
Osborn Will Not Seek Re-Election







The fertilizer application on castorbeans producing the high-plant and 50 sidedressed est yield was a preplant application of 100 pounds of nitrogen and sidedressed application of 50 pounds of nitro- with 100 pounds nitroger

This is the second year that this method of fertilizer application has produced the top yield in the castor bean fertilizer tests conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation, Dr. Thomas C. Longnecker, Director and Chief Soil Scientist, stated in reviewing the report.

The nine fertilizer applications tested were compared with the non - fertilized yield of a surprising 2,447 pounds per acre. The highest yield was

2,796 pounds per acre. The other fertilizer applications were; 50, 100 and 150 pounds of nitrogen applied preplant only; 50 preplant and 100 side dressed; 50 preplant and two sidedressed applications of 50 pounds each: 25 preplant and

eighth application pounds nitrogen preplan pounds phosphate pr

All the above applie were significantly below trogen application of 100 pe preplant and 50 pounds sign dressed.

In making the report; Foundation supporters, Dele Langford, Associate Agre mist, gave the following info ation. "The new Hale var was used in the test.
