



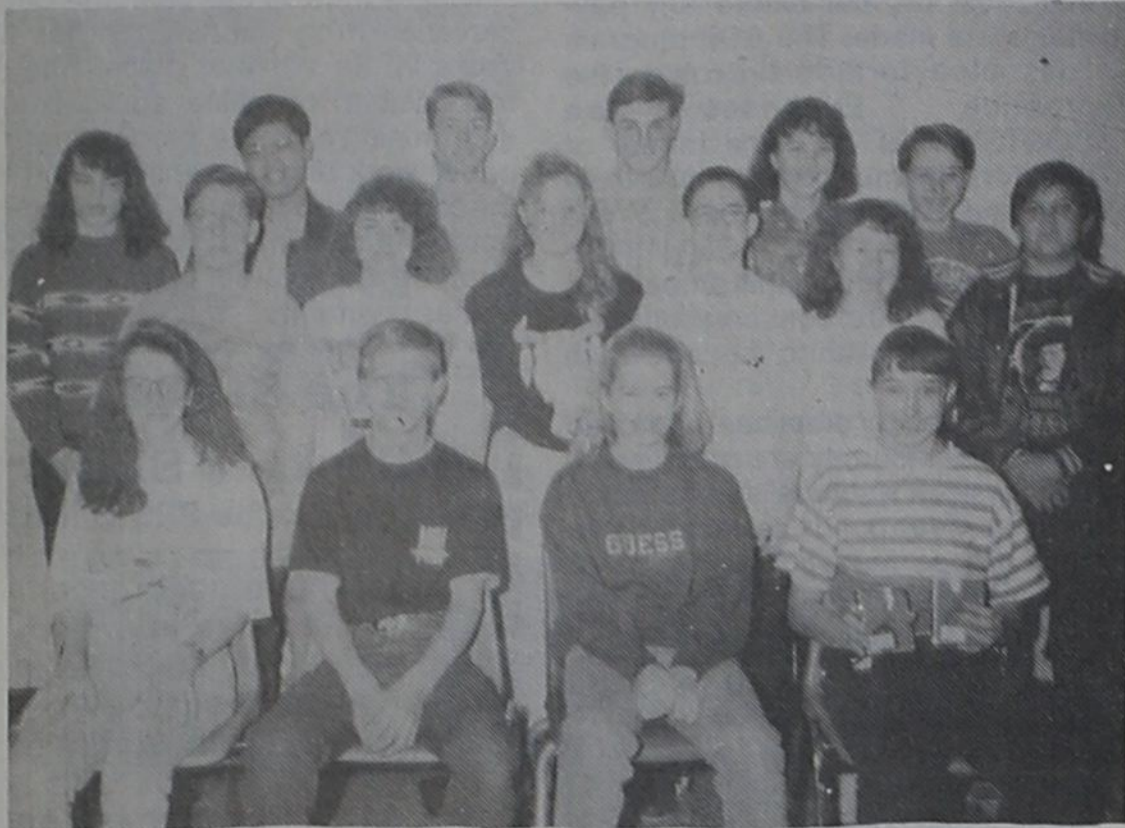

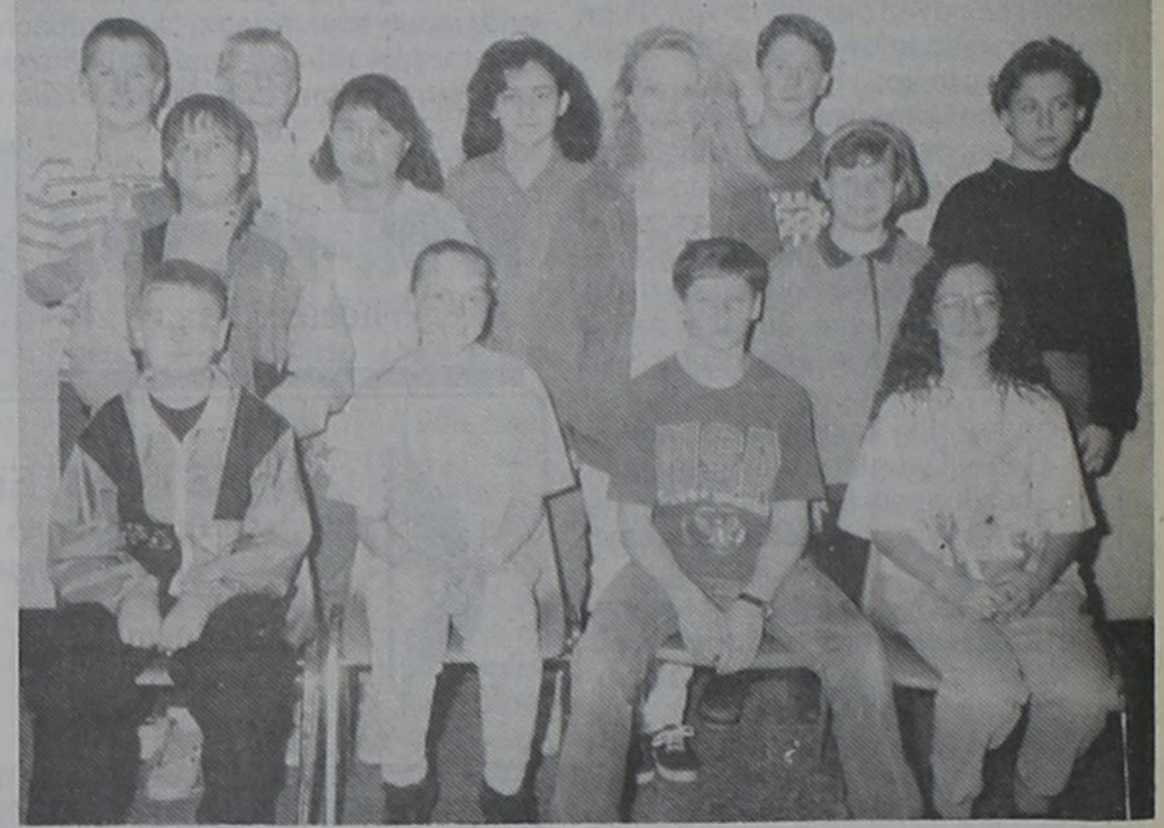

ACP Program Encourages Conservation Practices

The Wheeler County ACS Committee approves around \$45,000 a year for conservation practices completed by farmers and ranchers. These funds are appropriated by congress and are distributed throughout the United States. Each county ASC Committee selects what conservation practices meet their county's needs from a list of nationally approved practices. These practices have certain criteria that must be met by applicants, before specifications that must be met before any payments are made. The ACP program does not pay for the entire costs of the practice. Expenses are COSTSHARED with the farmer or rancher. He must bear 50% of the cost and ASCS bears 50% of the cost.

In Wheeler County this amounts to around \$90,000 of conservation practices being applied to the land each year.

Conservation practices approved for Wheeler County are grass seeding, livestock waterwells and storage facilities, seep ponds, terraces, diversions, cross fences, brush control, and reorganization of irrigation systems.

at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales.

He was born Dec. 17, 1896 near Riley Springs, Texas. To A.H. and Mary Hunt. He came to New Mexico after serving in the Navy on a mine sweeper in World War I. He homesteaded near Duran, and proved up on it. To augment his income during this period, he taught in a one room school for the children of the homesteaders. He married Mattie Sivage on Nov. 11, 1926, in Wheeler, Texas. They moved to Hiway, where he was principal and a teacher in a two room school.

He came to Portales to be the first principal of the new junior high, a position he left to become Roosevelt County School Superintendent. In Portales, he was an active member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club, the American Legion and the First Methodist Church where he taught the men's Sunday school class. He was a member of the Portales Masonic Lodge since January, 1931.

He served two terms on the State Legislature from Roosevelt County and was Veterans Administration Representative after World War II. He then returned to Eastern New Mexico College, later University, as Business Manager until his retirement. Later, he served as Director of State Finance and Administration under Gov. John Burroughs.

After he moved to Ruidoso, he served as manager of the Chamber of Commerce during the development of the ski resort. He continued to be active in rotary and served for years as Sunday school superintendent of the Community Methodist Church. He was the last World War I veteran of the Ruidoso Chapter of the American Legion.

He is survived by two daughters, Mary Olenchak of Antioch, Calif., and Lila Roberson of Roswell; one son-in-law, Joseph Olenchak; six grandsons, John Olenchak of Sunnyvale, Calif., Mike Olenchak of Clovis, Calif., Charles Roberson, William Roberson, Patrick Roberson, and Paul Roberson of Overton, Texas; one granddaughter, Molly Olenchak of Antioch, Calif.; and one brother Malcom and his wife Audrey of Denver, Colo.

Also surviving are sisters-in-law, Ardie Martin, and Audie Sivage of Wheeler, Texas, Edna Johnston and her husband Olen, of Pineville, La., and Cuma Oldham and her husband Tim of Portales.

He was preceded in death by his wife of almost 65 years, on July 7, 1991.

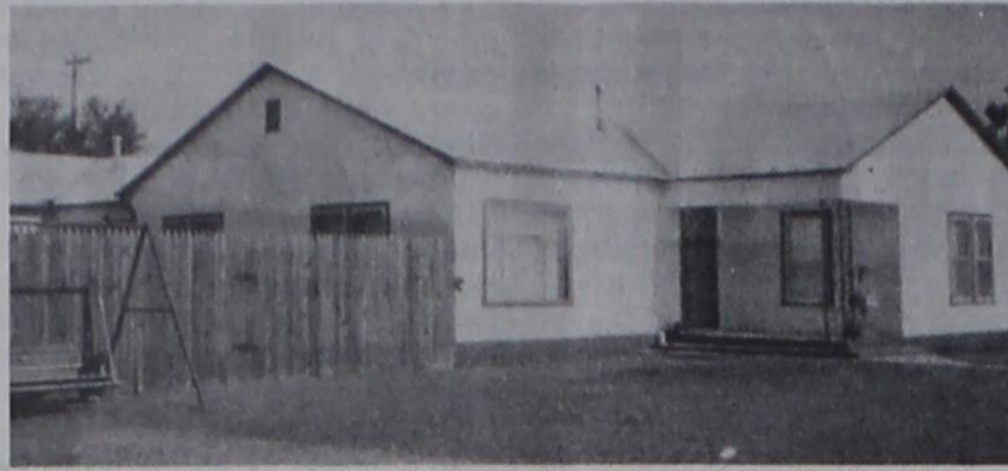

From The Minister's Desk:
Did you hear about the farmer who was informed by his banker that he had to reduce the expenses of his farm? The farmer carefully thought about his expenses for several days, deciding that there was definitely one expense that he could reduce. This expense was the amount of feed that he had to buy for his mule.

He decided that he would mix sawdust with the feed that he fed his mule. With this mixture, he believed that he would greatly reduce his feed expense. And he was right! After several weeks, this expense was reduced by almost fifty percent. But his mule died!

When I read about this farmer, I thought about some of the televangelists. To justify their false and often dishonest ministries, these televangelists mix their self-serving opinion into certain Biblical texts. One of these texts is Isaiah 53:4-6 which says: "Surely our griefs He Himself bore, and our sorrows He carried; yet we ourselves esteemed Him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But He was pierced through for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities; the chastening for our well-being fell upon Him, and by His scourging we are healed. All of us like sheep have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; but the Lord has caused the iniquity of us all to fall on Him."

The televangelists correctly teach that this text promises that the death of Jesus provides the forgiveness of sin. But they incorrectly teach that this text

also promises that the death of Jesus provides the healing of physical diseases and illnesses. To support these erroneous beliefs, these televangelists emphasize the metaphorical statement in this text that says: "—by His scourging we are healed."

If these televangelists properly understood Biblical exegesis, they would know that the cardinal principle of Biblical exegesis is that a text must always be studied in its context, and when Isaiah 53:4-6 is studied in its context it is obvious that it exclusively refers to the forgiveness of sin that people can receive by the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ.

For example, there are two other metaphorical statements in this text that clearly refer to the sacrificial death of Jesus. These two statements are: "—He was pierced through for our transgressions—" and "—He was crushed for our iniquities—" With this context, it is absolutely absurd to believe that another metaphorical statement would not also refer to his sacrificial death.

Isaiah 53:4-6 is one of the greatest texts in the Bible. It foretells the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ which was offered for the forgiveness of sin. But when televangelists mix their self-serving opinion into this text by teaching that Jesus Christ died for the healing of diseases and illnesses, they are jeopardizing the spiritual lives of people.
