FEW SHORTAGES IN 1952?

There is general optimism among top defense production officials as the result of President Truman's budget message to Congress. That message made it clear that a change in planning had been decided upon, which would eliminate the most severe civilian goods shortages expected to be encountered only a month or two ago.

The change in scheduling of defense production makes 1955, rather than 1953 the Quality Printing At The Wheeler Times

final year of the major rearmament, effort. Because the rearmament program is to be stretched over a longer period of time, it will ease the pinch in supplies of sheet steel and aluminum for civilian goods. The new defense program will probably mean that automobile production, per quarter, will not be cut below the predicted limit of 930,000 units -which was the limit recently predicted by the Defense Production Administration for the second quarter of this year.

In the first quarter, 1,006,000 units were allowed to be built. For a time, it had been feared that still further cuts were in the making for the third and fourth quarters of

the year. However, it now seems that the 930,000 unit quarter total will stand for the rest of the year. In addition, prospects are that, by January 1, 1953, the defense Production Administration will allow increases in automobile production once again. The present pinch in sheet steel and aluminum is said to be the worst likely to be experienced and is expected by agency officials, to end sometime this summer, rather than late in the year as had been expected earlier.

U. S.-KOREAN AIR LOSSES

Most people do not realize it but the U. S. Air Force has suffered heavier losses than enemy air forces in the Korean War. The latest summary report by the Far Eastern Air Force shows the Communists have lost 339 planes, while the U. S. Air Force has lost 418 planes. The summary estimates there have been another one hundred Red planes probably destroyed and some 387 damaged. No figures were released on damaged U.S.

It was noted by U. S. Air Force officials that "steadfastly intensified" anti-aircraft fire had accounted for the major proportion of Allied losses. This is because U. S. Air Forces are concentrating on strafing and disruption of enemy transport while enemy planes generally do not operate over U. N. supply lines in South Korea.

In the actual air-to-air fighting. U. S. jets have a distinct advantage in the kills recorded thus far, although the ratio of victory has declined in recent weeks. Of the Communist losses, 204 were jets, while U. S. jet losses have been only 170. It is easy if you remember the slogan: Right turn-hand up. Left turn-hand; out. Slow or stop-hand down. A hand signal could be the means of averting a death dealing acci-

Breeland stated that need for courtesy in driving is accentuated by the fact that the traffic death list for Texas in 1951 will show in excess of 2,500 persons when final figures are compiled.

"That's an unprecedented highway death rate for our state", he said. "Traffic safety education is a fine thing, but we must have the cooperation of motorists if needless slaughter is to be averted. More drivers must practice the preachments of traffic safety education. Applying hand signals lends that opportunity. We remind drivers that failure to give hand signals is a violation of law. By obeying the law you might save a life and that life could be your
