### Maurine Smith Makes Elaborate Christmas Ornaments as Hobby

Looking for a recipe for prune cake for the holiday season? Mrs. Maurine Smith is sharing her favorite recipe for prune cake with the readers this week.

Mrs. Smith and two sons, Dale and John live about 1 1/2 miles northeast of town. Her sister, Hallie Fox, lives with them.

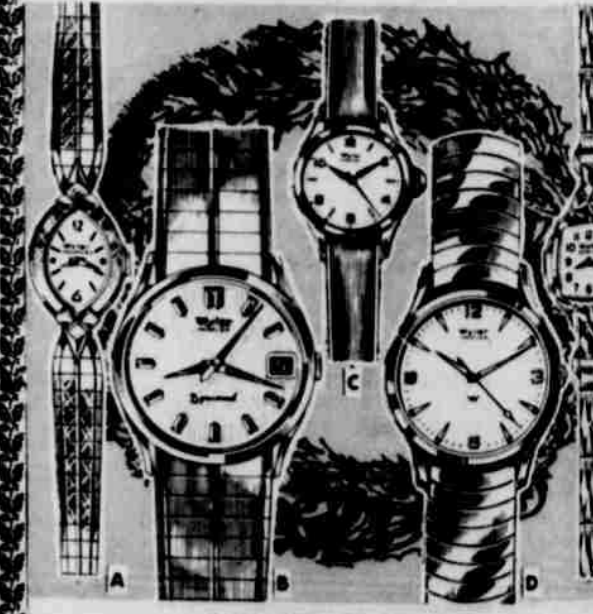

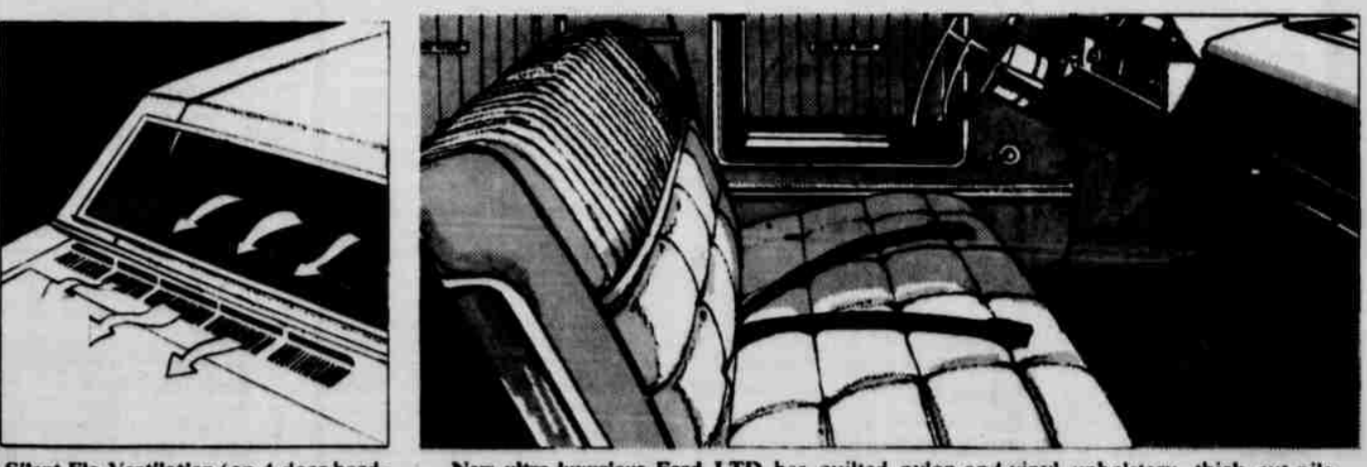

**Cow Society Not Democratic**

Cow society, according to A.M. Meekma, Extension dairy specialist, Texas A&M University, is very undemocratic. Like most animals that run in herds, they seem to set up a rigid social hierarchy in which every cow has her place. She is a queen to all the cows below her, and the loyal subject of all the stronger cows in the herd.

A herd of grazing cows is a highly organized social group. The boss of the herd is "cowed" by none. She has free and uncontested access to the best grazing spots, the best shade, or any other privilege she may choose to enjoy.

On the other end of the herd is the "cowed" cow. She has no privileges, defends nothing, and takes the leadings. A true pacifist, she will wait for hours for her turn at the feed bunker rather than fight with her superior.

A cow establishes her rank soon after she joins the herd, and once it's set it isn't likely to be challenged until another newcomer tries to find her place in the social order. Status, Meekma finds, seems to depend mostly on ability to push and shove. Audacity and daring are much more important than a talent for making milk. In fact, the high producers are more often found at the bottom of the social ladder.

In most larger herds there is often a "public servant." Any cow, regardless of her place in the social order, can come to this cow for a "refreshing" face washing. In answer to a gentle, pleading nudge, the servant will turn and lick the head, face or neck of her herd mate. Another aspect of cow "organization" noted by Meekma is a rest period after about an hour and a half of feeding. At this time, the herd will often bunch together, combining their flyswatting strength, while their food settles.

"Cow sociology," says Meekma, is interesting but it also has some practical utility. Understanding the "bovine social order" and how it works can prove useful in handling cows and in planning facilities for them.

**Contour Farming--A Paying Practice**

Contour farming definitely is a paying conservation practice according to all the experiment stations throughout the nation. On the experimental plots where contouring is applied for a long period of time and with all kinds of crops, there has been a production increase over similar plots treated with other type practices.

Contour farming is like all other conservation practices, it has its limitation alone, but with the aid of other conservation practices it can be applied to all land. A good definition of contour farming is conducting farming operation on sloping cultivated land in such a way that plowing, land preparation, planting and cultivation are done on the contour, which may include following established guide line, terraces or diversions. The use of guide line is not recommended on slopes greater than one percent with the support at terraces or diversions.

Contour farming can be applied to all dryland farms and irrigated farms where sprinkler system are used. Where a good contour system is applied and good management is used, these benefits will be received: Holding and storing the rainfall, prevention of water erosion and retarding erosion, plus better crops.

Contour farming is not new. Farming methods dating back into the early BC era included contour farming, and where these practices were continued, the land is still productive. The soil conservation service personnel is ready and willing to help anyone interested in conservation practices at any time. All that is needed is for you to let them know what you are interested in.
