

5"-12" SNOW BLOCKS ROADS IN AREA

The second snow of the season left traffic into and out of Wheeler blocked in all four directions and produced 0.53 inches of moisture. The snow measure varies from four to 7 inches,

but the blowing and drifting was the cause of the problem. Twelve inches was reported in the Gageby area with drifts to 12'. The snow began early Tuesday

morning, November 24 and continued throughout the day. Due to the lack of visibility, schools were dismissed at 10:30 A.M. and did not resume until Monday, after the Thanksgiving Holiday.

Roads were reported blocked Tuesday afternoon and through traffic was stopped at the 4-way stop by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department throughout the night. The motel quickly filled and the local churches were asked to open their doors for the stranded motorists. A bus driver, passengers, UPS driver and a number of travelers spent the night and into the morning at the First Baptist Church. The United Methodist Church and Church of Christ each had a number

of visitors. In addition to keeping the vehicles off the roads, the Sheriff's Department was also called upon for transportation to and from work by the employees at the Wheeler Care Center and Parkview Hospital. The department and the owners of 4-wheel drive vehicles assisted stranded motorists throughout the afternoon Tuesday and into the morning Wednesday. With the request for an ambulance west of town, a deputy made the call to be of assistance. The caution by the Sheriff's Department paid off, as no accidents with injury were reported. The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service made two calls during the height of the storm, neither related to the weather. The Highway Department and County Road Crews were on the job immediately trying to keep the traffic moving. Opening and/or keeping some of the country roads opened was completed nearly a week later.

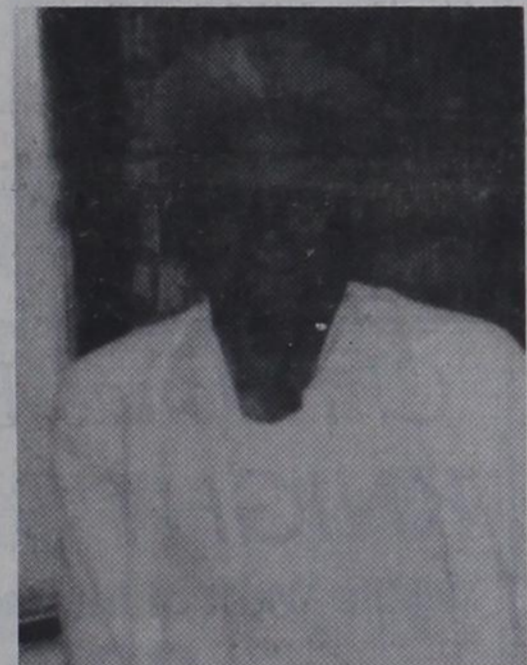

C.P. COOK Meet The Care Center Residents

C.P. Cook was born on May 2, 1915 in Palestine, Texas. Palestine, Texas is located in Anson County. C.P. married his first wife when he was fifteen years old and she was only thirteen. They had one kid. C.P. also had three other kids by a different marriage, later on in his life. He has one grandchild.

C.P. attended a school in Chicago, Illinois with the white kids. C.P. said, "although I got to go to school with the white kids, there was still tension between the black kids and the white kids. At this school was where he learned to read."

He first came to Wheeler sometime during the 1920s to chop cotton. He had to return to Palestine after he was finished chopping cotton to gather his own crops back at Palestine. In 1930 he came back to Wheeler in a Model T Ford. This time it was to stay. He decided to live in Wheeler because the white people treated him better here than they did in East Texas. Although the people in Wheeler were friendlier, he still had trouble being accepted by some white people. When C.P. walked down the streets of Wheeler his boss and his boss's brother had to walk on each side of him and carry a gun for C.P.'s protection.

C.P. said that he did all kinds of jobs growing up, just to make some money. His favorite occupation was working in peoples yards and gardens. C.P. said that he and his son were the first black men to come to Wheeler and do yard work for people. He really enjoyed making people's yards beautiful. When he was not working he enjoyed fishing ever chance he could get.

C.P. is a Jehovah Witness. He enjoys talking to people about religion and he is not afraid to tell you what he believes in. C.P.'s kids and family come to visit him often. C.P. always looks forward to visiting with them. I asked C.P. how he liked staying at the Care Center and he said that he got better care there then he would at his home. C.P. said that if people would like to stop in and visit him, he would be more than happy to tell them about his life.

Ground Water District Is Subject of Meeting Dec. 10

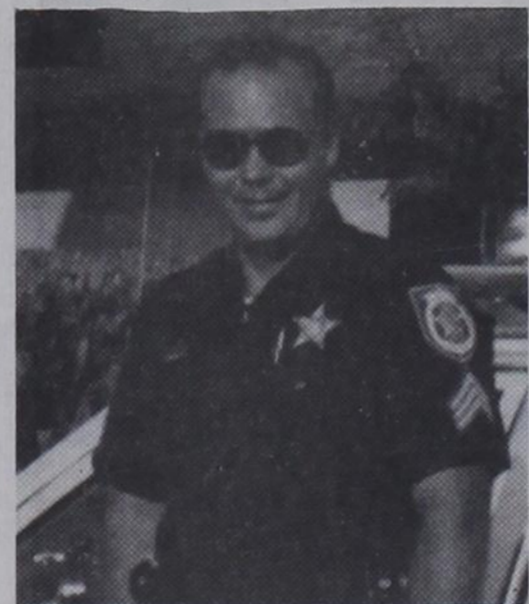

'Chad' Rue, Guest Speaker At Country Chapel Sun.

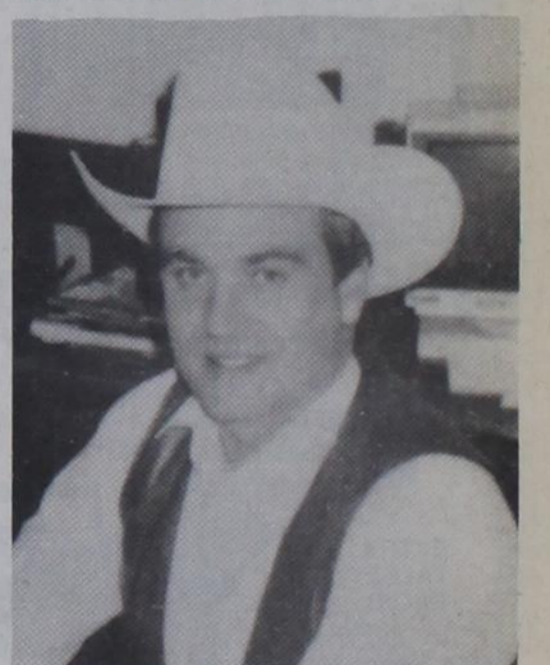
C.N. "Shad" Rue will be the guest speaker at Country Chapel Sunday, December 6 for both the morning and evening services.

GTE's intraexchange DS1 Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through concurrence with GTE's interLATA access tariff rates which are lower. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1, 080, 567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42, 383.

DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

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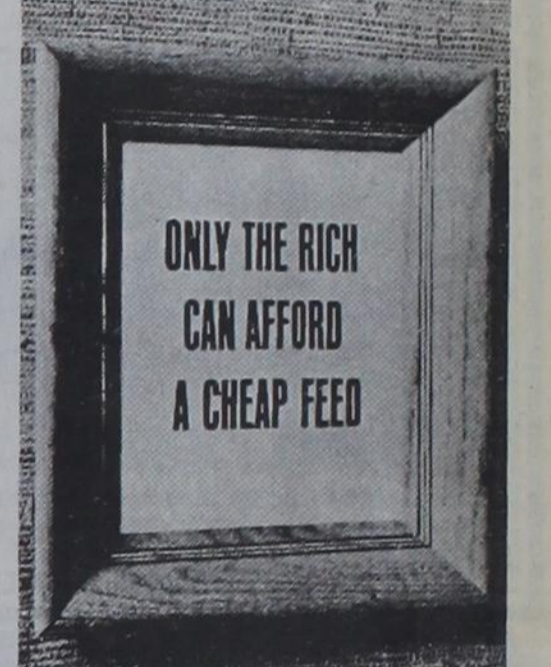

GTE's intraexchange DS1 Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through concurrence with GTE's interLATA access tariff rates which are lower. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1,080,567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42,383.

DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

From The Minister's Desk:

One of the most interesting stories in the Old Testament is the story of Naaman. This story is recorded in the fifth chapter of II Kings.

According to this text, Naaman was the "commander of the army of the king of Syria" (II King 5:1) Since Naaman had waged successful military campaigns against the enemies of Syria, he was a man of influence and prestige. He was also a man who was afflicted with a terrible disease. The text says that Naaman "was a leper" (II Kings 5:1)

Naaman's diseased condition aroused the sympathy of his wife's maid, a young Israelite girl who had been captured by the Syrians on one of their raids into Israel. (II Kings 5:2) This young girl believed that Naaman could be healed by Elisha, a prophet of God who lived in Samaria. She said, "Would that my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria. He would cure him of his leprosy." (II Kings 5:3)

When the king of Syria was informed about the prophet in Samaria who could heal Naaman, he arranged for Naaman to go to Samaria. The text then says: "Naaman came with his horses and his chariots, and halted at the door of Elisha's house. And Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, Go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean. But Naaman was angry and went away, saying,

Behold, I thought that he would surely come out to me, and stand, and call on the name of the Lord His God, and wave his hand over the place, and cure the leper." (II Kings 5:9-11)

Notice that Naaman said: "Behold I thought--." This phrase could easily illustrate the mistake that many of us make when we study the Bible. This mistake is that we allow our preconceived opinions and prejudices to overshadow the revealed will of God. Too many of us are more concerned about what we think than what the Bible says.

The Bible is not a book of abstract philosophy. Rather it is an infallible record of the will of God which was written by men who were "moved by the Holy Spirit" (II Peter 1:20-21) For this reason, the will of God is not determined by personal preference, opinion, or judgment. It is determined by the teachings that are plainly recorded on the pages of the Bible.

The maid of Naaman's wife was correct. The prophet of God could and did heal Naaman. But Naaman had to do what the prophet of God said not what he thought. (II Kings 5:13-14) What about you and I? We are not lepers, but we are sinners. To be forgiven, we must learn the will of God by carefully studying the Bible, obeying what God said not what we think.
