The cow that produces 40 pounds of milk a day that tests 2.8 per cent returns 1,120 pounds of butterfat which when sold at 40 cents a pound returns an income of 45 cents daily. The cow that produces 25 pounds of milk a day testing 5 per cent returns 1,250 pounds of butterfat which when sold at 40 cents returns 50 cents per day. In the course of a month the cow producing 15 pounds of milk less a day will return to her owner \$1.50 more and if the same relation should hold true for a year this would amount to \$18 difference, which on a herd of 20 cows would run into real money.

So it is not always the low pro ducer that should be culled out. There are more cows giving 40 pounds of 2.8 per cent milk than most people realize and usually they are profitable cows, but so often the cow producing but 25 pounds of 5 per cent milk is regarded as an unprofitable cow when in reality she returns more than the cow making 40 pounds daily.

A butterfat test on every cow every month of every year will serve as a valuable indication of the true worth of the cows. Such a test can be obtained in almost every section of the state either through cowtesting circles, cream stations, county extension agents or Smith-Hughes



Something to Think About By F. A. WALKER

THE LOVE OF SOLITUDE

THE truly great, the large-souled men and women who delight in going afield in the mystic realm of thought, you will find are ardent lovers of solitude.

They are never lonely wherever they may be, for they have found the way to happiness by getting acquainted with themselves, whose companionship they prefer to any other.

Washington chose solitude when he prayed for strength and guidance in the forests; Lincoln knew nothing of loneliness when he lay upon the floor of his log cabin before the glow of a hearth fire, studying by its faint light and pondering the subject matter of his lessons; the late John Wanamaker solved his most difficult business problems in privacy.

The men and women of exclusion illuminate the world by dazzling achievements, born to them in their quiet hours of isolation. Their works flare up like magic torches to light the paths of the faltering and dis-

The greatest writers do their best work in solitude, often in the nighttime, when voices are hushed and sttence is supreme.

And so do painters and presidents, kings and captains, students and in-

There is nothing more inspiring to thinking minds than quietude; nothing so grandly sublime and impressive as a canopy of stars in a still night when one is far away from the noisy haunts of men with one's own thoughts.

Only in solitude can man find himself. It was in solitude on the seashore that Demosthenes found himself, whence he came and stirred the people of his time with such oratory as had never been heard.

Real nobility of the soul dwells only in the men and women who care nothing for social gatherings and frivolities. Such men and women prefer to be alone with their muses, where they find their greatest pleasure in study, meditation and exploration, from which the human family ultimately

THINGS FOR OCCASIONS

GRATE the meat of a fresh coco-nut, from which the brown skin has been removed. Cook one tablespoonful of onlon with one of butter, add one tablespoonful of flour and one teaspoonful of curry powder. Add one quart of milk, or half milk and half water and the coconut. Simmer a few minutes, add salt and pepper. The dried coconut may be used, if steamed and the sugar washed out.

Mock Woodcock.

Trim the crust from four slices of bread and toast a golden brown. Spread thickly with butter and a dozen finely chopped anchovies. Pile on a warm dish and set in the oven. Beat the yolks of four eggs, add one cupful of cream and stir over a moderate fire until the mixture thickens. Pour quickly over the toast and send at once to the table.

Roman Parfait.

Dissolve five tablespoonfuls of sugar in two tablespoonfuls of boiling water, add one tablespoonful of granulated gelatin sonked in two tablespoonfuls of cold water, let stand over hot water until the gelatin is dissolved. Strain this into one pint of thick cream whipped, add two teaspoonfuls of vanilla, six tablespoonfuls of orange juice and the grated rind. Turn into a mold and bury in ice and salt for four hours.

Sweetbread Salad. Drop sweethreads into cold water, changing as often as the water discolors. Ler them stand until quite white, then pull out all the tubes and put into a saucepan. Cover with fresh cold water, add a slice of onion, one small bayleaf, one blade of mace and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Heat quickly to the simmering point and simmer for twenty minutes, Drain and drop into cold water, letting stand for an hour. Wipe and cut into small pieces with a silver knife. Make a French dressing and pour over the sweetbreads, set away until ready to nerve. Then add an equal quantity of finely cut celery and mayonnaise dressing. Mix well and serve on let-

Parboll the sweetbreads in water with a small amount of vinegar; this helps to whiten them and adds to the



Zoning Operates to the Benefit of Entire City

The justice and legality of zoning under police or community power and the impracticability of zoning when attempted through property condemnation were emphasized at the national conference on city planning at Springfield, Mass. It appears to be difficult for some property owners to grasp the fact that zoning, in addition to its usefulness in stabilizing real estate values, is primarily a public welfare measure, and that Its benefits are too numerous and too general to leave any occasion whatever for particular compensation through condemnation pro-

The legality of zoning, wherever it has been tried under reasonable conditions, has been established beyond doubt. The principle has been upheld, on two separate occasions, by the United States Supreme court, in one instance the approval of the high court being given where a zoning ordinance was retroactive. The principle goes back to the inherent right of the people of a state "to pass laws for the public safety, health, morals and gen-eral welfare." Exercise of the right is simply community power. It is known also as police power, although the police are in no way directly connected with it. Zoning authorities point out that this power is that which the state may use for protection against fire or the spread of disease. The high court of the nation has held that this power may embrace regulations simed at promotion of public

convenience and prosperity. How zoning has to do with both public safety and prosperity may be readlly seen. Through regulations governing the location of buildings and certain kinds of business and the nature of structure that may be erected in the various districts or zones, there come to be both protection of property values and insurance against unhealthful conditions. Plenty of light, air and sunshine are just as essential to physical wellbeing as is freedom from dirt, smoke and other unwholesome things that may be associated with commercial or industrial plants. In setting aside certain districts for residences and for industrial and commercial establishments, zoning operates to the benefit of all concerned.

Realize That Beauty Pays

"European cities have taught me never to apologize for beauty as an element in city planning," J. C. Nichols told Kansas City realtors who recently gathered at a dinner in Kansas City for a report on critical observance of Old World cities fashloned by the centuries.

"European cities realize that beauty pays, like commerce; that distinction in a city is a hold on the people," continued Mr. Nichols, who always has stressed the practical side of city planning. "Not costly ornamentation, not extravagance but beauty that is born in orderly lines, in stretches of uniform cornices, in artistic little shop fronts, in the play and sparkle of fountains, in the parks and free spaces, In vistas and in public buildings enhanced by proper placing. It is such things that make people love the old

A plea was voiced by Mr. Nichols for action that would make Kansas City distinctive among American cities, and for a cultural development that would remove any temptation for families of this region to remove with their children to either coast for "advantages."-Kansas City Star.

Each State to Give Tree

The latest effort in tree planting under the auspices of the Forestry asso ciation is the new national arboretum in Washington, in which each state in the Union will be represented. Seeds from the trees with a history are being collected from every state. In the long list of famous trees to he represented in the arboretum are the Lincoln hackberry at Decorah, Ia.; the Washington horse chestnut at Bath, Pa., presented to General Brown by George Washington; the Sir Joseph Hooker oak at Chico, Cal.; the Washington walnut at Maplewood, N. J.: the mulberry tree at Spartansburg. N. C.; the Rathbone elm at Marietta, O.; the Bartram cypress at Philadel phis. Pa.; the De Soto oak at Tampa. Fla.; the Whittler elm at Haverbill, Mass.; General Grant's tree. Chicago; the Webster tree at Franklin, N. H.; the battle ground oak and new oak at Gullford. N. C.; the council tree at Council Bluffs, Ia.; the Logan elm at Circleville, O.; Lafayette's tree at the battle of Brandywine; the tree planted by Lafayette at Yorktown, and many others.

Good Street Tree

As a street shade tree the white ash has fine possibilities, says the American Tree association of Washington, D. C., which will send you a tree bulletin for a two-cent stamp for postage. Its comparatively light foliage makes it especially desirable for streets, as the open crown permits the passage of sunlight and free circulation of air. The tree develops a round, graceful top and it grows fairly rapidly. The Carolina poplar will grow in dark crowded streets.



CAMPING AND PROBLEM OF FOOL

There is no healthler sport than camping. During the warm and balm; spring and summer days, it is res recreation. To get out in the frest air and sunshine, free from worry and care, enhances the health of any one, be he office man, salesman or what not. But due to the entirely inadequate

means of food preservation and re frigeration found in the majority of camps, there is the ever-present danger of sickness from infected foods The utmost care must be taken in or der that this may be avoided. Butter and eggs should be bought only as used The milk is a problem in itself. Per haps the solution lies in the use of a milk other than market milk, in order that purity and sterility may be as sured. For such use, evaporated milk is ideal. Many people are wont to confuse evaporated and condensed mllk but there is no similarity between the tion of sugar and milk and can be used only when both of these substances are desired. Evaporated milk is merely pure, fresh milk with about sixty per cent of the water removed and the nutrient content left intact. It is absolutely sterile and pure, having been sterilized before leaving the factory. The water, removed by evaporation, may be replaced very easily and the milk returned to its original volume. Evaporated milk may be ob tained in small cans, containing six ounces or in larger ones containing sixteen and can be taken to the camp in quantities sufficient for the needs of the entire period, thus assuring a constant supply of pure, fresh milk with out the worry or the danger attached to the use of the market product.

Following are recipes for a few dishes that are best adapted for camp consumption because of ease of prepa ration, purity and food value.

Tomato Soup. i pint tomato pulp 1½ cups water or canned to- Salt and pepper mate soup to taste

Bring tomato pulp or soup to the boll, add the seasonings and soda. Heat the milk and water and combine slowly with the temato mixture.

Stirred Eggs.

Stirred Eggs.

4 cup evaporated 4 tsp. paprika milk 6 eggs
4 cup water 2 tbsp. fat
4 tsp. pepper Grated cheese
Beat the eggs, add the milk, water and seasonings. Melt the fat in a frying pan. Add the egg mixture and stir until the mixture is creamy. When almost done, aprinkle with grated cheese. Serve on silces of bread, tossi or crackers.

Cultivate Young Orchard

A young orchard requires plenty of cultivation during its first summer in order to conserve moisture for the roots which He rather close to the surface. The planting of a cover crop may be delayed until late August or September, in the case of young trees, for this reason. All trees which are weakened by early leaf-full should receive generous application of nitrate of soda or manure next spring to bring them back to their normal, vigorous condition.

day when the air is moist. It isn't so much the number of trees in the orchard that counts. It's what those trees produce.

The keynote to successful spraying is proper sanitation, and the time to begin the campaign is now.

ORCHARD

PEACH YELLOWS IS

The fact that the peach diseases called yellows and little peach have STR/.YED: 1 red cow about 5 years has bred a feeling of false security on the part of some growers who believe that these troubles are on the decline.

In an article in New Jersey Agriculture, in which he gives a detailed description of these destructive diseases, William H. Martin, plant pathologist at the New Jersey agricultural experiment station, says in substance: Peach yellows is by no means a new disease in New Jersey; the term was coined as early as 1791, when the disease made its appearance in the lower

The most characteristic symptom of yellows, the article reads, is the ripening of the fruit several days to two weeks in advance of that of a normal tree. In addition to this the fruit from an affected tree is commonly more or less red-spotted and blotched. The spots occur either on the skin or throughout the flesh. Little peach differs from yellows in that the fruit Mr. and Mrs. Dan Karr, of Vernon, remains small and ripens from seven the same variety, and the diseased fruit is frequently flattened and somewhat irregular in form.

A tree affected with yellows develops sickly, wiry and finely branched shoots on the trunk. These much branched shoots may appear on a very young tree and are an important symptom of the disease. Young trees show a drooping of the leaves toward the branches and trunks of the tree, combined with a slight curling of the tips toward the petioles or leaf stems. The foliage of the tree is frequently yellowish green, although this is not always the case. On a tree affected with little peach the leaves droop toward the branches and are curied and rolled; their color becomes lighter, usually a mottled yellow-green.

In conclusion Dr. Martin says: "In many sections small, neglected orchards exist which contain a large per cent of diseased trees. Conditions are better in the imported fruit-growing sections, but a number of diseased trees are to be found. These trees are a menace to the healthy trees and should be destroyed. It is a waste of time and money to attempt to bring them into bearing."

The New Jersey State Horticultura. society advocates that active steps b4 taken to reduce these dangerous diseases, and in the opinion of Doctor Martin, all peach growers would do well to co-recrate in a plan of eradi-
