Celebrating Our Independence

This year the Fourth of July should mean a lot more to most of us than just an opportunity to go swimming, to go on picnics or to shoot off firecrackers.

Faced with increasing threats to our independence, in recent months we have probably heard more and thought more about the virtues of life in America than at any other time since 1917. We who for so many years have taken our independence, for granted have suddenly become vitally aware of it as a way of life which is worth any sacrifice to protect.

The Fourth of July has been the most important holiday in this country for 165 years-when our countrymen declared us to be free of all ties to England and stated our belief as follows:

"We hold these truths to be selfevident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

All of the complicated systems of government we have devised since that time has been tested by law, in the the light of its adherence to the platform as set forth in our Declaration of Independence. All of our relations with foreign governments have been studied from that same viewpoint, and anything which has threatened the continuance of our independence has been repulsed.

In our heetic discussion about polities and social programs, we often lose sight of the crystal-clear aims of our form of government as set forth in the Declaration of Independence and in our Constitution.

All of us have been taught about these documents in school, but few of us have read them since. On Fourth of July would be a good time for everyone of us to get out a history book, or even the world's Almanac, and read once again these famous documents. When we celebrate the signing of the Declaration of Independence this year, let's be sure we know what it is we are celebrating.

RAILROAD MEDIATION

Most of us have worried about the interference with defense production caused by strikes. No figures are available to show just how many more, ships, tanks' planes and guns might have been built if it hadn't been for strikes, but we know the number is considerable.

But one thing we haven't had to worry about is the efficient movements of raw materials and of finished products to their proper destination in this country. The railroads have done a notable job of handling a rapid increase in hauling goods without any disruptions.

Furthermore, we have felt secure in the belief that there would be no interruption in railroad service due to labor difficulties. We know that railroads have an employee-employer meditation plan by which any difficulties which have arisen have been settled without disruption of service.

But there is trouble brewing in the railroad industry right now. Because of increased handling of freight the railroad employees envision big profits for the railroads and are impatient to "get theirs". In fact, they have asked for wage increases which, it is estimated, would cost the railroads 909 million additional dollars a year, which, the railroads say, is \$700,.000,-000 more than their total net income

In spite of increased railroad activity, railroad statisticans figure that if they complied with union reguests they would be worse off than at any time during the depression. And their present wage charts show that the railroad employees are now earning more than they ever did in the railroad's most prosperious years.

It is hoped that both sides will put their cards on the table and settle the problem in a fair and business-like manner. The railroad unions, made up of a fine group of Americans, should use their present differences as an opportunity to show other branches of industry how labor and management can sit down at a table together and come to an agreement - without strikes, without picketing and without slowing up one iota the part which they are playing in defense of their johs, their homes and their country.



AUSTEN, TEX., July 1 (UP)-Drunken drivers in Texas are due for rough times at the hands of Texas prosecutors if the district Attorneys were earnest in their protests when Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel vetoed the new drunken driving bill.

At behest of presecutors who wired that the old law was enforced with difficulty the legislatures overruled the governor's objections and put into effect penalties that the prosecutors asked.

These penalties are:

For first offense-imprisonment \$500; or-both fine and imprisonment within the limits given.

For second or subsequent offense imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than one year nor more than five years.

The penalties are incurred for operating a motor vehicle upon any public road, highway, street or alley while "intoxicated or under influence of intoxicating liquor".






