SOUTH PLAINS PROGRESSING

All the indications that we see and hear of make it look to us as if the drought cycle has come to an end. This year, for the first time in five years, enough rain has fallen over the greater part of the drought-stricken areas. to bring the storedup ground-water supply up to a level where it can be reached by the roots of the farm crops.

PROGRESS IN HOCKLEY COUNTY

"Mr. Baldwin used half a column in his last week's issue to mention some of the then residents of the town. Many are still there. Levelland is no longer a dream, it is a reality and one of the fine towns of this section. The county during the decade from 1920 to 1930 made one of the greatest percentages of gains of any county in the nation, in population."


