Wheeler County Sheriff's Department Recognized

Wheeler commemorated National Police Week, Friday, May 19, with a ceremony recognizing the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department for its daily effort in defending the law, the county and it's people.

Hans Klingler, director of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's West Texas office, delivered remarks regarding the significance of National Police Week and presented the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department with a certificate of appreciation from Senator Gramm. The ceremony was held at the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department in Wheeler.

Klingler also read a letter sent by Senator Gramm commending the Sheriff's Department for its contribution in fighting the war against crime and drugs on city streets.

"Your courage renews my belief that America's real heroes are the men and women, like yourself, who daily pin on the Texas law enforcement badge," said Gramm.

"All too often, when we go to bed at night, we forget about the men and women who continue to patrol our streets, allowing us the feeling of security. They put their lives on the line for us daily, a fact many of us take for granted," the senator said.

"This is truly the only profession that I know of where the employees are virtually on the job 24-hours a day. Police officers, many with families of their own, risk their lives to protect ours. It is for that reason we should honor these men and women who have answered the call, unselfishly giving of themselves," Gramm said. "I am confident your devotion to duty is an example of what can be accomplished by an individual who dedicates his life to the service of others," the senator said.

National Police Week, sponsored by the American Police Hall of Fame, will celebrate its 35th year of honoring those who protect and serve.

Ft. Elliott's baseball team won the Region 1-1A high school baseball semifinal game Tuesday and will advance to the regional championship game later this week. They will play Loraine Friday or Saturday.

Despite collecting just five hits, the Cougars managed to score three runs in a 3-1 victory over Marfa.

"We only left two on base," Cougars coach Curtis Smith said. "We got the hits when we needed them."

The team played in the regional

semifinals the past two years.

David Helton singled to lead off, advanced to second on John Moffett's sacrifice, and scored on Justin Westbrook's double. Westbrook scored when the next batter, Jake Swigart, singled.

The final score was made in the sixth ending.

Swigart went the distance for Ft. Elliott, allowing no earned runs to improve his pitching mark to 10-1.

"Jake did a heckuva job pitching

today," Smith said. "He had 10 Ks, and they were all timely. His curve and fastball kept them off balance."

The Shorthorns reached Swigart for six hits—all singles—and four walks, but they could not reach home plate.

"We did have three errors but we had some real good plays defensively," Smith said. "They left 11 men on base, so they had their chances to score. We just made some great stops defensively."

Farm Credit District Reports Improvement

The Tenth Farm Credit District reported today continued improvement in its portfolio, noting a \$2.9 million reduction in high risk assets during the first quarter of 1995.

The reduction marks the continuation of a four-year trend of decreasing nonaccrual loan volume and other high risk assets. Nonaccrual loans were reduced by 3.2 percent from the year-end 1994 level, and other property owned totalled \$23.8 billion at quarter end, down from \$39.9 billion a year earlier.

As is typical for the first quarter, loan volume dropped slightly from year-end 1994 — by less than 2 percent — due to seasonal crops and repayment patterns inherent in agricultural lending. Some of the decline in volume also was a result of the reduction in nonaccrual loans. Total loan volume was \$3.6 billion at March 31.

District net income for the period was approximately \$20 million, compared to \$23 million for the same period a year ago. While total interest income was up \$5.2 million, interest expense increased \$6.8 million during the quarter.

The Tenth District comprises the Austin-based Farm Credit Bank of Texas; 48 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas which make long-term land and housing loans; and 18 Production Credit Associations in Louisiana, New Mexico and Texas which make short-term and intermediate-term operating loans. The bank and associations are cooperatives, owned by the borrowers who do business with them.

From The Minister's Desk:
A recent issue of the **Amarillo Daily News** contained some pictures of children in Portales, New Mexico who were playing Little League baseball. These pictures clearly showed the fun and enjoyment that these children were having as they played the national pastime.

As I looked at these pictures, I remembered that the Little League in Albuquerque, New Mexico had to prematurely cancel its season in 1992. After this decision was made, the director of the Little League in Albuquerque offered an explanation for the cancellation. He said: "The season was cancelled because of hostility and fights among some adults who were at the games. It wasn't the kids who caused the problem. Adults, who don't support the kids or the league, caused the problem. These adults should help the kids. They should not act like jerks."

This director made a wise decision when he prematurely cancelled the Little League season. With this decision he may have prevented an incident like the one that occurred at a Little League in Terre Haute, Indiana. The umpire of this game, Mr. Donald Jenson, was hit in the head by a bat that was thrown during an argument among adults who were at the game. Although Mr. Jenson did not seem to be seriously hurt, he was taken to the hospital in Terre Haute for overnight observation.

While he was in the hospital, Mr. Jenson wrote a letter to the newspaper and made some important observations about Little League. For example, he wrote: "The purpose of Little League is to teach baseball skills to young boys and girls. Obviously, a team which does not play well in a given game, yet is given the opportunity to blame that loss on an umpire for one or two calls, is being given the chance to take all responsibility for the loss from their shoulders. A parent or adult leader who permits the youngsters to blame their failures on an umpire—is doing the worst kind of injustice to those youngsters. This irresponsibility is bound to carry over to future years."

I wish that I could write and tell Mr. Jenson how much I appreciate this observation, but I cannot. Before he was released from the hospital, Mr. Jenson died of a brain concussion. Perhaps the adults, who provoked the argument that caused Mr. Jenson's fatal injury, will take responsibility for their actions. If these adults will, they will recognize that the game of life is far more important than the game of baseball. They will then help kids; they will not act like jerks.

Texas Traffic Sign Theft, Vandalism Is On Increase

With the arrival of spring, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has noted an increase in traffic sign theft and vandalism.

Although the signs are quickly replaced, and no one has been injured due to missing or damaged signs, the costs associated with this crime are high. Damaged signs pose a danger to the traveling public, and the funds spent to replace them could be spent elsewhere.

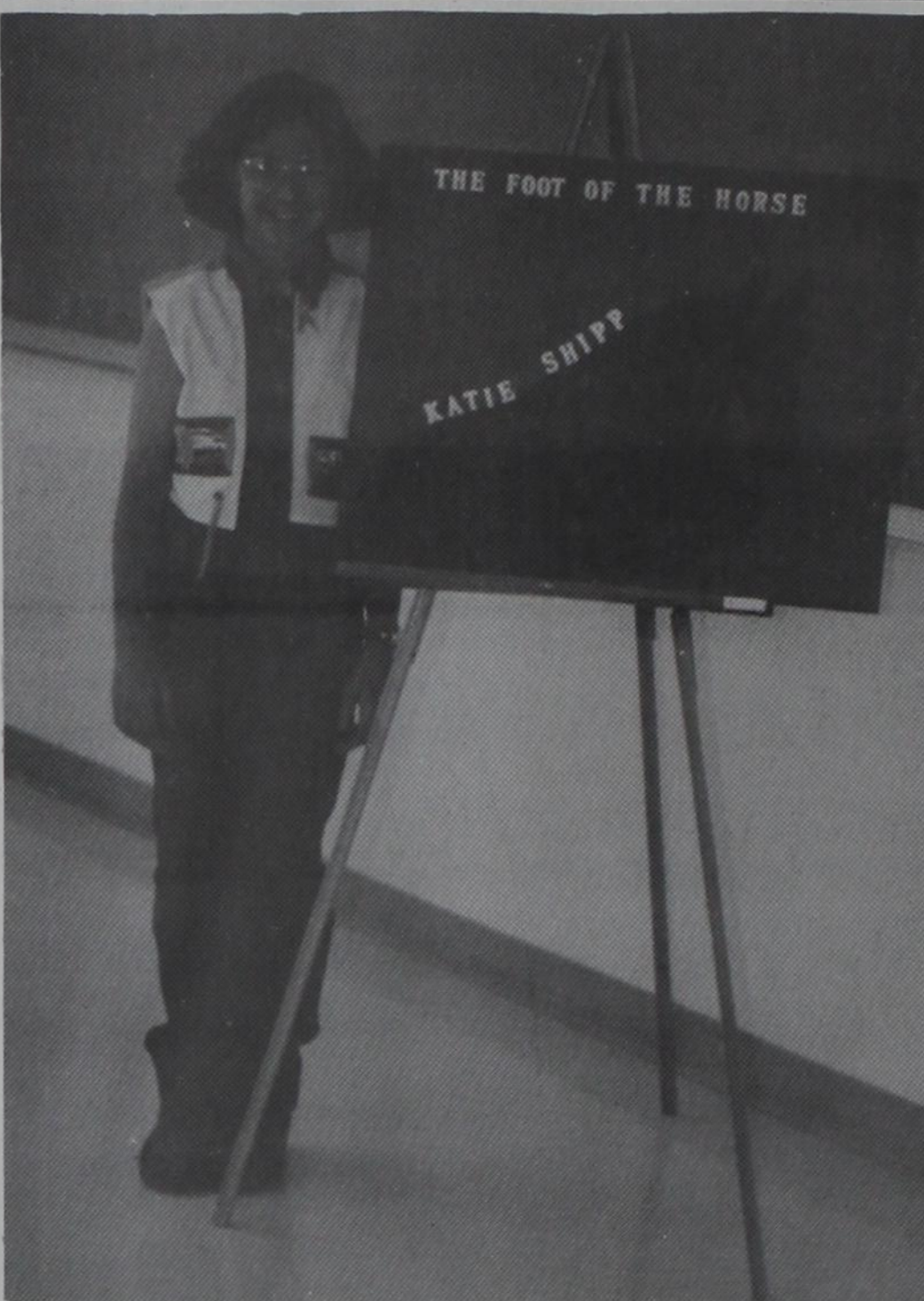
Taxpayers in the Childress district spent more than \$28,000 last year to replace stolen and vandalized signs along state roadways. Statewide, taxpayers spent more than \$8 million replacing signs damaged by natural disasters, accidents, and vandals.

Wood and metal signs cost approximately \$10 per square foot to produce. The costs to install replacement signs vary depending on the amount of time and equipment needed.

People are reminded that in Texas it is against the law to possess a sign without a permit, and the state does not sell signs or issue permits to possess them. In addition, if the loss to TxDOT is more than \$1,500 it is a felony.

Counties included in TxDOT's Childress district include: Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Collingsworth, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, King, Knox, Motley and Wheeler.

Motorists are encouraged to write down the license plate number and contact their local law enforcement official if they see anyone tampering with a traffic sign.
