day in West Texas and over the country.

Carter, who said Wednesday he is not currently a member of the Birch group, "but I don't repudiate them," challenges the Hatfield and Scranton efforts.

"I don't think this was any of the convention's business. In politics you don't go around knocking support, and there is support here."

"I think Goldwater would still have had the Birchers support, whatever the convention did. I think this is the attitude of the Birchers in this area; I don't know about them somewhere else."

Carter estimated that there probably are no more than a half-dozen actual Birch society members in Lamb county.

The Birch society is on record as identifying Milton

Eisenhower, brother to former President Eisenhower, as Communist agent, and has charged the ex-president with colluding Communists. It has had the Communist epithet at other leading Republicans, namely late John Foster Dulles, Eisenhower's secretary of state.

Their chief target, however, is Chief Justice Earl Warren, U.S. Supreme Court. They advocate his impeachment, a campaign they have pushed in newspapers and billboard advertising and with a student essay contest a couple years back with a \$25,000 cash prize. Warren should be impeached. About the only question unanswered late Wednesday at Cow Palace was: Is Barry Warren? It is a question that will be answered in Lamb county before November comes.
