### Low Temperatures, Snow Over Area

Littlefield felt the first real chill of the season Monday evening about 6:30 o'clock when a stiff north wind, accompanied by a flurry of snow sent the temperature down. By eleven o'clock the ground was blanketed with snow and the precipitation in moisture is reported to be one-fourth inch.

Snow began falling over the area again Wednesday afternoon about 3 o'clock, and by late Wednesday night about two more inches had fallen, covering everything outside with a lovely white mantle, while the temperature moderated considerably. As the Leader goes to press snow continues to fall.

The snow was general throughout the South Plains area with Lubbock, Tahoka, Lamesa, Post and Floydada reporting two inches each.

With the continued cold weather the snow formed an icy glaze on the ground making traffic on the highways dangerous.

Temperature hit the new low Tuesday morning between 6:00 and 9:00 a. m. with 12 degrees, as reported by the West Texas Gas Company. (Continued on Back Page)

Farmers Get Choice Of Insurance Under 3 Levels

A farmer can't save his cotton crop after a storm has ruined it, but he can protect his interest in that crop with a Federal Crop Insurance policy. All-risk cotton insurance is offered by the Federal Government which protects a cotton grower against loss from circumstances beyond his control.

Federal all-risk cotton crop insurance offers protection against loss in yield of lint cotton due to unavoidable causes including drought, flood, hail, wind, snow, wildlife, hurricane, tornado, insect infestation, and plant diseases.

Farmers pay only for the protection they get. All the costs of running the program are paid by the Federal Government. The program is organized on a basis that the producer (Continued on back page)

### Sudan Boy Is Killed In Train-Truck Accident

Funeral services were conducted for Billie Roy, 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Cantrell of Sudan, at the First Baptist Church, in that city, Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with Rev. W. L. Brian, pastor, officiating.

Interment took place in the Sudan Cemetery.

The child passed away Friday afternoon in the Amherst Hospital one and a half hours after the

truck in which he was riding with his father, was reported hit by the east bound passenger Santa Fe train about 3:30 o'clock, at a train crossing three miles south of Sudan.

Mr. Cantrell was seriously injured and is a patient in the Amherst Hospital. He received head injuries, and possible internal injury. Wednesday hospital authorities stated he was doing as well as could be expected.

Mr. Cantrell was hauling feed for R. D. Nix of Amherst, and the truck was loaded with grain. It was completely demolished.

The truck, driven by Mr. Cantrell, was on the track when struck by the train, investigators reported.

Besides the deceased, the Cantrell have six other children.

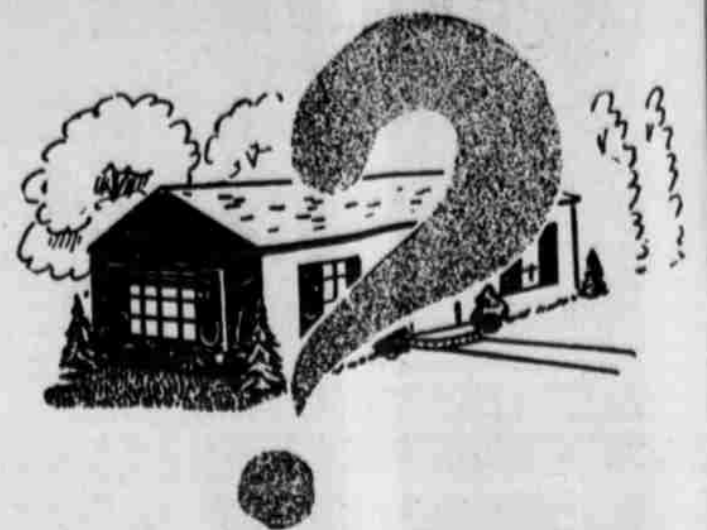

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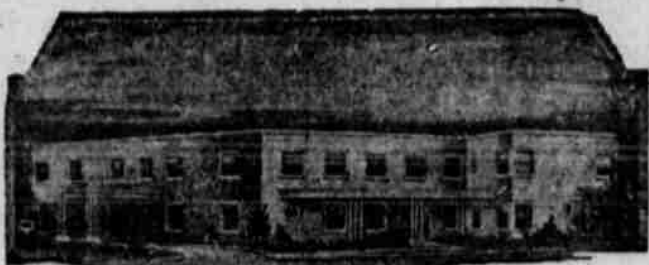

Dirt roads from farm to town are taking \$144. out of a farmer's pocket annually for each car and truck he operates, Charles M. Upham, engineer-director of the American Road Builders' Association, points out in a statement to county highway officials here today.

As proof of the actual dollar-and-cents value of better roads, Mr. Upham cites an analysis of individual car expense accounts of 300 rural letter carriers driving more than 3,000,000 miles in a group of Middle Western and Southern states. In this study, equal distances of paved, gravel and earth roads were travelled. Four elements of cost were considered — gasoline, oil, tires and maintenance.

"In Mississippi, a typical state, the cost of gasoline in driving 12,000 miles over paved roads was \$146. or 1.22 cents a mile," Mr. Upham said. "Over gravel roads, the gas cost was \$168. or 1.4 cents a mile, while over earth, it was \$162. or 1.35 cents a mile.

Oil consumption was .11 cents a mile over paved roads, .15 cents a mile over gravel and .21 cents a mile over dirt.

Gravel roads took the greatest toll in tires with .44 cents a mile against .27 cents a mile on pavement and 33 cents on earth. Maintenance costs were in direct ratio to the quality of the surface — .10 cents a mile on paved roads, .56 cents on gravel and 1.01 on earth.

The total of the four items are 1.7 cents a mile for pavement, 2.55 cents a mile for gravel and 2.9 a mile for earth," Mr. Upham continues. "It therefore costs 1.2 cents a mile more to drive over dirt roads and 0.85 cents more over gravel than over pavement. Therefore if a farmer operates only one car and one truck, an unsurfaced road to market costs him \$288 a year. Even if gravel has been added, there is an annual outgo of \$204. It is a cost he cannot avoid as long as his outlet highway is unpaved. But it is a cost he can save, if the roads he drives over are paved.

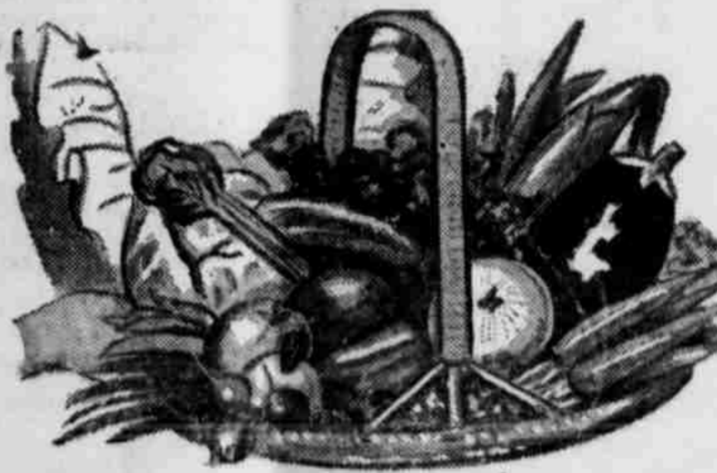

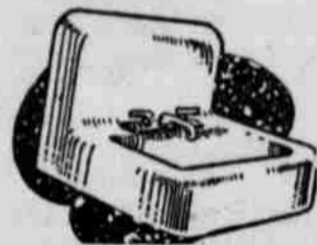

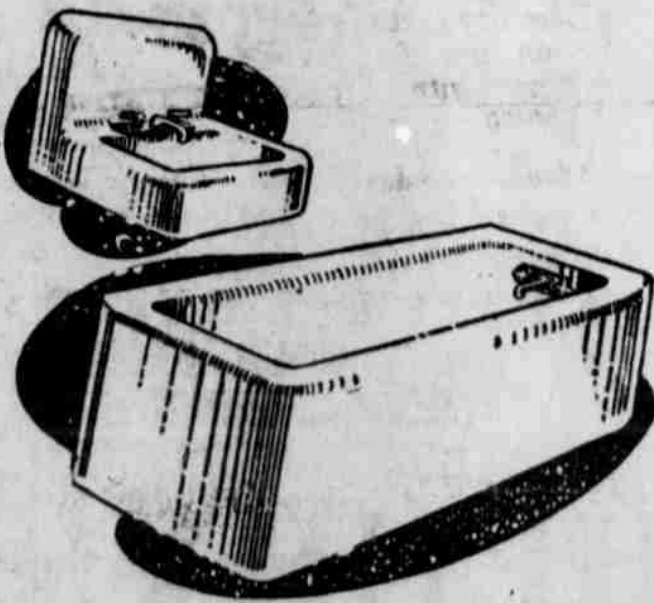

### CROP INSURANCE

(Continued from page one) premiums paid-in should cover the losses paid out, and nothing more.

For 1947 farmers have a choice of insurance in three levels: Level A offers a small amount of insurance at the lowest cost; Level B offers a moderate amount of insurance at a higher cost; and Level C offers the highest amount of insurance at the highest cost.

Farmers can secure additional information and sign insurance contracts by calling at the local ACA office, or by attending meeting in one of the AAA communities on dates which will be published each week in the local papers. The first of these meetings will be held at district court room, Littlefield, Texas, Friday night, January 3, 1947, at 8:00 p. m.

Applications must be signed before January 31, 1947, which is the closing date for accepting applications. Any producer who signed an insurance contract in 1946 and does not wish to continue the contract in 1947 must call at the Triple A Office before January 31, 1947.
