MUSTANGS ARE HEADED FOR PLAY-OFFS

Mustangs Defeat Kiowas 22-7 to Become District Champs

Friday night the Mustangs returned home for what would be their final home game of the 1997 football season hosting the Booker Kiowas who came to Wheeler boasting a 3-1 district record. While the Mustangs were 4-0 going into the game they were hoping to keep their winning streak alive.

Both teams came into this game knowing that it had very important implications. If the Mustangs won they would be the outright district champs and if the Kiowas won it would allow them to enter the play-offs as the second place team in district.

The Mustangs won the opening toss and elected to kick being able to use the wind to their advantage.

On Booker's first possession the Mustang defense held them to a three and out after Booker went three plays without gaining yardage. Whenever, the Mustangs received the Booker punt they had hopes of getting on the score board early, but on the first play the Mustangs fumbled the ball away to the Kiowas.

When the Booker offense took the field the Mustang defense shut them down once again by sacking the quarterback for a loss of 12 yards on third down and forcing another punt.

The Mustangs drove the ball down the field, but stalled at the Booker 20 yard line and were forced to attempt a field goal. The kick was not good, but the Mustangs were aided by a roughing the kicker penalty called against the Kiowas.

The Mustangs took advantage of the Booker mistake by scoring on a one yard dive by Aaron Dunnam. Ben Dollar's kick was good and with 1:31 left in the first quarter the Mustangs

took a 7-0 lead.

The next Booker possession the Mustang defense forced a fumble and Josh Lee recovered the ball for the home team. This gave the Mustang offense the ball on Booker's 41 yard line.

The Mustangs drove the ball down the field and Jeremy Davis ran the ball into the end zone from 16 yards out. The extra point was missed, but once again the Kiowas were flagged for roughing the kicker.

After the call the Mustangs elected to go for two and Brooks Brown completed a pass to Michael Montgomery who made a very tough run to get the two point conversion.

With 11:49 to go in the second quarter the Mustangs made the score 15-0. When the buzzer sounded at the end of the half the score remained the same.

The Mustang defense played magnificently in the first half allowing the Kiowa offense to only gain six total yards.

When the second half opened the Mustangs received the kick, but was shut down by the defense being forced to punt.

The Kiowas scored on 43 yard run, with the extra point the Kiowas cut the Mustangs' lead to 15-7.

In the fourth quarter the Mustangs ended the scoring for the evening on a 25 yard touchdown run by Bryan Judd. Dollar's kick was good and the Mustangs took a 22-7 lead.

The Mustangs finished the game with 14 first downs, 211 yards rushing, and 17 yards passing, for a total of 228 yards.

The Mustangs were 2-7 passing with two interceptions. They had five punts for a 35 yards average.

Fumbled six times, losing three and were flagged three times for 25 yards. Bryan Judd had 12 carries for 65 yards, Jeremy Davis had 18 carries for 88 yards, Casey Childress had ten yards on three carries, and Aaron Dunnam had 19 carries for 48 yards.

Dunnam was 2-7 passing for 17 yards, he led the defense with seven tackles, six assists and two caused turnovers.

Jeremy Davis had two tackles, four assists and one sack.

Josh Lee had three tackles, two assists, two sacks and a fumble recovery.

Bruce Copeland had three tackles and two sacks.

Michael Montgomery had three tackles and two assists.

Kyle Masters had two tackles and one sack.

Jorje Salas had four tackles, one assist and one interception.

Donald Phipps had one interception, and Brooks Brown recovered a fumble.

Booker ended up with eight first downs, 71 yards rushing, and 21 yards passing for a total of 92 yards. In the passing department, they were 3-15 with two interceptions. They had seven punts for 34 yards, fumbled three times and lost two, and were flagged eight times for 61 yards.

The Mustang defense went out Friday night bound and determined to shut down the Booker Kiowa offense, and that is exactly what they did!

At times the Mustang offense sputtered and stalled but the defense remained a constant force.

Friday night the Mustangs will begin their play-off run by facing the Kress Kangaroos in Childress at Fair Park Stadium, 7:30 p.m.

The winner of this game will move on to face the winner of the Wink vs. Petersburg game.

Tour Planned On Range & Pasture Management

Producers in Wheeler County and surrounding counties are invited to a Range and Pasture Management Meeting Monday, November 17, 1997. The meeting, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service offices in Wheeler, Gray, Carson, Roberts, Hemphill and Collingsworth counties, will begin at 6 p.m. in the Wheeler School auditorium.

J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist at Vernon, will discuss Grazing Management of Rangeland. The discussion will include estimating available forage, leaving sufficient forage on

the land and grazing to maintain forage production and control weeds. Cadenhead will also review range plant identification, chemical weed and brush control and chemical safety.

Rickey Gilliland, District Supervisor with the Texas Animal Damage Control Service in Canyon, will cover the topic of Wildlife Damage Management. He will concentrate on predators such as coyotes and feral hogs.

Participants will receive 2 CEUs toward the renewal of their Private, Non-Commercial or Commercial Pesticide Applicator Licenses.

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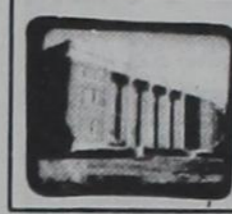

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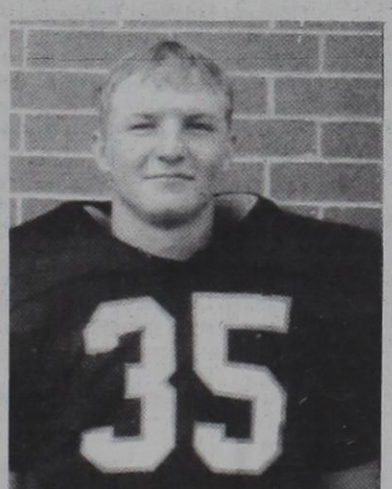

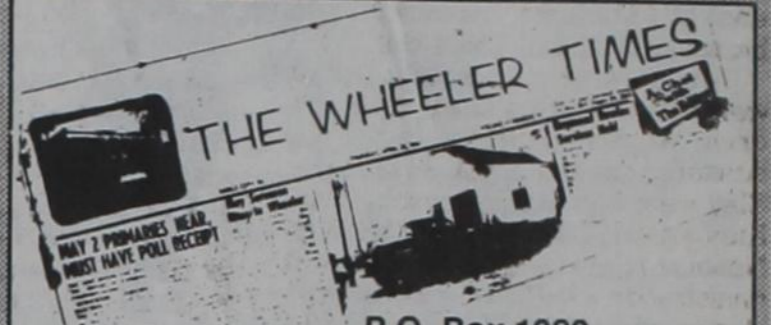

KIDS ARE NOT CARGO

Several years ago, Karen Slay of Lubbock read a newspaper account of how a Chevy truck loaded with 12 kids ranging in age from four to thirteen ran a stop sign near Snyder, which is about a hundred miles southeast of Lubbock. The pickup was broadsided by an 18-wheeler.

Two parents and another adult were killed, as were eight of the children, whose mangled bodies lay scattered on the desolate highway. Slay went into action, launching the Kids Aren't Cargo campaign. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) adopted her slogan and logo and she has been recognized nationally for her efforts.

Nationwide, more than two hundred deaths per year are a result of persons riding in pickup beds. Dr. Richard Martinez, administrator of the NHTSA said, "pickup trucks are a great place for cargo. Kids aren't cargo and need to ride up front with a seat belt on." And it is not only kids that need to stay out of beds of pickup trucks but people of all ages. In 1996 in Texas, six people were killed as a result of riding in the cargo area of a pickup truck. These six people were between the ages of 17 and 21. In addition, 708 Texans were injured as a result of riding in the cargo area of a pickup truck.

Considering using camper shell and think that it will offer protection? Think again. Camper shells are not structurally enforced and there are no seat belts in the bed of the pickup. The combination can be lethal, according to Marlene Albers, Texas Agricultural Extension Service associate with passenger safety. Ed Carmon, safety education officer with the Texas Department of Public Safety in Bryan/College Station, said, the traumatic force of being thrown around inside the camper will damage soft internal organs. If the camper shell remains intact during a crash, it helps keep passengers from being ejected. However, they will suffer injuries from being thrown against the pickup bed and shell. In a worst case scenario, they may be crushed inside. The chance of getting a severe head injury is greatly increased. If you injure your brain, it may never heal. That's what your seat belts and air bags do for you in a car.

Even though it is legal in Texas for adults to ride in the open bed of a pickup truck, it is not safe. Riding in the back of pickups is a problem throughout Texas. The current Texas law states that "a person commits an offense if the person, at a speed that exceeds 35 miles per hour, operates

an open bed pickup truck or an open flatbed truck or tows an open flatbed trailer on a public street or highway when a child younger than 12 years of age is occupying the bed of a truck or trailer."

The speed limit has increased on many Texas roadways, and it is critical that drivers are attentive, follow posted traffic signs, that all passengers and the driver buckle up, and drive unimpaired.

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How to Prepare Fresh Pumpkin

To prepare a fresh pumpkin for cooking, first slice in half crosswise, and remove the seeds (but don't discard). Put the halves, cut side down on a jellyroll pan, and bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until the pumpkin is tender. When it's cool, remove the skin and mash the pulp. A 5 pound pumpkin will yield about 4 1/2 cups of cooked, mashed pulp.

And the seeds are perfect for snacking — bake them in an 8 inch square baking dish at 300 degree for 25 minutes. Or if you prefer stir in a little butter and seasoning salt for flavor before baking.

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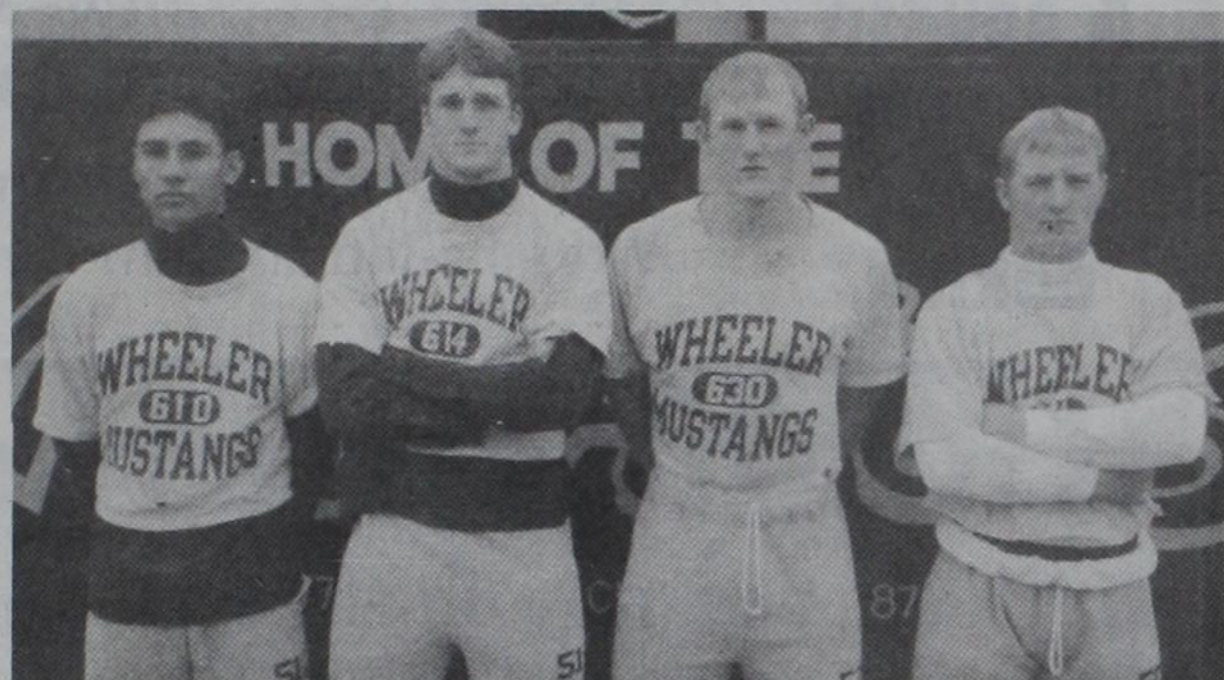

The other twins are Horace A. Fillingim, S 1/c, who has a fleet post

office address, San Francisco, and has been stationed at Treasure Island, and Hugh E., seaman, first class, who has a San Francisco fleet post office address.

These boys have three sisters, and two brothers, besides their parents, waiting for the end of the war when the family can be reunited. The sisters are Mrs. John Root, Amarillo;

From The Minister's Desk:

John Gipson, the minister of Sixth and Izard church of Christ in Little Rock, Arkansas, recently wrote a bulletin article that many religious people need to read. This bulletin article was entitled, "The Ancient Landmarks" and it said: ---

"It's in vogue today to disparage the achievements of earlier generations. Colleges and Universities often look with disdain upon the founders, presidents, and faculties which had the vision, endured the hardships, and educated the young people entrusted to them. There seems to be a pleasure in debunking the life and character of former leaders, and poking fun at the 'good old days.'"

"We tend to assume that anything new is better. So it was when I was in elementary school. The class which went before me studied phonics, and they knew how to spell. But the notion caught on that a class in phonics was old-fashioned, and ought to be dropped from the curriculum. I, along with many others, have suffered as result of that dreadful mistake. My grandchildren, armed with the strong emphasis on phonics they received, can out spell me any day."

"It's easy for me to see the wisdom in the proverbs which states,

"Remove not the ancient landmark which your fathers have set."

"In the church it is important to preserve the ancient landmark which our fathers have set. We do not mean, of course, to insist upon a blind adherence to tradition for its own sake, or decry the new methods available to us carrying or applying the Gospel to our modern world."

"We do mean, however, that there are certain things about the church and its message which are absolute and unchangeable, and which can be removed only at our spiritual peril."

"We dare not tamper with the 'ancient landmark' of Christian doctrine—the 'faith once delivered to the saints.' We have a sure foundation in the apostolic doctrine, of which Jesus Christ Himself is the chief Cornerstone. This doctrine is fixed and unchangeable as is the nature of Him who gave it. The Faith is not relative; it is not progressive; it is not modified by changing times or circumstances."

"And I see the faces of our patients and their families when difficult times are eased by the medications we can buy, the equipment we can furnish, and the services we can give through the support we receive from the Tree of Love."

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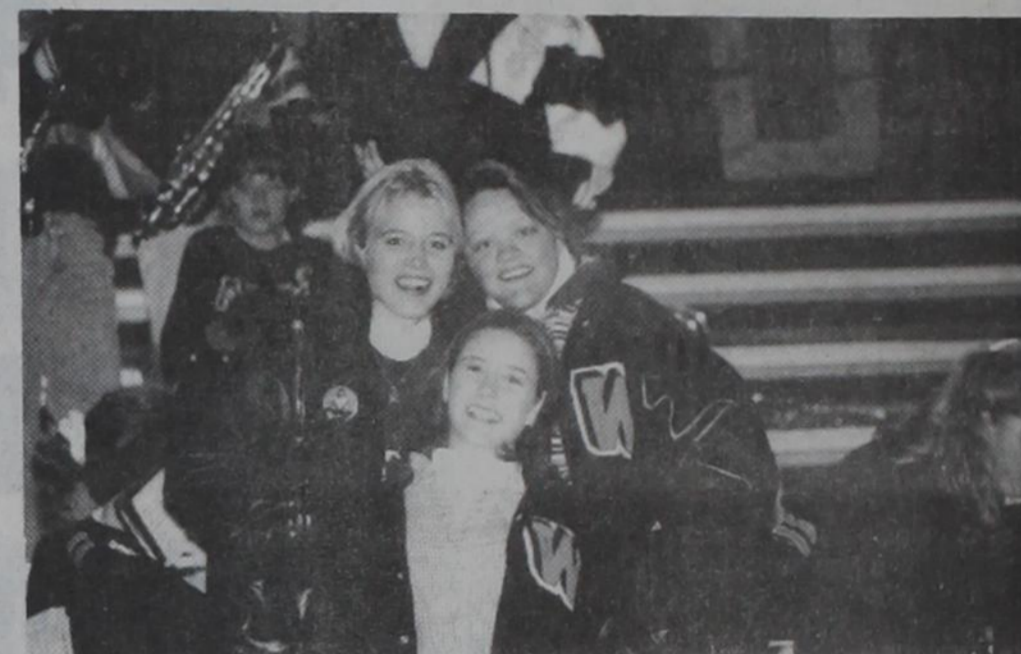

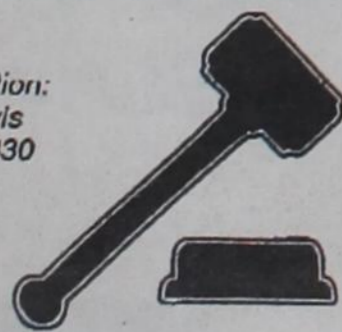

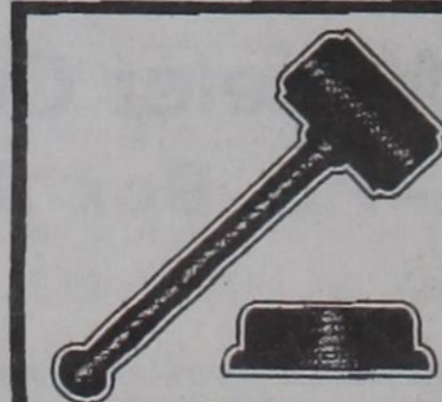
