# Political Calendar for 1942 Election

First Democratic Primary July 25, Second Aug. 22 and General Nov. 3 are Highlights

Although 1942 is an "off" year, with only the regular biennial state election coming up, it promises an interesting if not exciting political season. A calendar of principal events, issued last week by the office of Gov. Coke R. Stevenson, is highlighted by three dates of prime importance to the electorate, namely: the first Democratic primary on July 25, the second on August 22, and the general election on Nov. 3.

These dates ore fixed by statute. In addition to the three dates above and a half dozen more listed by the governor's office, A. B. Crump, chairman of the Democratic County Executive committee, has supplied additional dates to form the following complete political calendar.

Jan. 31—Last day to pay poll tax.

# **Grow More Garden Advise Authorities**

Extension Service Says Backyard Production of Foodstuffs is Patriotic Duty

"It is patriotic to grow a vegetable garden in the backyard, if no other space is available," declares a news release from the office of County Agent Jake Tarter, which reflects the Food-for-Freedom policy of the extension service. Continuing, the article points out that whatever amount of vegetables are grown in backyard gardens releases just that much more food for the defense pro-

Tarter recommends that garden ground, to which has been applied a half inch of manure or an inch of cotton burrs spread evenly, should Names Under New Rule now be broken or spaded up in preparation for planting as soon as weather conditions permit.

The following list of vegetable varieties adapted to this locality has been compiled by the agent's office:

Tomatoes-Porter, Burgess or New Stone; cabbage—Early Wakefield; sweet corn-Southern Sweet; green beans-Long Green, Pinto or Kentucky Wonder; carrots, radishes or mustard-any variety; but Swiss Chard has proved the most satisfactory variety of that vegetable; onion plants-Bermuda, Pennick or shallots; peas-Blackeye, Brown Crowder or Cream are good producers and give best results if plant-

### PUBLIC WASTE MUST CEASE

The most telling criticism of the newly proposed federal budget deals with projected expenditures for nonwar activities. The budget calls for a cut of about one billion dollars a year in this direction. Many economists and high governmental officials are convinced that a reduction of at least double this amount can be made.

The taxpayers are being called upon to accept a financial burden unparalleled in American history. Last year's record-breaking income tax bill is supposed to produce an increase in tax revenue of some \$3,-500,000,000 a year. This year, plans call for another bill to produce around nine billions additional.
