# Condemnation Suit Hearing Saturday

A condemnation suit, filed by the City of Littlefield against two Lamb County farmers, will be heard Saturday before three special commissioners in the county courtroom.

The hearing is set for 10 a.m. with Ernest Black, Willie Steffey and Buster Feagley sitting as court-appointed commissioners.

Defendants in the suit are Dwain Phillips and Ice Cummings. The two denied easement rights for the city to lay a pipeline on their property. The land in question is a county road which landowners deeded for road purposes only.

The city sought easement for a 24-inch pipeline which will bring water to the city from the sandhills tract now being developed. Proposed route of the pipe is in the narrow ditch on the west side of the dirt road, which lies 1 1/2 miles east of US-385.

The city secured easements from 18 of the 20 landowners involved along the route, offering them free water taps and the installation of meters in return for right-of-way on the pipeline.

Phillips contends that the out-of-town water rates, which are 50 percent above city rates, should not apply to users on this line. Cummings' main objection, on the other hand, is his concern for future paving possibilities.

The city's position on the water rates, according to Mayor B. W. Armistead, is that the out-of-city charges have been in effect since about 1956 and the council feels it would be discriminating to make any exceptions. Too, the city is bound by these rates in its sale of bonds to finance the water improvements program.

Cummings said a discussion with Lamb County commissioners revealed that the state will not pave over the water line, if such a project was ever approved on the county road.

Should the state participate in a paving program on this road, it apparently would have to obtain all its additional right of way on the other side of the road. A city official said it was "very doubtful" that the state would ever consider the road for paving since it runs nearby to US-385.

The county could pave on the 33 feet right-of-way if it so desired, however, since it ordinarily paves only a 20 foot strip. Besides the paving question, Cummings thinks the approximate \$1 per foot payment for easement is not sufficient.

County Judge J. B. Davis appointed the three special commissioners for the condemnation hearing. Both parties approved the appointments. Black is a real estate man and cotton buyer from Amherst; Steffey and Feagley are both farmers residing near Littlefield.

## IN FRIDAY CEREMONY Masons To Level LHS Cornerstone

A Masonic cornerstone leveling ceremony at Littlefield's new \$527,689 high school plant is scheduled at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow with John R. Collard Jr., grand master of Texas Masons, here to conduct the impressive event.

Charles Jones, master of the local Masonic Lodge, emphasized Wednesday that the general public is invited and urged to attend the cornerstone ceremony. A number of out-of-town Masons are expected to be present.

The Littlefield School Board, along with school administrators, have been issued special invitations to attend the ceremony. The new plant is part of a huge \$800,000 bond issue approved by voters last year. It is scheduled for completion for the start of the fall term of school.

The event will mark the first Masonic cornerstone leveling to be conducted in Littlefield, records indicate. Masons participated in a ceremony when the post office building was erected, but no Masonic cornerstone was included in the building.

Masons will assemble near the new high school site at W. 10th and Wicker at 2 p.m. and form for a procession to the northeast corner of the building. The Littlefield High School Band will play several selections for the ceremony.

The audience will sing "America," and the band will also play "March and White" and the "Star Spangled Banner."

The Rev. Robert N. Huckabee, grand chaplain from Lubbock, will deliver the invocation and benediction. Collard will level the cornerstone, assisted by officers of the Grand Lodge of Texas.

## Settlement Reached in Cattle Suit

A suit in which two plaintiffs joined in alleging sale to them of diseased cattle was settled out of court this week after being scheduled for hearing Monday in the 154th district court.

The suit was filed by S. O. and Phillip Richardson of Hale County, cattlemen who operate in Lamb County as Otis Richardson and Son, and by Eugene and Robert Heath, who operate as Heath Bros.

Their suit was against Walter B. Herman and Garland Rose, cattle raisers near Olton.

Pleadings in the suit alleged that Hereford cows bought on November 3, 1962, from the Rose cattle ranch had a disease that impaired their value and that were represented to the plaintiffs to be "clean" and with calf at the time of sale.

The two plaintiffs bought groups of cattle separately, but on the same date and from the same sellers, the pleadings stated. The Richardsons bought 73 head of cattle; Heath Bros. bought 10 head.

The Richardsons sought damages alleged for losses in sale of the cattle, for veterinary fees and for disease in other cattle owned by them and blamed on the Rose purchase. Heath Bros. sought losses alleged in subsequent sale of the cows bought from the Rose ranch.

Both plaintiffs asked exemplary damages. Settlement was reached before the case was called before District Judge Pat Boone, Jr.

## State Seeks \$14,902 From Lamb Co-Ops

A huge suit to escheat personal property now being held by several Lamb County cooperatives has been filed by the State of Texas in 154th District Court here in Littlefield.

The State is claiming title to a total of \$14,902.64 of abandoned property in the form of unclaimed dividend checks. The citation lists five cooperatives as holders of the property, and the suit names approximately 960 persons as owners of the unclaimed checks.

Largest single amount listed in the escheat suit is \$12,376 which is classified as preferred stock in Farmer's Cooperative Assn. at Amherst.

Defendants, or any person claiming an interest in the per-

sonal property listed, are notified to file an answer to the suit in 154th District Court on or before 10 a.m. Monday, April 27.

The state alleges in the suit that the property was reported to the State Treasurer by the holders as abandoned personal property, subject to escheat, and that it was advertised and remained unclaimed for 120 days or more.

The defendants and the amount of the property listed in the citation are: Spade Cooperative, Inc., \$373.86; Field-ton Co-Op Gin, \$782.32; Littlefield Farmers Co-Op Gin, \$1,942.80; Farmers Co-Op Gin Assn. of Amherst, \$12,376 in preferred stock and \$172.09 in unclaimed dividends; and Olton Co-Op Gin, \$255.57.

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## Mrs. Askew Gives Carrot Cake Recipe

Mrs. Gene Askew, mother of two, gives a recipe this week for one of her family favorites, Carrot Cake.

This cake can be made ahead of time to serve at gatherings. It serves about 20 people and leftover cake can be frozen.

**Carrot Cake**  
Mix together:  
3 cups flour  
3 cups sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tsp. cinnamon  
2 tsp. soda  
Gradually add:  
1 1/2 cups wesson oil  
3 eggs  
2 cups carrots  
2 tsp. vanilla  
1 1/2 cups pecans  
1 can pineapple

Pour into a greased angel food pan and bake at 350 degrees for an hour. For a company treat, top with whipped cream.







# GenTel Budgets \$183,400 For Littlefield Area Work

General Telephone Co. has approved a \$183,400 construction program budget for the Littlefield area in 1964--the largest outlay here since dial conversion, according to District Mgr. Bob Saunders.

Biggest portion of the budget is for a zone plan to provide rural service in an area around the city. More than 100 prospects are listed for this service, and \$83,400 is budgeted for this project.

Saunders said the big budget reflected the company's desire and intent to keep pace with the growth and development of the Littlefield area.

Saunders had previously announced the company's intentions of extending service in the immediate vicinity. The expanded rural service and extended area service to Whitharral and Bula were three major items listed when a new telephone ordinance was introduced.

Other work included in the new construction program are new carrier systems for additional toll and special circuits going to Lubbock, Anton and Spade, upgrading of facilities and service to the Crescent

Park and Cannon Terrace areas of town, and additional feeder cable to the southeast section of town.

It will probably be the latter part of the year before work is completed on the expanded rural service. The EAS to Whitharral and Bula is reflected in part of the construction program -- such as new lines and terminals and additional carrier systems to be installed.

The EAS service to Whitharral was completed this past week, after a target date of April has been set. EAS to Bula is scheduled to come in the third quarter of the year if everything goes according to schedule. An area telephone cooperative has additional work to complete before the project is extended.

The addition of some 100 lines and 200 terminals in the central office equipment is tabbed for \$25,000. Additional carrier systems for toll and other circuits is down for \$19,000.

A new feeder cable to Crescent Park addition for new service and to upgrade service is budgeted for \$13,900. An additional cable to the Cannon Terrace area for growth and up-

grading, due to a new school being constructed there, is tabbed at \$12,000.

The new cable southeast is expected to relieve problems on the Lubbock highway and provide for more growth. About \$10,000 is pegged for this work.

Routine upgrading and local maintenance as required is set at about \$20,000--which is above the amount normally budgeted, according to Saunders.

## Check Income Tax Returns

District Director of Internal Revenue, Ellis Campbell, Jr., said that the percentage of correctly prepared returns has increased sharply in the past few years, but numerous simple mistakes continue to show up.

Campbell said: "The best advice we can give on filing a return is when you complete it, resist the temptation to put it in the mail right away. Set it aside for a day or two, then give it a thorough review for omitted income or deductions, errors in arithmetic, printed name and current address, social security number, correct copies of W-2's, signatures."

Quite often, Campbell pointed out, the taxpayer will find that a review of his return will turn up mistakes he did not notice previously. "It's human nature to want to put the return in the mail immediately," he said, "but a careful review by the taxpayer now may prevent delays in processing your return or the issuance of a tax refund check or savings bond."



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
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
