

## You And Your Congress

Federal Employes have more bosses than other workers.

Their superiors include the 435 members of the House and 96 members of the Senate. Awareness of this branch of management increases when a federal pay day is drawing near and Congress has not approved new money for salaries.

That has happened twice so far this Summer. The federal government's business year begins

July 1. When the old 1951 fiscal year ended June 30, stopping expenditures under 1951 appropriations. Congress had not approved any major appropriations for the new 1952 fiscal year-and still hasn't.

Normally, while this may induce a certain degree of nervousness among federal wage earners, it does not cause any major disturbance. Because Congress as it has done twice since June 30, simply permits the federal agencies temporarily to draw advances on their 1952 appropriations until the latter finally are fixed.

This summer, however has not been normal in that respect. A new feature has been added. Final Congressional action on about \$85 billion worth of appropriations bills is being delayed by a fight between the House and Senate over an is-

sue close to the hearts of federal employes-how

federal payrolls should be gut. There is House-Senate agreement that a cut is necessary because federal employment rolls are too large and payrolls too expensive. There are about 2,487,000 federal workers and their annual total payroll runs approximately \$8.5 billion, according to

one Congressional committee. Conflicting plans are offered by the House and Senate respectively for reducing federal employment. The House champions the Jensen Plan. Rep. Ben. Jensen (R.fa.) would cut the employment rolls by prohibiting federal agencies from filling more than three out of each four employment vacancies. He says this would save \$500 millions a year in salaries

The Senate is backing the Ferguson Plan. Sen. Homer Ferguson (R-Mich.) would reduce employ-ment by simply cutting by 10 per cent the amount

By custom, appropriations bills are launched in the House. There are a dozen bills all told, coverng various federal operations. Requests for each f these operations are contained in the President's udget message to Congress.

This year the House along with doing some trimming, tacked the Jensen amendment onto each of six of the appropriations bills before sending them along to the Senate. But as it considered each of the first of those bills, the Senate substituted the Ferguson Plan for the Jensen Plan.

That meant that each of the three bills had to be sent to conferences of House and Senate Appropriations committees members for compromise agree-

They are still there.

In each case, the conference agreed to replace Jensen Plan with the Ferguson Plan but when the House itself was asked to vote approval of that switch, it refused and sent the bills back to confer-

And each time, of course, the action made top headlines, in Washington newspapers whose sub-scribers include thousands of federal employes.

Backers of the Jensen Plan argue that the Ferguson Plan would penalize the more efficient government departments, which try to hold down wasteful labor turnover, by subjecting them to "meat axe" cuts. With the Jensen Plan, this argument runs, more departments would try to hold down turnover in order to avoid as much as posible personnel reductions.

Ferguson Plan supporters contend that federal employment has gotten so big that the only way to make a noticeable dent in it is through flat appropriations reductions.

The argument continues; but eventually, it is assumed, an agreement will be reached. Meanwhile, there is general disturbance in Civil Service circles, with distinct overtones of nervousness.



Poage asked agriculture department experts, who came back with this reply:

Apparently the climate in the Lubbock area wouldn't be suitable but farther south in Texas there may be areas which are sufficiently semi-tropical to grow the plant successfully. Land put into the crop should net about \$144 an acre. Ctudies are underway by the department to determine the feasibility for commercial production of canaigre, the tannin bearing plant, in this country.

The Census Bureau, continuing its study of 1950 population data, reports that there are fewer than 10 persons to the square mile in a third of Texas' 254 counties.

The average population per square mile for the entire state is slightly more than 89; that includes Dallas county's high of 688 and Loving's county's low of one person for each three square miles of land area.
