



Extension Update

#### Dietary Calcium As It Relates To Hypertension

Joan Gray, CEA-HE

Newer research has shown dietary calcium to have a role in the development or treatment of essential hypertenison. Research demonstrated that Calcium's role is a more active one in the regulation of blood pressure than is that of sodium or potassium. It is postulated that too low amounts of dietary calcium predisposes one to high blood pressure. In animal research, when calcium supplements were given, there was a decrease in blood pressure.

Research with humans also has shown an association between low dietary intakes and hypertension. Study of populations (epidemiological evidence) showed a link between low calcium intake and hypertension. Another study indicated that calcium intake is lower in hypertensive than in normal patients. One study revealed that 49 hypertensive subjects had significantly lower dietary calcium intake of 496 mg. daily than 53 normotensive subjects who had 914 mg. daily.



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

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

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#### USDA To Help Provide Housing for the Homeless

Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a chance to become home owner's under a plan being adopted by the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA), Johnny W. Earp, IV, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to home that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 10 months. Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including housing authorities and nonprofit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, Mr. Earp said. In addition, homes which were recently, acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies of nonprofit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the lease. Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Mr. Earp said that many homeless people work and have incomes, and have the potential to become homeowners.

"By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the-cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Mr. Earp said. FmHA officials in Texas are seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to



inadequately housed families.

TROUBLE WITH TRIMS Sequins are commonly used as decorative trim on ladies' garments such as jackets, skirts, blouses and

Multicolored sequins can be applied in different patterns, making the garments more attractive and eyecatching but they can lose color.

Usually, a surface coating or pigment is used on sequins to make them colorful. The method and coloring matter used on sequins will determine how well they withstand dry cleaning or washing. The color loss in sequins may become apparent after the first cleaning, or they may get progressively worse with subsequent

Sequins are not the only trim causing problems. Buttons and plastic stones resembling gemstones can become damaged when cleaned. Buttons can dissolve in dry cleaning solvent and stain adjacent areas of a garment or other garments in the load. A fabric covered button with a metallic coated ring around the edge is especially susceptible to damage. The coating underneath the fabric is softened in dry cleaning solvent and creates a stain on the surrounding fabric. If this button is noticed on a garment, try to remove it prior to dry cleaning. However, if damage does occur when the garment is cleaned according to the care label, the manufacturer is re-

Colored and clear plastic stones that resemble gemstones and become damaged in two ways. The problem starts with the silver consider mirror coating on the underside of the trim. Tests show a component of the backing is softened and removed with dry cleaning solvent. This initially results in a loss of the trim's reflective properties. The softening of the backing then contributes to further damage to the stones. The plastic becomes susceptible to cracking and shattering once the backing softens. The damage is due to a poor formulation of the materials used to construct the trim. Any ruined garments should be returned to the retailer or manufacturer for a reimbursement or excharge






