"Not Enough Interest In Drive," Says County Chairman, Miss Walker

Lamb county was well represented at a meeting of the Camp & Hospital Council in the recreation room of the Union Hospital at the South Plains Army Air Field Thursday afternoon.

From this area attending were: Mrs. Virginia Walker, County chairman; Mrs. Jess Elms, Littlefield chairman; Mrs. L. M. Brandon, Executive chairman; Mrs. Ves Terry of Dalena, District chairman; Mrs. Mary Gray, chairman for Sudan; and Mrs. Johnson, also of Sudan.

A feature of the program for the afternoon was the address given by Flight Officer Pachalio, returned from overseas, and at the South Plains Army Field on military business Thursday. He participated in the African, Sicily and Italian invasions, and was a patient in a hospital in England on D-Day, when 100 patients in four hours' time were brought there. He recalled that some men were wounded in various ways; many having their legs and arms blown off, chest wounds, etc.

He related the splendid work being done in these British hospitals by the Cross workers, stating they do everything for the patients that the doctors do not have time to do, such as writing letters home, providing patients with cold drinking water, and the many services to make patients more comfortable.

In an interview with Miss Walker, County chairman, Saturday, she said:

"We still don't have interest enough in this McCloskey drive. We are not asking for expensive gifts—we do not need to exceed a dollar and the contributor does not want to give more—just a remembrance of all we are asking for."

Miss Middleton Decorated For Outstanding Service

First Lieut. Forrest D. Middleton, husband of Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Middleton, was decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross for his service over enemy territory. Miss Middleton was the former Miss Elaine Myers.

With six other overseas veterans, Lieut. Middleton was decorated last week for outstanding service in the American Army Air Force by Lieut. Col. D. B. Shaw, Acting Commandant at Ft. George Wright, in a formal Retreat Parade. An Navigator of his squadron, he was awarded a Distinguished Flying Cross for leading his Liberator Squadron successfully against an enemy aircraft factory in Germany under persistent attack from 50 enemy fighters.

He courageously manned the nose guns, driving off the enemy aircraft, enabling his plane to complete a highly successful bombing run.

Last Rites For C. R. Heard Sunday Afternoon

Passes Away Suddenly Thursday Afternoon When Taking Rest

C. R. Heard, 68, passed away suddenly Thursday afternoon about 2:30 o'clock, as the result of a heart ailment.

As was his custom, Mr. Heard, who with his wife owned and operated a grocery store in Southmoor Addition here, left the store after lunch to take an afternoon nap in the Heard apartment adjoining the store. When it became 4:30 o'clock, and Mr. Heard didn't get up as usual, Mrs. Heard went to his room and found him dead. It was the opinion of Dr. C. E. Payne, who was called, that Mr. Heard had been dead two hours when discovered.

It is reported that all four Heard brothers have died suddenly. A brother, Charlie Heard, passed away in a similar manner last spring. Mr. C. R. Heard was the last of the brothers.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Ninth Street Church of Christ, Littlefield, with Bro. Alva Johnson, of Turkey, officiating. Interment, in charge of Hammons Funeral Home, took place in the Littlefield Cemetery.

Surviving deceased are his wife, and two sons, Roy of Los Angeles, who arrived in Littlefield Saturday in response to the death message, and Curtis of Clovis. He is also survived by a granddaughter, Judy Heard.

The Heard family have lived here since 1923, coming to Lamb county from Winters, Texas, where they had lived 18 years.

Mrs. Heard will accompany her son, Roy, back to Los Angeles, Cal., this week, where she will make her home with her son and daughter-in-law.

T-Sgt. R. R. Hodges Wounded In Action

T-Sgt. Robert R. Hodges, 24, brother of Mrs. John Sterr of seven miles north of Amherst, is reported to have been severely injured September 16, in the invasion of Germany, and is now in a hospital "somewhere in France." This message was received October 7 from the service man's commanding officer, and no further report has been received.

T-Sgt. Hodges is also a brother of Mrs. J. P. Bean of Littlefield; and of Mrs. Bill Workman, formerly of Amherst, but now of Amarillo. He is a member of the 22nd Infantry. He was graduated from Amherst High school with the 1938 class; and was employed in the County Agent's office, Amherst, when he volunteered in the spring of 1940. He has been in the service about four years.

The local lads were never behind after Billy Lyman found Homer Peel open on the 20-yard line early in the first period and heaved a beautiful pass to the rugged end who tucked the ball away and went the distance for a touchdown. Buster Owens kicked the extra point which looked mighty big a few minutes later when the Wildcats were penalized to their one-yard line and Lobo Blount plunged over for a Levelland touchdown making the score 7-6. Early in the second quarter the Wildcats lost Sidney Buell, line-backer deluxe and key man on Coach Fikes' intricate T-formation. It looked bad for the Wildcats, but Homer Peel, alert end, grabbed a Levelland pass off the arm of the passer and went all the way for a touchdown. The Levelland boys threatened ominously for the remainder of the period but the Littlefield boys stiffened and the half ended with the Wildcats in the lead 13-7.

Littlefield fans breathed a little easier when near the end of the third period Billy Lyman, on a beautifully executed decoy pass, hit Oscar Arend on the 50-yard line and the shifty little back with beautiful down field blocking, side-stepped all the way to pay dirt. Extra point was missed and the score stood 19 to 7. But the Loboes stormed right back to score again on a beautiful run. Extra point was good. The Wildcats fought valiantly throughout the last period to preserve that slender 6 point lead. Much credit is due that courageous little substitute center, Landon "Slow" Grissom, who went in the first half in place of Buell under terrific pressure. Pfc. Brown Wounded; Arrives At Temple

McCLOSKEY GENERAL HOSPITAL, Temple, Texas, Oct. 14.—The rumor that the Germans stole almost a million cars when they evacuated Rome may be true, but there were still plenty of cars, motorcycles, and bicycles in the Eternal City when the 88th Division got there, according to Pfc. Thurman E. Brown of Littlefield, Texas, infantryman who arrived at McCloskey General Hospital, Temple, Texas, this week.

"I thought there was no gasoline in Europe and especially in Italy, but there were plenty of Fiat cars running around the streets of Rome," this 20-year-old Texan reveals, adding, "Furthermore, everyone seemed well-dressed."

Brown, who saw his first combat about 15 miles north of Castelnuovo, Italy, and was wounded at Volterra by 88 fragments, can't get over the royal welcome accorded the Americans when they entered Rome. "Boy, did those Italians carry on," he exclaims. "They sang, threw flowers, kissed all the guy, and gave them all wine!"

The city itself provided many unusual cultural points of interest, he added, such as monuments, works of art, old ruins—all untouched by war except for a few railroad yards.

"The restaurants had poor food, though—the Italians were hard up for grub," he tells. Brown saw a movie, "Sergeant York," in all Italian dialogue while in Rome and says, naively, "I don't know how the movies work that deal but Gary Cooper speaks fluent Italian."

Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Brown of Littlefield, was inducted

Feb. 8, 1943, and went to Camp Howze for basic training.






