WRECK CLAIMS LIFE OF WHEELER WOMAN

Sylvia R. Reames died Sunday night in a car accident in Beckham County, said Nancy Hurt, a communications officer with the Oklahoma Highway Patrol Sylvia Reames was driving a 1988 Pontiac that collided with a 1994 Chevrolet pickup driven by Roy William Drinnon, 54, of Elk City.

The two vehicles collided at the intersection of state highway 6 and U.S. Highway 283, Hurt said.

Reames died at the scene from neck injuries, Hurt said. Drinnon was taken to Great Plains Regional Hospital in Elk City with head and arm injuries. He was treated at the hospital and released, Hurt said.

FIRST NATIONAL IN WHEELER NAMED CERTIFIED LENDER IN FmHA PLAN

"First National Bank in Wheeler, Texas has been accepted as a Certified Lender in a new Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) plan to streamline its guaranteed loans for farmers," George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said today.

Under the program, FmHA guarantees farm operating and ownership loans made by commercial lenders against a certain percentage of loss.

"The Certified Lender Program was created to reduce paperwork and expedite the actual processing of loan applications," Ellis said. "For lenders that meet our requirements, we pledge to give them a reply in 14 days when they send us an application."

"This helps the lenders and the farmers, and keeps our work flow moving faster. It cuts the normal processing time by more than one half."

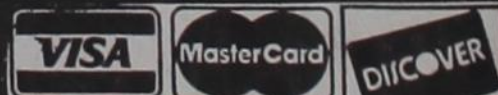

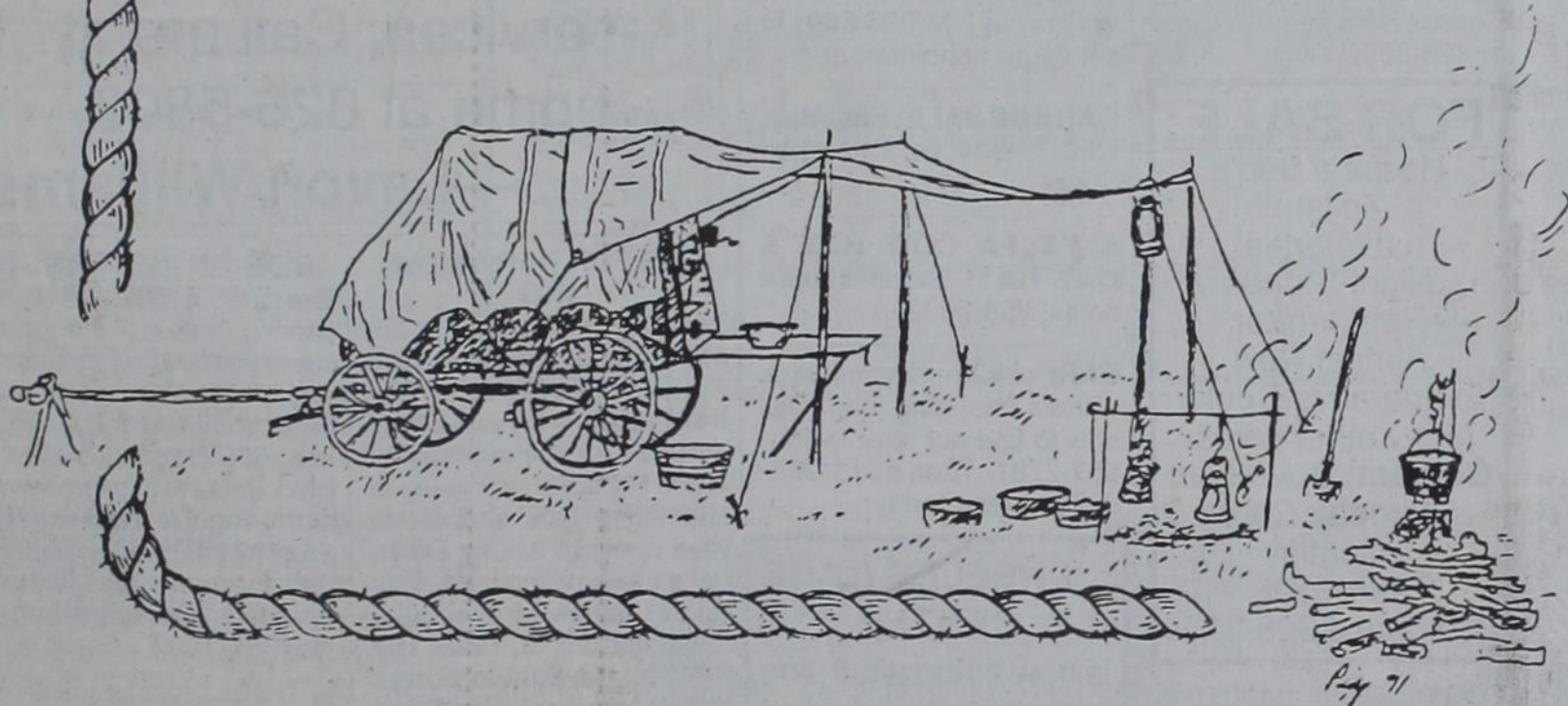

RENDER INCOME-PRODUCING PERSONAL PROPERTY NOW FOR 1994

Business owners are reminded that they must file property rendition forms with the Wheeler County Appraisal District by April 14, 1994. A 15 day extension can be granted if requested in writing.

Anyone who owns or manages income producing personal property on January 1, 1994, must file a rendition statement. Businesses are required to report inventories, furniture & fixtures, machinery, equipment, business vehicles and any other tangible property used in the production of income.

Any Taxpayer may voluntarily file a rendition. The rendering of real estate is not required by law, but the act of rendering is a good way to prevent errors.

Property owners with damaged buildings (storm, fire etc.), may also file a special report of decreased value.

Rendition and Report of Decreased Value forms are available at the Appraisal District Office, Courthouse Square, Wheeler, Phone 806/826-5900.

It is a criminal offense to make false statements on these forms. Once completed, the forms are confidential and are not open to public inspection.

Personal Safety Tips When Laundering

To reduce the risk of fire, electric shock or injury when using washers and dryers, follow these basic precautions:

- Read all instructions before using the appliances.
- Do not reach into the appliance if the agitator or drum are moving.
- Clean lint screen, when accessible, before or after each load. Do not operate the dryer without the lint screen in place.
- Items containing foam rubber (may be labeled latex foam) or similarly textured rubber-like materials must not be dried on a heat setting. Foam rubber materials, when heated, can under certain circumstances produce fire by spontaneous combustion.
- Any material on which you have used a cleaning solvent or which is saturated with flammable liquids or solids, should not be placed in the washer or dryer until all traces of these flammable substances and their fumes have been removed. Substances such as acetone, denatured alcohol, drycleaning solvents, gasoline, kerosene, turpentine, waxes and wax removers can give off vapors that could ignite or explode.
- Do not place into the dryer items that have been spotted or soaked with vegetable or cooking oil. When exposed to heat, these items can become hot enough to catch fire.

From the Minister's Desk:
The definition of words can be very educational. For example, Webster's Collegiate Dictionary defines "tolerance" as "sympathy or indulgence for beliefs or practices differing from or conflicting with one's own." With this definition an important question is raised. This question is: "What attitude should Christians have towards people who do not practice Biblical truth?"

This question poses a serious dilemma for disciples of Jesus. This dilemma consists of a commitment to Biblical truth which will not compromise and of a sympathy for people who do not have this

commitment. To solve this dilemma, disciples of Jesus have embraced one of two extremes. These two extremes are: ---

1. Rigidness. Some disciples of Jesus have tried to resolve this dilemma by a rigid belief and practice of Biblical truth, despising tolerance as compromise. And this attitude has often been the cloak for some very evil behavior.

Perhaps the best illustration of such behavior is found in a text in the ninth chapter of Luke. According to this text, Jesus and His disciples are denied lodging in a Samaritan village which deeply offended two of His disciples. These two disciples "--James and John--" asked Jesus if He wanted them "--to command fire to come down from heaven--" and destroy the Samaritans. But Jesus rebuked them, saying: "You do not know what kind of spirit you are of, for the Son of Man did not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them." (versus 55-56)

Jesus came to save people not to destroy them. His disciples should have the same purpose. The Apostle Paul said that the gospel of Jesus "--is the power of God for salvation--", but he also taught that it cannot be successfully communicated by ugly dispositions. (Colossians 4:5-6)

Disciples of Jesus must have a strong commitment to Biblical truth which they will not compromise. But they will graciously allow other people to question and challenge this commitment. The proverbial "bottom line" is that the world will not be influenced by intolerant disciples of Jesus.

2. Compromise. While some disciples of Jesus have tried to resolve the dilemma by a rigid commitment to Biblical truth which considers tolerance to be compromise, others have honored tolerance at the expense of Biblical truth.

Tolerance, then, can be a pleasant word for a lack of conviction. The open mind is often the vacant heart that has no cherished beliefs or convictions. Such disciples of Jesus are extremely tolerant because they have no conviction. The lowest level of conviction will always produce the highest level of tolerance.

Either of these extremes--rigidness and compromise--is wrong. Disciples of Jesus must maintain a balance between these extremes. They must be deeply committed to the truth of God's will. But they must also be genuinely tolerant of people who are not. Perhaps the key to this balance is found in their attitude towards people. Like their Lord, disciples of Jesus will hate sin, but love sinners. They will be uncompromisingly intolerant of erroneous beliefs, but they will be genuinely tolerant of the people who hold them.

Is such a balance possible? It was for Jesus! His commitment to the truth of God's will could not be shaken by a death upon a cross. Yet as He died, He prayed: "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34) His disciples must walk in His footsteps, hating sin, but loving sinners.

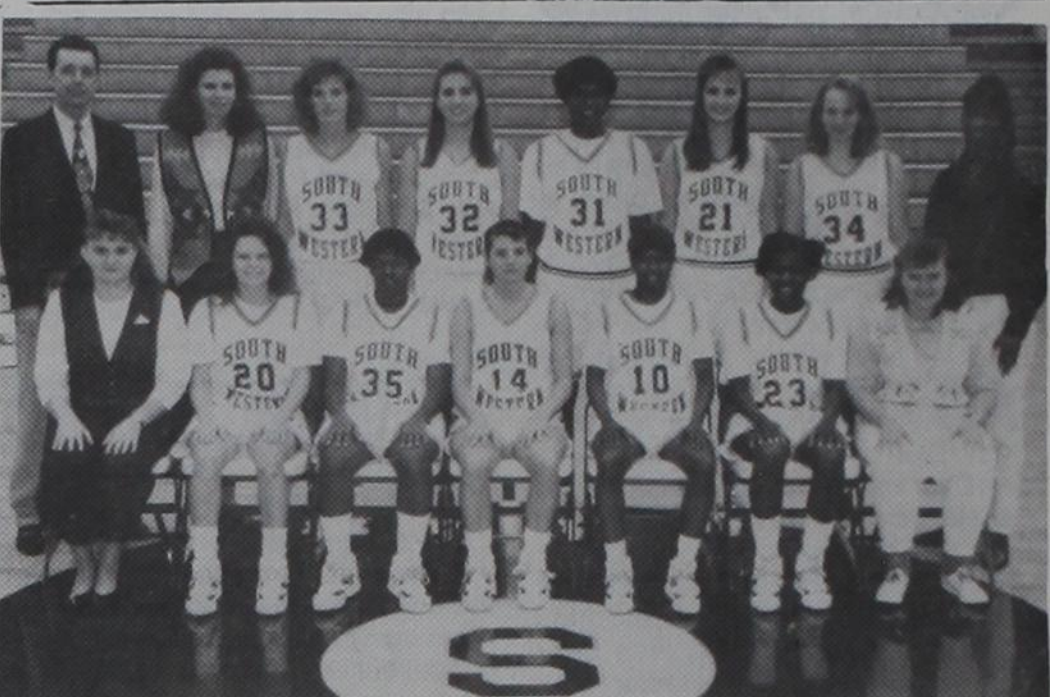
