Pearl Bradshaw Jones, 78, died Monday, July 5, 1993.

Services will be today at 10:30 a.m. in Wheeler Church of Christ with Bill Morrison, minister, officiating. Burial will be in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

Mrs. Jones, born in Dodson, Okla., lived in Wheeler County most of her life. She married Owen Jones in 1932 at Cheyenne, Okla. He died in 1984. She worked for the Wheeler Locker and Grocery, City Drugstore and Ware Chevrolet. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include a son, Larry "Buck" Jones of Wheeler, a daughter, Sondra Wright of Lamar, Colo., a sister, Ruby Pendleton of Wheeler; four granddaughters; and five great-grandchildren.

County Jail two times during the past week. According to deputy Rick Walden, the man was originally arrested Tuesday, June 29 in connection with the armed robbery of Cantrell's gas station in Shamrock.

The prisoner first escaped Wednesday, June 30, by climbing the 12 foot wall in the out door exercise area and crawling through the razor-sharp metal coils that surround it. He was then caught hitchhiking through Wheeler by off-duty deputy Joel Finsterwald and taken back to the Wheeler County Jail.

He then came down through the ceiling and exited the building. He was stopped east of town in a stolen pickup later that day by a Highway Patrolman.

While the stolen pickup was being searched, Graham reportedly climbed over the seat of the trooper's car and escaped, heading toward Oklahoma. This resulted in a seven mile chase which finally ended when Graham wrecked the car he had been driving.

Graham is now being held at Rogers County Jail in Rogers County Oklahoma.

Griffin Returns from Tour of Africa

Not many people, at the age of 19, can say that they have made a significant impact on someone's life, much less someone in an entirely different country. Brandon Griffin, a former Wheeler Christian Academy Graduate, recently spent six months in Africa as volunteer teacher, teaching many unfortunate people the basic educational skills which they had long been denied.

Brandon began his long journey in Zambia and ended his trek, several months and 6000 miles later, in South Africa. Brandon, who plans to go to college next year and major in business administration, was chosen to go on this educational mission trip because of his academic achievements in high school.

When Brandon first arrived in Africa, he realized that, for the natives, education was nothing. He then began teaching a class of 450 basic skills such as the alphabet, adding, and counting. He then started his own school of 156 students where he gave diagnostic tests and taught basic educational skills.

"I mostly enjoyed the change," Brandon says. "I enjoyed going and work-

ing with the common people and seeing the expressing in their eyes when they could add two plus two or say the alphabet."

According to Brandon, teaching the people to be a success in their own culture was quite a full job. With all of the students, paperwork took up much of his time.

In addition, Cholera had swept through the village and many students were absent for long periods of time. Likewise, Brandon himself came down with Malaria and was sick for four days.

Brandon also had the chance to witness Africa's infamous racial tensions firsthand. "I always heard that Africa was a dying continent," Brandon says. "When I got there, I found out why."

In U.S. terms Africa can be compared to a continuous L.A. riot filled with violence. Stealing and racial assaults are the norm.

Brandon, who had to raise his own money for the trip, learned the most from his interaction with people who were extremely disadvantaged, and because of that, he has a greater appreciation for his own culture and education.

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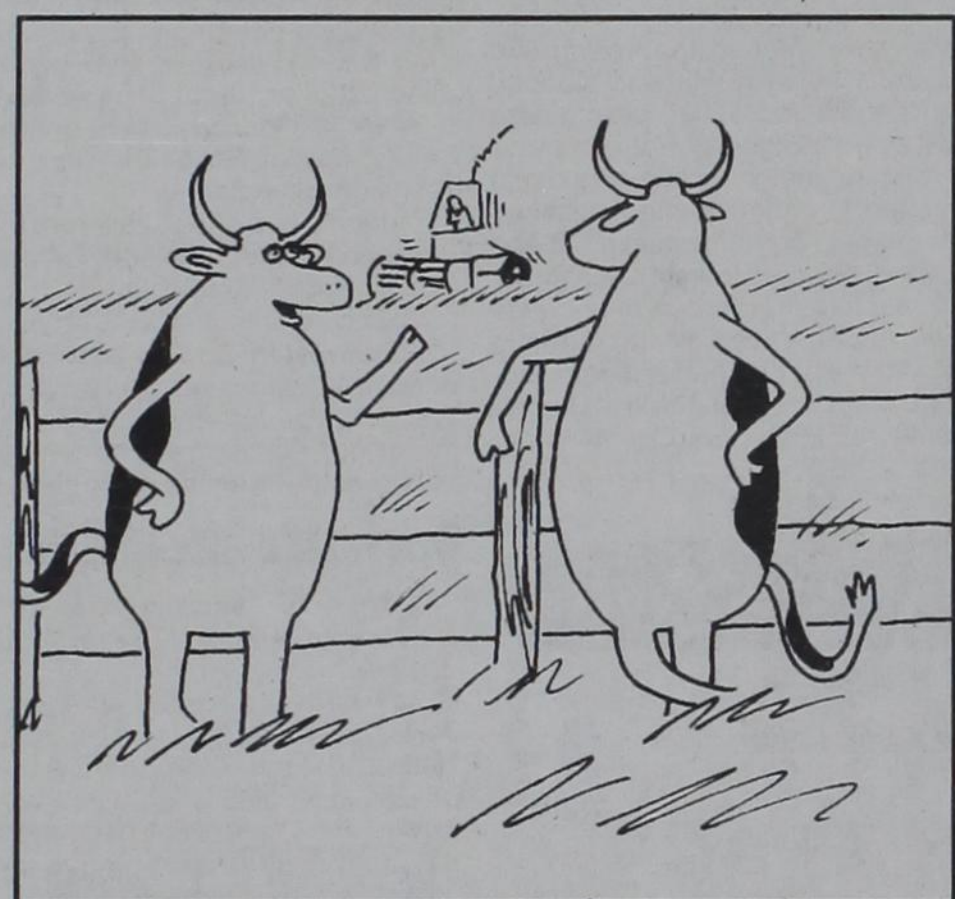
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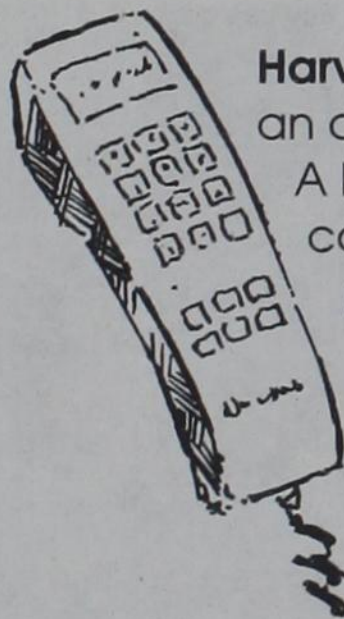
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Ain't It The Truth

Extension Update

Grilling meats outside is a favorite warm weather activity. Follow safe food handling practices to assure that meat is safely prepared and safe to eat. Cook ground meats to a well-done stage; meats should be brown throughout. Cook chicken until juices run clear; fish until it flakes easily with a fork. Use a clean serving plate and utensil to pick up and serve cooked meat. Never use the same one that held raw meat or marinade mixture without washing them first. Any item that was in contact with the raw meat may carry bacteria that cause illness. Keep everything, including containers, utensils, hands, and any surfaces that come in contact with meat.

From 1892 to 1897 James Corbett, who was known as "Gentlemen Jim", was the heavyweight boxing champion of the world. "Gentlemen Jim" was one of the first scientific boxers, winning more than thirty title fights. After one of these fights, he was asked: "Mr. Corbett, what does it take to be heavyweight champion?" The champion replied: "Fight one more round." He then explained by saying: "When your feet are so tired that you have to shuffle back to the center of the ring, fight one more round. When your arms are so tired that you can hardly lift your hands to come on guard, fight one more round. When your nose is bleeding and your eyes are black and you're so tired you wish your opponent would crack you on the jaw and put you to sleep, fight one more round, remembering that the man who always fights one more round, is never whipped." Perseverance! It is quality that is needed by champion boxers. It is also a quality that is needed by the disciples of Jesus. 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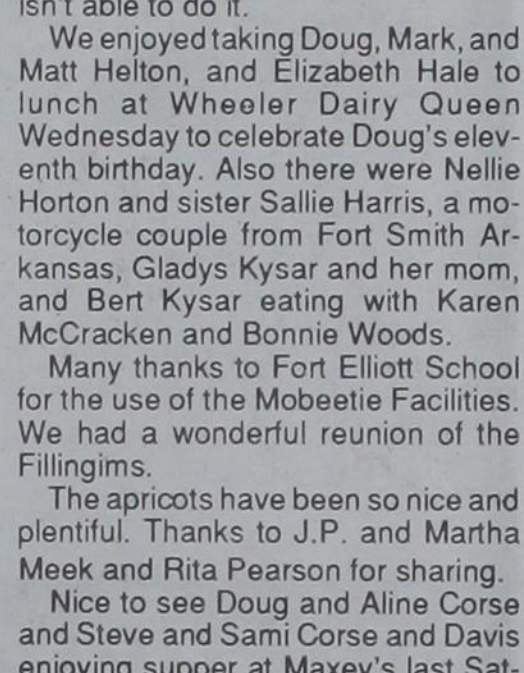

WHAT IS FAITH? HOW IMPORTANT IS IT?

In Hebrews 11:1, the Bible says that faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen. What does that mean? The word substance here means "confidence". Faith is being confident (or assured) that what you hope for is yours. The Amplified Bible uses the term "title-deed" to define the word substance. Faith is having the title-deed. You are absolutely sure that you have something because you have the title-deed to it. If I had the title deed to a new automobile, that would prove that I owned the car even if it wasn't in my driveway yet. When you know that God's Word promises you something (such as healing), you can believe it. The Word of God gives you the title-deed for it even before you can see it or feel it. The Bible says that what things you desire, if you will believe you got it when you pray, you'll have it in time. (See Mark 11:24)

Notice the last phrase in Hebrews 11:1. It says that faith is the evidence of things not seen. Some people say, "I'll believe it when I see it." That is not faith at all. You don't have to believe something that you can see. If you can see and feel your body healed, you don't have to believe it. Faith is believing something that you can't see yet. If you really believe it, you will eventually see it, but you must learn to believe it based on the promises of God instead of based on what you can see or feel. People believe things all the time that they can't see. You believe electricity is in the wires in your home, and yet you do not see it. You can see what it does. You can also see what faith does if you learn to believe what God's Word says in spite of what you see at the moment. People believe they have a brain, yet they have never seen theirs. My point is that people believe many things that they can't see. Just because you can't see something doesn't mean it isn't real. I can't see the wind, but I can see what it does. If you believe God's promises, you won't be able to see just yet what He said, but if you believe it is real and true simply because He said so, you'll see the results of believing eventually.

People believe they are sick sometimes when they aren't. Sometimes, people believe they have heart trouble or cancer, etc., and then find out they didn't. In other words, people have the capacity of believing things they can't see. They don't think anything is out of order to believe these type of things, but they are programmed to believe that it is strange or fanatical to believe what God's Word promises even though they can't see it right now. God's Word says that faith is the evidence of things not seen.

What basis would you have for believing something you couldn't see? God's Word is the basis. If God said something, you can believe it. The reason that I know I am healed is because the Bible said so. There are many places where it says so. We have a free page typed list of forty healing Scriptures, so I am quite aware of the fact that the Bible says I am healed. Therefore, even if it doesn't look like it for a moment or a day or a week, I believe it because the Word says so. That means that the sickness or pain will have to leave my body shortly. If we would choose to believe what the Word says, the contradictory circumstance that are evident right now will have to change to conform to what we are believing. Noah believed it was going to rain for no other reason than that God said so. He lived according to what He believed. He built the ark, and

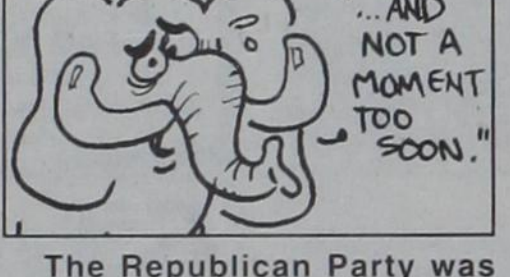

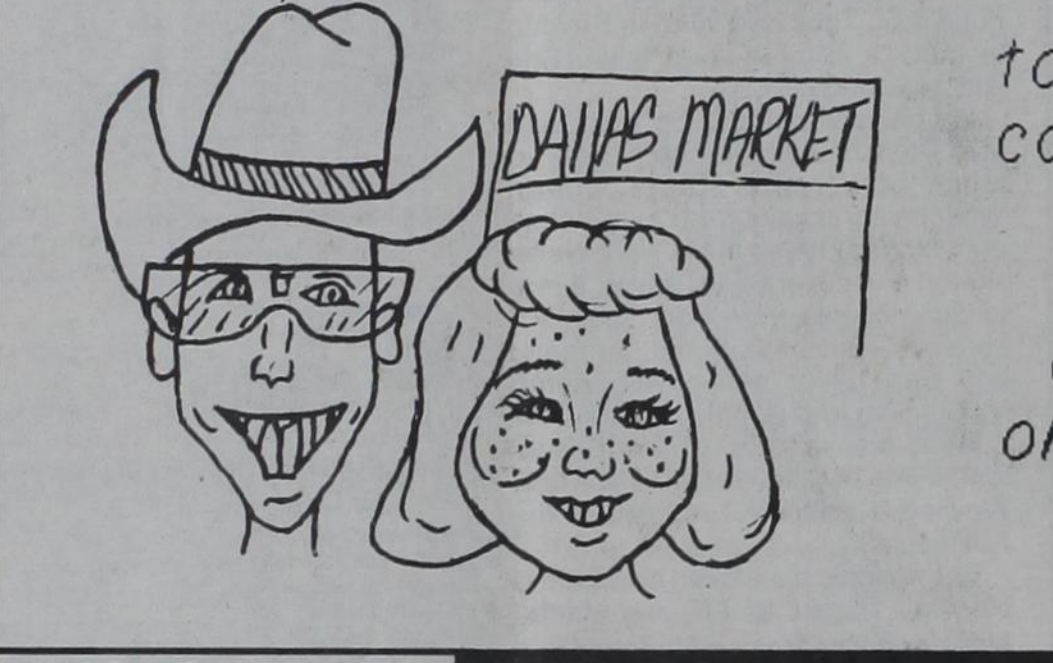
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
