The Wheeler Mustangs played the Booker Kiowas last Friday night in their third game of District play. Rain and lightening cut the game short with the officials ending The Mustangs dominated the Kiowas on both sides of the ball, and came out to the game with a win.

The Mustangs would receive the kickoff to start the game. The Kiowas were able to hold them on fourth and one, and took over on downs. On the next play, Aaron Dunnam forced the Booker running back to fumble and the Mustangs recovered. The Mustangs drove 81 yards on 16 plays; and Casey Childress scored a touchdown on a six yard run. Aaron Dunnam passed to Brooks Brown for the two point conversion, and the Mustangs went ahead 8-0 with 2:48 left in the First Quarter. The Mustang defense then took over, and held Booker to three plays and then forced them to punt.

The Wheeler offense then put together a 45 yard, 7 play drive. Aaron Dunnam scored on an 11 run, and kicked the extra point. The Mustangs lead 15-0 with 11:29 left in the Second Quarter. Booker again went three plays and had to punt. The Mustangs offense then went 52 yard in 11 plays, and ended with Caleb Finsterwald's 9 yard touchdown run. Aaron Dunnam's kick was good, and the Mustangs went ahead 22-0 with 3:24 left in the half. Once again the Mustang defense held Booker to three plays. The offense went 34 yards on 3 plays to score their fourth touchdown of the night. Aaron Dunnam connected with Kirt Boedeker for a 20

yard touchdown pass, and the two point conversion was good. Wheeler went in at half time ahead of Booker

Wheeler received the opening kickoff of the second half on their own 12 yard line. The Mustangs went 88 yards on 13 plays. Casey Childress then scored his second touch down of the night on a 2 yard run. The extra point was no good, and the Mustangs lead Booker 36-0 with 4:26 left to go in the Third Quarter. Booker received the kickoff, but due to lightening in the area the officials called the game. The Mustangs beat Booker 36-0.

Casey Childress rushed 16 times

for 87 yards and two touchdowns. Aaron Dunnam rushed 11 times for 78 yards and one touchdown. He was also 6-8 passing with 99 yards, one interception, and one touchdown pass to Kirt Boedeker.

Caleb Finsterwald rushed 14 times for 75 yards and one touchdown. Kyle Masters had 3 receptions for

64 yards. Kirt Boedeker had 2 catches for 31 vards and one touchdown.

unique scenic beauty. Austin consultant Ted Lee Eubanks will lead the two-day workshop, which will be held from 1-5 p.m. Tuesday and from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Wednesday at Canadian's River Valley Pioneer

Museum. Eubanks is the recipient of numerous honors for his achievements in protecting and promoting wildlife opportunities in Texas, Fermata, Inc., Eubanks' Austin-based firm, coordinates the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail-a \$1.5 million project which ties together 12 different locations over a 500-mile coatal highway trail. Fermata has been involved in assessing the economic impact of outdoor recreation throughout the United States, and is preparing an economic and marketing feasibility study for the proposed World Birding Center in South Texas. Scholarship Fund Begun In Memory of Bob Close

The George Robert "Bob" Close Memorial Scholarship is being established for students entering Texas Tech Law School from any of the top 10 counties in the state of Texas, as well as his home county of Wheeler.

As a product of Shamrock, a Red Raider letterman, a Texas Tech graduate and an attorney in Perryton for 35 years, Close kept "close" ties to West Texas.

He graduated from the University of Texas Law School in 1957 with honors...the Texas Tech Law School was still a dream at that time. During the last years of his life, the Texas Tech Medical Center provided treatment for his Parkinson's disease. He died Oct. 19, 1998.

The 11 counties are significant because the people in the "top Ten" trusted him with their representation in the Texas House of Representatives for three terms-1975, 1977 and (Continued Page 2)

Co. Sheriff Burns Marijuana

Wheeler County Sheriff Jimmy Adams and Deputies Joel Finsterwald and Rick Walden cleaned the county sheriff's evidence locker of some 657 lbs. of marijuana.

The accumulation of weed was a result of several drug interdiction arrests along Interstate 40, according to Sheriff Adams. District Attorney John Mann gave the instruction for

the evidence to be destroyed. The estimated street value of the 657 lbs. of marijuana would be almost three quarters of a million dollars. The material was taken from the locker in a pickup and transported to the lot behind Wheeler County Pct 1 & 2 Barn, west of the Wheeler city limits. The seals were broken on the cardboard boxes and the bricks of marijuana were doused with diesel fuel and gasoline and set afire.

Although the early residents of Mobeetie were of a transient opportunist nature, even Charles Goodnight admitted there were a "few" genuinely good men and women who became settlers. Among the good men and women were many that became

iar today in the Texas Panhandle. As the officers at Fort Elliott began to bring their wives and families from the east to the fort and the settlers began to make permanent homes, the families began to socialize between the two establishments and a smart cosmopolitan air was lent to social and culture to the free and untrained social side of people versed in the realities of pioneer life.

Friendships and loyalties grew be-

the pioneers whose names are famil-

tween the military and the pioneer families. One incident in the fall of 1879 involving the military and civil authorities of Fort Elliott and Wheeler County reflects that relationship. A federal marshal named Norton, armed with blank warrants, was sent from the Dallas federal courts to the Panhandle. The marshal arrested persons whom he suspected of selling tobacco without paying a federal tax or having a merchant's license. Since most ranchers maintained a supply of personal items such as tobacco products for sale to the cowboy employees, it was not difficult for the marshal to find violators. Norton arrested more than a dozen ranchers from all over the region and took them to Mobeetie where he arranged to have them tried by County Judge Emanuel Dubbs. The recently elected, untrained Dubbs, feeling the ranchers to have been mistreated, acquitted all of those charged. Marshall Norton, enraged by the acquittals, arrested Judge Dobbs and re-arrested the tobacco tax violators. Other county officials interfered and were also arrested. Norton, having arrested all the county officials, took them and the ranchers to Fort Elliott for safe keeping when other citizens threatened violence. There were no officials anywhere in the area with authority to do anything about the arrests. The only authorities not under arrest were those of the military at Fort Elliott and Marshal Norton himself

Multi-County Theft Spree End Area Oil Field Case

A multi-county oil field theft spree has been ended with the arrest of 49year-old Gary Lynn Davis of Amarillo according to a press release issued today by the 31st-223rd Judicial District Attorney's Office in Pampa. District Attorney John Mann said

that more than 25 gas measurement meters belonging to K&N Energy Company of Pampa as well as various oil companies operating throughout Hemphill and Wheeler Counties were recovered as the result of efforts of the sheriff's departments in Gray, Wheeler and Hemphill Counties as well as the Texas Rangers and the investigative division of the District Attorney's Office.

Daivs, who remains in jail in Winkler County, Texas, in lieu of bond regarding charges that have been filed there, had been selling the stolen gas meters to a concern in Midland. When the purchaser became suspicious, authorities were notified, Davis was lured into picking up a check for some of the meters and was arrested at that time accoring to Mann.

The matter is scheduled to be presented to a grand jury in Gray County, Texas, on November 4, 1998, at which time an indictment for felony theft will be sought.

probably felt an undeniable allegiance to Norton, a federal government representative. He allowed some, and probably all, of the eighteen prisoners to be put in the Fort Elliott guardhouse. Feeling considerably less allegiance to Marshal Norton, Lieuten ant Henry O. Flipper, 10th cavalry, reputed to have been the first Negro graduate at West Point and a rather independently minded officer, during the night released all of the civilian prisoner from the guardhouse. He loaded them into a wagon and was personally escorting them to safety in the Indian Territory when either marshal Norton captured the party or the escapees decided to turn back and find a better way of solving the problem. Norton, one source reported took Judge Dobbs, Lieutenant Flipper and Captain Norton to Dallas where the two-army officers were tried and fined one thousand dollars each for interfering in the processes of law. Dobbs was released without fine, and Mar-

shal Norton was reprimanded.

Lt. Henry O. Flipper, was West Point's First Black Graduate on June 14, 1877, and American's First Black Officer. Flipper was commissioned a Second Lieutenant and was assigned to frontier duty with the all Black Tenth United States Cavalry at Fort Sill, Oklahoma in Indian Territory. In early 1879, Troop A of the Tenth Cavalry was ordered to Fort Elliott, Texas where Captain Nicholas Nolan, an Irishman, was made the command? ing officer. He appointed Lieutenant Flipper to be his adjutant, which was the ranking officer on the commanding Officer's staff. In addition to his adjutant duties, Flipper found time to map and survey the post and to help build a telegraph line from Fort Elliott to Fort Supply in Indian Territory Flipper was included in all the social affairs at Fort Elliott. He usually declined invitations to picnics and dance, preferring instead to spend his leisure time riding with Mollie Dwyer Captain Nolan's sister-in-law. Sundays, Lt. Flipper and Mollie joined other officers and their ladies chasing coyotes and jackrabbits on the plains. -Continued Next Week

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
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



ture tourism is the fastest growing segment of the tourist industry, averaging a 30% annual increase each vear since 1987. "On a local scale, that breaks down

to \$50 per day per visitor on food, lodging and travel items, with an additional \$200 spent for 'shopping' on a typical two-day visit," she concluded. "Nature tourists are mostly from

the city, mostly well-educated and well-off, and are tired of stress and traffic and just want to get away," Eubanks explained.

Ms. Farrar said that several studies of nature tourists support her belief that the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles offer "exactly what they are looking for: to experience nature, to be physically active, and to meet people who live in the area." Among the top attractions for those travelers are pretty scenery, wilderness, birds and wildlife, trees and wildflowers, streams and rural areas. "Wildlife management areas, such as the one we have at Gene Howe," Farrar said, offer some of the best birding and wildlife viewing in the world.

The November 17-18 workshop will be aimed at teaching business people, landholders, community leaders and agency employees how to build on those assets to attract visitors to this area. This will not be a theory-only seminar. Eubanks will lead a working session, presenting his research and then help interested parties develop a working plan with specific guidelines and goals.

The Economic Development council has invited residents of Hansford, Lipscomb, Wheeler, Roberts, Ochiltree and Gray counties in the Texas Panhandle, and residents of Ellis, Roger Mills and Harper counties in Oklahoma.
