"It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatments or corrections that may be necessary before school opens. No youngster should be permitted to begin a school career with less than the best possible physical equipment.

'As most parents know, vaccinaion against smallpox is necessary. Those who received this immunization in Infancy should be vaccinated again in order to assure a high degree of immunity and those who have never received this protection could be vaccinated without de-

"Diphtheria immunization is also an important safeguard for all boys and girls about to enter school. Those who have never been immunized against this disease should receive toxoid shots now. Children who were inoculated against diptheria when they were bables should now have a 'booster dose' in order to maintain their immunity at a sufficiently high level.

"Other immunizations that the individual physican may reciommend are also desirable as further health protection. Whooping cough, typhoid fever and tetanus are among the diseases against which the doctor may advise safeguards."

Shocking disclosures of organized crime and power of the underworld this year have led to popular demand for better law enforcement and purging its ranks of any corruption that tolerates lawlessness.

It is fitting now that the side of the law enforcement in this vital problem has been presented by the National Association of County and Prosecuting Attorneys. Its statement at a recent convenion voiced "deep concern over evidence of a breakdown in the moral and spiritual life of our citizenry." The prosecutor, it was explained, can not enforce the laws unless the people abhor crime. Popular apathy is an unsurmountable barrier to law enforcement.

There is considerably more to public support of law enforcement than service on juries, being witnesses in court and eletion of high-caliber men to offie. Every unlawful activity in a community is dependent upon its patrons, often respectable citzens, and could not flourish but for the tolerance and

tacit support of the citizenship. Power of the underworld is commensurate to its wealth. Fearless law enforcement can mean political death for the en-

We hold no brief for organized crime, lax enforcement and corruption which eat away the moral fiber of a nation, but we believe the sources of these social cancers should be recognized. The power of the people is supreme in a demoracy but is atrophied when not used.

The strength of democracy rests upon the integrity andi worth of the individual, which can not be delegated to government. The effort to shift the citizen's responsibility to government is only means for evading one's own guilt. Law-abiding people, if in the majority, could make a community lawabiding. The people themselves must have definite coral convictions and the courage not only to assert them but to apply them to their own lives. -Star-Telegram.

For summer leaves, chicory, alse known as endive, is more available than lettuce, which usually runs to seed in midsummer. Endive may be had with curly leaves, or broad leaves. Many like the curly leaves best for summer, and broad leaves (escarolle) for fall, as they endure frost and become sweeter after the frost comes. Sow both types in drills, thin out to six or eight inches

Leaf crops grown in a similar manner, and much esteemed in bowl salads, include corn salad, which is very hardy and can be harvested late in the fall; and upland garden cress, which gives a pungent flavor to the salad.

In the fall lettuce may be grown again; and the Chinese cabbage leaves are delicious. Chinese cabbage may be grown in the spring, with rich soil and an early start But in midsummer, it always runs to seed. A late crop has no such tendency, and heads are easily produced in the fall, from plants started in late June.

Plants Grow Faster Wi Moved This Scientific



When the danger of frost is over, | solution is in the garden plants which have been started under protection can be moved to the garden. By using methods which have been developed by research, amateurs willing to take care can start plants growing in their new homes with a minimum of shock, without wilting, and without losses.

In the diagram above, the best methods of procedure as recommended by research scientists are illustrated. Transplanting is horti-cultural surgery, and so every step in this technique has been carefully tested. To prepare for transplanting the plants should be fed with liquid plant food a week before the operation. The day be-fore, a starter solution should be prepared, by hanging a cloth bag containing chemical plant food in a bucket of water and letting it soak overnight. Use 4 ounces of a 4-11-4 mixture or similar to each gallon of water.

Make a hole for the plant large and deep enough to hold its roots without crowding. Mix with soil at the bottom a teaspoonful of plant food, and cover this with soil. Set the plant in place, then pour into the hole, over the plant roots, 1/2 between s pint of starter solution. While the otherwise.

Sweet Peppers Rich in Vitamins



Green Peppers Turn Red or Orange As They Ripen.

A few plants of sweet peppers, set out in the garden after danger of frost is over, will give big returns for the space they occupy. They are among the richest of vegetables in vitamins A and C and can be served raw in salads and cooked in many appetizing ways.

Early varieties can be grown from seed sown outdoors, after the ground warms up, but it is better to start plants indoors or buy them in the market. The plants are very tender, and should not be set out-doors until it is safe for tomatoes.

Space the plants 18 inches apart in the row and give them frequent cultivation. They like a rich, heavy soil, but thrive in lighter soils if given plenty of water. The pepper is one plant which likes a bath now and then; it can be washed off with the hose and will thrive the better for it.

They grow rapidly and once they begin to bear they continue to produce fruit until frost kills the plants in the fall. A dozen plants will usually be sufficient for a family of four. They have a long season during which they are in good condition; the color changes from green to red and the vitamin A content increases with this change. The red peppers are highly decorative. and there are also attractive orange varieties.

The only insect likely to attack peppers is a flea beetle, which can and should never be set out until all be discouraged by spraying or dusting with nicotine or D.D.T. There are no diseases likely to bother.

Hot peppers are seldom grown in gardens, but if you wish to try them the same general cultural methods will suffice

Egg Plant Good and Good Looking



Pick Eggplant Fruit When the Skin Is Shiny.

Though of American origin, egg plant is more popular in Europe and in the orient than in this country. Its nutritive value is high, and there are many tempting ways of

cooking it. Egg plant is closely related to peppers and tomatoes and takes so long to mature that plants are nearly always started indoors and transplanted to the garden. The plants require an even temperature and do not thrive in cold frames. A dozen plants are sufficient for the average

The dark purple fruits are highly decorative, and if you plan to enter a basket of vegetables in the harvest show, an egg plant is an absolute must in arranging an attractive display.

D.D.T. has been a boon to egg plant, because it destroys its chief insect enemy, the flea beetle, which eats tiny holes in the leaves.

The fruit may be eaten at any stage of growth, until its skin becomes dull. As long as the skin is shiny, the flesh within is in good condition, but when that stage passes. the fruit should be discarded. There are many tempting ways of cooking this vegetable and several different methods should be used during the



Telegraph Rates To Be Increased

Telegraph rates are going up, and that 10-worder which so often ended with "love" is going out.

The age of miracles is far from over. At least that's the story as far as Frank Shaller, Canadian farmer, is concerned. Here's why:

"I owe the good Lord more than I can ever pay. I want to solicit contributions for CROP in the Panhandle and West Texas. Furthermore, 10 per cent of my 480 acres of wheat goes to CROP."

The early freeze came. The greenbugs came. The drought came Frank Shaller, along with his Canadian neighbors, naturally assumed that his crop of golden grain was now nothing but a mirage. But two weeks later miraculously enough the Shaller wheat was waving gracefully in the breeze, green and growing stronger. The harvest looked promising.

All across the Panhandle, farmers were bemoaning lost crops. Fields were barren but somehow the greenbugs only hit a few spots on the Shaller wheat. From the Frank Shaller farm, CROP received 660 bushels of wheat which means life to a large number of

That is not all of the Shaller story. The farmers of Hemphill County have come through with enough wheat to fill a car, so Hemphill county is the first to send a car of wheat to the hungry in war torn nations.

Mr. Frank Shaller, now a member of the executive board of the Texas CROP committee and the 'Special Gifts" section, is seeking various commodity gifts-cotton, wheat, cattle, rice, and peanuts from generous farmers and ranchers of the Panhandle and West Texas. These bulk gifts will be distributed to the world's destitute in various sections of the globe by CROP.
