

The word "exemption", properly used, applies to relief fro mobligation for service as specifically provided for in the act, although not from registration. The word 'deferment" indicates that the individual has an obligation to serve, but performance of the obligation is to be postponed or delayed so long as certain conditions continue to exist. It is the local board which decides whether the registrant is eligible for exemption or deferment. In other words, it fits the facts, the law, and the regulations to each individual's

8. WHO ARE EXEMPT FROM MILITARY CERVICE? - A. Generally. Vets. ministers, and conscientious objectors are exempt under the law. But they must meet the requirements as outlined below. Also exempt is the sole surviving son of a family in which other sons or daughters were killed in action or died in line of duty while serving in the Armed Forces of the United States, or subsequently died of service-connected wounds, injuries, or disease.

9. ARE VETS OF WW II LIA-ABLE FOR SERVICE? A. Not if they have served honorably on active duty for 12 months during period between September 16, 1940 to June 24, 1948; or for at least 91 days between December 7, 1941 to September 2, 1945. If in doubt as to liability for military service, see your local SS board.

10. ARE FORMER MEMBERS OF THE MERCHANT MARINES EXEMPT? A. No.

WHAT ABOUT MEN STUDYING MINISTRY? A. Regular or duly ordained ministers of religion and students preparing for he ministery shall be ex service. However, the students must be under the direction of recognized theological or divinity schools which they have pre-enrolled. No exemption from registering if in the SS age bracket.

Experiment Station shows that cattle placed in the feed lot and limited to such rations as cottonseed meal, cottonseed hulls, white corn and other white grains are often affected by the condition. Following drouth periods, cattle placed in dry lots and on vitamin A deficient rations may show symptoms of vitamin A def'cioncy in a relatively short time. Younger animals become affected sooner than the older ones.

Thompson says that calves born to cows which have been subjected to a shortage of vitamin A usually are in very poor condition at birth and unless placed on cows receiving adequate vi:amin A, may die within two or three


Farm animals he says, get most of their vitamin A requirements from carotene which is found in green range or pasture grasses and hays or other roughage. The carotene is changed to witamin A by a process that takes place in the liver of the animal which is also the chief storehouse of both carotene and vitamin A in the body.

The lack of vitamin A potency in the ration apparently has little or no effect upon the rate of gain as long as the cattle have reserves of the vitamin in the body. When symptoms of deficiency show up, the loss of appetite im-

mediately causes gains to cease. Thompson says research has shown that the addition of a pound of good green alfalfa hay to the dally ration will protect the animals from a deficiency of the vitamin when they are receiving a difficient ration. The giving of codliver oil to effected animals will also correct the situa-

To guard against any occurrence of the deficiency condition, he advises watching for night blindness. If symptoms of night blindness are noted, start feeding immediately from one to two pounds of good quality leafy green alfalfa bay per head per day in addition to the regular ration.

He suggests that you ask your local county agent for a copy of C-171, ' Control of Vitamin A Deficiency in Feeding Beef Cattle". The bulletin contains information that can help you avoid trouble not only in the feed lot but on the



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


