signatures, just make and justify your nomination.



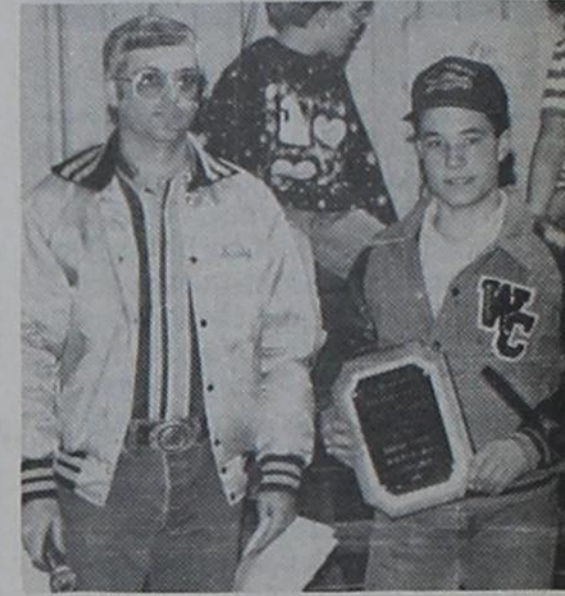

Tickets are on sale for the 1992 Wheeler Chamber of Commerce Installation Banquet, scheduled for Monday, February 17, in the Wheeler High School Cafeteria.

Speaker for the evening will be William Taylor "Spike" Dykes, head coach of the Texas Tech Red Raiders. Dykes is known for his humor and is a well known speaker in demand over the area.

To know Spike is to know the Will Rogers of the world. Forget egos and career ladders. His priorities start and end with people. Everything else is secondary. "Where I come from, if somebody says hello to you going to the post office, you don't just keep walking, you say 'Hello, how ya doin'?" Dykes says. "To me, that's just natural. That's just being a person."

Spike is just as much at home giving an acceptance speech for his induction into the Texas High School Coaches Association's Hall of Honor (a 1991 inductee) as he is sipping coffee and spinning yarn at some diner off the beaten path. His philosophies of life have proven successful in the football arena, stretching from many different ends of the spectrum. After a dozen different coaching stops, Dykes and wife, Sharon, have packed and unpacked for the last time—at least until next century.

Wanting only what's best for his players is a big deal to Spike, and

that's why academics always is foremost on his mind. "We can never forget why these young men are here," said Dykes, in reference to his players. "We want them to receive the type of education that will make it easier for them to advance in society after they leave."

The highlight of the banquet each year is the presentation of the "Outstanding Individual" awards.

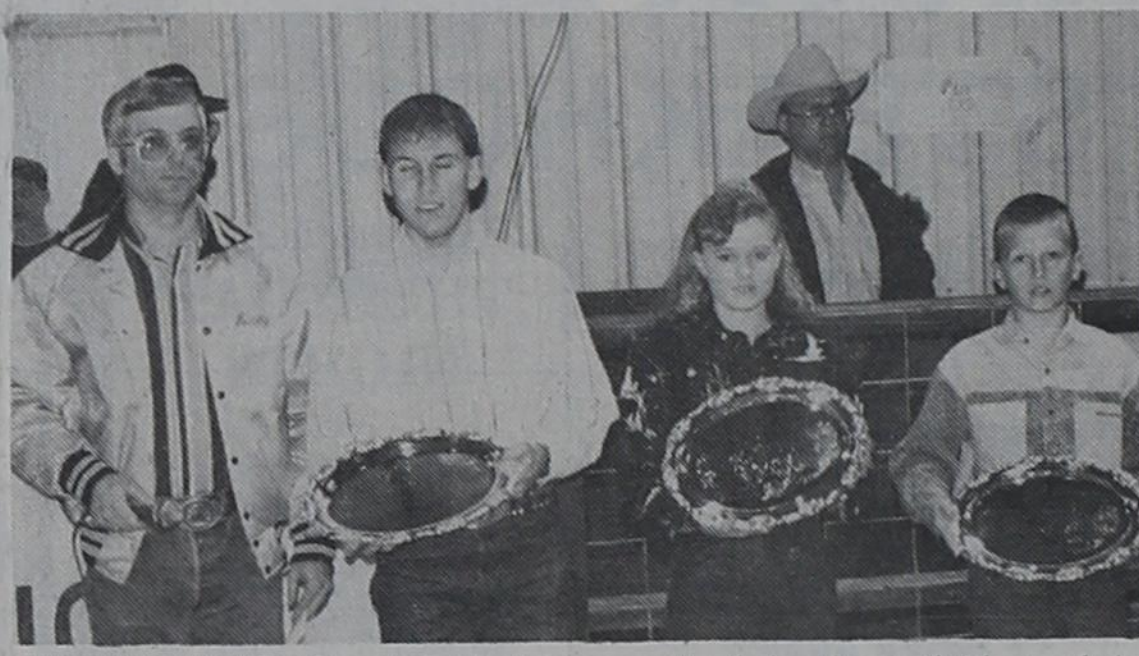

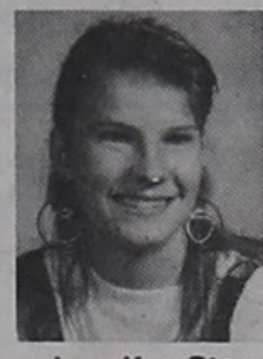

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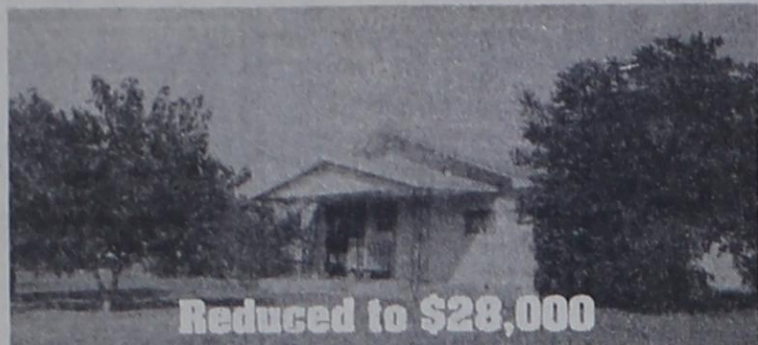

RENDER INCOME-PRODUCING PERSONAL PROPERTY NOW FOR 1992

Business owners are reminded that they must file property rendition forms with the Wheeler County Appraisal District office by April 1, 1992.

Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a written request with the appraisal district by the above date.

Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1, 1992, must file a rendition statement. Businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery, equipment, business vehicles and any other tangible property used in the production of income.

When business personal property isn't rendered, the Chief Appraiser is forced to estimate the value.

While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition. The rendering of Real Estate is not required by law, but the act of rendering is a good way to prevent errors.

Property owners with damaged buildings (storm, fire, etc.) may also file a special report of decreased value. Rendition and report of decreased value forms are available at the Appraisal District office, courthouse square, Wheeler. Phone 806/826-5900.

It is a criminal offense to make false statements on renditions or reports of decreased value. These forms are also confidential and not open to public inspection.

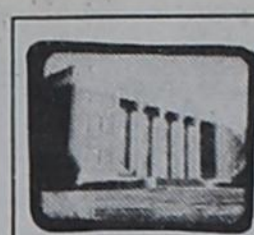

Mickey Macina Named Conservation Program Ass't.

Conservation Program Assistant Mary (Mickey) I. Macina, is the program assistant responsible for all conservation programs in the Wheeler County ASCS office. The program with the most activity is the Conservation Reserve Program. Wheeler County has 332 CRP contracts that cover 53,825.5 acres. These acres are the maximum that can be entered into the CRP this time for the county. The CRP Program started in 1986. A contract is for ten years.



Mickey Macina

In 1991 Mickey was responsible for seeing that 352 CRP participants received \$2,073,245 in annual payments at an average of \$38.00 per acre.
Mickey is also responsible for making costshare payments to CRP participants for establishing a grass cover and for controlling weeds on CRP. The producer pays the cost of the conservation practice and ASCS reimburses him half of this expense. The CRP participant must comply with a Conservation Plan that has been developed by Soil Conservation Service. A participant then receives costshare as he completes a component of the plan. At least \$334,378 were spent by 71 CRP producers to either sow grass or for eligible weed control on new grass stands in 1991. ASCS paid \$167,189 in cost share to these producers.
Producers are required to maintain the grass stands at their own expense

once the grass has established itself in the fields. In order to maintain these grass fields producers shred or apply herbicide. These maintenance costs can vary from \$5.00 to \$20.00 per acre.

A producer that refuses to maintain an established grass stand or does not comply with the Conservation Plan can be determined ineligible to receive any further annual rental or cost share payments and be required to pay back all payments they have received plus interest from the dates the payments were issued.

The president of the Bank of International Settlements,
The head of the world's greatest monopoly.
These financiers collectively controlled more wealth than the United States treasury. Newspapers and magazines had printed their success stories, urging the young people of this nation to follow their example. But twenty-five years later these success stories had ended in disgrace.
The president of the largest independent steel company—Charles Schwab—was living on borrowed money.
The greatest wheat speculator—Arthur Cullen—died abroad. At the time of his death, he was broke.
The President of the New York Stock Exchange—Richard Whitney—had recently been released from prison.
The member of the President's cabinet—Albert Fall—was pardoned from prison so he could die at home.
The greatest "bear" on Wall Street—Jesse Livermore—committed suicide.

The president of the Bank of International Settlements—Leon Fraser—committed suicide.
The head of the world's greatest monopoly—Ivar Krueger—committed suicide.
From the experiences of these financiers, it should be obvious that the crucial issue of life is not what a man has, but what a man is. But what exactly is man? To answer this question, a comparison must be made between two questions that Jesus ask. These two questions are: "—What does it profit a man to gain the whole world, and forfeit his soul?" and "—What is a man profited if he gains the whole world, and loses or forfeits himself?" 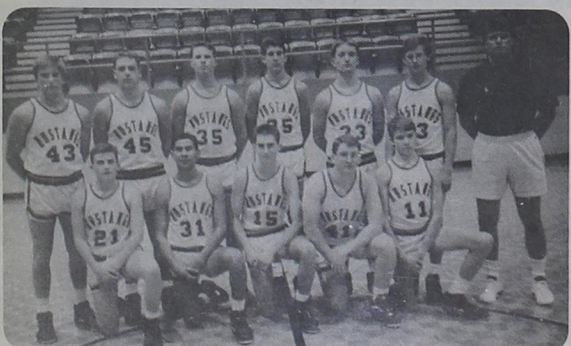
