

LIT CRIT TEAM WINS FOURTH

It has been a long academic season for the members of the Literary Criticism Team from Wheeler High School as they have made their way all the way to state competition. Members of the team are Kristin Smith, Senior; Amanda Rives, Junior and Monty Long, Freshman. They started this school year as the defending 2-A State Literary Criticism Champion Team. Monty Long joined the team this year to fill the gap left by graduating Rochelle Rives.

At the District UIL Academic Contest at Canadian on March 24, 1994, the team won first place scoring 236 points. Amanda Rives took first place honors with a score of 84. Kristin Smith followed with a score of 82, earning second place. Monty Long took third place scoring a 70.

The team advance to regional competition on April 23, 1994, in Abilene. Here, they also earned the title of Regional Literary Criticism Team Champions. Kristin scored an 83 taking first place individual honors. Amanda tied for third place with a 77. When a tie occurs, the individual's essay is judged. Amanda lost thus slipping to fourth place. Monty was involved in a four-way tie for fifth place and won putting him in fifth place with a score of 65. The team score of 225 points once again brought the gold back to Wheeler High. The school received a beautiful plaque declaring the team to be Regional Champions.

On May 7, 1994, the Literary Criticism Team competed in the State UIL Academic Contest in Austin. They made a good showing there in a very competitive 2-A division. Only four points separated the four teams that made it to the State Meet. Krum and Lytle tied for first place team with 230 points each. Hawkins' team score was 229 points with Wheeler's team following closely behind with 226 points.

Kristin led the team's scoring with 78 points, Amanda scored 75 points, and Monty followed with 73 points. This team, as you can see, performed well. Their combined score of 226 points would have easily defeated the 1-A winner along with 4-A's top team.

The top score in the 2-A contest was 81. There was a five-way tie for first place individual, so these contestants took the top five places being judged on their essays.

The competition was stiff this year, but this team is planning to try it again next year. Kristin Smith will be graduating and moving on to bigger things at Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas. This contest requires dedication and commitment to hours of study each day. Sue Bentley, English teacher, sponsors this team, and traveled to Austin with them, along with parents, Jenny Smith and Betty Rives.

Academic state competitors are eligible for the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation Scholarship program. The members of this team can apply for these scholarships their senior year in high school. These scholarships range from \$500 to \$12,320 per year. Rochelle Rives, 1993 Literary Criticism Champion, was awarded a \$3,000 UIL scholarship from the Abell-Hanger Foundation.

Life Members. Those persons who contribute \$100.00 shall become life members. 7. Annual Sustaining Members. Those persons who contribute \$25.00 per year or more. When the contributions of any such person total \$100.00 they shall thereupon automatically become a Life Member. 8. Annual Members. Those persons who pay annual dues of \$5.00. Ware Chevrolet Company was established in April of 1949. Mr. N. D. Ware of Fargo, Oklahoma, had previously been a Chevrolet dealer in Fargo during the 30's, but when WWII became a reality and cars were impossible to obtain, he went out of the car business and into the farm implement business.

When Nick Ware found out there was an opening for a Chevrolet dealership in Wheeler, Texas, he and his wife, Kate and his son, N. D. Ware, Jr., came to Wheeler to look the town over and explore the possibilities of opening a new business. Even though they came from a smaller town than Wheeler they were not too impressed with Wheeler's appearance. At that time there were no paved streets, no new school building, no new hospital and no landscaped, modernized bank and plaza.

Wheeler was just a friendly little country town with houses of assorted sizes scattered here and there. Most of the homes were stucco and a few others were wood frame. The courthouse square was surrounded with small businesses.

In April of 1949, Ware Chevrolet opened. It was first housed in a tiny one room building directly behind the old First National Bank building. The building later became Mr. Deering's shoe repair shop. There was room to park two or three cars on the lot, and at that time that was about all the cars Ware Chevrolet had at one time.

Nick and Kate Ware moved into a little four room house that had been a garage behind the home of Mrs. Fanny Wofford. In July, N. D. Ware, Jr., and his bride of two weeks also moved to Wheeler and N.D. went into business with his dad.

During the following year, Carl Lafflin built a brick building directly east of the Nicholson Hospital and that became the new home of Ware Chevrolet Company.

In the mean time the Wares had recruited their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Bob McNeil, who moved to Wheeler from Woodward, Oklahoma.

Bob became the chief mechanic and the McNeils lived in Wheeler until about 1963, when they moved to Muleshoe, Texas.

In 1958, N. D. Ware, Jr. bought the old Ford building from Mr. Jud Johnson and Ware Chevrolet moved across the street. In 1964, N. D. Jr. bought the business from his father and in 1976, Bob Ware went to work for his father.

Ware Chevrolet Co. became Ware Chevrolet-Buick-Olds-Pontiac, Inc. in 1983 and moved to its present location on South highway 83 in April of 1984.

"We are now into our third generation of Wares. Wheeler has been good to us and as it continues to grow we certainly expect to be a part of it. Stop by as we celebrate our 10th year at our new location and our 45th Anniversary.





From the Minister's Desk:

While the presidency of the late
Richard Nixon will be remembered for
many noble achievements, these
achievements will always be over-
shadowed by the scandal that was
known as Watergate. This scandal
began on June 17, 1972 when five
men were arrested for breaking into
the Democratic National headquar-
ters in the Watergate building in
Washington D.C. It ended on Au-
gust 8, 1974, when President Nixon
resigned as President.

I believe that President Nixon
would not have been forced to re-
sign if he had heeded the warning
of one of his aides, John Dean. At a
meeting in the President's office in
the months after the scandal be-
gan, Mr. Dean candidly warned
President Nixon about the effects
of the scandal, saying: "We have
a cancer within—close to the Presi-
dency—that's growing. It's growing
daily. It's compounding. It grows
geometrically now, because it com-
pounds itself."

The metaphor of cancer which
Mr. Dean used to warn President
Nixon about the scandal of
Watergate has also been used by a
religious writer, Hank Hanegraaff,
to ward disciples of Jesus about a
crisis in Christianity. Mr. Hanegraaff
used this metaphor in the preface of
his book, *Christianity In Crisis*, say-
ing: "The true Christ and the true
faith of the Bible are being replaced
rapidly with diseased substitutes
offered by a group of teachers who
belong to what has been labeled the
Faith movement."

Mr. Hanegraaff then added: "This
cancer has been triggered by a
steady diet of fast food Christiani-
ty—a Christianity long on looks but
short on substance. The dispensers
of this carcinogenic diet have
utilized the powers of the airwaves,
as well as a plethora of pleasantly
packaged books and tapes, to lure
their prey to dinner. The unsuspect-
ing have been called not to love the
Master, but to love what is on the
Master's table."

While Mr. Hanegraaff warns
about several of the teachings of
the Faith movement in his book, he
especially warns about its teaching
on prosperity. He writes: "Christ did
not come to bring financial prosper-
ity: He came to focus our attention
on eternal prosperity. Even now the
words of the Master ring with divine
authority. "Do not store up for your-
selves treasure on earth, where
moth and rust destroy, and where
thieves break in and steal. But store
up for yourselves treasures in
heaven." (Matthew 6:19, 20) How
magnificent a sight it must have
been to witness the Lord standing
on the shore of Galilee, pleading
passionately with His followers to

labor not for that which perishes but
for that which is eternal. (John 6:27)
"How much scripture do we need
to see the bankruptcy of the Faith
movement's teaching on prosperi-
ty? Shall we remind ourselves of
Christ's account of the rich man and
Lazarus in Luke 16:19-31? The rich
man, who lived his earthly life in
luxury, was not even dignified with a
name in eternity. But Lazarus, who
lived in poverty, received comfort in
the eternal kingdom. (verse 25)"
"Or perhaps we should reread the
words of Jesus' own brother, James,
who boldly declared to the rich, "Your
wealth has rotted—Your gold and
silver are corroded—You have
hoarded wealth in the last days."
(James 5:2,3) The Bible is replete
with examples declaring the pov-
erty of the Faith movement's teach-
ings concerning wealth and want.
The Faith teachers of our day have
not conformed their teaching to the
ancient scriptures. Instead, they
have conformed themselves to
American society."

"American culture is obsessed
with upward mobility and crass ma-
terialism, which is precisely what
the Faith movement panders to. It
thrives on the idea that God's kids
can acquire wealth without work
and dollars without discipline. Its
watchword is not self-sacrifice but
self-aggrandizement. Sadly, a sig-
nificant portion of contemporary
Christianity has bought into the
message that we only go around
once in this world, so we had better
go for all the gusto we can while
we're here. We no longer sing, "I
surrender all." Rather, we say, "I can
speak it all into existence through
the formula of faith."

Mr. Hanegraaff concludes his
warning about the Faith movement's
teaching on prosperity by saying:
"Having said all this, let me make it
clear that I do not associate poverty
with piety. This issue is not what you
have, but what you do with what you
have. Our time, talent, and treasure
should be used for God's glory rather
than our own gain. I am persuaded
that the Bible teaches a form of
Christian capitalism—in other
words, responsibility associated with
wealth. It does not promote the pos-
session of money for the sake of
money, but instead encourages us
to use money for the sake of the
kingdom."
President Nixon failed to heed
John Dean's warning about the can-
cer that threatened his Presidency.
I hope that some disciples of Jesus
will not make this mistake. I hope
that they heed Mr. Hanegraaff's
warning about the cancer that threat-
ens genuine Christianity.

Drop by small spoonfuls. Remove from oven just before they brown. Good and chewy. Clara had been making these cookies over forty years.

Springs arrival is also bringing out the fishermen. I came across an account of one mans experience. I'll tell it as briefly as I can.


