**County Entomologists** Lorel Bird Succumbs Short Time After Charge Tears Gaping Hole in Abdomen

Occurred Late Tuesday Victim Was in Field Near Home **Hunting Rabbits When Tragedy Befell** 

Death, in tragic mood, reached forth its clammy hand late Tuesday evening and snatched from the Allison community one of its highlyrespected and promising young men, Lorel Bird, 20, when a shotgun with which he was hunting rabbits was accidentally discharged, the contents of a 12-gauge shell tearing a gaping hole in the right side of the abdomen.

Young Bird, who lived with his parents two miles south of Allison, had gone a short distance from the house to look for rabbits. ### **Cotton Loan Rules Cover Wider Scope**

Change in Regulations to Permit Participation by Wheeler **County Growers** 

An announcement this week by the Commodity Credit corporation, a governmental agency under whose supervision plans for relief measures for cotton growers faced with lowered prices as the result of a large crop, brought a ray of hope to producers of this region in the new 6cent loan provision.

The new ruling by the credit organization is a system of loans for cotton which fails to qualify under the regular 9-cent loan program. The new brackets are

Strict low middling with seven-eighths inch staple or better, 81/2 cents.

Strict low middling with staple below seven-eighths, 7 cents.
