## Lt. Elmer McKnight Awarded Air Medal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, ENGLAND—First Lieutenant Elmer B. McKnight, son of Mrs. Lorado McKnight, 602 East 4th Street, Littlefield, Texas, has been awarded the Air Medal for "exceptionally meritorious achievement" while participating in sustained bomber combat operations over enemy occupied continental Europe, it recently was announced by the Commanding General of the Eighth Air Force.

The citation accompanying the award read in part: "The courage, coolness and skill displayed by this officer upon these occasions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States." Lt. McKnight, bombardier on a B-17 Flying Fortress, has flown on some of the Eighth Air Force's roughest missions over Germany, including Berlin, Dresden, Kassel and Dortmund. Other successful bombing assaults credited to Lt. McKnight are those in the area of southern and central Germany where marshalling yards, supply depots, Nazi airfields, and other vital enemy targets have been knocked out by our heavy bombers in coordination with the advances made by the U. S. ground troops. Accurate bombing by Lt. McKnight and his fellow bombardiers by use of intricate bomb sighting devices has resulted in the location and destruction of many key industrial centers.

Before joining the 398th heavy bombardment group commanded by Lt. Col. Lewis P. Ensign, El Paso, Texas, Lt. McKnight received training in Texas at Midland and Hondo. He was graduated from Littlefield High School in 1937, and later attended St. Mary's University, San Antonio, Tex. His wife, Mrs. Kathryn Darby McKnight, also is from Littlefield.

## M-Sgt. Wayne Duffey Home From Overseas

M-Sgt. Wayne D. Duffey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Duffey of Yellowhouse Switch, arrived home July 3rd after two years service overseas as a mechanic in the 8th Air Force.

## Pfc. Orvel Morris Gets Bronze Star

Pfc Orvel W. Morris, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Morris, of 17 miles west of Littlefield, attached to the Fifth Army, who has been overseas a year, first being stationed in North Africa, and later in Italy, has been awarded the Bronze Star. In awarding this decoration, R. E. S. Williamson, Brigadier General, U. S. Army Commanding, sent the serviceman the following Citation: "Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45 as amended, you are awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in action—on 14 October, 1944, near Sassi, Italy. When his company established an ammunition dump in a forward position, Private First Class Morris carried the first load by vehicle from the rear over unswept and exposed roads. Through enemy mortar and artillery fire continually falling along the road Private First Class Morris without thought for his personal safety carried the ammunition through for his company. Two enemy machine guns fired at him from atop the escarpment but realizing the desperate need for supplies, Private First Class Morris unhesitatingly delivered the ammunition to the ammunition dump. Completely ignoring the enemy fire, he returned to make two more trips that night. Private First Class Morris' courage, initiative and loyal devotion to duty enabled his company to maintain constant fire in support of the rifle companies. Private First Class Morris' courageous and loyal devotion to duty on this occasion reflects great credit on himself and becomes the highest traditions of the United States Armed Forces."

## Light To Heavy Rains Fall Monday Night and Tuesday

Precipitation Is Reported Fairly General Over Area

Light to heavy rains fell over the South Plains area Monday night and early Tuesday.

Although it was somewhat spotted, the moisture was fairly general. The rain is reported to have extended from Littlefield to Plainview, east to Lubbock, and West to beyond Muleshoe. Some damage is reported at Morton caused from the high wind and electrical storm. Littlefield received .22 inch; Muleshoe received a big rain; Sudan 1 1-4 inches; Amherst 3-4th of an inch; Lubbock .62 inch; Plainview and Cotton Center, good rains; Beck's Gin, half an inch. Farmers in the Bula area stated they had plenty of moisture and were going ahead and planting feed. Baileyboro reported no rain, as also did Spade Community. Levelland reported 1 1/2 inches for the past week, with half an inch Monday night. Although Littlefield received no moisture Thursday night, other cities and communities in this city's trade area report good rainfall. Four inches were reported at Beck's Gin, with about three inches at Bula with good moisture between that community and Bull Lake. One and a half inch of moisture is reported at Levelland and Sundown, with good rains at Enochs, and Morton. Sudan and south and east of that town, as well as Pep, received good rains. Heavy showers were said to have fallen at Amherst, and an inch and a half of moisture in the Olton territory.

P. A. Nafzgar of one mile south of Olton said that area received an inch and a half of moisture; that it began raining about seven o'clock Thursday night, and rained for an hour. He said, however, that he noticed the rainfall was lighter as he came nearer to Littlefield.

## Plenty of Petroleum

Active participation of every woman in Lamb County in the used fats campaign is needed now to help deliver the knock out blow to the Japs, E. C. Munro, acting district representative, Amarillo, Texas District Office, announced this week.

National reserves of fats and oils are lower than at any time in two years while the demand for munitions, military medicines, opiates to ease pain, sulfa ointments and many other military items are at an all-time high and will get still higher as more soldiers are shifted to the Pacific. Increased civilian needs make the situation more serious, he added.

"Every drop of fat that can be scraped from the bottom of frying, roasting and boiling pans, every teaspoonful lifted from the top of soups or from melted down fats are needed to help off-set a national deficit," Munro emphasized.

This year's goal for used kitchen fats is 250,000,000 pounds. In many instances collections have dropped in larger towns and cities because of meat shortages. To off-set this decrease and go over the top this year, more used fats must come from towns and rural areas where families do their own butchering and have access to more meats.

## More Used Fats Needed

No nation other than ours has produced petroleum in such huge quantities. Why can we produce it? Is the United States peculiarly blessed by nature with a resource not found elsewhere? Not at all! The reason we United States produces more oil than other nations is that Americans have taken full advantage of our freedom of opportunity. We have drilled more exploratory wells—called wildcats by the oil industry—than the people of other countries. As a result of that opportunity to venture, and the willingness of Americans to venture, we now have all the petroleum necessary to win the war. Petroleum is not peculiar to the continental United States. It is found in all parts of the world. In the light of present knowledge, our top geologists tell us that some six million square miles of the earth is potential oil land. We have explored only a fraction of that land, in the United States and outside it. Plenty of petroleum will be available to do the work of mankind for generations to come, provided the opportunity to find and produce it continues. So says William R. Boyd, Jr., president, American Petroleum Institute.

## NAVY HOUR LAUNCHED

New Orleans, "NAVY HOUR", a new 30-minute program, will hit the air waves for the first time Tuesday, July 10, 1945, at 8:00 p. m. Central War Time, over the National Broadcasting Company facilities. The program will originate in Washington, D. C.

NAVY HOUR, the first network radio series to be written and produced by the Navy Department, will feature a 90-piece U. S. Navy Symphony Orchestra, a high-ranking Navy officer in a report of the current war news, a pick-up from a ship of the Pacific Fleet, and an especially written dramatic tribute to the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard with a name guest star and especially arranged music. Lieut. Robert Taylor, USNR, will be helmsman for the first three programs.

Spotlighting the Pacific War, "Navy Hour" is scheduled to run for 13 weeks.

## ADDITIONAL GOVERNMENT FARMS TO BE PURCHASED IN LAMB COUNTY

Announcement was made this week by Stilwell H. Russell, Lamb County FSA Supervisor, that applications are now being accepted by the Farm Security Administration for the purchase and improvement of farms in Lamb County under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act.

According to Mr. Russell, applicants generally are considered eligible who possess the following qualifications:

1. Must be a citizen of the United States of America.
2. Must be, or have been, recently engaged in farming as a means of providing the major portion of his

family income. Exceptions to this rule will be made to veterans. A veteran to be eligible should have had practical farming experience, but need not have been farming just prior to his induction into the armed services. Special consideration will also be given veterans in regard to family status.

3. Be willing to cooperate with representatives of the FSA in developing and carrying out a sound farm and home plan and maintaining such records and accounts as may be required until the debt is paid.
4. Be morally, physically, and mentally acceptable.

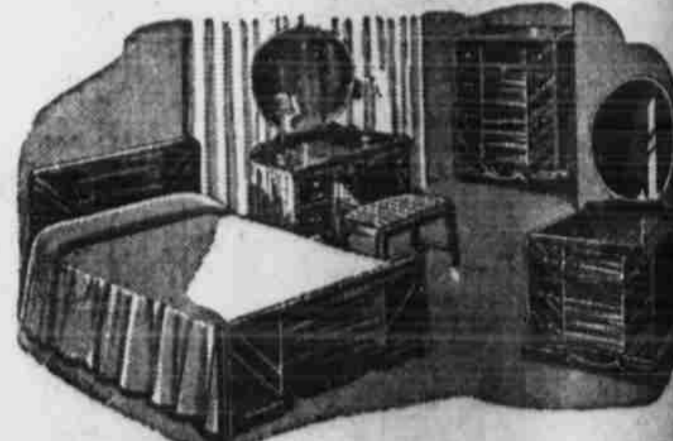

 In The Armed Forces**

U. S. ARMY 178TH GENERAL HOSPITAL, France.—Sgt. Andy B. Davis of Morton, Tex., holds one of the Army's most unusual occupations—that of farmer.  
 The sergeant, assigned to the 178th General hospital in Reims, France, as a surgical technician, is serving at present as foreman of a 23-acre farm operated by the hospital to grow fresh vegetables for convalescent soldiers.  
 Sgt. Davis, who operated a 320-acre farm in Texas before entering the Army in March, 1941, takes charge of all details of planting and harvesting for the hospital farm and supervises the work of 30 German prisoners of war.  
 The farm is one of many in the Army's Oise Intermediate section in France to help provide American soldiers with vegetables not otherwise available and to reduce pur-

chases from the French who are faced with a food shortage.  
 The Morton soldier arrived overseas last fall for duty in the hospital surgery room until last March when he was put on special duty on the farm project.  
 Sgt. Davis has five brothers in the armed forces; Pfc Orville W. Davis, now in France with the signal corps after serving in Africa and Italy; Sgt. Richard L. Davis, with a signal battalion in France; Capt. G. A. Davis, Jr., on duty in the Philippines with a fighter squadron; ARM 3-3 James E. Davis, with the Navy in the Pacific; and S 1-c Calvin W. Davis, also in the Pacific.

A recent release from the Headquarters of the 8th Division, Public Relations office, to the Leader reports that Cpl. Jack Brotherton is now returning home from Europe with the Eighth Infantry Division, the division which accounted for 21 times its own weight in Germans by taking 316,187 prisoners during ten months of combat. The Eighth (Golden Arrow) Division was in the Normandy breakthrough, the capture of Brest, the bitter fight in the Hurtgen forest. Troops of the Eighth were the first to cross the Roer River, launching the drive that reached the Rhine. The Golden Arrow Division then cut the Ruhr pocket in two and finished its ETO fighting by crossing the Elbe and linking with the Russians.

Cpl. Brotherton entered the service in September, 1942; has been overseas a year, participating in campaigns in Normandy, France and Germany.

Cpl. Tom Brotherton, another son, is with the Air Transport Command based in France. He is doing radar work, and has been in service nearly three years, and overseas a year last February. He is awaiting assignment.

Robert Al Brotherton, RM3-C, is in an Amphibious unit, stationed at Pearl Harbor.

He reported to his mother, Mrs. R. A. Brotherton, that he had recently spent two leaves in Honolulu with Cecil Woodworth, whom he had not seen since boot camp. Cecil is believed to be on a destroyer and based in Hawaii.

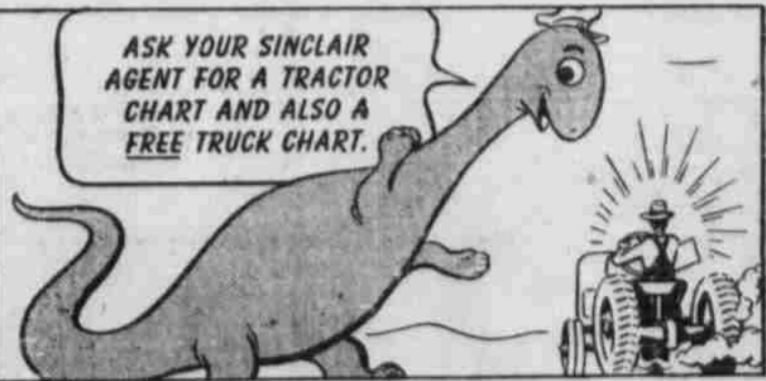

**Town and Farm In Wartime**

**Civilians at War**

The Government needs and asks its citizens in the 186th week of the war against Japan to:

1. Keep your family well-fed by using the many alternates for scarce foods. Careful planning will help you to serve healthy and attractive meals despite shortages.
2. Budget your wartime spending. Saving now helps hold prices down. Spending later will stimulate prosperity when war production ceases.
3. Back up the men who will bring victory over Japan by becoming a Wave. 20,000 are needed for hospital and other assignments. Write Waves, Washington 25, D. C., for information.

**Farm Loans for Service Men**  
The Farm Security Administration has been authorized by Congress to lend \$25,000,000 in the next 12 months to returning service men who want to buy family size farms, and started making these earmarked loans on July 2, through more than 2,000 county offices. Part of an additional \$25,000,000, not restricted for the use of veterans, also may be used to make loans to discharged service men.

The loans, made under terms of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act of 1937, can cover the full purchase price of a farm, and allow up to 40 years for repayment. They bear interest at 3% on the unpaid balance. Applicants must find for themselves the farms they wish to purchase. Each farm is appraised, and a loan is made only when the purchase price is in line with the farm's actual value, based on its longrange earning capacity.

**Extra Gasoline for Service Men**  
Additional gasoline rations may now be obtained by service men having furloughs of more than 30 days, OPA Administrator Chester Bowles announced. "Furlough gasoline will still be issued at the rate of a gallon a day," Mr. Bowles explained, "but the 30-gallon limit is being removed for the benefit of released American prisoners of war who get leave or temporary duty assignments for sixty days in this country, and for those members of our armed forces who return from overseas and get more than 30 days leave."

"Service men applying for furlough gasoline rations should follow these three easy rules. 1. Apply at any local war price and rationing Board. 2. Bring along the mileage rationing record for the car to be used, and 3. Be ready to show furlough papers."

**Consumer Prospects for Footwear**  
Consumers will be given an opportunity to buy men's and women's "odd lot" shoes ration-free and at mark-down prices when a small percentage of shoes in these categories is released to the public during the three-week period July 9 through July 23, OPA announced. "Odd lot" shoes must be sold to consumers at prices at least 25 per cent below the prices at which they were being offered for sale on June 1, 1945, OPA said. Women's shoes with heel heights of one inch or less may not be included in the release as these shoes are usually the type worn by growing girls and do not accumulate on dealers shelves as odd lots. Dealers are requested to limit sales of "odd lot" shoes to no more than a pair to each customer. . . The first complete inventory of the Nation's stocks of both rationed and non-rationed shoes will be taken by shoe dealers on July 31, 1945, OPA also announced. This is to determine how many pairs of shoes can be allotted to consumers and whether any shoes can be released from rationing.

**Production of Bedding & Electrical Appliances Increased**  
Production of bedsprings, box springs, innerspring mattresses, studios couches and other types of bedding will be increased in the coming months, says WPB, but not to any appreciable extent, as the supply of textiles and other materials is still limited. . . Limitations have been removed on the manufacture of the following electrical appliances: air heaters, household toasters, casseroles, chafing dishes, heating pads, household waffle irons, dry shavers, hair clippers, permanent wave equipment and home dishwashers. Continuing scarcity of materials, however, will also limit the number of these items available to consumers for many months. . . To provide more work socks for civilians, WPB removed the freeze on circular hosiery knitting machines above 72 needles that had been frozen to the production of wool socks for the Armed Services."

**Farmers to Get More Lumber to Repair Homes**  
An additional 23,000,000 board feet of lumber has been allotted to

Pacific from July 1943 to June 1944 when he was returned to this country to attend officers candidate school.

**War Food Administration for distribution to farmers for emergency maintenance and repair of farm dwellings in the third quarter of 1945, WPB announced. Farmers make application for the lumber to the County Agricultural Conservation Committees, and approved applications are rated AA-3 by Delegation of Authority from WPB to WFA. Emergency cases for which applications will be approved are limited to repair of damage caused by fire, flood or similar disaster, or repair of dwellings that would be uninhabitable or a definite hazard to the health of the occupants if not repaired immediately, PB said. Four Groups Eligible for Preferred Gasoline Rations**

Changes affecting the eligibility of several groups of persons for gasoline rations were announced by OPA. They are as follows: 1. Servicemen returning to this country from overseas, who are issued temporary duty orders for "Rehabilitation, Recuperation and Recovery" may obtain furlough gasoline rations. These servicemen should apply to their local War Price and Rationing Boards and present both their temporary duty orders and the mileage rationing record (OPA R-534) for the car that they are going to use. Previously, the ration was given only when servicemen on leave or furlough for three days or more presented leave or furlough papers. The furlough ration, which will remain unchanged, provides one gallon of gasoline each day of the furlough, leave, or temporary duty, to a maximum of 30 gallons. 2. Because growing crops damaged by hail or wind must be inspected promptly for maximum salvage, adequate gasoline rations will be provided insurance adjusters to make trips to farms for this purpose. Formerly, semi-preferred mileage, which is limited to 825 miles per month, was permitted for travel to farms to inspect storm damaged crops. 3. Preferred mileage rations will be issued to buyers for essential plants who have to travel long distances to buy cattle, sheep, pulpwood, rice and similar items processed at the plants. Local boards will give the preferred mileage rations to buyers for such essential establishments as packing plants, feedlots, canneries or processing plants, under the following conditions: (1) Applicants must be skilled in grading and classifying the products they buy, (2) The industry's marketing practices or conditions, such as unavailability of public markets, must require buyers to travel long distances. Heretofore, these buyers

were limited to semi-preferred mileage. In many cases this ceiling of 825 miles per month, which will remain unchanged when the regular "B" ceiling is raised to 650 miles a month, does not provide sufficient gasoline for essential travel by these buyers. 4. The eligibility of social

workers for preferred mileage limited by the provision that full time social workers who both employed and paid by a profit organization may be preferred mileage rations. BUY WAR BONDS AND STAMPS

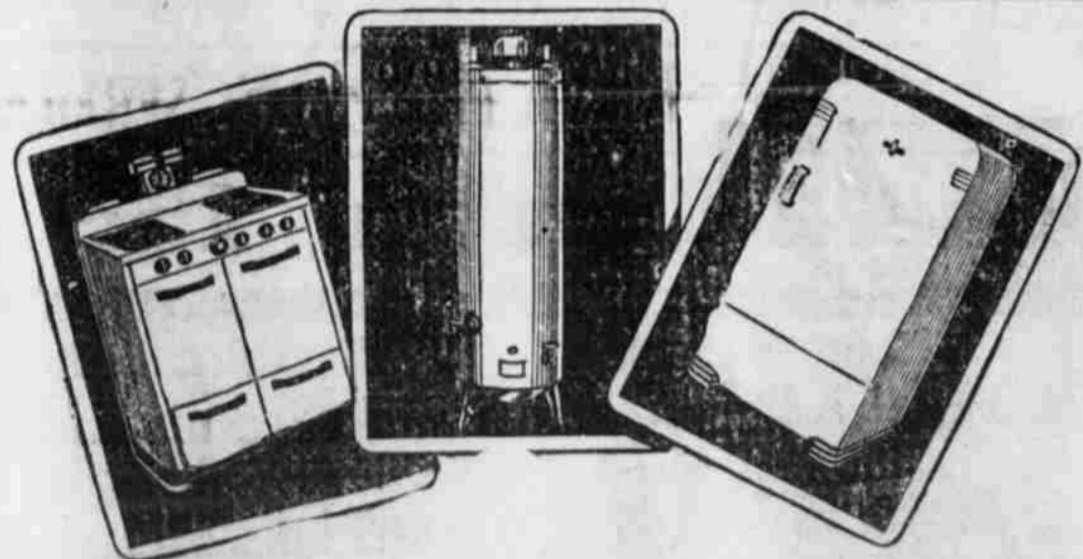

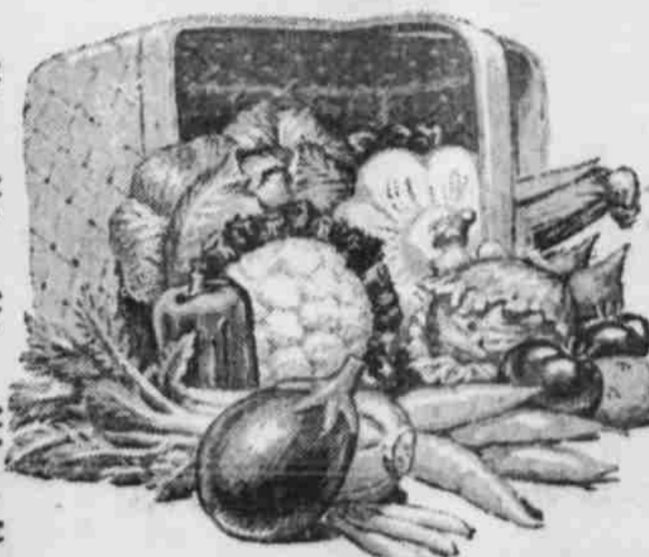

Sidelights From Washington

By GEORGE W. MAHON

The U. S. Senate, after reasonably brief hearings and debate, will ratify the United Nations Charter adopted at San Francisco. That is the prevailing view in Washington. There is an air of eagerness and optimism which exceeds the early expectations of friends of world organization.

Within two hours after Senator Connally arrived from the conference he gave us Texas members a preliminary report on the new charter. Early U. S. ratification would set

the pattern for other nations. War has become such a terribly destructive thing that there can be no hope for the world unless we can establish an effective organization for peace.

The Charter makes dull reading, but it can and must become the greatest instrument for peace ever created by man. There will be many disappointments ahead, and we must steel ourselves against them, realizing that the Charter is far from perfect and that we must not expect too much or too little of it.

Anyone wishing a copy of the proposed Charter can secure it by addressing a request to me at the House Office Building, Washington, D. C.

Those interested in rural electrification in West Texas will be pleased over the action we took in the House last week. I joined other friends of REA in putting through an amendment which provides for an additional one hundred twenty million dollar REA expansion pro-

gram. This money is provided by Government loans which are repaid by patrons of REA. Applications for REA expansion now average one million dollars per day. The program is still being retarded, however, by the scarcity of certain critical material.

Members of the House almost come to blows whenever the merits or demerits of oleomargarine and butter are discussed in Congress. For fourteen years there has been a provision in an appropriation bill prohibiting the purchase of oleo for the Army except for cooking purposes, unless special request to the contrary is made by the soldier. Some of us recently undertook to strike this from the law, arguing that though most of us prefer butter, both foods are wholesome and neither should be discriminated against. (We argued that in view of food shortages, the Army should be relieved of what we called an unreasonable restriction. After heated debate, however, the motion was defeated and the restriction remains in the law.

On all sides one hears comments to the effect that President Truman has got off to a good start as President. He is friendly, and he would not know how to be arrogant or aloof. There has probably never been a more informal, down-to-earth, friendly sort of fellow in the Presidency than Harry Truman.

Most people in public life have referred to former Presidents as Mr. President or Mr. So-and-So. Even President Roosevelt was generally called Mr. President or Mr. Roosevelt by his associates in public life. But scores of men in public life call President Truman by his first name, Harry. It seems to fit in perfectly with the man. He appears to think of himself as just an ordinary fellow with a big job to do and who needs a lot of people to help him.

He was extremely well received when he appeared before the Senate last week to deliver the United Nations Charter. The Senate has been consulted from the beginning of the proposed plan, first by President Roosevelt and later by President Truman, and the ground work for favorable Senate action has been well laid.

Speaking of President Truman's informality, on the first occasion when he addressed a joint session of Congress, he forgot to wait until Speaker Rayburn presented him before proceeding with his speech. He was about to do the same thing on the next occasion, when Senator Rayburn whispered audibly, "Hold on, Harry, let me introduce you!"

Not long ago I had occasion to call on President Truman at the White House. He had on a blue shirt and was in his shirt sleeves. With complete informality, he began the conversation by inquiring about conditions in Lubbock, recalling his visit there last year.

Of course, the President has a hard road ahead of him, but all our people wish him well, particularly in the field of foreign policy and in his capacity as Commander-in-Chief for the knock-out blow against Japan.

SUDAN POSTOFFICE IS ADVANCED TO SECOND CLASS

The postoffice at Sudan was advanced to second class on July 1, according to a letter received by Postmaster Simon D. Hay, from the first assistant postmaster general, at Washington.

The advancement is based on gross receipts, and receipts of the Sudan office for 1944 total \$10,559.11. Only 85 per cent of the gross postal receipts is counted for purpose of determining the class, and the Sudan office on this basis is over the second class bracket by \$975.24.

The second class rating entitles the office to an extra clerk, and also means an increase in salary to the postmaster.

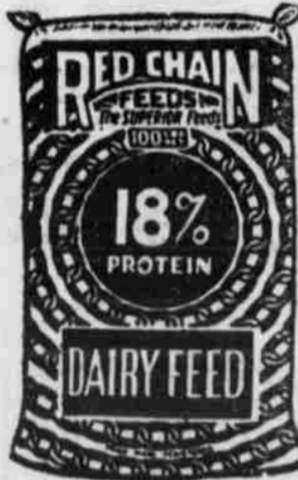
