all lands understand the things said and written in foreign countries, it would be easier to reach harmonious agreements between nations.

The book of Genesis in the Bible gives a most interesting tradition regarding these differences in language. It tells how in the early days of the race, the people of the earth spoke one language. Also that they planned to build a great tower whose top should reach to heaven, but that the Lord saw their ambitious undertaking and He felt that it had to be stopped. He was said to have confounded their language and produced a confusion of tongues, so that the people could not understand the things they heard said.

Whatever one may think of this old tradition, the differences in language and present confusion of tongues are a great obstacle in the way of human progress.

A UNIVERSAL LANGUAGE

Will it ever become possible to adopt a universal language which shall be learned and spoken in all countries? To accomplish such a plan it would probably be necessary to have one language taught in schools in all leading countries. It would not be necessary for any country to give up its own language and literature.

It would become necessary or desirable for an important part of the people of each country to learn the universal language. It is a noble idea, and the present effort to unite all nations in a harmonious cooperation to prevent war would be greatly aided if such a universal language existed which was generally spoken in all countries.

Maytag Company Sets Washer Production Record



When the 54-year-old Maytag Company of Newton, Iowa, produced its five millionth washer recently, the occasion was marked by a special ceremony. Iowa Governor Robert D. Blue and leaders in business, industrial, labor and civic organizations gathered to celebrate the event which set a new record in washer production history.

Tom Smith, head of the research division, which developed the modern Maytag, is shown upper left, autographing the one-piece aluminum tub which has had a large share in building Maytag popularity. Assembly workers are shown below lowering the tub into its enameled steel jacket. At right, Miss Rosanne Morgan, 1947 Maytag Queen, is christening the machine with a bottle of milk. Looking on, nearest the camera from left, are: W. I. Sparks, secretary of the Maytag Company who has been with the firm forty-nine years; Letha Trent, Miss Morgan's predecessor as Maytag Queen; Roy Bradt, Maytag vice-president in charge of sales and advertising and president of The American Washer and Ironer Association; Verne R. Martin, Maytag sales manager; Fred Maytag II, Iowa State Senator and third generation president of the washer company, and Iowa Governor Blue.

The Maytag Company made its first washer in 1907 and its millionth machine in 1927. Between the four millionth production in 1941 and the five millionth machine, Maytag took three years time out from peacetime production to engage in war work. The five millionth washer is being retained by Maytag as a souvenir.

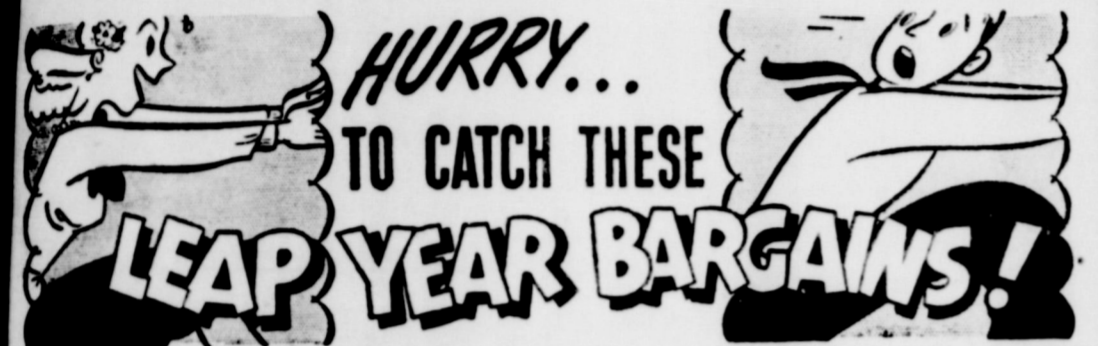

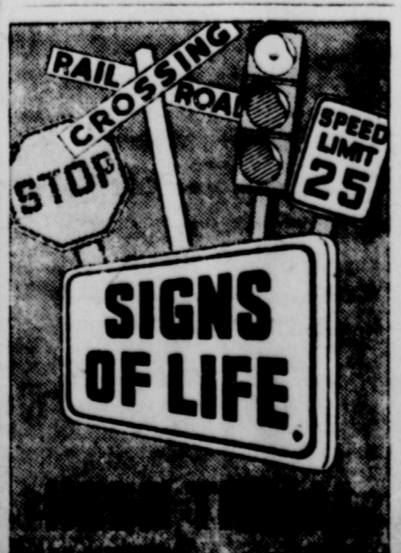

peaks each of the two laws providing education and training for veterans. By the end of the month, 2,546,000 veterans were in training under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill), and 254,000 under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) for disabled veterans.

New high levels were reached during November in all of the major training classifications under both laws with the exception of job training under the GI Bill. This type of training declined for the tenth consecutive month.

Most of the GI Bill trainees were studying in schools, with 1,150,000 enrolled in colleges and universities and 6,515,000 taking work in other schools below the collegiate level. Institutional on-farm training attracted 199,000 while 345,500 were training on-the-job.

Among the disabled veterans, approximately 86,000 were studying in colleges and universities. Another 35,500 were enrolled for study in other schools. Farm trainees totaled 23,500 and on-the-job trainees, 109,000.

More than \$6 million had been loaned to veterans under terms of the GI Bill for homes, farms and businesses, according to a Veterans Administration report for the end of October.

The average World War II veteran served in the armed forces for about two and one-half years, the Veterans Administration has estimated.

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q—Will my failure to report for a physical examination ordered by VA, affect my payments of compensation?

A—Yes. Upon failure to report for examination, without adequate reason, an award of disability compensation is suspended. Where the veteran subsequently reports for physical examination, retroactive payments over the intervening period may be precluded unless the evidence clearly establishes that the disability, in fact, existed to a compensable degree during such period.

Q—Is the amount of my disability compensation in any way affected by the amount of money I earn to receive from other sources?

A—No.

Q—Is the stepchild of a veteran entitled to the same benefits as a natural child?

A—Yes, if the stepchild is or was a member of the veteran's household.

Q—If I have entitlement time left after I finish my job-training course, may I enroll in another job-training course or go to school for the remainder of my entitlement?

A—With prior approval from Veterans Administration, you may use any remaining entitlement either for job-training or for educational training.

The number of World War II veterans in all types of training under federal programs administered by the Veterans Administration reached a new peak of 2,800,000 on November 30, 1947.

The current enrollment is more than four per cent higher than the previous peak of 2,674,000 established on April 30, 1947.

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. How often should dairy cows be watered in winter?
A. Cows should be watered at least three times a day, winter and summer. If possible, water should be available at all times with water cups at each stallion. It is possible to increase milk production of a herd by 10 to 15 per cent by seeing that cows get sufficient water. Failure of cows to drink enough during severe cold weather may result in constipation and a sharp drop in milk flow.

Q. What is the moisture absorbing capacity of some of the more commonly used poultry litters?
A. Ordinary peat moss, 5 to 7 times its weight; fine cut straw, 1 to 4 times its weight; peanut hulls, 2 to 3 times its weight; ground sugar cane, 3 1/2 times its weight; shavings, 1 to 2 times its weight; gas hulls, 2 times its weight; ground corn cobs, 1 1/2 times its weight; sand, 1/2 times its weight.

Q. In breeding rabbits, how often should the buck be used for mating?
A. The Research Rabbitry of the Ralston Purina Company which specializes in New Zealand White rabbits (medium type) recommends the following: Bucks from 6 to 9 months of age are limited in service to mating 2 does a month. After 9 months, the bucks are treated the same as adult bucks and mated to one doe a week. A strong vigorous mature buck may be used two or three times a week for brief periods, although a buck used too often may be ruined as a reliable breeder.

Q. Is it necessary to change a young kid's bedding frequently?
A. Yes, it may be advisable to change the bedding two or three times a day, because the young kid quickly wets and soils the bedding. Too much emphasis cannot be placed on this point and on the need for frequent disinfecting of the kid's housing.

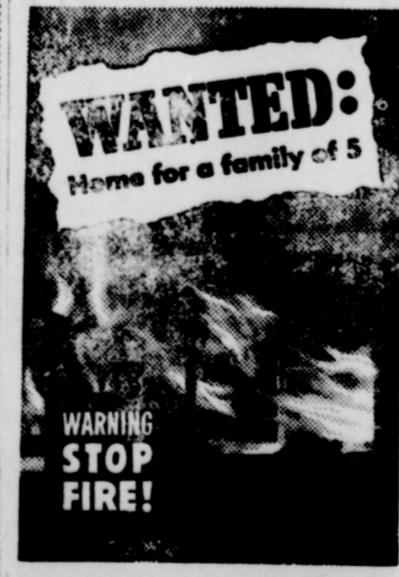
