## Mobeetie School Board Polls Patrons

The taxpayers of Mobeetie Independent School District are being polled, concerning the future of the Mobeetie School System. The reason for the action by the school board is to obtain input from each patron.

The sheets present the condition of the school's finances. Two possible solutions to the situation are offered voters are asked to state their preference.

The financial comparisons of the years 1983 through 1988 show continued program and salary mandates without any new state funding and a drop in the school's tax base. In the school year 1983-84 the assessed value for the school was \$67,000,000; this figure for 1987-88 stands at \$2,783,863. The state and federal revenues for the same period dropped from \$232,459 to \$99,440.

Two alternatives are offered: 1. Converting to a K-8 or K-6 school with other grades transferred to a neighboring school district. 2. Continuing as a K-12 school with the possibility of tax increases.

The final statement offers consolidation as a possibility and asks the taxpayers for either "Input for Consolidation" or "Input against Consolidation".

## Computer Team Earns First Place

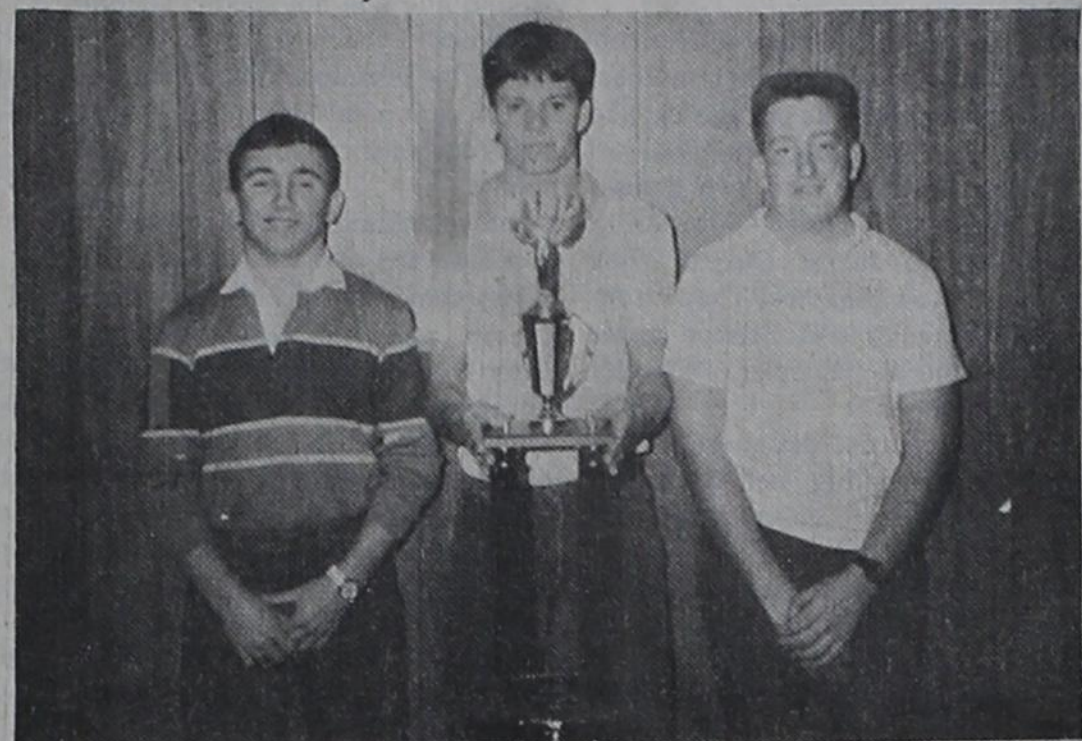

The team of Chris Bedowitz, Shane Whiteley, and Chad Bentley took first place and scored a record number of points, thirty-nine, at this invitational meet. The team of Mindy Harcastle, Dawn Boedeker, and Kelli Sabbe overcame adversity when their computer malfunctioned

and they had to switch to one they had never used before. The team took third place just behind Happy. The team of Bryan Kenney, David Jones, and Misty King, all of which did not know for sure if they were going until a week before the contest, made a respectable showing with a fifth place out of 14 teams.

This is the second year in a row that Wheeler has won the contest, and hopefully there will be another victory in 1989. Returning from last year's team is Chris Bedowitz. Chad Bentley will be the only member of this year's team that will be eligible next year.

The next contest for the programmers will be the area contest at Amarillo. The top teams from there will qualify to the state meet. ## GUY HARDIN TO SEEK OFFICE OF CO. ATTORNEY

Guy Hardin, veteran Shamrock attorney, announced today he is a candidate for election to the office of Wheeler County Attorney, subject to the action of the voters in the Democratic Primary, Tuesday, March 8, 1988.

The candidate is a graduate of the Baylor University School of Law and began his law practice in Shamrock in 1949.

Hardin served in the office he seeks from 1953 to 1956 and again from 1961 until 1969.

Hardin has served his community and profession in many capacities. He is a member of the First Baptist

Church, former member of the Boosters Club, past president of the Shamrock Jaycees, past adjutant of De-Shazo-George Post 68 of the American Legion, and past president and fire chief of Shamrock Volunteer Fire Department.

He served for many years as a member of the Grievance Committee for the State Bar of Texas. He has also served as Director of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association.

Mr. Hardin stated that he is an advocate of diligent and fair prosecution and that he believes this to be a vital factor in maintaining responsibility to society.

Hardin and his wife, Verna reside at 920 South Main.

In making his announcement, Hardin, who recently announced he will retire Jan. 1, 1989, from the office of District Attorney of the 31st Judicial District of Texas, said:

"I have served to the best of my ability in the various public offices which I've held, and I am asking your support in my bid for election as County Attorney of Wheeler County. If elected, it is my intention to seek immediately on Jan. 1, 1989, a reduction of \$6,000 per year in the salary of this office."

## Blood Pressure Clinic

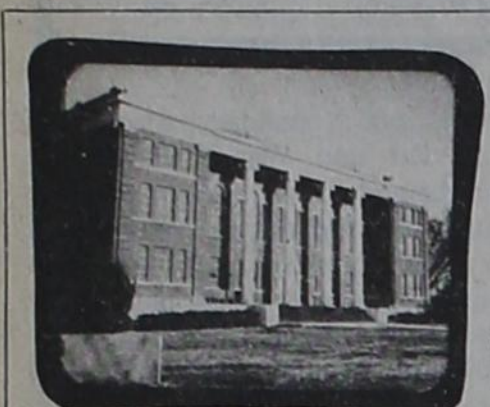

Gail and I were gone to the clinic all afternoon with residents, so I didn't get a chance to say Hi!

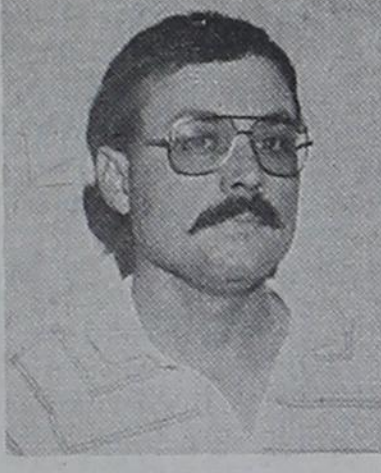
We still have three in the hospital Esther Sorenson and Stella Fields in Amarillo and Sam Thomas here at Wheeler.

I'm dedicated to my work, and to the people in our county. This is my life, I do not and will not use it as a part-time job. I need and want to be your Sheriff again.  
I'm not running against anyone, I'm running for the job of Sheriff.  
It is my opinion, when a voter goes to the polls, they are hiring professional people to serve in various offices. Please accept this as my application again, for the job of Wheeler County Sheriff.  
I will work as hard the last day in office as I did the first and I will continue to work for you, the people of Wheeler County.

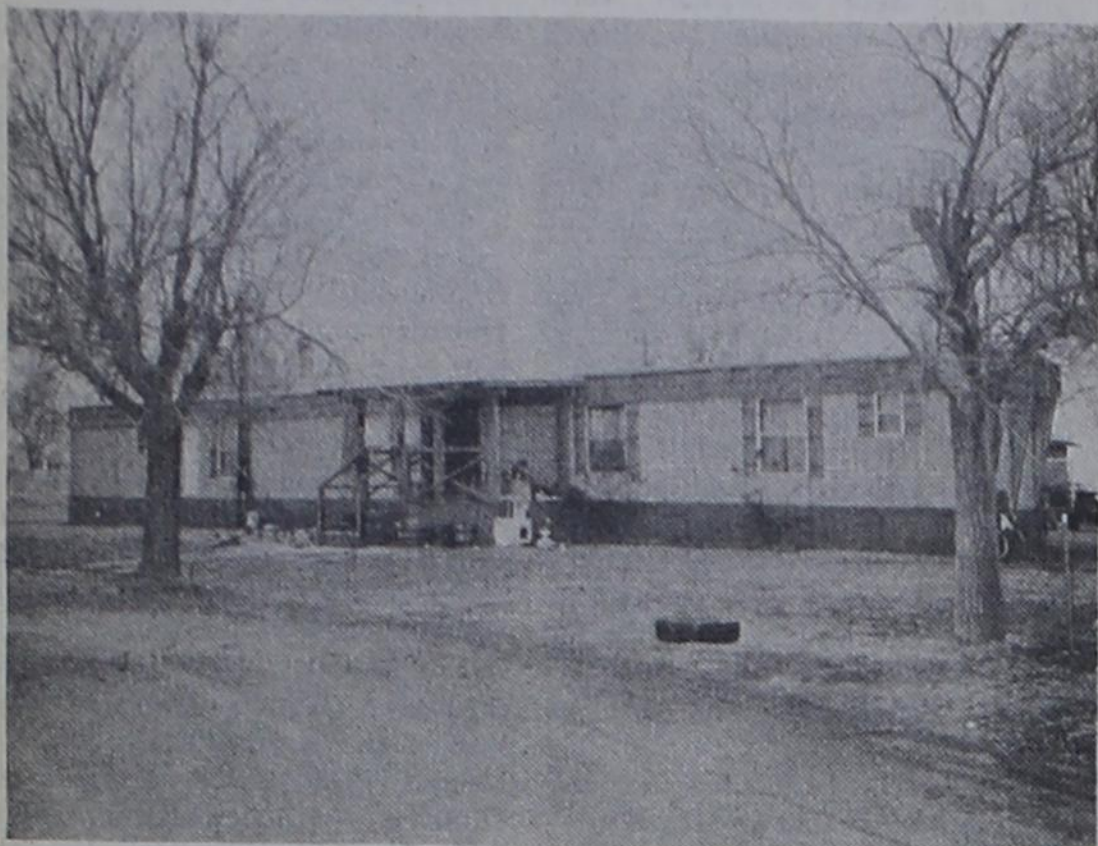

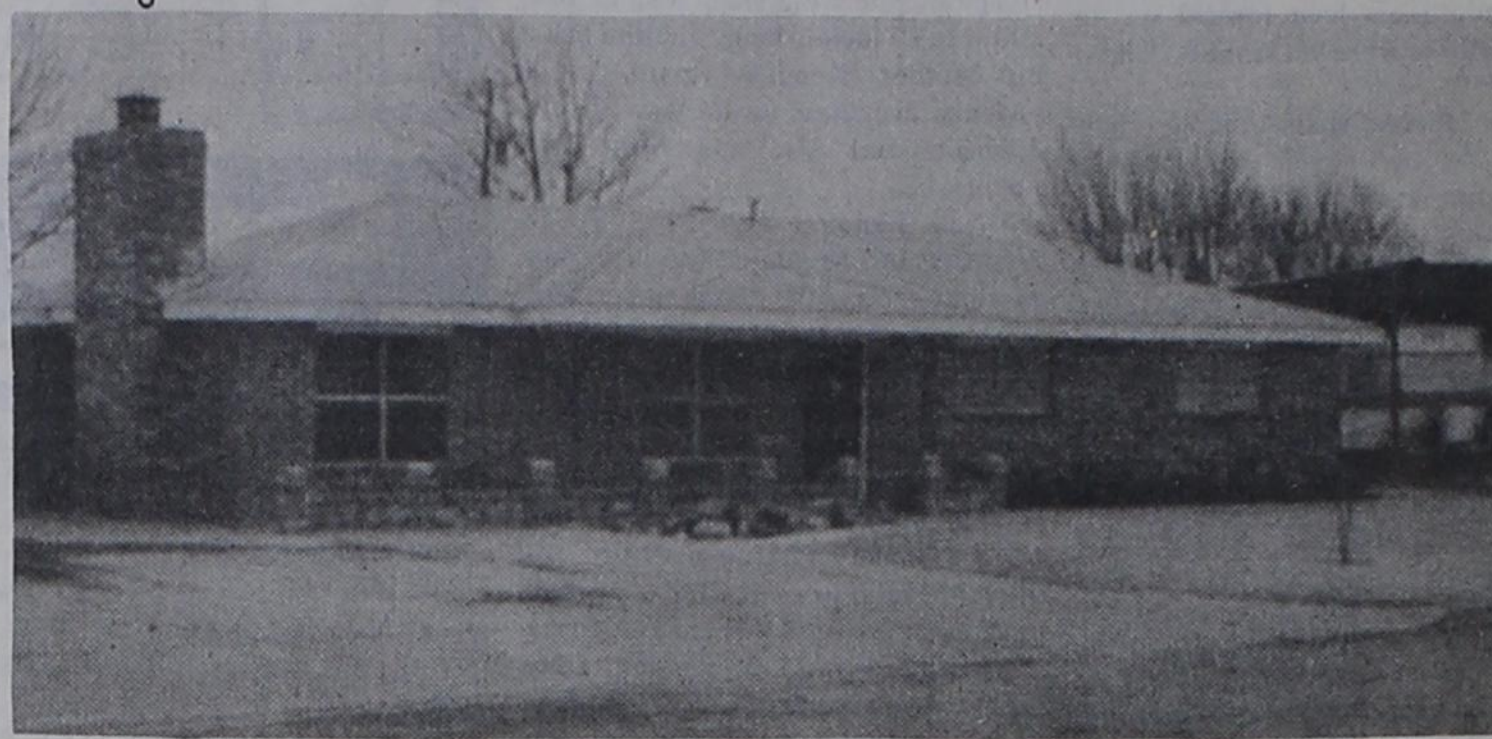


