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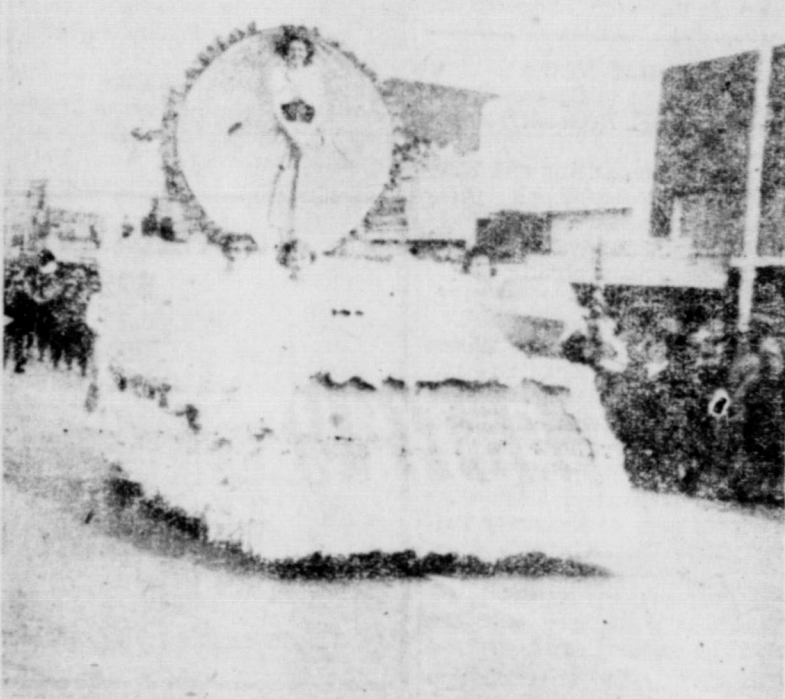
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## MRS. M. GOAD DIES WEDNESDAY IN CALIFORNIA

Word was received here Wednesday of the death of Mrs. M. J. Goad, mother of Andrew and Evert Goad of Wheeler and Mrs. Ardell George and Mrs. Ruby Zybach of Briscoe. Mrs. Goad passed away at the home of her daughter, Berza, in Los Angeles, Calif. Wednesday, March 19, 1952, at 2:45 a.m.

Martha Jane Coleman was born August 13, 1869 in Trimble County, Kentucky. She was 82 years, 7 months and 6 days old at the time of her death. She came to Erath County, Texas in 1881. On May 30, 1886 she was married to John Thomas Goad and to this union thirteen children were born.

She was preceded in death by her husband who died September 26, 1918, and four children.

Mrs. Goad came to Wheeler County in March 1920 and settled on a farm northwest of Wheeler. In 1938 she moved to Pampa. In 1941 to Panhandle and in 1946 she moved to Los Angeles, Calif. where she made her home until her death.

She has been a member of the Church of Christ since early womanhood.

Survivors include five sons, Andrew and Evert of Wheeler, Jim of Plainview, Emmitt of Riverside, Calif., and Oshel of Los Angeles, Calif.; four daughters, Ruby Zybach and Ardell George of Briscoe, Berza Goad of Los Angeles, Calif., and Hattie Miller of Bakersfield, Calif.; two brothers, Zack Coleman of Wheeler and Will Mahoney of West Fork, Ark.; and one sister, Mrs. Gertrude Parker of Olustee, Okla.; 28 grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren, 1 great-great grandchild and a host of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Wheeler Church of Christ but the exact date of the last rites had not been set at press time today. Short rites were to be held at Los Angeles at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon (Thursday) then the body will be shipped to Pampa where it will arrive at 6:45 p.m. Saturday and be met by a Kirk-Mason coach.

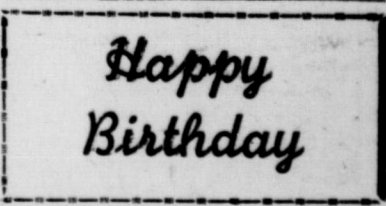

## Crump Points Out Important Dates For Local Citizens

Politics are beginning to catch on in Wheeler County the past few days and County Democratic Chairman A. B. Crump has called attention of the Times to a large number of dates which are important to voters and politicians alike.

A complete list of all the dates that should receive special attention by voters and candidates between now and the first democratic primary is reprinted herewith. The Times would like to call special attention of the voters to the dates of the precinct, county and state democratic conventions since attendance at these conventions by the voters is the only way they can share in the nomination of a democratic party candidate for the presidency of the United States.

The complete list of dates follows:

March 31, 1952—By April 1, Tax Collector shall deliver to Election Bd. certified list of voters.

May 3, 1952—Precinct Convention to elect delegates to County Convention of political party desiring to elect delegates to National Convention.

May 5, 1952—Request by candidates to have name placed on ballot shall be filed not later than the first Monday in May preceding primary.

May 6, 1952—County Convention to elect delegates to State Convention of political party desiring to elect delegates to National Convention.

May 27, 1952—Sworn statements shall and must be filed by candidates at intervals of 20 days beginning 60 days next preceding date of election.

May 27, 1952—State Convention to elect delegates to National Convention of political party desiring to elect delegates to National Convention.

June 5, 1952—Three days prior to State Executive meeting, State Chairman notifies all members of committee and State Candidates of place of meeting.

June 9, 1952—County Executive Committee determines hour and place of Precinct Conventions.

June 9, 1952—State Executive Committee selects place of meeting on third Monday after fourth Saturday in July.

June 9, 1952—State Executive Committee shall decide upon the hour and place of State Convention to be held on the first Tuesday after the third Monday after the fourth Saturday in August.

June 9, 1952—County Executive Committee shall decide the hour (Continued on last page)

## BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD AT MOBEETIE TUES.

The Moebetie Independent School District will hold a bond election on Tuesday, March 25, in the Moebetie Gymnasium, for the purpose of approving bonds in the amount of \$35,000.00. This bond money, if approved locally and then by the Attorney-General, is to be used to repair and improve generally the grade school and the high school buildings, and the gymnasium. Major improvements planned are the re-roofing of the high school, repairing of other roofs, the refinishing of the floors, walls, and ceilings in classrooms, and the improving of the lighting system, painting, etc.

The ballot includes three propositions. The first refers to the \$35,000 bond, the second to the \$1.50 tax on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property, and the third to assuming the bonded indebtedness of the district when other districts were united with the original Moebetie School District. The last two propositions actually have already passed in previous elections and are in effect, but they must be shown on the ballot since the boundaries of the district were re-defined by the Council Board in 1949 after consolidations under the Gilmer-Aikens Law. No increase in taxes is being voted, since present taxes will take care of the proposed new bond issue.

Remember "Better Schools Make Better Communities". A vote for the bonds is a vote for our children.

Plans are being made by the First Baptist Church to partition the auditorium section of the original building to provide adequate Sunday School space. Rev. M. B. Smith, pastor, announced this week.

A plan of arrangement approved by the church several months ago will be followed and the work will be done by the men of the church as they donate their time.

The plan calls for 10 class rooms, some steps out of the basement on the north end of the building and an exit directly from the basement to the outside.

### Editorial

#### THE NEXT DEPRESSION

The next depression, or recession, will probably not be as severe as the one suffered in 1929-33. So many Government programs, designed to prevent such a calamity, have been inaugurated, that another severe depression, such as the one twenty years ago, is unlikely.

Many financial experts expect a recession when tremendous defense expenditures are reduced. They point out such a development would be only natural and that it might be a readjustment many people would welcome. However for these reasons, that recession will not reach the panic stage of the last great depression: First, the nation's banking system is much sounder and banks

will not fail as they did in the early 1930s. There is also federal insurance for deposits up to \$10,000.

Second, the Government supports farm prices, which will prevent a disastrous spiral on farm products. Third, there is unemployment insurance today, when millions of workers could take advantage of in the event of a depression. This unemployment compensation would mean money in circulation, which was not being spent in the last depression. Fourth credit terms will be eased much faster than in the last depression, stimulating buying.

Fifth, the nation is not likely to abandon its entire rearmament program, and spending for defense purposes will help to stimulate business and profits. Another brake on a tremendous depression is the fact that taxes are higher today, and can be lowered greatly to bring more money into circulation.

Still another factor is the increased numbers of Americans now receiving old age pensions and security benefits, which also mean a regular supply of money going into circulation.

Therefore, those who expect a disastrous drop, or crash, may be expecting something which will not come for many, many years. A recession, it is true, will probably occur after the big defense spending spree, but a major depression is not yet in sight.

#### TEEN-AGE TRAFFIC COURT

The City of Baltimore has set up a traffic court exclusively for teen-agers. Behind the magistrate's bench is a velvet drape, on the walls are gruesome pictures of violent death and of tragic accidents, and in conspicuous display are state and national flags. An amplifying system makes it possible for everyone to hear clearly what is said.

This experimental and unusual court is explained by Chief Magistrate Stanley Scheer by the statement that "a sloppy court makes for sloppy justice." And the court is unusual in that it convenes every Saturday morning with a movie.

Those guilty of minor offenses are unusually placed on probation for the first offense. While on probation they are required to report to the court at night to hear traffic lectures and to see movies, which are designed to show the consequences of illegal driving. Habitual offenders and those who commit more serious offenses are sentenced to jail. The Chief Magistrate does not believe in fines that are usually paid by the parents.

Since teen-agers are responsible for an unusually large percentage of the traffic accidents in the nation, many law enforcement and legislative officials will watch with a great deal of interest this Baltimore court for teen-agers. What success it has in cutting the number of traffic violations and traffic accidents may determine whether other cities will follow the Baltimore lead of setting up a special court for teen-age traffic violators.

For the most delicious noodles to serve with your most delicious stews, toss them after cooking, of course, with melted vitaminized margarine and chopped fresh parsley.

A meat loaf looks like company when you shape it in an oval and score like a half of ham. When baked, stud it with sliced, stuffed olives.

Bathroom and kitchen tiles will sparkle and stay bright a long time if cleaned thoroughly with glass wax. Silver candlesticks will resist oxidation longer if you give them a good coating of colorless furniture wax. Buff to a high lustre.

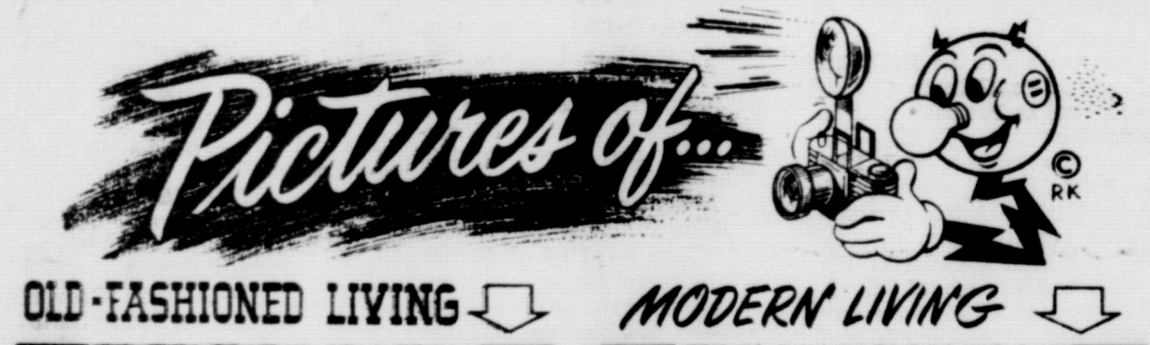

Finsterwald was accompanied to the meeting by Fred Waters, one of the directors of the local association.

R. H. Forrester, secretary of the Wheeler County N. F. L. A. reports that the local association had a fairly good year last year as will be shown by the dividends which will be passed out at the annual stockholders' meeting which is to be held at the Rogue Theatre here, Tuesday, April 1.

**Federal Land Bank To Ask Changes In State, Fed. Laws**

At the annual stockholders' meeting of the Federal Land Bank held in Houston on February 20 and 21, the stockholders went on record to ask for changes in federal and state laws affecting various phases of its operation.

Resolutions were unanimously adopted giving support to legislation providing for a twelve-man, part-time Farm Credit board to be appointed for staggering 6-year terms of office for the purpose of supervising and regulating the Farm Credit System, with one member to be selected from each of the twelve land bank districts in the United States. The effect of such a change would be to replace the present supervising authority who is an appointee of the President of the United States.

The stockholders also unanimously agreed to support legislation that would provide for a separate board of directors of each Federal land bank. Such board would consist of five men, all to be elected by the locally owned and operated national farm loan association who, in turn, own all of the capital stock of the respective Federal land banks.

The present members of the district Farm Credit board, consisting of seven members, serve as a board for the four Farm Credit institutions, Federal Land Bank, Houston Bank for Cooperatives, Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, and the Production Credit Corporation. At present the stockholders of the Federal Land Bank, Production Credit Association, and the Bank for Cooperatives each elect one member with one other being appointed by the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration.

They will also press for state legislation that will place a limitation upon the period of time for which minerals and the surface of the soil can be separated. It will be proposed that the sale of minerals be limited for a period not to exceed 20 years unless production of minerals is being obtained.

Judge J. A. Elkins, prominent Houston attorney and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the City National Bank of Houston, addressed the group on "What

Does the Future Hold for Farmers?" Judge Elkins pointed out that the agricultural prosperity of the United States is unusually bright for the immediate future, but cautioned that the great need to insure prolonged prosperity would rest largely upon the people of this nation demanding economy, efficiency, and sanity in government. He stated that the indifference of the people is largely responsible for the economic ills of our country, and asked for a more active interest in all public

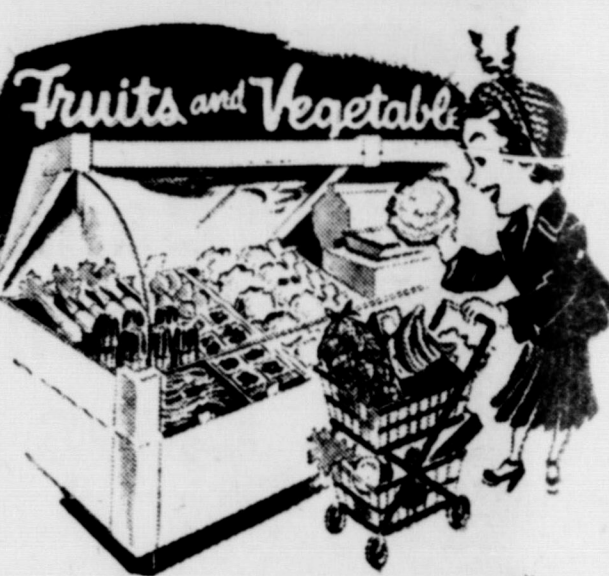

The late New York columnist, E. J. Rinaldi, once claimed "the biggest rubes in the world are found along Broadway." Today he would include Washington bureau.

The Defense Production Administration is studying direct action positions with Broadway "rubes". It is not presumed that anyone in DPA will ever be found to have received such treatment or with such because of the action. But the very language of the DPA report on the subject shows that biggest "rubes" in the world are bureaucrats.

DPA Bulletin No. 270 reports five big newspaper firms have received certificates for rapid construction of building costs for new production facilities.

But in the next sentence, the report says nothing will happen at the near future, because as practices are planned at this time for construction of new newspaper plants, DPA sees a large quantity of scarce newspaper to announce nothing will be done.

The film pays high tribute and credits much of the success for the democratization of the militaristic nation, to Gen. Douglas MacArthur's open door policy to Christian activity. The customs of the people of India, Formosa and Japan are depicted. Humor, tragedy and drama are throughout the film as will be shown in the life among the ten million people concentrated on Formosa in an area less than half the surface of Lake Michigan. Mr. Dick Hicks, 39 year old missionary to China and former prisoner of the Reds, served as commentator. There is no admission charge and everyone is invited to attend.

(Continued from Page One) and place of County Convention on the first Saturday after Primary Election.

June 9, 1952—On the second Monday in June preceding each general primary, State executive committee meets and directs chairman to certify names of state candidates.

June 16, 1952—Sworn statement shall and must be filed by candidates at intervals of 20 days beginning 60 days next preceding the date of election.

June 16, 1952—On the third Monday in June preceding each general primary, County Executive Committee meets to apportion cost of primaries among candidates.

June 16, 1952—On the third Monday in June preceding each general primary, the County Executive Committee shall meet and determine by lot the order of candidates' names on ballot.

June 21, 1952—County Tax Collector shall deliver to County Chairman at least 5 days before election day certified and supplemental list of voters.

June 21, 1952—Candidates to pay assessments to County Chairman on or before the Saturday before the fourth Monday in June.

June 23, 1952—On the 4th Monday in June, the Primary Committee meets to make up ballot.

June 25, 1952—Former non-residents or minors who shall have since become eligible to vote by reason of length of residence or age, shall not later than 30 days before election obtain exemption from Tax Collector.

July 6, 1952—Sworn statement shall and must be filed by candidates at intervals of 20 days beginning 60 days next preceding the date of election.

July 6, 1952—Absentee voting for primary-at any time not more than 20 days nor less than 3 days prior to election.

July 16, 1952—County Chairman shall, at least ten days prior to precinct convention, post notice of hour and place of precinct conventions.

July 16, 1952—County Executive Committee meets to receive certificates showing names of state and district candidates.

July 21, 1952—Sworn statement shall be filed by candidates not more than 3 nor less than 2 days prior to date of election.

July 21, 1952—Tax Collector shall furnish to Election Board 4 days prior to primary, supplemental certified list of voters.

July 21, 1952—If a voter moves his residence to a new voting precinct within city of 10,000 or more, he must apply to Tax Collector not less than 4 days before election to qualify to vote.

July 22, 1952—Absentee voting for primary-at any time not more than 20 days, nor less than 3 days prior to election.

July 23, 1952—Former non-residents or minors who shall have since become eligible to vote by reason of length of residence or age, shall not later than 30 days before election obtain exemption from Tax Collector.

July 23, 1952—Notice of hour and place of County Convention to be held the first Saturday after primary election shall be posted by the County Chairman on the bulletin board of the County Courthouse and copy filed with County Clerk.

July 26, 1952—Date of Precinct Convention.

July 26, 1952—Date of first primary election.

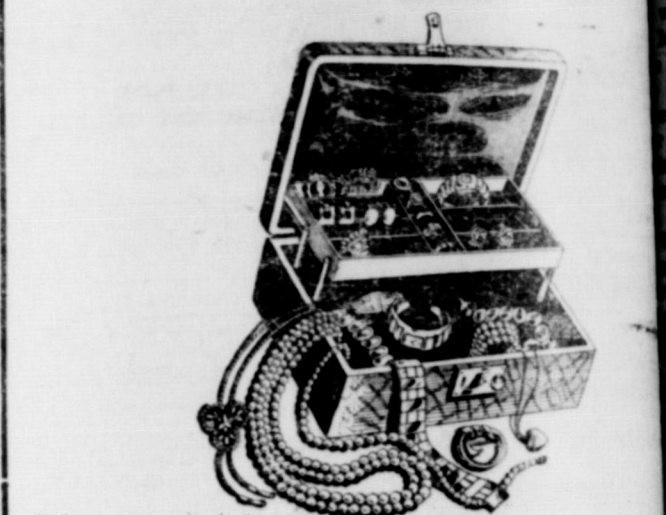
There will be a speaker to describe in detail the advantage and possibilities of building the quonset way. All farmers and business men are especially invited to attend followed it with the pledge.
