

Body Of Will Rogers Is Brought Home To Claremore

The body of Will Rogers has been brought home to Claremore, Oklahoma.

The remains of the famous Oklahoma humorist-philosopher were taken from the Glendale, Calif., cemetery Friday for interment in a native stone crypt beside the Will Rogers Memorial Museum at Claremore.

Accompanying the body home were Lew Wentz, Ponca City Oil man, and Ewing Halsell, Vinita rancher.

Visited in Lamb County The fact that Mr. Halsell accompanied the remains recalls the fact that Rogers visited on many occasions in Lamb county as the guest of Mr. Halsell at the Mashed-O ranch, north of Amherst and owned by the Halsell interests.

A cowboy in his younger days, Will never lost his art and skill with a rope; in fact, he was considered "a good roper." Though fame had showered him in abundance, the beloved "Ambassador of Good Will" was just plain Will Rogers and he took his place at branding time and got a big kick out of the whole show.

Arrangements to move the body to the hill overlooking Claremore were made by the Will Rogers Memorial Commission, headed by N. G. Henthorne, Tulsa World editor, with the co-operation of Governor Kerr and former Governor Phillips.

Legionnaires report Mr. Boone out at the cemetery at work cleaning up graves that otherwise would not have been taken care of, which is typical of Mr. Boone, who is always found working hard at any civic enterprise to the betterment of his City or County.

The City scraper is also reported to be working over the streets in the cemetery preparatory to the service Sunday.

Sgt. Loe's right arm and a leg were wounded, and he has been a patient in the McClosky Hospital, Temple, for several weeks. He arrived home recently on a furlough, and will return shortly, when he expects to undergo an operation for the grafting of a piece of bone from his leg into his arm.

An effort has been made by the local Red Cross office here to secure furloughs for two half-brothers of Sgt. Loe in the service, so that they might visit him at Earth.

Judge I. B. (Dock) Holt last week authorized the Leader to announce his candidacy for re-election.

Judge Holt has been a resident of Olton and Lamb County since 1921. He is now serving his second term as County Judge. He served as District Court Clerk four years, and as tax assessor-collector four years.

Judge Holt will make his formal announcement later in this newspaper.

Anton Youth Drowns Tuesday

Jack D. Grant, 18, of Anton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Leroy Grant, became the second fatality at Buffalo Lakes this season when he was accidentally drowned about 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Witnesses said that Grant and two other Anton youths, Franklin Jackson and Ray Tidwell, were riding in a boat during a pleasure excursion at the lake. Grant, who was standing upright in the boat, lost his balance and tumbled backwards into the water. Unable to swim, he rose to the surface once and then disappeared beneath the water.

Lubbock firemen were called at 3:18 o'clock. Chief W. E. Twitty, assistant chief John Nugent and Tom Crow rushed to the lake with an inhalator. Firemen Pete Stark and J. C. Bond made a second trip with grappling hooks to recover the body.

After 50 minutes of grappling activity, the body was recovered about 50 feet from the bank, about halfway between the rock house and the bath house. Firemen said that the body had been submerged for one hour and 20 minutes.

Respiration treatment was started almost immediately by Elmo Low, Midwestern area representative for the American Red Cross, who was conducting a first aid and water safety class of South Plains Army Air field members at the swimming pool located about a quarter of a mile from the drowning scene. Low was assisted by Cyril Batton, first aid instructor at Texas Technological college, and the members of his class: S-Sgt. A. V. Carp, Cpl. W. H. Goldsmith, Tech-Sgt. George Hanneford, and Pfc. Marvin Howard, all of Anton.

At the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center, future pilots, bombardiers, and Navigators are receiving pre-flight courses to prepare them

for aerial instruction.

The present pre-flight class includes Adam H. Demel, 21, son of Mat Demel, of Pop Community.

The cadets begin pre-flight training as a single group. They are separated for specialized training as bombardiers, navigators and pilots midway through the ten-week course.

T-Sgt. Lonnie H. Horn volunteered for the Air Corps in February, 1942. He was first stationed at Lubbock Army Air Field and after one year was transferred to Frederick, Okla. He was in Oklahoma one year when he received orders for overseas duty.

Sergeant Horn is now on duty in England. He graduated from Sudan High school in 1935.

Lieut. Vernon O. Nixon, son of Mrs. Georgia Nixon of Okon, is now overseas and has participated in a course designed to bridge the gap between training in the states and soldiering in an active theatre of war. At one of the Air Service Command Stations somewhere in England, known as Control Depots, Lieut. Nixon was carefully processed by classification experts who make certain that he was well fitted for the job assigned to him.

Pfc. Edwin Coffman, after a 15 day furlough in Littlefield with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Coffman, returned Monday to training at Lake Charles, La. He is attached to the Air Forces.

Pvt. Leon A. Langford, son of W. A. Langford of two miles east of town, has been in the service three years, and has been overseas

about two months. He is stationed in England with an Engineering Unit. His wife and daughter, Mary Margaret, 6 months old, have been living with Mrs. Langford's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond McBroom, 3 miles southwest of town.

The bride was becomingly attired in a light blue wool suit, with white and black accessories.

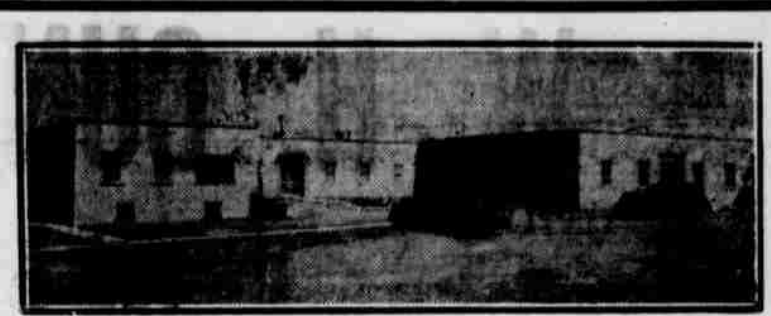
The groom is the son of Mrs. W. L. Wagner of Hylton. He returned

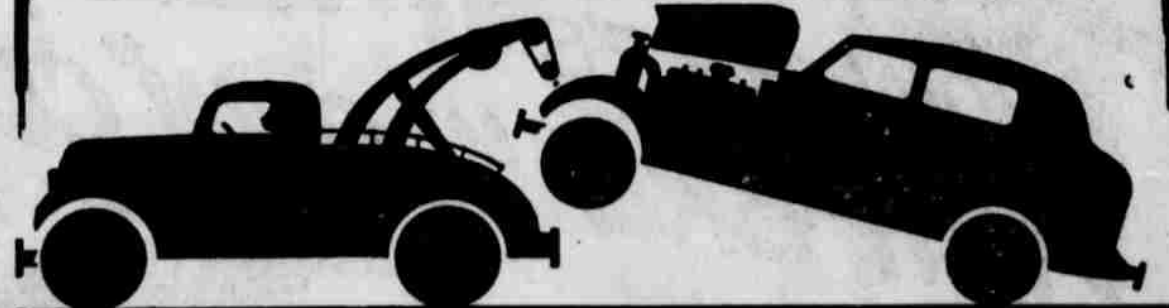

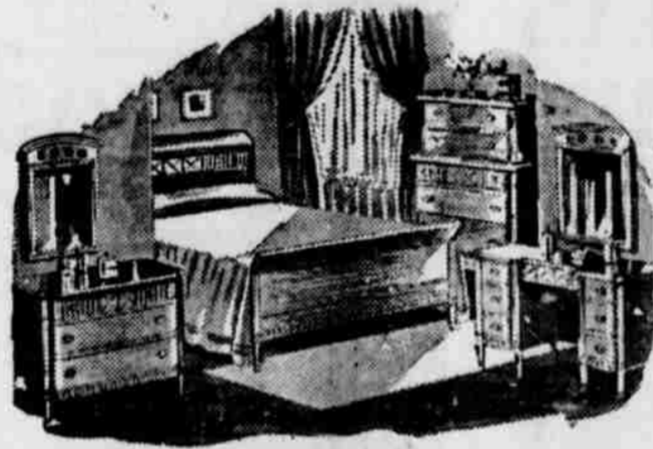

Alaska, August 15, 1935. The Will Rogers Memorial was built in 1938 and dedicated on Rogers' birthday anniversary November 4 that year.

Rogers' personal collections and some of his intimate personal effects, was built of native limestone in the rambling ranch house style of architecture. It stands high on a hill overlooking Claremore not far from the birthplace of the beloved Will.

We can plan our lives . . . we can look forward to the future . . . and we can dream, but the pattern of our life beyond each breath we take is sealed to us.

That was as true in Will Rogers' life as it is a fact in all our lives.

Rogers Planned Claremore Home

The land on which the Will Rogers Memorial stands was purchased by Rogers many years ago, and he intended after his retirement to build a home there and return to live among the simple Oklahoma folks he liked best.

"I'll be coming back here some day when I'm old and the world is tired of my act," he said then. "I'll build a home on this hill and just sit here and whittle and gab with my friends until the Big Boss stages the last roundup and heads us strays into the home corral."

Will Rogers is home. His crypt is built on a gently sloping terrace that commands a view of the Verdigris Valley, where Will was born and rode the ranges before his adventurous spirit took him off on the road to fame and fortune as a newspaper columnist and film star.

Will has hung up his rope, put away his saddle and his typewriter. He rests high on a hill, where he wanted to be, overlooking Claremore.

We have stood beside Rogers' tomb, but at that time his body was resting in the Glendale cemetery. It seemed to us that it was not fitting that he should be buried in California; we felt that he should be in his native Claremore among those who loved him as just Will Rogers, a good neighbor and one of the boys.

Inside the main memorial building is a large central foyer with a domed ceiling in which stands a 10-foot bronze statue of Rogers. At the base of the figure is inscribed this famous quotation from Rogers:

"I never met a man I didn't like."

We stood before this statue with bared head, then passed on from room to room. Exhibit after exhibit unfolded his life to us.

Will Rogers had lived a full, active life, asking little for himself, but contributing much to the joy and happiness of others.

It seems to us that his tally book was in good order when the Big Boss called him to the home ranch.
