WHEELER ISD KINDERGARTEN VISITATION SCHEDULED

Any child five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1993, will be eligible to attend kindergarten this fall. If your child will be attending kindergarten this fall, you and your child are invited to attend the visitation in the Wheeler ISD South Kindergarten room. The south Kindergarten is the one which is across the hall from the cafeteria. The following schedule has been set.

Last names beginning: A B C D E F, Mon, April 26, 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Last names beginning: G H I J K L, Tue., April 27, 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Last names beginning: M N O P Q R S, Wed., April 28, 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Last names beginning: T U V W X Y Z, Thur., April 29, 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Friday, April 30, No Visitation; School Holiday.

Feel free to come on another day of the week of visitation if you cannot come on your child's day.

The State of Texas requires the following before your child can be enrolled this fall:

1. Birth Certificate—Certified copy, not hospital copy.
2. Immunization records verified by a valid clinic or Physician.

The Wheeler School requires your child's social security number for accounting and record keeping purposes. You must have these documents in order to enroll your child in the fall. Some of them take time to be processed, so it is a good idea to apply for them immediately.

On the day of visitation, please bring a copy of your child's immunization records to leave at the school. If you don't have a copy, stop in the Superintendent's office on your way.

The nurse needs these records to review before school starts. Leave your child's other records at home. Bring all records when you come to enroll your child in the fall.

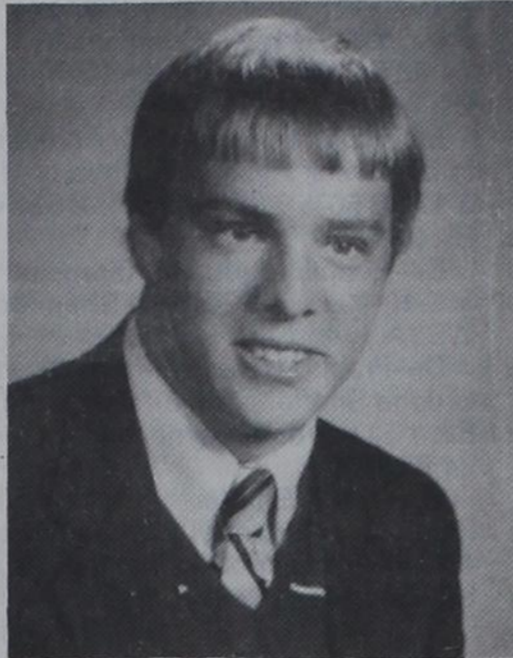

Greetings from Houston and hopefully by the time you read this I will either be at home or pulling in the drive way shortly. The plan is for me to be released Tuesday.

I have to remain close for a couple of more days. Since we are not familiar with Houston we chose to stay in the complex.

Surgery went well. It took 8 hours. I can not say what it was like for the others, but all I can remember is giving the doctors and nurses a hard time in the recovery room before they ran the family out and/or wheeled me out.

With the blink of an eye the family was asking how I was doing. I do not remember who was there. I remember the bright pink figure in the corner. That turned out to have been Leroy.

I have my crickets to keep me company at quiet times. At first I had a light numbness on the right side. It is weird to taste on only one side of the mouth. These problems are improving. The taste is coming back and I can tell I am breathing through the right nostril. The amount of recovery varies with each individual. As is the case 90% of the time with this type tumor, there was no malignancy. (The pain is practically nil after I got over the stiff neck. Much to my surprise and everyone else, the dizziness is minimal, of course I cannot jump right up and I do not bend over.)

One of the requirements to get out of here was to be able to walk down the hall. I was up walking the halls without assistance by Tuesday, April 13.

Barbara is always glad when I say I am ready to quit for now. I took the nurse for an early (3:30 A.M.) stroll Monday.

We have been gone a week. We left Monday afternoon and arrived in Houston in time for the 11:00 ear test appointment Tuesday. I gave Ronal Wayne permission to remain home and promised to call the "mother hen" at work and tell her it was fine. He flew in Tuesday evening and stayed until I was in intensive Care and all was well.

Leroy my twin brother-in-law and Lavila Meriwether left Hinton Tuesday after school arrived Wed. A.M., and stayed until I was alert enough to know they had been here.

FIRE IS ONLY A TOOL

The recent article published in the Wheeler Times on March 25, 1993 had a title when printed of "SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE PRESCRIBES FIRE FOR GRASS". The title should have been only PRESCRIBED FIRE. The title as printed sounds as though the SCS says fire is the only tool for managing grassland. This was not the case. Many producers are going to burn regardless. The article was intended to give best guidance available if burning is going to be done. The article, if read would have shown this.

Recent changes by the Texas Air Control Board has been made. If a producer wants to burn grass land, prior clearance from the Air Control Board must be obtained, in order to be legal. This clearance must be requested in writing and obtained before burning. More information on requesting this clearance can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service.

The SCS does not require burning on any of their programs. Fire is only a tool. New laws require that burning be done by the rules of the Texas Air Control Board. When someone says he has a controlled burn, it does not mean that it is a prescribed burn. The SCS can help producers stay legal and carry out the practice as safely as possible. We regret any misunderstandings of the title of the article as published.

From The Minister's Desk:

The state of Missouri is a state that is located in the mid-western plain of the United States, it's nickname is the "show me" state because its citizens have to be shown something before they believe it.

But Missourians are not the only people who have this attitude. There are some religious people who also have it. This "show me" attitude can clearly be seen by their belief that faith is not authentic if it is not created by some highly emotional experience. For this reason, these people claim to have had some experiences that are only rivaled by the six days of creation.

I would kindly suggest to these religious people that they should carefully study certain New Testament texts. These texts are the ones that record the response that Jesus made when the Pharisees asked Him to show them a sign from heaven. (Matthew 12:38-40; 16:1-4; Mark 8:11-13; Luke 11:29-32) According to these texts, Jesus refused, but why? Jesus could have easily performed some great miracle or wonder for them to see. Jesus wanted their faith in Him to be the results of what He taught not the results of what they saw or experienced.

To be authentic, faith must come—from hearing and hearing by the word of Christ. (Romans 10:17) It does not come from emotional experiences that people have. Please do not misunderstand! Authentic faith is not devoid of emotions, but these emotions are a outgrowth of this authentic faith. Per-

haps the best example of people who possessed such an authentic faith would be the two disciples who talked with Jesus on the road to Emmaus. These two disciples were greatly confused about the death and resurrection of Jesus. To correct this confusion, Jesus did not tell these disciples that they needed to have some emotional experience. Rather He said: "O foolish men and slow of heart to believe in all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary for the Christ to suffer these things and to enter into His glory?" (Luke 24:25-26) He then began "—with Moses and with all the prophets—", explaining "—the things concerning Himself in all the Scriptures." (Luke 24:27)

After this discussion, these disciples said: "Were not our hearts burning within us while He was speaking to us on the road, while He was explaining the Scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:32) These disciples had an emotional experience! Their hearts had burned within them! But this emotional experience had been an outgrowth of what they had learned from the Scriptures.

It is wrong for people to have a "show me" attitude and build their faith upon the emotional experiences that they have. Rather people should expositionally study the Bible, allowing their emotional experiences to be the results of an authentic faith.

I would like to welcome a new resident to our home. Her name is Evelyn Garrison. Evelyn is from Pampa

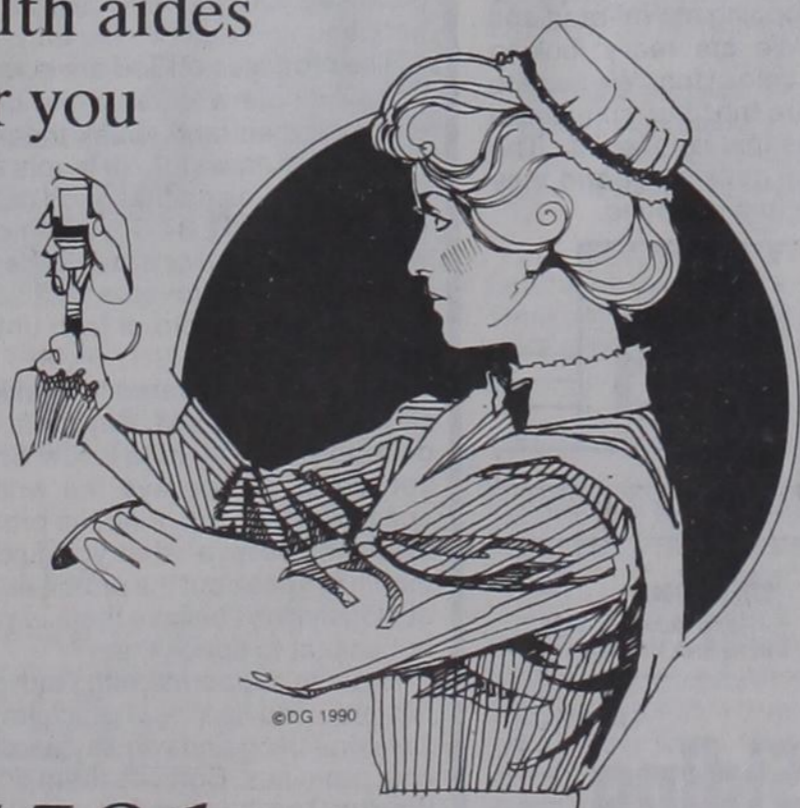

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YOUR MIRACLE IS NOT FAR OFF

Some time in your life, you will need a miracle. Some of you reading this probably need a miracle now. Perhaps you have a mountain of a problem in your family or in your finances. Maybe, you are sick with a deadly disease. I have good news for you.

You can have a miracle from God. God is a miracle worker. The days of miracles are not over. There is not a particular time that is the "day of miracles". 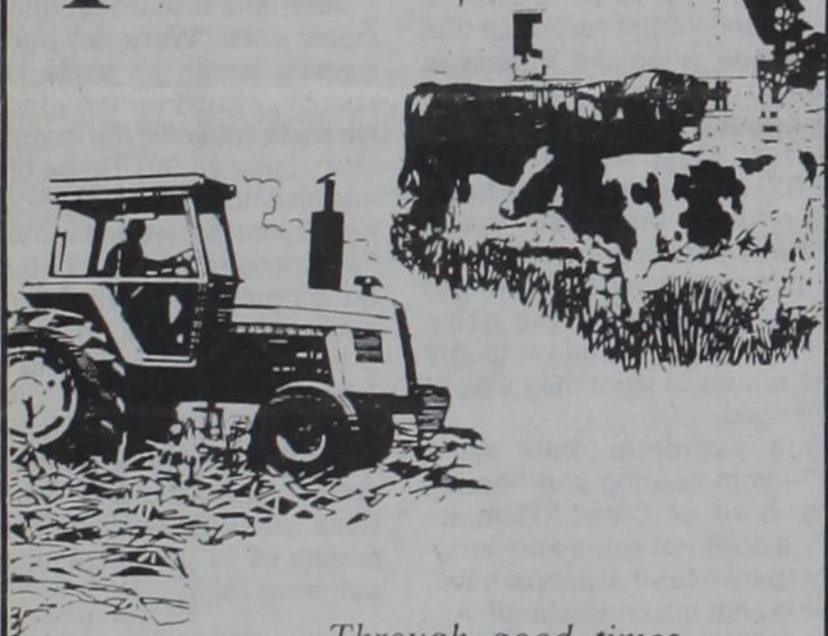

(See Matthew 12:34-37) Solomon taught us that the words of our mouths will bring forth life or death depending on what words we choose to keep speaking. (See Proverbs 18:20-21) Paul taught us that we use the mouth to confess the Word of faith unto salvation and healing. (See Romans 10:8-10)

Have you ever dared to speak out loud the promises of God's Word? Say them to yourself. Say them to the devil. Say them to your mountain of trouble. Say them to fellow Christians or friends who believe them as you do. If you believe the written promises in the Bible, be bold in speaking them out. It will work for you if you do. There is a miracle in your mouth.

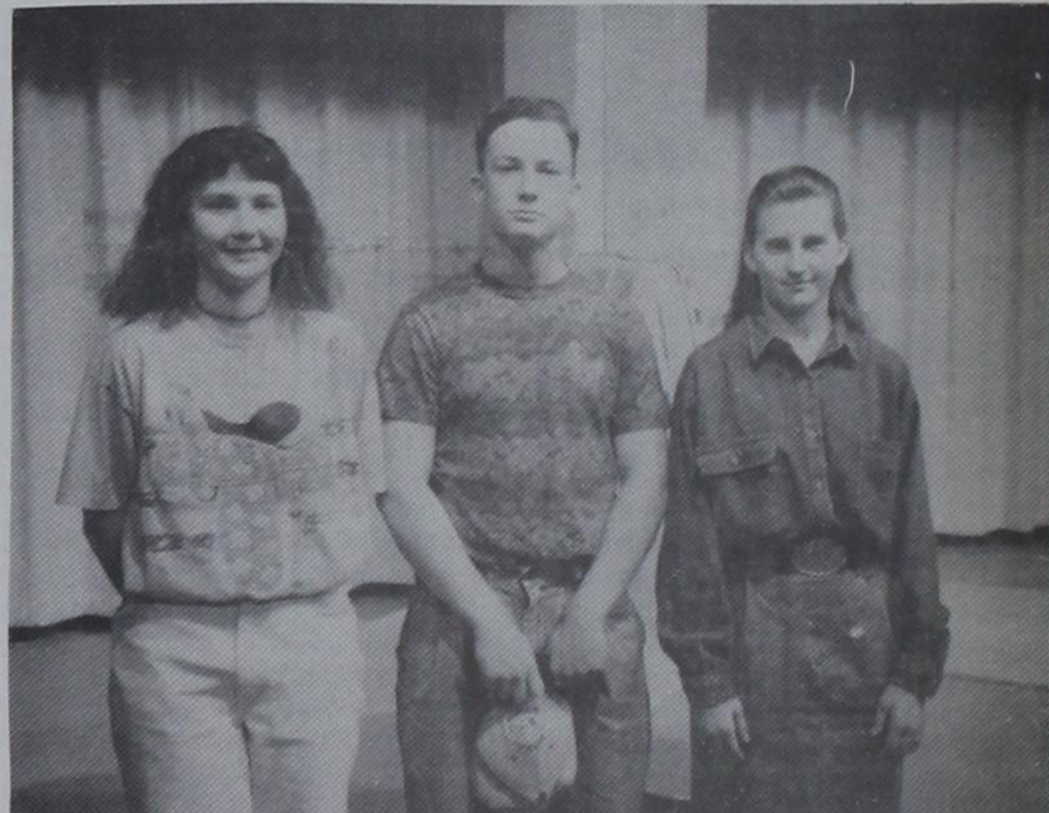

Sheriff Jimmy Adams

In a small Texas panhandle town, housed in a two-story red brick building is an office decorated with relics from home—among them—pictures of children, plaques and framed certificates of accomplishments, an old leather gun holster, and a dirty worn straw cowboy hat. Behind a large wooden desk sits a big tall man with sparkling pale blue eyes, silvery hair laden with youthful strands of brown and a broad friendly smile. He listens for the phone to ring, to open to sound, or the front door to creak. He's ready to serve the public—which is his duty. His title, Sheriff of Wheeler County; his name, Jimmy Adams.

Elected by voters, the job duties are not only many, but demanding, as well. As sheriff, Mr. Adams has to be ready to settle domestic and civil disputes, arrest lawbreakers (sometimes his own friends), make drug prevention visits to schools, as well as many other things.

As a young boy of "nine or ten" Mr. Adams became enamored with law enforcement. He became fascinated with the "red siren and flashing lights" of the sheriff's car driven by an uncle, who was a sheriff at that time. The shiny handcuffs and the guns were also a determining factor for a, soon chosen, career in law enforcement.

Mr. Adams describes himself as a "people person", that may be the reason he has devoted twenty-two years to serving the public. He began his career in 1966 in the military. After 3 years, he joined the Amarillo Police Force, where he remained for 9 years. After that, he worked 3 years on "pri-

vathe past 4 1/2 years" at Sears. Fortunately for Wheeler County, Texas, he has served as a sheriff for Wheeler County, Texas.

Even though there are no requirements for becoming a sheriff, it is important that a candidate be well liked among the majority of the voting communities. He needs to be knowledgeable, patient, and capable of doing the job. Mr. Adams had demonstrated this knowledge, patience and capability in some of the major experiences he has encountered during his career.

Some of these experiences are: being ambushed by a black man in Amarillo; capturing an armed bank robber; also, capturing three armed robbers after chasing them eighty-four miles and having a shoot-out with no injuries; talking people out of suicide (one victim being armed, and he (Adams) was not. One of the most rewarding experiences was that of saving a young boy's life. The boy had been attacked in the throat by a dog. Mr. Adams had rushed him to a hospital without delay, breaking a few rules in doing so. In response to these experiences Mr. Adams says, "Catching a bank robber is the end of a bad thing" saving somebody's life is the most rewarding." Still, the worst experience is "having to bury a fellow officer." Mr. Adams lost a fellow rookie when he worked for the Amarillo Police Department. This, by far, could be the most difficult experience to encounter.

Where-as-much as there are no requirements for "running" for sheriff, there are several steps a law enforcement officer must complete. Among them are: complete high school; have no felony background; complete 730 academy hours; and pass a psychological/emotional profile test. After the requirements are met, the officer is ready to be assigned to duty.

As for crime in Wheeler County, according to Mr. Adams, we "have the same percentage of crimes that they have in large metropolitan areas per capita."

Among the main crimes for both adults and teenagers are "check writing and DWI (Driving While Intoxicated)." These crimes are handled "expediently and fairly with as little added cost to the tax payer as possible." Restitution for the checks is expected with a fine that could be as small as one dollar. DWI is handled through the county court with a jail sentence, suspended probation, and a fine.

As earlier stated, Mr. Adams makes appearances at public schools in quest

for drug prevention. As a non smoker and nondrinker, Mr. Adams makes this promise to young students: "If you ever catch me, Jimmy Adams, drinking a beer, I'll give you my badge." With this conviction in his heart, Jimmy Adams is the kind of man to keep a promise of this velocity.

A sheriff must have a li-z away from the office. Mr. Adams leaves his problems of the day at the office (or sometimes, depending on the stress level, at the front door of his home. He spends time with his wife and sometimes his grown children. You can even catch a glimpse of him at local ball games, at an occasional street dance, or driving down the street in a county sheriff's car with the "silence and red flashing lights."

Mr. Adams enjoys working with and for the people of Wheeler County. He has dedicated his life to this service. There is a great demand for good law enforcement officers like Mr. Adams; and he has this to say to young people wishing to enter the field: "If you want to do it—go for it!"

driving skills.

Amount of alcohol needed to produce impairment and legal intoxication.

Alcoholic content of various drinks. Time required to oxidize alcohol. Ineffectiveness of popular methods for "sobering up".

Penalties for drinking and driving offenses.

Nature and effectiveness of chemical tests, and laws relating to their use.

Some parents who sponsor drinking parties for young persons are unaware of their moral and legal responsibilities for the health and safety of their minor guests. Typical excuses parents have offered for serving alcoholic beverages to minors include:

"I'd rather have the kids drink here—it's safer."

"It's my kid's turn to have a party and all her friends have had a Keg at their parties—it's expected."

"We won't serve hard liquor, just beer."

"All the parents allow it. We don't want our kids to feel different."

"If my kid doesn't drink at home, he'll go somewhere else and do it."

"I'd rather know what's going on."

"High school kids are under a lot of pressure these days. Beer is part of their culture. I want our son to think of us as friends."

These topics could be assigned to students for research, with the findings reported to the class prior to the celebration.

Project Celebration involves establishing a new "tradition" in many communities. Students and adults can learn that it is possible to have a good time at a party without drinking or using drugs. In many Texas communities, the chemical-free party idea has transcended graduation night, and now includes proms, end-of-sport-season parties, and other special activities. John McKay, Director of Texans' War on Drugs, best summarized what is happening in Texas when he said, "The trend is moving away from the tradition of drinking being acceptable. Students who choose not to use (drugs or alcohol) receive support for that decision throughout the year."

In the field events, Mark claimed a first place finish in the long jump, with a leap of 21'-9", and a 2nd finish in the triple jump with a jump of 42'-2".

Todd Baize leaped his way to a second place finish in the high jump, with a jump of 6'.

Joe Dan Ledbetter had a personal best of 140'-1" in the discus to claim the bronze medal. Joe Dan also placed 5th in the high jump, with a jump of 5'-10".

The 400 m and 1600 m relays, ran yearly bests for 2nd place finishes.

Todd Baize ran a 2:10 in the 800 m dash for a second place finish.

Phillip Wiggins ran a 2:18 to place 6th in the 800 m dash, and placed 6th in the 1600 m run with a time of 5:38.

Jarrold Ledbetter ran a 16.8 in the 110 HH to place 5th.

Chad Dunnam ran a 41.5 in the 300 IH to claim 3rd place.

J.A. Taylor ran a 49.8 to place 6th in the 300 IH, J.V. division.

Casey Riemer ran a 12:35 to place 5th in the J.V. 3200 m run.

J.A. also placed 2nd in the J.V. pole vault competition with a vault of 9'.
