Educational Tour And Meeting Scheduled

Two educational programs have been planned for the benefit of Wheeler County farmers according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

A tour and educational meeting has been scheduled for Thursday, April 15, to discuss ways farmers can meet the requirements of the Food Security Act that mandates erosion control on farmland.

The tour, which will leave from the parking lot of Maxey's Steakhouse at 4:30 p.m., will visit farms where the producers are employing various methods to prevent wind and water erosion. These methods include windstrips, overseeding wheat into cotton and residue management. Equipment used in these conservation tillage operations will also be on display.

The group will return to Maxey's for a Dutch treat meal at 6:30 p.m.

Following the meal, a panel of speakers will present information on various phases of conservation plan compliance. Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Agronomist, will discuss minimum tillage systems, residue management and weed control with minimum tillage. Personnel from the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will explain the standards that producers must meet to stay in compliance with their conservation plans.

Those planning to eat dinner with the group are requested to make reservations with the SCS office at 826-3565 by 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 13. This meeting, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, SCS and ASCS, will give two (2) CEU's to those producers who hold a private pesticide applicators licenses.

Wheat producers are invited to a wheat production meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the District Courtroom at 7:30 p.m. April 20. Dr. Bean will discuss wheat diseases, varieties, weed control and forage production. Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist, will cover the identification, economic threshold and control of wheat insects including greenbugs, Russian wheat aphid and cutworms.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and will also qualify private applicators for two (2) continuing education units (CEU's).

STORM WARNINGS

When threatening weather is in the area, the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department will have units surrounding Wheeler in an effort to detect severe weather (high winds, hail, heavy rain and tornado).

If tornadic conditions are detected the storm sirens will be sounded. When the sirens sound you should enter a storm shelter immediately (The County Courthouse will be open for persons without access to a cellar). The siren will sound for 105 seconds.

The WVFD will NOT give an "ALL CLEAR" SIGNAL. YOU are responsible for determining when the weather conditions are settled enough to leave your shelter.

The siren will only sound when dangerous conditions exist and for testing each Saturday at 12 noon.

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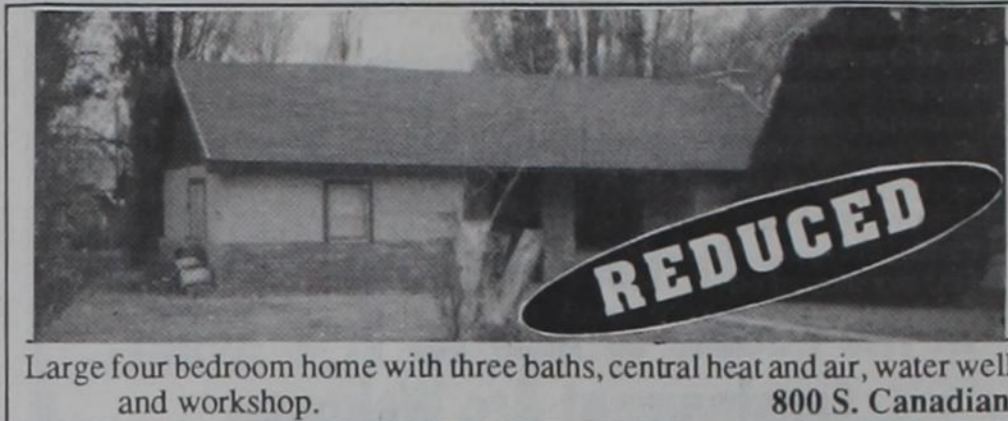

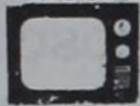
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Ain't It The Truth

"Systematic theology. An overview--a whole, total concept of the Bible. Too many are segmented--only know a narrow thought. The Bible must never be at the mercy of one verse. Do we know the cardinal principles, doctrines, and concepts? The Bible is concept--not abstract religious law."

"Social I.Q. Moderns promote intellectual I.Q. It is easier to built a straw man than destroy him. Bible study involves "the people quotient" which consists of grace, mercy, peace and forgiveness. This is why "Do's and Don'ts" fail! Use your heart as well as your head."

New black lines for the septic tank at the trailer will be put in with Chuck Hogan, Robert Hogan, Dale Corcoran and Larry Rajski doing the work.

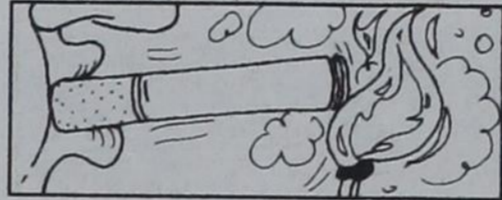

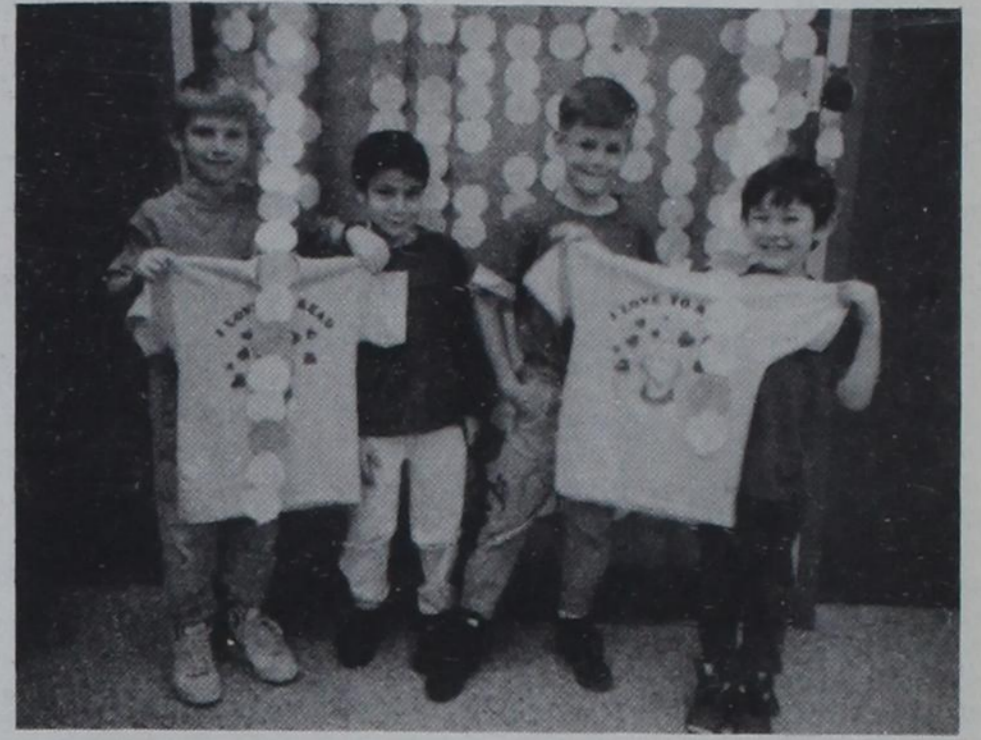

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8th Grade Girls Placed 2nd In Wheeler Relays

The Wheeler Junior High 8th grade girls placed 2nd in the annual Mustang Relays. The Colts tallied 115 points but trailed powerful Canadian who used superior depth to score 181 points. En route to the runner-up placing, the girls garnered two firsts, four seconds and four thirds.
