Would like to write this note of explanation to the basketball fans who witnessed the last game of the girl's county tournament at Shamrock.

Coach and player is primarily interested in winning; playing to the "fan" is secondary. The accent is on winning fairly and according to rules. Schools are of the league every year who employ unfair tactics to allow their fans and coaches to use abusive language to their opponents. ESPRIT DE CORPS, school loyalty, to win fairly should be paramount. Keep in mind comparison is between "playing to win" and "playing for the spectator. Fundamentally, the development of the character, love of the game, and the spirit of team are the major objectives.

Although players and spectators prefer offensive basketball, coaches believe offense is the "be-all" and "end-all" of the sport. If basketball consisted merely of offensive play, it would soon degenerate into a shooting contest and would cease to be important.

When a team uses a zone defense, or in other words, when their guards from under the goal to challenge the team for the ball, stalling tactics are frequently used. The guards to go after the ball or "play ball," who uses the zone defense and knows nothing else, some time or other to have stalling pulled on them. A coach who uses other defense when necessary, as in this instance, the team lounging under the ball, hurt if the opposing team does not try to force through them to the goal regardless of consequences. That they are playing ball and that the other team's motion is comical and absurd. The team who has the ball playing, if the opposing team wishes to gain possession, they are at liberty to do so.

The winning team of the county tournament did this and then were shocked, angry and insulting when tactics were employed. The guards never made any attempt to get the ball and their behavior became angry when we did not give it to them. They tried to get them to come out and play ball. As a result, there was a low score, loss of tempers and disgruntled fans. Why keep the score? Does it do not play to win—Why keep the score? Does it throw one down the center to a home run hitter who are on base? We are always glad to play a team that comes out and play. If they do not, what can they do?

Local county agents have blueprints and other plans that will help the future homeowner realize his dreams for a well constructed and attractive farm or ranch home.

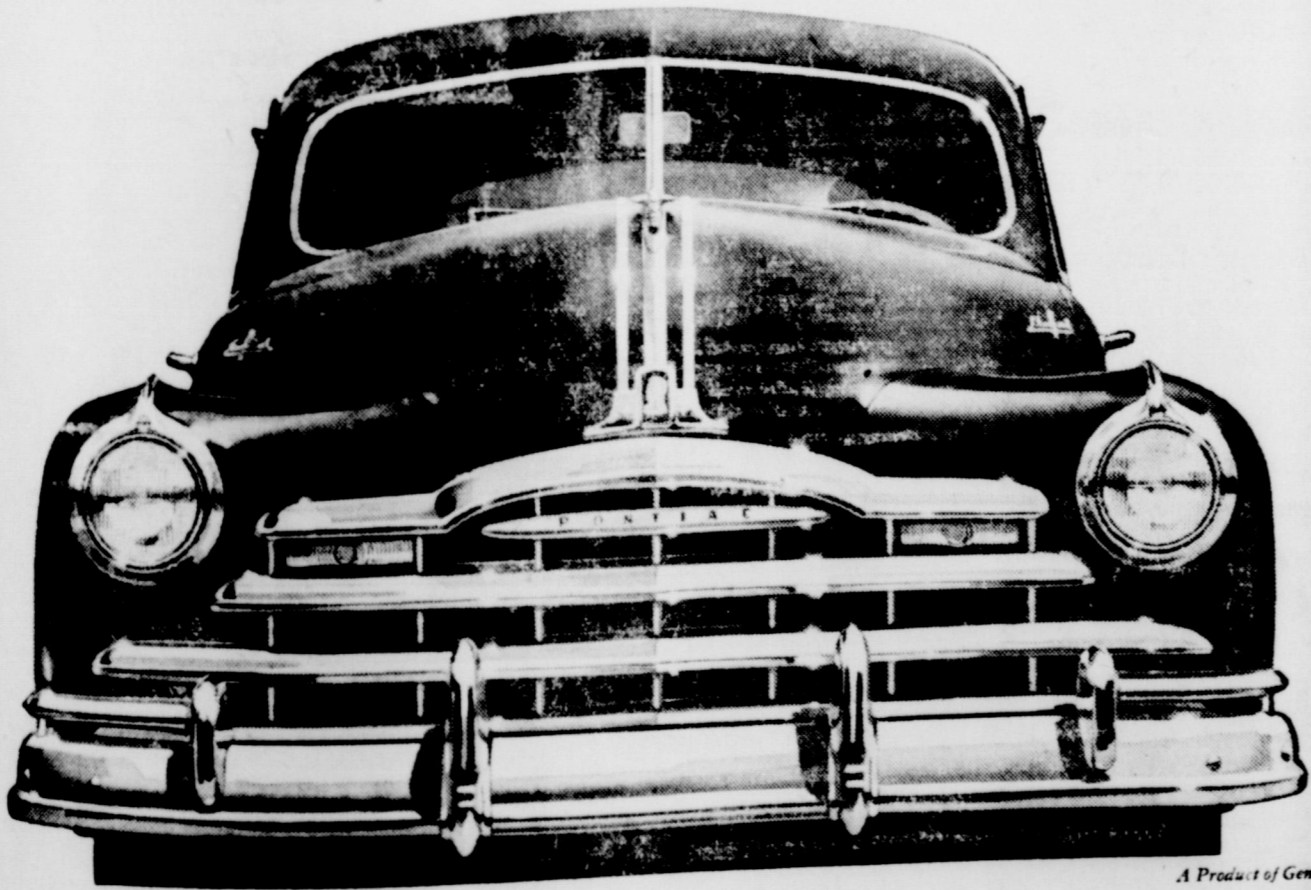
