### W. E. TAYLOR DIES SUDDENLY AT SHAMROCK

Funeral services for Bill Taylor, Sr., who succumbed at his home in Shamrock, Wednesday morning, will be held from the Shamrock Methodist Church at 10 a. m. Friday. Rev. S. N. Dunning, pastor, will be in charge of the rites, assisted by Rev. S. Y. Allgood, pastor of the Wheeler Methodist Church.

Interment will be in Shamrock Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Death came to Mr. Taylor suddenly at 10:45 a. m. Wednesday. His wife and daughters, Mrs. W. H. Walker and Mrs. Harvey Close, were with him when death came suddenly.

Mr. Taylor had not been in good health for almost three years and for the past several months had been confined to his home. He suffered a heart attack while he and Mrs. Taylor were making their home on a farm just outside Wheeler, and they moved to Shamrock to be nearer their children. His cheerful attitude never left him in an illness that he accepted as worsening.

A retired stockman, former City Marshal of Shamrock, ex-Texas Ranger, and inspector for the Cattle Raisers Association, Mr. Taylor lived a vigorous, outdoor life, typical of so many early settlers. He had lived in Wheeler County 45 years and he and his family counted as personal friends hundreds of residents of the Panhandle and Western Oklahoma.

William Edgar Taylor, Sr., was born November 4, 1879, at Friona, Texas. He and Mrs. Taylor were married at Mangum, Okla., in March, 1903, and moved to Wheeler county the following December. He united with the Methodist Church in 1905 and was a member of the Shamrock Methodist Church.

He is survived by his widow and four children, Mrs. W. H. Walker, Mrs. Harvey Close and W. E. Taylor, Jr., of Shamrock, and Mrs. J. G. Dyer of Oklahoma City; three sisters, Mrs. Eva Lee and Mrs. Linda Clay of Wheeler, Mrs. Lottie Davis of Phoenix, and one brother, Loyd Taylor of Capitan, New Mexico.

### Sprinkler Irrigation Demonstration Is Set For Next Wednesday

A demonstration of a sprinkler irrigation system will be given all day Wednesday, December 22, at the Southwestern Public Service Company's Jowett plant northwest of Wheeler according to County Agent W. K. Frey.

The sprinkler system of irrigation at Jowett is a cooperative demonstration between the Southwestern Public Service Co. and the County Agricultural Agent, and will be carried on for one year on a 17-acre plot to demonstrate the value of sprinkler irrigation in this county on grain sorghums, cotton, wheat, pasture and possibly alfalfa.

All Thomas of Wheeler will farm the 17-acre plot and costs of all operations will be kept to show the profit above installation costs of a well and sprinkler irrigation pipe.

All persons interested in sprinkler irrigation are invited to come out and see it in use.

### KEVA OPENING IS DELAYED

An unexpected delay in construction of its 200-ft. tower will postpone opening of the Panhandle radio station, KEVA, at Shamrock until the first week of January, John Kennedy manager, said Tuesday.

Kennedy and his staff were expecting arrival of the tower momentarily when a telegram came Tuesday from the Wincharger Corporation, Sioux City, Iowa, saying shipment could not be made until December 20. Failure to obtain needed steel was blamed by the tower manufacturing company.

Manager Kennedy and his KEVA staff had thought the station would hit the airways not later than December 20. The Western Electric transformer and related electronics equipment have been installed, the studio and business office has been set up, and the staff has been completed. The station is ready to go on the air as soon as the tower is erected and FCC equipment and program tests have been made.

If the tower is shipped from Sioux City Monday it should arrive by Christmas. Allowing a week for its erection and equipment tests, the station should be ready to start programming by Monday, January 3.

KEVA will operate on a frequency of 1580 kilocycles on a day-time basis. It will feature a 24-hour United Press teletype news service and local news and programs from the towns of McLean, Wheeler, Erick, Wellington and Shamrock. Its recorded musical programs will come from the Lang-Worth Program Service. KEVA already has a library of 6,000 songs and is adding 60 new selections monthly.

Five-minute newscasts are planned every hour, giving listeners the quickest available coverage of state, national and world happenings. There will be three 15 minute newscasts and two or three sports and market casts daily.

Station KEVA will appreciate program suggestions from people of the 5-town area and rural communities it plans to serve. Especially does the station want the names of persons who might sing or play on guest programs. Schools, women's clubs, farm groups, luncheon clubs, American Legion, Veteran of Foreign Wars, etc., are invited to avail themselves of KEVA's facilities. There is no charge for programs of a public service nature.

**Editorial**  
**NEW INDUSTRIES SHOULD BE SELECTED**  
 The effort to secure industry has caused many communities to go hog-wild on the acquisition of new industries. Dennis O'Harrow, a State planner, recently warned that some attention should be

paid to the mortality rate of small and established businesses and that thought should be given, in connection with securing industries, to the effect that the new industry will have on the local economy.

Somewhat along the same line, Dr. Victor Roterus, of the U. S. Department of Commerce, points out that a little expansion along selected development lines "is better than a lot of expansion without any consideration as to what a community or area is really looking for."

In effect, we suspect that the gentlemen are trying to tell the people of the nation that they should work toward a balance between industry and agriculture rather than to become over-industrialized along any particular line. We think the observation has merit and that Wheeler, for example, in its quest for new industries, should intelligently select the types of industry encouraged to settle in this area.

It is good to have a balance between agriculture and industry but it is just as bad to be over-balanced from an industrial standpoint as from an agricultural standpoint. Of course, Wheeler has a long way to go before the threat of over-industrialization will be patent, but no community loses anything by intelligent planning.

**SCIENTISTS TEST THE ATOM**

The Atomic Energy Commission reports that about one ounce of radio-active atom is shipped each year to sixteen foreign nations and more than three hundred important laboratories of medicine, biology, chemistry, agriculture and industry in the United States.

The ounce of atoms is mixed with a solution or a little powder that brings the weight of the shipments to ten pounds but the protective wrappings amount to over fifty tons annually.

The use of radio-active atoms in various phases of man's enterprise is still experimental but thousands of research projects are underway. In all fields of human activity, serious-minded scientists are endeavoring to find out what the radio-active atoms can do for man.
