Editorial

ROBERT E. LEE

Saturday, January 19th, is the anniversary of the birthday of Robert E. Lee. It is a tribute to the famous Virginian that his memory brings forth no enmity in any section of the country.

on humane principles and as a gentleman of the old school who believed in chivalry in warfare.

Lee, who is regarded by many authorities as the ablest strategist developed during the War Between the States, finished second in his class at West Point in 1829, later became Academy superintendent, and on April 18, 1861, was offered the field command of the United States Army.

Lee was a Whig, loyal to the Union, and hoped that the issues of the day might be settled amicably. He, however, like many men of his time, believed that his first duty was to his state—Virginia.

The record of his military achievements in that war is not needed here. His abilities were recognized on both sides long before the end, when Lee surrendered to General Grant at Appomattox Court House, on April 9th, 1865.

The remaining years of his life were spent at Washington College, in Lexington, Va., which, after his death, was renamed Washington and Lee. Perhaps the greatest of all tributes paid to the Virginian is the respect and admiration shown him in all the forty-eight states and abroad.

POWER FROM ATOMIC ENERGY

A new chapter in the history of the atomic age has been written in the production of useful electric power from atomic energy. Spokesmen for the Atomic Energy Commission report that heat energy has been removed from a breeder reactor by a liquid metal of a type not revealed and that this energy produced enough steam pressure to drive a turbine generating more than one hundred kilowatts of power.

While this development, which was predicted last spring, will not put the Atomic Energy Commission in competition with the various power companies, it is a great step forward in the peacetime development of atomic power. It is refreshing to note that atomic advances are being made which will improve the standard of living rather than destroy human life.

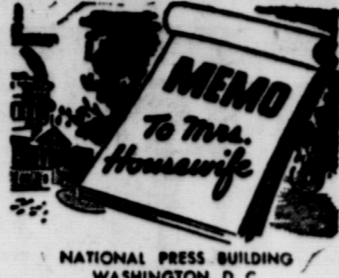

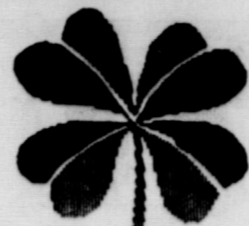
These simple flavor tricks are worth knowing about. Mix vitaminized margarine with chopped green olives and spread on broiled hamburger steaks. Divine! Top cooked green beans with a mixture of margarine and finely chopped onion. The whole family will love 'em! Saute croitons in margarine with a clove of garlic till lightly brown add to tossed green salads or soups for a gourmet touch.

Most everybody loves mashed potatoes, but if you don't vary the flavor you're missing something special. For example, add chopped onion or parsley or pimiento or grated cheese, singly or in combination. For a completely different and delicious taste treat stir real mayonnaise, milk, grated lemon rind and salt in mashed potatoes and beat till light and fluffy.



Baked Peach Custards
Broadcast: January 19, 1952

1 cup drained, sliced cling peaches, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 egg yolks, 2 tablespoons soft butter, 1/2 cup Pet Milk, 1/2 cup peach juice, 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla, 2 stiffly beaten egg whites, 1/4 cup sugar.

Grease 4 large custard cups holding about 1/4 cup each. Put equal parts of peaches in bottom of cups. Put butter and vanilla into bowl. Mix in, about 2 tablespoons at a time, a mixture of sugar, flour and salt. Beat until smooth after each addition. Then add egg yolks one at a time and beat hard. Stir in gradually a mixture of milk and peach juice. Fold in egg whites. Pour mixture over peaches in cups. Set in pan holding about 1/2 inch of hot water. Bake in a slow oven (325) 35 minutes, or until firm. Cool. Makes 4 servings.

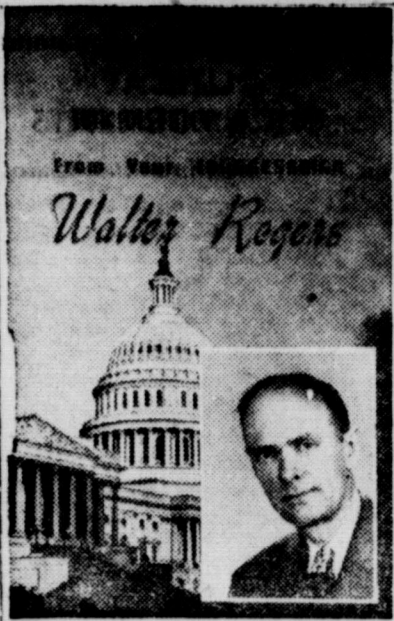
LETTER TO THE EDITOR

If he does so, it will be the result of a complete change of mind on his part that has taken place within the last thirty days. The talk around here as to the probable presidential nominee of the Democratic Party includes the following: Chief Justice Fred Vinson, of the Supreme Court; Senator Estes Kefauver; Senator Harry Byrd; W. Stuart Symington; and Senator Richard B. Russell. There are others, but these are the most prominent at the present time. As vice-president nominee, we hear the name of Senator Lyndon B. ter around Senator Taft. A split in that party is evidenced by the many news reports concerning the leading contenders, to-wit: Senator Taft, Governor Warren, Harold Stassen, and of course Tom Dewey, who says he does not want it, but who, I am convinced, could be prevailed upon to accept it. The names mentioned in both parties of course are the names of those who at the present time have actively or passively indicated their availability. As to what statement General Eisenhower will make, no one knows as of this date, to-wit, January 4, 1952, the date this letter is being written. Frankly, it is my opinion that the nomination of General Eisenhower by both parties would solve many

problems, both domestic and foreign, that are presently faced by the people of this country. Either party could provide strong vice-presidential nominees. Such a procedure under the present circumstances would in my opinion meet with the approval of the general public. After all, the general public is supposed to be running this country, and I am certainly not ready for that to be changed. Should Eisenhower definitely reject nomination by either party, this could well be a year of dark horses. Some good level-headed dark horses that are well versed in 5th grade arithmetic might be the answer to much of the domestic and political confusion. In order for a man to be qualified for President of the United States it is not necessary that he be a widely publicized figure. There are many, many men who could do an outstanding job as President whose names are not known outside of the section of the country in which they reside. It might do both par-

ties well to explore that source for presidential material.
PROPOSED RE-ORGANIZATION OF THE BUREAU OF INTERNAL REVENUE: The President's proposed re-organization of the Bureau of Internal Revenue has met with both approval and condemnation. Those who are most outspoken in their criticism are the ones who have appeared most anxious for a cleanup. I do not know whether the President's proposal to reduce the number of district offices to 25 and put these people under civil service will abolish the possibilities of corruption. I do know that it is the only solution that has been offered to date. With due respect to all parties concerned, I think that it would behoove the critics of that proposal to at least offer an alternative solution. Criticism alone has never solved a problem. The solution must come from constructive thought. It occurs to me that some pertinent suggestions should be forthcoming from the investigating committee. All of that committee are most able and competent and should certainly be able to offer some sound advice. I still believe that both prosecution and stiffer penalties for violations of public trusts would be a great forward step in the right direction. There are too many acts that can be engaged in by public officials on all levels that are not included within the confines of the criminal law as being illegal, although the acts referred to would definitely be considered immoral. A public official should be as vigilant to avoid the commission of an immoral act as to avoid the commission of an illegal act. If this practice is not going to be followed by public officials, then the immoral acts should be included in the criminal law as illegal acts, and prompt and proper punishment should be meted out to those engaged in them.

 body may become reddish-blue in color. Cholera sick hogs usually die within 5 to 10 days after symptoms appear. In a more chronic type of hog cholera, it may take as long as 18 days before the hogs die after symptoms appear. While multiple pin point hemorrhages in the internal organs are observed in hog cholera, a diagnosis cannot be made on these lesions alone since there are several other diseases that have these same internal symptoms.

If you think that you have hog cholera symptoms on your sick hogs, the best bet is to call your veterinarian. Hog cholera can be prevented in many cases newly sick hogs can be saved if vaccinated with hog cholera serum. The serum gives a temporary protection. There have been several types of vaccines developed and your veterinarian will know the best method to use, depending on the individual problem at hand.

Dead hogs must be buried four feet under ground. They should be covered with lime before this is done. If you bring other hogs on to your farm after having hog cholera, the whole place must be well disinfected as the cholera germs can live as long as 11 weeks in undecomposed dead cholera hogs. During hot sunny weather, the virus may not last longer than 24 hours, so you see that a thorough clean up program must be undertaken. And above all else, if you think that you have hog cholera in your herd, don't go to your neighbors and check to see if his hogs are sick without first making sure that you are not going to carry the disease to his hogs.
