Mayor Hall presided at the meeting, and he urged the cooperation and support of every person in Littlefield, in helping to prevent any kind of attacks, sabotage, or raids, during the war.

Otto Jones was named chairman of the organization. Mr. Jones, who is chairman of the Lamb county draft board, said, "We all should be on guard . . . and all citizens of the United States should be a member of a Home Guard unit . . Anything can happen . . . Americans will be called on for 1,000 duties . . . and - We must just look and listen, and not talk too

Castor Beans To Be Tested For Oil Content And Quality

Samples of castor beans grown on the Tech farm have been taken to College Station by M. L. Lohman, who is with the Department of Agriculture. The samples will be tested for oil content and quality, the oil being used in various kinds of paints and varnishes.

Four varieties of castor beans were planted on four acres this year, according to Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department. Two acres have been harvested but not threashed, and the other two acres will be gathered as soon as possible.

Nine Latin-American countries Nine Latin-American countries declared war on Japan following the attack on Hawaii.

Cuba went to war with the three major powers when President Fulgencio Batista signed a declaration that had been passed by the senate, 50 votes to none, and by the house of representatives, 222 to none. Cuba also declared war on Japan.

Costa Rica, the first Latin-American nation to enter the second World war with a declaration against Japan, deckared war on Germany and Italy Thursday. Guatemala and Nicaragua, both already at war with Japan, also declared against Germany and Italy.

Mexico handed passports to Baron H. Rudt von Collenberg, the German minister, and Count Alberto Marchetti di Muriaglio, the Italian minister, and quit all diplomatic relations with the Axis nations.

They were summoned to the foreign office Thursday night within 12 hours after receipt of the news of their nations' war declarations against the United States.

Collenberg was received first by Foreign Minister Ezequiel Padilla and a half hour later Muriaglio was called to the chancellery. Each was informed that Mexico was severing relations with their countries, completing diplomatic action against the Axis which began when the Japanese minister was advised similarly.

"Mexico is loyal to the compromises contracted by our country at the Havana conference," said a foreign office statement, "and is acting in the same spirit of firm continental solidarity that governed Mexico's conduct in the case of imperial Japan's attack against the United States.

Argentina reaffirmed its solidarity with the United States and sent a message to the American Congress condemning the "treasonable" Axis

WHAT TO DO IN AN AIR RAID

Official By The U. S. Office of Civilian Defense



1. KEEP COOL

Above all, keep cool. Don't lose your head. Do not crowd the streets, avoid chaos, prevent disorder

You can fool the enemy. It is easy. If planes come over, stay where you are. Don't phone unnecessarily. The chance you will be hit is small. It is part of the risk we must take to win this war.

Until an alarm, go about your usual business and recreation in the ordinary way.

Think twice before you do anything. Don't believe rumors—spreading false rumors is part of the enemy's technique. Don't let him take you in.

Know your air-raid warning. In general, it is short blasts or rising and falling pitch, on whistles or horns. The "all clear" is a steady tone for 2 minutes. Watch this paper for description of the local signal. (This is subject to change.)

Await official information before taking any action. When the Air Raid Warden comes to your home, do what he tells you. He is for your protection. He is your friend

He will help you do your part to whip the enemy.
We can do it. We will do it, if we stay calm and cool
and strong and alert.

The official instructions 1 and 2 are two of a series of such instructions received by the Lamb County Leader Monday from Director F. H. La Guardia, U. S. Cilivian Defense, advising this newspaper to give this important information the widest possible circulation.

This information is official by the U.S. Office of Civilian Defense.

What is set forth on this page, as well as on the other four of these series —Instructions 3, 4, 5 and 6, which will appear weekly in this newspaper, is based on the best of British experience in minimizing the damage from air raids, and is the advice of the U. S. Director of Civilian Defense.

This material was released in Washington 25 hours after the first bomb fell in Hawaii. The U. S. office of Civilian Defense, while hoping it would never become necessary, was prepared for the possibility of having to issue such instructions.



2. STAY HOME

The safest place in an air raid is at home.
If you are away from home, get under cover in the nearest shelter. Avoid crowded places. Stay off the streets.

The enemy wants you to run out into the streets, create a mob, start a panic. Don't do it!

If incendiary bombs fall, play a spray from a garden hose (never a splash or stream) of water on the bomb. Switch to a stream to put out any fire started by the bomb. Switch back to a spray for the bomb. The bomb will burn for about 15 minutes if left alone, only about 2 minutes under a fine water spray. A jet splash, stream or bucket of water will make it explode.

Under raid conditions, keep a bathtub and buckets full of water for the use of the fire department in case water mains are broken.

If you have a soda-and-acid extinguisher (the kind you turn upside down), use it with your finger over the nozzle to make a spray. Don't use the chemical kind (small cylinders of liquid) on bombs. It is all right for ordinary fires.

But above all, keep cool, stay home.

Choose one member of the family to be the home airraid warden—who weill remember all the rules and what to do. Mother makes the best.
