
John E. Morrison Seeks Office Of Wheeler County Attorney

Following my military service I was a pre-law student at Abilene Chris-









Extension Update

EVEN CONSUMERS HAVE RESPONSIBILITY IN CLEANING GARMENTS

Family & Consumer Sciences - Family & Consumer Sciences Texas Agricultural Extension Service

Few consumers, according to a report issued by the International Fabricare Institute, understand that stains from even colorless ingredients, such as beverages and sugar, can cause damage to garments.

More than 2,500 garments were analyzed last year containing consumer-caused stains. Stains ranged from ink, food, hair preparations, beverages, oil, perspiration to sugar.

Invisible stains can occur even when they are difficult or impossible to remove. Delaying cleaning increases the risk of permanent stain. The sooner a stain is treated, the greater the chance that it can be removed successfully. The color and fabric type influence whether stains can be removed.

Consumers can help the dry cleaner to do a better job of cleaning by telling the dry cleaner of any potential stains, including those invisible "spills."

It also is helpful to know what kind of food or ingredient was spilled on the garment, how long the stain has been present and any techniques the consumer may have used to remove the stain.

It is important for consumers to understand that some spills from even mildly acidic/alkaline foods and beverages can cause colors to fade in fabrics. The reaction is slow.

Color loss depends on the sensitivity of the dye. The fiber content, acidity/alkalinity and time of exposure on the fabric. Hair spray and per-

fumes often cause surprise stains, especially on silk and wool fibers.

Though appearing to be invisible, hair spray and other hair preparations may oxidize and become visible with age, exposure to light and heat. Stains usually appear as tan, gray or black raindrop-like splatters. In some cases staining causes the fabric to feel stiff.

Pointing out potential stains to the dry cleaner can alert them to taking

precautions that might prevent staining and costly losses to the consumer.

From The Minister's Desk:
John Gipson, the minister of the Sixth and Izard Church of Christ in Little Rock, Arkansas, recently wrote an editorial that taught an important lesson. This editorial was entitled, "Mr. Know It All", and it said:

"Over the holidays I read Barnaby Rudge by Charles Dickens. I quickly discovered a cast of characters not unlike many of us living today. For example, there is "John Willet, a burly, large-headed man with a fat face—one of the most dogged and positive fellows in existence—always sure that what he thought or said or did was right, and holding it as a thing quite settled and ordained by the laws of nature and Providence, that anybody who said or did or thought otherwise must be inevitably and necessarily wrong."
"It is disconcerting to meet someone like John Willet, especially when one suspects he might be kin to him—Solomon said, "Do you see a man who is wise in his own eyes? There is more hope for a fool than for him." (Proverbs 26:12)
"In calculating the extent of conceit, one Harvard professor has suggested that if men were really as big as they sometimes feel, there would be room in the United States for only two professors, three lawyers, two doctors, and one reporter on a city paper. The rest of us would be crowded into the sea and would have to swim."
"One of the dangers of conceit is that it bars the door to self-improvement. When one refuses to recognize his own ignorance, he is apt to reject all advice and counsel from others. Charles Kettering, one who has made great contributions to science and industry, attributes his progress to what he calls "intelligent ignorance." The hope of advancement lies with those who are intelligent enough to be aware of their ignorance, and humble enough to be instructed. . ."

"Nowhere is conceit more damaging than in religion. Preferring his own notions to the teachings of Christ, the "wise" man rejects the wisdom of God. Paul said, "Make no mistake about this: If there is anyone among you who fancies himself wise-wise, I mean, by the standards of this passing age—he must become a fool to gain the true wisdom. 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
