Although the smallest yield of grain in 30 years, or more has been predicted by federal reporters, Secretary Wallace makes the statement that there is no danger of food shortage.

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The drouth's ravages affected not only the grain crops but directly or indirectly the entire food supply of the Nation and cotton as well.

For example, the crop reporting boand forecast that this year's pro fuction of corn would be only 1,607,-108,000 bushels, a deadline of more han half a billion bushels or 24 per cent over its estimate of conditions on July 1. The average yield of this important feed and food crop is around 2,500,000,000 bushels.

The wheat yield, to the surprise of many observers, increased six million bushels today over the July prediction, the estimate today being 490,-360,000 bushels. But that figure is the lowest since the 1890's.

Millions of cattle and sheep are being bought by the Goversement, both because they are starving now from lack of feed and water and also because there will be no feed for them in the months to come. 
Regarding the general outlook the report said, "Growing conditions are poor practically everywhere except along the Atlantic Coast, in the eastern cotton belt and in the Pacific Northwest.

"In a large area that inclusies most of Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas Nebraska, the Dakotas and some adjoining portions of Arkansas, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Wyoming. Colorado and New Mexico, all growing crops and pastures were seriously hurt and most of the corn was scorched beyond recovery.'

Serious drouth effects also were reported on late crops including cotton, grain, sorghums, buchwheat, late cuttings of alfalfa and clover, emergency hay and forage crops, potatoes, sweet potatoes, sugar beets. apples and some late commercial truck and canning crops.

Loss of some gardens was characterized as "a serous blow to those living in the drouth States."



One hundred and eleven men and women will graduate from the West Texts State Teachers College, Canyon, on August 23, at the end of the 22nd annual summer season. Among those upon whom bachelors degrees will be conferred on them is Glen Daughtery of Olton.

Lamb county that year ginned 72,000 bales of cotton and about 20.-000 bates had been ginned before we farmers sent the telegram to Allred. James V. Allred's help to us in this county in that year meant in dollars and cents to us at least one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000). 



Mr. Taylor reports a number of new members have been added to the group, making it a bigger and better band. They have been putting in considerable practice, and are doing splendid work.


