## Hospital Crowded, But People Quiet

DIMMITT — The lobby at Castro County Hospital was never more crowded. But people brought here Tuesday night by a twist of wind and fate are quiet, perhaps as quiet as those who came here for an ordinary visit.

Hushed voices describe the terrifying tornado which hit the Sunnyside community only a few hours before.

Over in a corner sits a man who has learned his 12-year-old daughter is dead and his wife is missing.

He does not talk. He listens as his preacher and a brother try to console him.

Anxious faces gaze about, seeking word on the safety of loved ones.

A reporter asks a teenage boy how he got the cut on his hand.

"I had gone to the store to get a can of kerosene. My mother and sister were home, and Daddy was at the church. It hit when I started to leave the store.

"Something caught my hand when I tried to open the door. I don't know what it was."

Then he tells the reporter: "My sister was killed. They haven't found my mother."

It dawns on the reporter. This is a member of the Phelan family. He is Larry Don Phelan.

Nona Beth Phelan, his 12-year-old sister, is dead. His father is sitting in the lobby.

The Phelans later learn a woman, horribly battered, has been brought to the hospital. She is first tentatively, then positively identified as Mrs. Sylvia Phelan, the mother.

She undergoes surgery three times that night, and the next morning she is listed in critical condition. Doctors are attempting to remove a piece of 2-by-4 board which has lodged in her back.

Extra doctors and nurses are on duty at the hospital. Attendants try to tell worried relatives who is injured.

A woman asks about her husband.

"O thank God!" she says, as she is told her husband has suffered only minor injuries.

A Dimmitt Baptist preacher, Rev. Ben Atkins, checks into the hospital. He is tired and covered with mud.

"I was in the church when it hit. The lights were out and we had just finished eating supper. Different ones were watching, and somebody said it looked like a cyclone is coming.

"Directly somebody said it real."

## Church Gets Brunt Of Storm

SUNNYSIDE — This farming community of 50-75 persons began to pick up the pieces Wednesday after a vicious tornado took three lives, injured at least 33 persons and caused hundreds of thousands of dollars in property damage Tuesday night.

Rescue workers continued to comb the wreckage Wednesday, but they found no other bodies.

The dead are T. R. Hogan, 51, Sunnyside gin operator; J. B. Kidd, 55, Plainview; and Nona Beth Phelan, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Phelan, Sunnyside.

Twenty-nine of the injured were treated at Castro County Hospital, Dimmitt. Others were taken to Olton, Lubbock and Littlefield.

Property damages will run well in excess of a half-million dollars, Dimmitt officer W. W. Jones estimated early Wednesday.

The savage storm struck about 8 p.m. Tuesday, leveling its fury at a Baptist Church meeting. Some 50-75 persons were in attendance.

In addition, five business houses were destroyed or damaged. Many homes were leveled and others were heavily damaged.

Half of the Sunnyside Baptist Church, a new section completed only last April, is scattered northeast of the site.

Cars outside the church were crumpled together as though a giant hand had squeezed them.

Rescue units from throughout the area were on hand Tuesday night and Wednesday, along with Red Cross and Salvation Army personnel.

Most critically hurt of the injured are Mrs. Sylvia Phelan, 30, Sunnyside, mother of the dead girl; Mrs. T. R. Hogan, about 50, Sunnyside, wife of one of the dead men; Jose Ruiz, 9, Sunnyside, whose right arm was amputated; and Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Williams, Sunnyside.

The storm struck the community almost without warning, hitting an El Paso Natural Gas station southwest of Sunnyside and moving northeast across the community.

The meeting at the church was a brotherhood of the Stakes, Plains Baptist Association. It had attracted many persons from area towns.

The funeral was first sighted by the wife of the pastor of the church, Mrs. Murie Rogers. She ran into the church and warned of the approaching disaster.

Some were able to make it to a cellar behind the church. Others ran to their cars, but were caught before they could leave. Still others stayed inside the church, becoming victims of falling timbers and rubble.

After the tornado hit, disaster units rushed to the scene, using portable lighting equipment to search for casualties. Law enforcement officers were on the scene to combat a mounting traffic problem.

Thirteen doctors, including three from Tulsa, four from Hereford, two from Friona and four from Dimmitt, were called for duty at the Castro County Hospital.

How does it feel to be the South Plains' champion speller?

"I still can't believe it," says Bobby Ross, who last Saturday captured the regional spelling bee at Lubbock.

Bobby continued to receive congratulations here this week, both from his elders and youngsters his own age.

The victory at Lubbock was the result of steady, concentrated work since January.

Now comes the hardest work of all, however.

Bobby must prepare to meet the best spellers in the country at the National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C., in June.

As winner of the regional bee, Bobby will receive an all-expense paid trip to the nation's capital.

Bobby, 13, a 7th grader here, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Ross, who are as proud of their son as any parents could be.

The long (four hours) match at Lubbock would be a strain on anyone, but Bobby says he never became overly excited.

"I believe that's the secret of winning," says Mrs. Ross.

Bobby does admit, however, that the nervous tension had him tired at the finish.

Was there any particular word he feared?

"No," says Bobby. "I can't think of any. But I did get worried one time 'illicit,' when they asked me to spell 'illicit.'"

Bobby says he started to spell "illicit" and the judges stopped him.

"I thought for a minute that I was through," says Bobby, "but the judge said he had forgotten to say which word he meant. He told me the definition and I spelled it right."

Bobby was the regional bee champion when his opponent, Runner up, Truett Reeves, missed the word "octogenarian." Bobby spelled that one correctly, then spelled

Keith King, Johnny Emfinger and Dennis Moore were riding in the pickup when the accident happened. They all received first aid treatment at Olton before being admitted to Littlefield Hospital.

The driver of the vehicle, Dennis Moore, said he swerved the pickup to miss a dog which ran in front on him.

King was hospitalized at the Medical Arts Hospital with facial lacerations. He was being examined Wednesday for other possible injuries. Emfinger was admitted overnight at the Medical Arts Hospital for treatment of abrasions and contusions.

Moore was admitted to the Littlefield Hospital for treatment of an eye injury.

## Boy, 15, Dies After Auto-Go-Kart Crash

Funeral services for Jackie Wroe, Wayne Gage, 15-year-old victim of a tragic go-kart - automobile crash here Monday night, were conducted Wednesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church.

The boy, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Gage to die in traffic accidents since 1953, was buried in Littlefield Memorial Park.

Jackie, a sophomore at Littlefield High School died at Medical Arts Hospital Monday night at 7:10 about 40 minutes after a crash in which he received head and chest injuries.

The mishap occurred at the intersection of 17th Street and Wroe Avenue, about 2 1/2 blocks from the Gage home at 601 E. 16th.

Jackie's go-kart was in collision with an auto driven west on 17th by Leon Otis Gray, 43, of 210 E. 17th. Gray was driving home from work.

Witnesses said the Gage boy turned the corner at 16th and Wroe, then headed south on Wroe, toward the circle in Crescent Park.

Beryl Harris, who lives at the corner of 17th and Wroe, said the go-kart attracted his attention when he heard it coming down

...blare of trumpets... in the towers of Zion... cascaded over Jeru... a rain of silver, sig... arrival of daylight... moment, a veiled group... came rushing through... west Jaffa gate, turning... to drape the disaster in absurd... farfusions.

The women persisted. "We entered in and found not the body..."

"An angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled away the stone and sat upon it... "We were afraid, and bowed our faces to the earth."

They had no single version, only a single conviction. "Two men stood by in shining garments..."

"A young man was sitting on the right side clothed in a long, white garment..." "His appearance was like lightning..."

They Could Not Believe

The apostles, disheveled, nerve-shattered men, shook their heads in skeptical disdain. They already had believed and trusted too much in vain to believe anymore. All had come to naught, to degradation and ruin.

Apparently under the strain of the past three days, the women had come back from the tomb with their heads awry with hallucinations. They had gone there to anoint the body with hyssop and rose oil, and their senses must have deserted them.

"We trembled and were amazed..." they said. "The keeper shook and became as dead men..."

And the angel said... "why seek ye the living among the dead?... Go quickly and tell His disciples..."

He is risen from the dead!"

The men dismissed the report as an idle tale, the women's ridiculous fancy. They would not be deluded again. But a thin, remote glimmer of yearning, of forlorn wistfulness, arose in two of them.

The hulking, grief-wracked

Peter and the even-minded John determined to go and inspect the sepulchre, at the risk of being recognized and arrested. Mary Magdalene followed behind them.

When the men returned, they were aghast and perturbed, almost as if they doubted their own reason, but they remained unconvinced of any imagined rising of a dead Jesus, and they spoke in curt, morose tones.

Yea, the stone seal was removed. The tomb was empty. Even the burial linens lay there, abandoned. Yet they drew no conclusions from that riddle. Baffling yea. But they could not rebuild faith on a vacant grave slab.

Later, when Mary Magdalene came running back to the house alone, exclaiming feverishly that she had encountered the Lord himself outside the tomb, the apostles discounted that, too.

After all, she had first thought the man she met was a gardener, and no doubt he was just that. The emotional woman of Magdala was prone to such flights. Jesus himself had cast seven devils out of her. Perhaps they had come back. Even when two excited friends, Cleopas and Simon, returned from a four-mile trip to Emmaus, insisting they had seen Jesus, the disciples disbelieved.

It was learned that the pair did not identify as Jesus the man who walked with them and sat down with them at meat until He broke bread and vanished, or seemed to. Then they felt sure of it. Rubbish!

The apostles rejected it. They shut their eyes tightly, clamped their jaws, pressed hands to their heads and turned away, their shoulders slumped. They were defeated men, hopeless, bitter, afraid, humiliated, with belief gone.

They had called Jesus the Lord, the Anointed of God, who would banish evil and oppression and bring abundant life to all. But instead, He had died on a cross. The very word, "crucified," was anathema in the mouths of Israel. The sages said that "the curse of God rests on him who has been hanged." How could one possibly believe that such a man had risen from his degraded death?

There at the house of the widow of Cyprus, the apostles spurned

the implausible vision, the impossible paradox. They were logical men. They were wary, dubious men.

There, at the house where they had sat and planned and prayed with Jesus, there where they had retreated from the storm, they reasoned with all careful logic of the world about Him who himself said the world could not receive His truth.

Neither, for a time in that upset household, could they.

## Farm Employer At Muleshoe Denied Braceros

DALLAS — Regional Director Tracy C. Murrell of the Department of Labor's Bureau of Employment Security in Dallas, said this week that Jimmie Presley, user-member of Western Farm Labor Association, Muleshoe, had been declared ineligible to use Mexican agricultural workers.

The decision did not affect the eligibility of the Association, Murrell said.

Presley was advised of the decision to make him ineligible because of his failure to maintain employment records and because of his unauthorized use of a worker while under contract.

The decision was based on Article 11 of the Migrant Labor Agreement which provides "an employer may use Mexican workers."

Presley did not appeal the decision. He was notified of the final determination to make him ineligible on April 7, 1960.

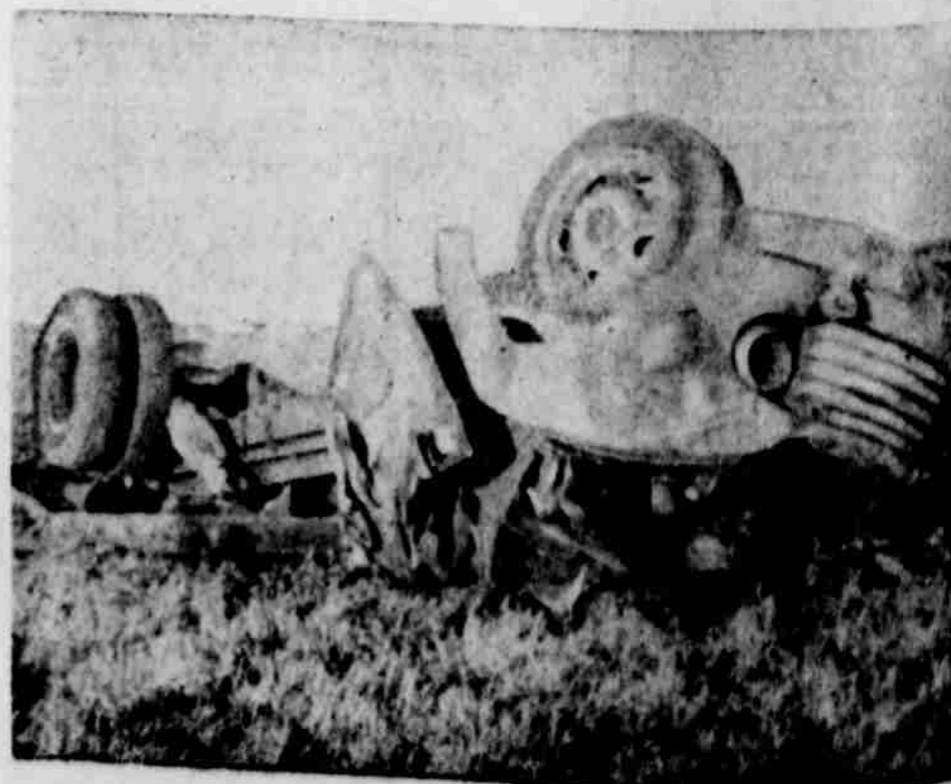
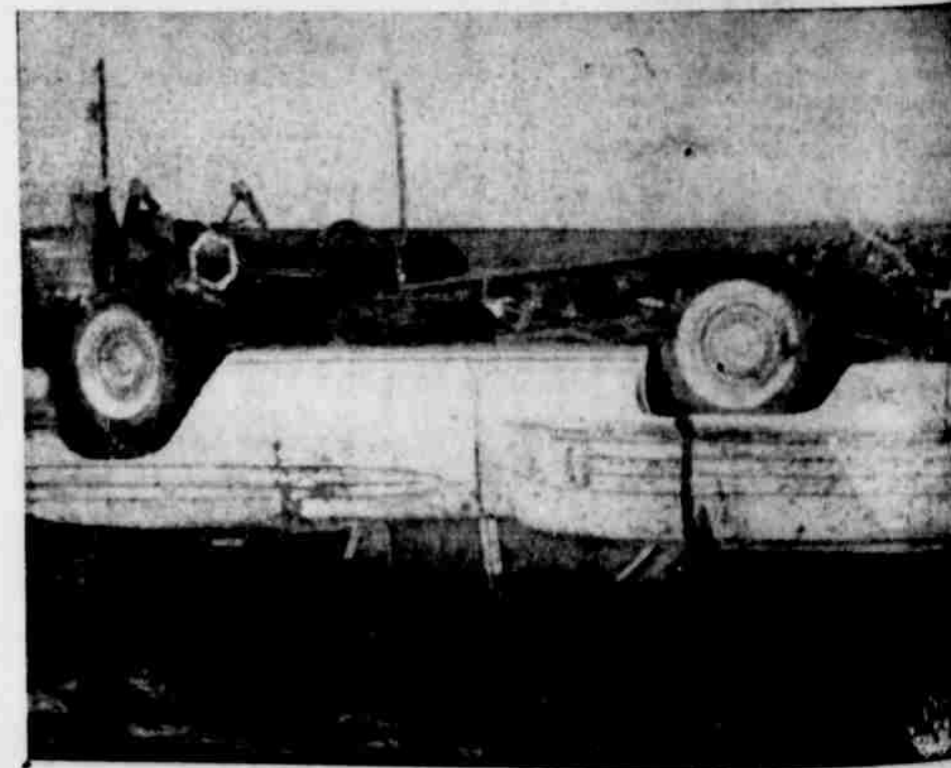

## Mrs. Landon Grissom To Head Cancer Crusade

Mrs. Landon Grissom of Littlefield has been chosen to direct the 1960 Cancer Crusade in Lamb County, it was announced this week.

Accepting the chairmanship of the annual educational and fundraising drive, which is set April 20, Mrs. Grissom urged "all public-spirited citizens of our community to make this a full-scale offensive against cancer."

"Public enemy disease number two," the chairman called it, pointing out that cancer is second only to heart disease as a cause of death.

April has been designated Cancer Control Month by presidential proclamation. Throughout the month, volunteers will distribute life-saving information to every

home in Lamb County, Mrs. Grissom said, and continued.

"Of course cancer control is a year-round program. But this is the time of the year when we go all out to try and save more lives. And it's the time when we ring doorbells and collect funds to fight cancer."

"More than 85,000 lives could be saved right now. They are wasted, literally thrown away simply because cancer isn't diagnosed and treated early enough. Either because people don't know the facts, or because they procrastinate."

Mrs. Grissom said a quota of

those wasted lives are to be found here in Lamb County. "So our local drive must be a drive to save those lives," she added.

"Our literature reaches every single household, and if a member of every household makes himself, or herself, responsible for safeguarding the rest of the family, we could eliminate this shocking loss of loved ones."

The ultimate defeat of cancer is the great objective of the Cancer Society's research program. It supports more than 1,000 top flight scientists in hundreds of laboratories in all parts of the country.

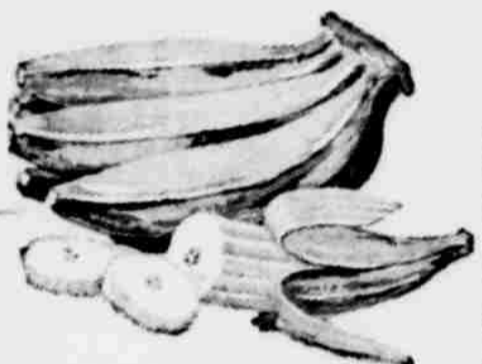

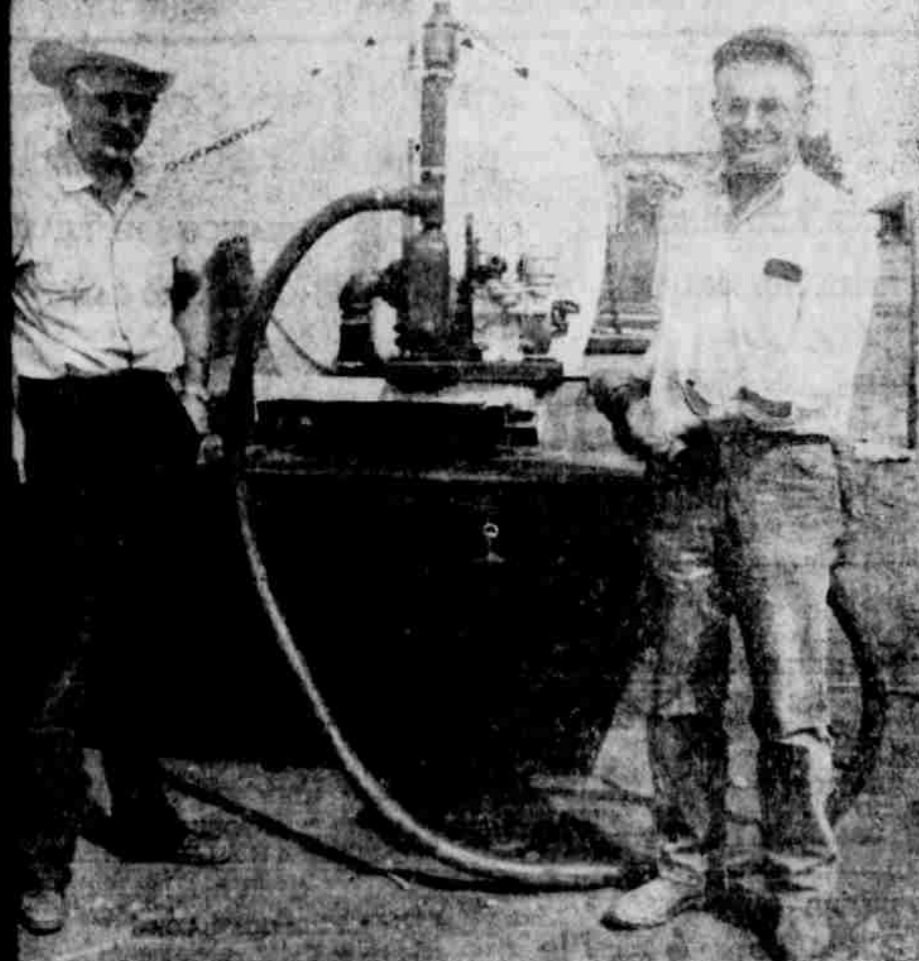

On the left, farms northeast of Brownfield on a farm that belonged to his father. "We don't have a lot of water up here but we do have good land. The land has been well taken care of — and what we have, we try to make it produce as much as possible. I have, altogether, 430 acres of irrigated cotton, and at the present time we are putting down 300 lbs. per acre of 13-0. Later we will side-dress as needed.
