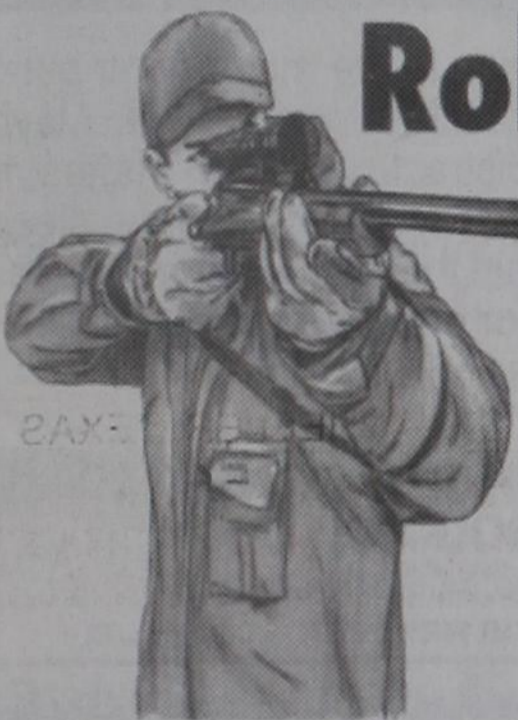

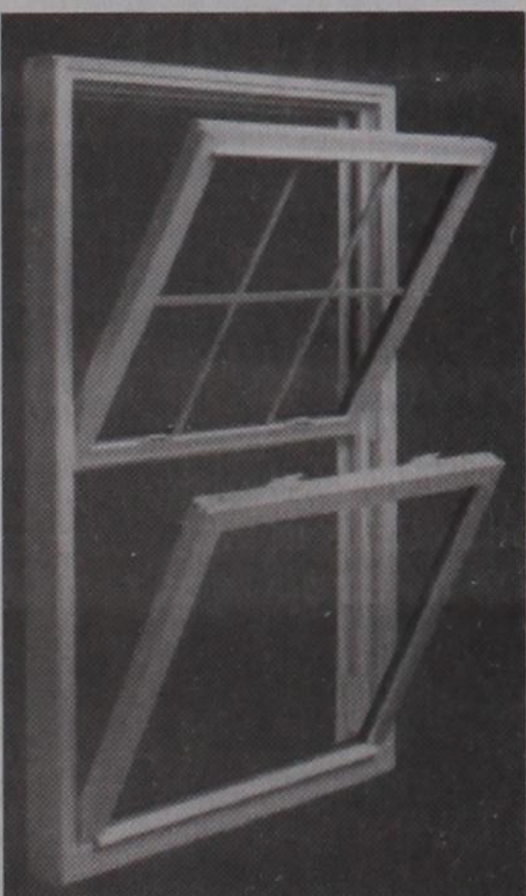

Parkview Artery Thunderstorm Safety

Do you have some kids that have fears about thunderstorms? Because of the damage that severe thunderstorms and tornadoes can cause, many adults have a healthy fear of them too. After all, about 212 people are killed in thunderstorms each year, mostly from lightning and flash flooding. Although many people simply worry about hail damage during thunderstorms, it is important to realize that other, often more deadly risks from thunderstorms, can come from: Driving during blinding rain.

Lightning, which can strike as far as 10 miles from an area of rainfall. Flash flooding, which is most common during slow-moving thunderstorms and can cause fast moving water to flow down what used to be dry creek beds or slow moving creeks or rivers, catching kids in the fast moving water.

Strong straight line winds, which can knock over trees and damage some buildings.

Tornadoes, which can damage or destroy all but the most secure buildings.

Lightning causes thunder, so if you hear thunder, there is lightning nearby. And since lightning can strike as far as 10 miles from a thunderstorm, it is important to try and figure out how far lightning is far you and your family, instead of simply waiting for it to start raining until you seek shelter. How do you figure out how far the lightning is?

A general rule of thumb is that you can figure out the distance between you and a lightning strike if you count the seconds in between seeing a lightning strike, hearing thunder, and then multiplying the time by 0.2. So if you count 10 seconds in between a lightning strike and a thunder clap, then the lightning is only about 5 miles away and you should seek shelter in a car or building.

In general, you should make sure that you can count to at least 30 in between seeing lightning strikes and hearing thunder, which means that the lightning is at least 15 miles away. And to be safe, stay indoors for at least 30 minutes after hearing thunder for the last time, which should give the thunderstorm plenty of time to move out of your area.

Other tips to keep safe during when lightning is nearby include that you: Stay off corded phones and avoid taking a bath or shower, as telephone lines and metal pipes can conduct electricity if your home is struck by lightning.

Seek shelter in a low-lying area that is not prone to flash flooding, squatting low to the ground, if you are caught outside during a storm, and stay away from tall trees or metal poles. Avoid riding on anything metal during a severe thunderstorm with close lightning, such as a bicycle or golf cart.

Thunder is good, thunder is impressive; but it is the lightning that does the work.

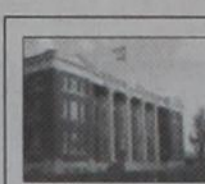

Fungus Problems Observed Locally

The Fungus develops in high humidity, when day time temperatures are between 75 to 90 degrees F. and nighttime temperatures drop to 70 degrees F. or below. These are the conditions we have experienced in Wheeler County the last couple of weeks.

The first symptom appears as a small, circular, water soaked dark grass that soon wilts and turns yellow or brown. As the fungus grows outward from the center, there is a grayish-black colored ring of wilted grass around the perimeter that is called a smoky ring. The patch begins small, a few inches in diameter and can grow to over fifty feet in diameter. As they expand and merge with other patches and shapes become irregular.

Another symptom is the leaves of the grass are easily pulled from the stolons. This is because the fungus has destroyed the tissue at the base of the leaf. The stolons are not usually killed unless the infection is severe and the warm, humid weather continues. If this is the case the roots and crowns will rot and the grass dies. If the stolons are not killed, the grass in the center of the patch may recover in a few weeks and put out new growth.

Fungus can be controlled by applying a fungicide. There are many on the market to chose from. Generally, the fungicide should be applied at the first sign of infection in the fall. Subsequent applications can be made according to the manufacturer while the day time temperatures continue to be warm and humid. The grass should be kept as dry as possible to slow the spread of the fungus. It should be watered as little as possible and only in the early morning.

Homeowners can reduce their chances of the fungus returning by following a balanced program of watering and fertilizing. Lawns with high nitrogen and high moisture are more likely to develop Brown Patch than a less cared for lawn. Watering should be done only when the grass needs it, in the early morning and to a soil depth of six inches, if possible. Avoid leaving grass clippings on the lawn when the fungus is active. Avoid over fertilizing with high nitrogen fertilizers. Preventative fungicides can be applied during the period the fungus is active.

All lawns are susceptible to Fungus, but a strong healthy lawn is more likely to recover quickly.

Cedar Ridge, recognized as one of Oklahoma's top bluegrass bands, is an acoustic ensemble that has been playing together since March, 1999. From that time the band has made quite a reputation in the local and state Bluegrass scene for its 'hard drivin', head turnin' sound. The group takes pride in its close vocal harmonies, tight instrumentation and purism of the genre.

Audiences are rapidly caught up in the fun when Cedar Ridge puts forth the smooth sounds of traditional, gospel and original material. A growing number of hard-core bluegrassers and mainstream listeners are placing this band high on their list of favorite artists. The group's reputation for excellent execution, refreshing good humor and love of the music has spread over a four state area.
