## LOSS TO MUNDAY ENDS '90 FOOTBALL SEASON

The Wheeler Mustangs played the Number 1 ranked Munday Moguls last Saturday afternoon in Vernon in an area match-up. The Number 4 ranked Mustangs gave the hometown fans from Wheeler a thrill as they picked up a 13-0 lead with 4:39 on the clock in the 1st quarter.

Mack Marshall put a big hit on Terry Collier to cause a fumble which was recovered by Matt Smith on

Wheeler's 38 yard line. Jason Beers ran a bootleg pass on third down and Matt Smith made an overhead catch and scampered 58 yards for the first 6 points, with Arthur Altamirano adding the extra point.

The Stangs allowed one first down and forced a punt the next series with Brandon Chick returning for 16 yards to the Munday 46 yard line. Mark Marshall broke a trap play 43 yards on

2nd down to out-distance the Mogul secondary for the 13-0 lead. The try for the extra point was wide by Altamirano.

A fumble set up Munday's first score with their possession coming at the Wheeler 44 yard line. On the sixth play, Terry Collier scored on a 27 yard run. Bobby Dockins kicked the extra point to narrow the Mustang lead to 13-7.

The Mustangs returned the kick-off to the 22 yard line and failed to convert a third down pass. Chick punted to the Munday 48 yard line. Five plays later, Dockins completed a pass to Jay Kingston for a 37 yard touchdown to tie the score. Dockins added the extra point to take a 14-13

lead with 6:07 left in the first half. Each team took a possession before the half ended.

The Mustangs, determined to regain the lead took the 2nd half kick-off and marched to the Munday 7 yard line. Matt Smith gained 36 yards on a delay pass over the middle for the big gainer in the drive, with Mack Marshall adding 17 yards and brother Mark picking up 12 yards after mixing a field goal try, the Mustangs went for the touchdown, with a play action pass to either Smith or Willeford, but was denied the opportunity by the stiff Mogul defense.

Terry Collier on the first play, took a pitch around the right to sweep 93 yards for a big play for Munday. A

missed extra point let the scoreboard read 20-13 in favor of the moguls.

The Moguls scored on their next possession with Tyler Thompson scoring on a 74 yard trap play to make the score 28-13 after a 2 pt conversion by Terry Collier.

Matt Smith took the kickoff and made a great return of 49 yards to the Munday 36 yard line, breaking four tackles in the process. The drive was stopped with an interception of a Beers pass intended for Smith.

The Mustangs held the Moguls and after an 8 yard punt took over on the

### Rites Read Tues. For Kenneth L. Franklin

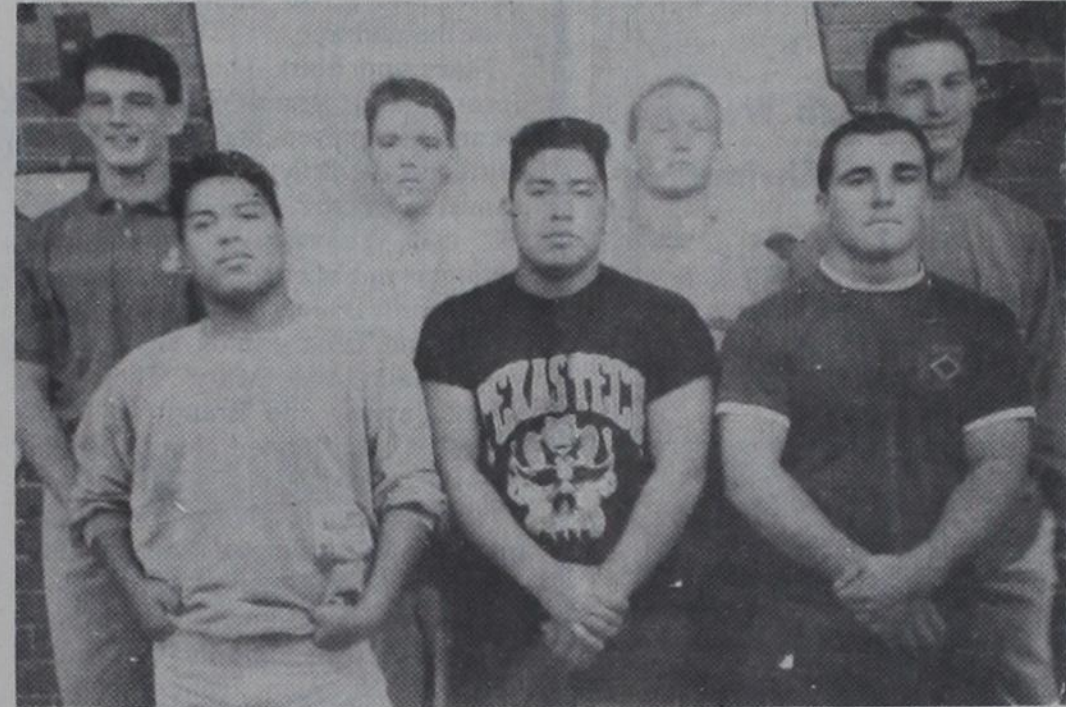
Kenneth L. Franklin, 69, died Sunday, November 25, 1990.

It looks like sometime this month they are going to get relieved over here. I think that as long as I know when we are coming home it will make it a little bit easier. All the E-5's are pulling a lot of duty right now. It is almost everyday that we have duty. We are the Sergeant of the Guard and it is a four hour shift. I don't mind it because I can usually write a lot of letters while I am on duty. I need Mike, Larry and Patti's address. I left home without them. When Kim sends some of those little cameras in the box that you leave in the box and some packages to mail them I will send some pictures of Saudi Arabia and me. I hope to be home before to long, but I don't know when just yet. Tell everyone hello from me and keep writing!

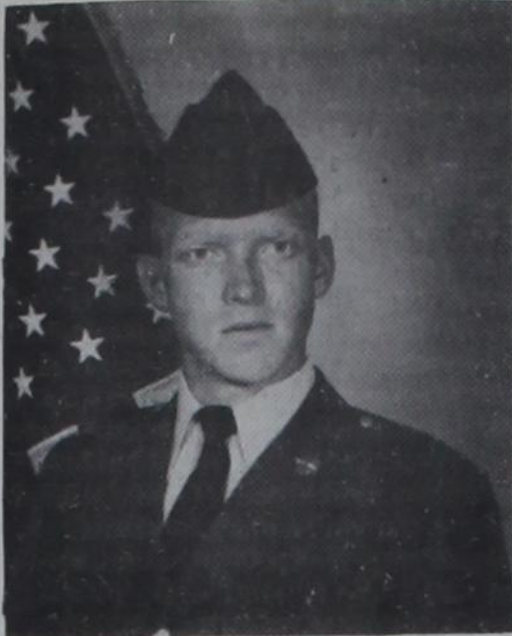

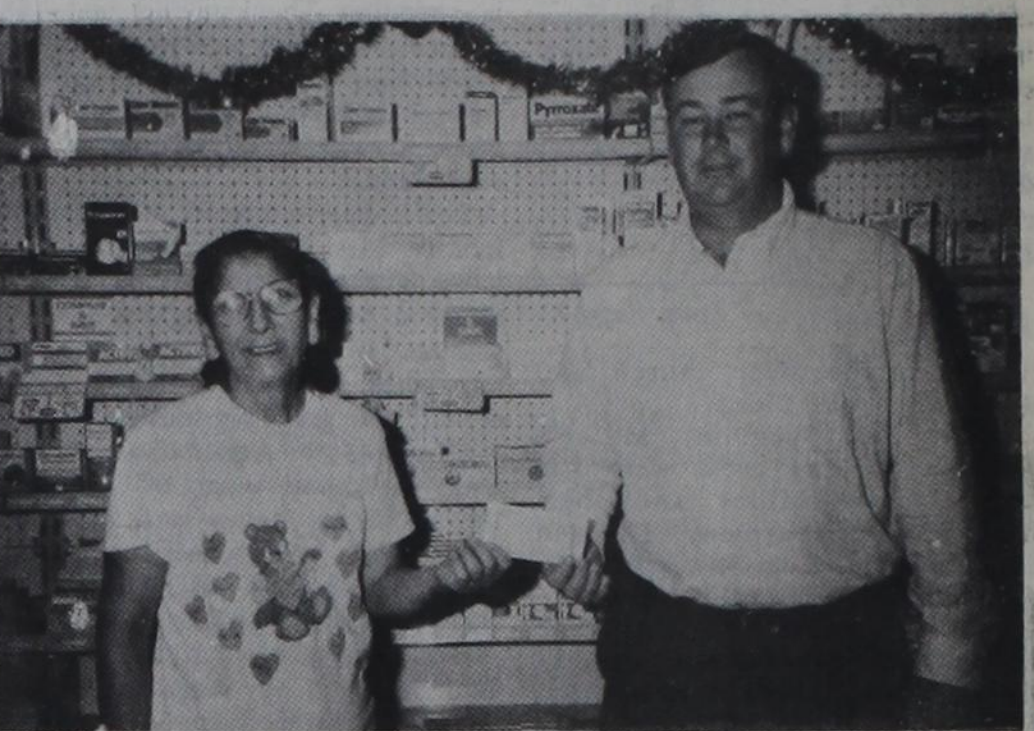
There will be a showmanship contest for juniors and seniors in each species. The showmanship entry fee will be \$3.00 with the entire pot going to the winner.
