OUR ENORMOUS FIRE LOSS

Nearly half a million dollars worth of property goes up in smoke every year in the United States. Thousands of lives are lost through fires that occur, many of them, through carelessness. The figures will probably indicate a higher loss this year. The campaign for carefulness seems to have missed a few cylinders. The average citizen insists upon

taking too many chances and the fire demon burns up too much property.

The figures carry a lesson to the people of Wheeler. It is the duty of every citizen to do his or her part to rut down the enormous economic waste. The only way to do this is to practice carefulness yourself. Don't bother about neighbor John, or Sister Sue; get lined up on the need of precaution and refrain from joining the ranks of those who wantonly and needlessly cause the thousands of fires which occur through carelessness.

Combine Food Dishes For Greater Economy

Combination main dishes offer a two-way economy, especially important for low cost meals when food costs are up, according to Louise Mason, Specialist in Food Preparation of the Extension Service of the A. M. College.

Such combinations, as macaroni and cheese, spaghetti and meat sauce, rice and meat stew, or creamed eggs on toast are familiar examples.

The economy in such dishes is that the inexpensive cereal foods "stretch" the meat, cheese or eggs and make them go farther in serving the family. A more important economy, however, is the other way around—the meat, eggs, milk, or cheese stretch or build up the nutritive value of the cereal foods.

The protein in grains or cereals is not complete. To be fully useful for growth and body repair, grain protein can be reinforced with animal protein. Therefore, if cereal foods, such as bread, flour and rice are to be used to the best advantage in the diet, thrifty housewives will combine them with at least a little milk, cheese, meat, or egg. In the union there is added strength and added flavor.

Dried skim milk at current prices is the cheapest food and one of the best for building up cereal protein.

The Viennese have always been expert at being and pastries. They way with Vienna Chocolate Iceing makes a cake frosting that's especially rich. Melt 4 squares unsweetened chocolate keeping the flame high to do a quick job of it. Then remove and add 1 cup confectioner's sugar, 2 tsp. hot water, blending thoroughly. Add 2 eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Then add 6 tsp. butter, two spoonful at a time remembering to beat well after each addition. Spread this mixture thickly over your layer cake. Then listen to the children say "Yummy."

Pottery is one of the greatest economizers of fuel because it retains heat so well. Never use a high fast flame for cooking food in pottery because it's a needless waste of gas and also, in time, cracks the glaze on the bottom. Preheat the pottery utensil with a medium low flame, then as soon as boiling begins, lower the flame to the lowest simmer point to maintain gentle boiling.

If you discover that raisins have become hard and dry after long pantry storage, here's how to plump them. Rinse in boiling water, drain, spread in a shallow pan, place in oven, turn the gas flame to moderate heat (about 350°). Takes about 10 to 15 minutes for the raisins to puff up. Raisins revived this way do not keep as long so plan to use them at once.

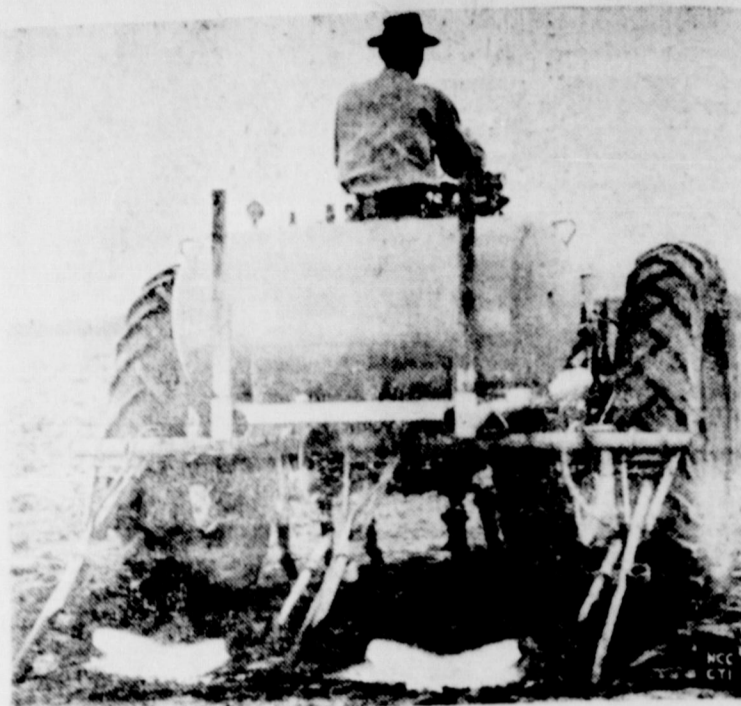

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I am going to be trained under Law 16 and would like to know if I can borrow money from Veterans Administration in case of need when I enter training?

A—Yes. Loans from a revolving fund, provided by Congress, not exceeding \$100 in any case, may be made to trainees commencing or undertaking vocational rehabilitation.

Q—Is vocational guidance available to veterans wishing to take on-the-job training or it this service offered only to disabled veterans?

A—Any veteran found eligible for education or training under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act is entitled to educational and vocational guidance provided by trained counselors at Veterans Administration Offices.

Q—Will payments made to schools, subsistence allowance or readjustment allowance paid to me be deducted later from any future bonus that may be authorized by Congress?

A—No.
Q—May a veteran, receiving disability compensation, receive at the same time subsistence all-

owance under Public Law 346, G. I. Bill?
A—Yes.

Approximately 30,000 veterans of World War II who suffered hearing impairments in service are eligible for a special program of medical rehabilitation that the Veterans Administration has established to help them overcome their handicap. Eligible veterans may take advantage of this program whether they require medical attention to

improve their hearing or if they need rehabilitation to come the handicap of a recent hearing impairment. The complete rehabilitation course includes a series of hearing and speech tests, the fitting of a hearing aid, audiology training, reading instructions and correction if necessary.

Louisiana State University-Baton Rouge is one of the institutions throughout the nation which the Veterans Administration has contracted to this service for veterans.

Opportunities for careers in forestry are described in a book of Information on Forestry Positions in Forestry which has been distributed to all Veterans Administration vocational centers.

Published by the Society of American Foresters in Washington, D. C., the booklet contains descriptions of positions in the forest service, requirements for positions, methods of applying for jobs, and possibly might be crowded.

Approximately 104,000 War II veterans are becoming skilled mechanics pair men under the job provisions of the G. I. Bill. Of some 600,000 men taking on-the-job mechanics led the list of salesmanship and retail management with 80,000 veterans. An executive is a worker job never ends.

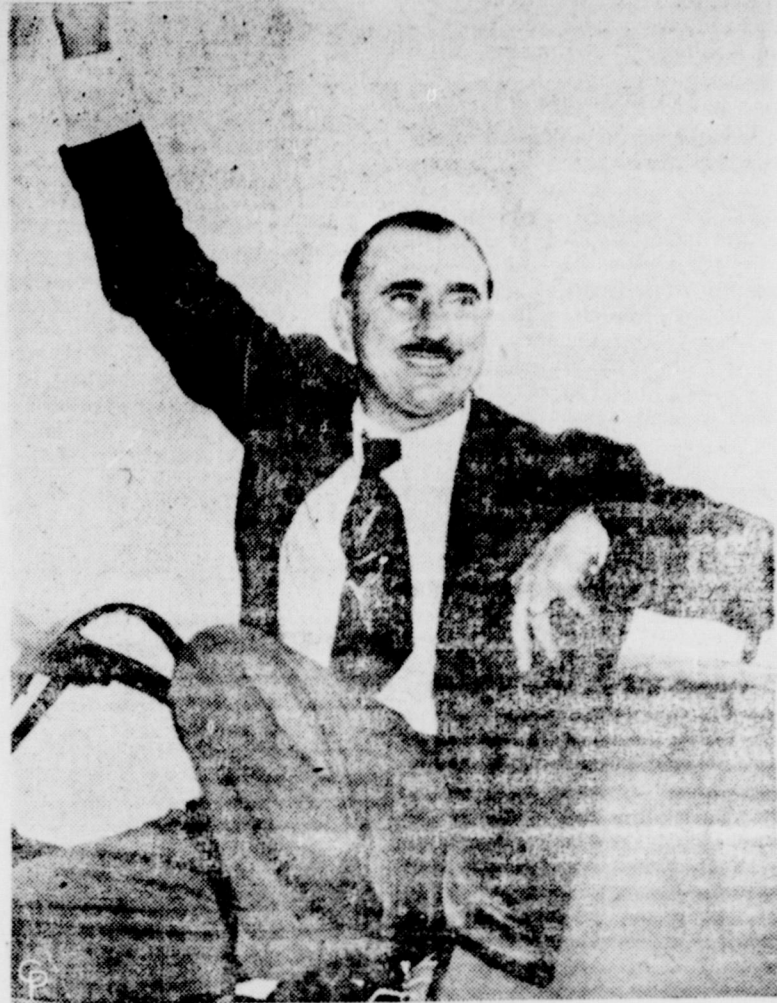

FARM FACTS
 WORTH KNOWING

Q. What is the cause of a cow giving bitter, rancid milk?
A. This trouble is usually due to the action of an enzyme known as lipase which is normally not present in milk but may occur in the last stages of the lactation period or in cows suffering from mastitis. It not due to mastitis, the trouble will usually disappear when the animal freshens or after she goes on pasture. The difficulty may be overcome by heating the milk to 145° F. and then cooling promptly.
Q. What factors should be considered in selecting the boar for the breeding herd?
A. The major factors to consider in selection of the herd boar are:
 1. Individuality or outward appearance.
 2. Ancestry or the inherited ability to produce strong, healthy and desirable offspring.
 3. Performance record or the test of production.
Q. After rabbits have been mated, is it advisable to have the does rebred?
A. Yes. The Rabbits at the Ralston Purina Research Farm recommends that rabbits be mated and the same pair remated five hours later. Then, because of the possibility of does going through a period of pseudopregnancy (false pregnancy) all does are rebred again on the 10th day.
Q. My five-month-old capons are developing breast blisters. These capons have been raised on wire since they were four weeks old. Is there any way to get rid of these blisters, and will they affect the quality of the meat?
A. These breast blisters are no doubt caused by irritation from the wire floors. Raising the birds on slat floors will prevent most of this trouble. Blisters that become punctured and infected would make the carcass unsalable. But ordinary breast blisters do not affect the quality of the meat although they do hurt the appearance of the carcass when dressed.
