THE OBLIGATIONS OF THE PRESS

In the December issue of The Cosmopolitan, MacArthur's Intelligence Chief, Major General Charles A. Willoughby, complains that a number of the nation's top newspaper men "appeared to go out of their way to create defeatist thought patterns in their readers, and to belittle the country's armed

Gen. Willoughby's bitter accusation of giving aid and comfort to the enemy was hurled at Hanson Baldwin of the New York

Times, Joe Alsop of the New York Herald-Tribune, Drew Pearson, Hal Boyle of the Associated Press, and lies. Writers who had not been too critical of the job that the General had done, as MacArthur's Intelligence Chief, drew the bouquet of being balanced and accurate in their writings.

Without going into the merits of wh these writers have written about Gen. Willoughby or what they have written about our armed forces, we are thankful that we do have writers in this country who report the acts and the truths as they see them instead of shouting, when they know that it isn't true, that all our generals are the best, that ill our training is the best, and so forth.

It is true, as Gen. Willoughby indicates, hat it hurts the morale of the fighting oldier to learn that his general or his equipnent is not the best. 
