MUSTANGS TO PLAY MEMPHIS

The Wheeler Mustangs will get their first test of the 1948 season Friday night when they meet the Memphis Cyclone in a non-conference encounter on the Memphis gridiron. The contest will be a regulation affair and will be the first outing of the season for either the Mustangs or the Memphis eleven.

Last Friday night the Wheeler Mustangs held a practice scrimmage with the McLean griders and the sight beheld by local spectators was unusually pleasing and it appears now that the Mustangs will be a formidable eleven this fall if they continue to show the spirit and drive they displayed in their scrimmage session with the Tigers last Friday night.

The Mustangs have not been put on the scales for any official weights yet this season and Coach Bernard Smith has not yet officially announced a probable starting line-up but it appears that he will be able to field a fairly well balanced team which will have a good deal of experience at key positions and some new lads are working in well in spots where there are no veterans to take over.

Although school has not opened yet and the pep squad has not been formed, it is hoped a large crowd of local supporters will follow the Mustangs to Memphis Friday night and cheer them on to victory in the opening contest of the 1948 season and it appears to the writer that it is very probable the Mustangs can bring home a victory for this first encounter even though Memphis is a Class A eleven.

WHEELER IN LEAGUE FINALS

The Wheeler Baseball team is now engaged in tournaments at Booker and Sayre, Okla. and will participate in the play-offs of the West Texas-Oklahoma League during the next two days.

Sunday and Monday the Wheeler nine will play Booker in an independent tournament and they are scheduled to play in the semifinals of the Sayre tournament Friday night, Sept. 3 and should they win that contest they will play again Tuesday night at Sayre.

The Wheeler team which finished in third place in the West Texas-Oklahoma League will meet the second place Sweetwater team in the first play-off game at Sayre under the lights next Thursday night, September 9. Shamrock and Kelton are the other two teams in the play-off and they will meet at Shamrock Sunday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock.

Last Sunday the Wheeler team finished their regular league schedule by downing the fast Briscoe nine by a count of 7 to 2 behind the six-hit pitching of Billy J. Darnell. Cooper pitched for the losers and allowed only seven hits but gave up 13 walks due to wildness which was probably the difference in the two ball clubs.

LEE CLEMENT IS CHARGED IN CATTLE THEFT

Lee Clement, 20-year-old Clarendon man, has been charged with cattle theft in connection with the theft of 17 head of dairy cattle from the Hank Miller farm, 15 miles northwest of Wheeler, on the night of August 14. Tom Braly of Pampa, district attorney, announced the charge Sunday following filing of a complaint by Sheriff Jess Swink.

The theft was discovered last Friday by T. J. Clemens of Clarendon and his son-in-law, W. H. Whittenburg of Twitty, owners of the cattle, when they went to the Miller farm where they had pastured some of their cattle and found 17 were missing. Lee Clement, the accused man, is a son of T. J. Clement.

Clement was arrested at his Clarendon home and brought to Wheeler where he waived examining trial after making a statement to the district attorney, Justice of the Peace A. C. Wood set bond at \$2500.

Sheriff Swink and Deputy Sheriff Charlie Nixon of Mobeetie, started an immediate investigation when the theft was reported last Friday. They found where the rear wheels of a truck had been sunk in pits for loading cattle. Nearby they found where a truck had mired in a shallow lake bed. Evidence showed that another vehicle had been used to haul the truck from the lake bed.

The officers made a trip to Wheeler garages and truckers to learn if any of them had been called to pull a truck from the lake bed. They met success when they found Carol Pettit, Wheeler trucker. Pettit said a man called him on Sunday morning, August 15, telling him that a truck was stuck on the Miller farm. Pettit said he drove to the location where he was informed that the men, two of them, had bought the truckload of cows.

Pettit said he hauled the truck to the pavement and the men drove away. He knew nothing of the theft until contacted by the officers. He furnished a good description of the men.

Ranger Kelly Rogers of Amarillo assisted Sheriff Swink and Deputy Nixon in breaking the case.

GRAIN PURCHASE IS EXPLAINED

A Purchase Agreement is an agreement between the producer of the grain and the Commodity Credit Corporation in which the CCC agrees to purchase from the producer not more than a specified number of pounds of the particular grain. If the grain is delivered to the CCC, settlement will be based on the applicable loan rate for the grade of grain delivered.

Under the agreement the producer can deliver to CCC fewer bushels of grain than specified in the contract but he cannot deliver more.

The producer takes the entire responsibility for storage of the grain.

Signing the agreement does not prohibit the producer from selling the grain on the market at any time during the life of the agreement.

Wheat, corn, oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums are eligible for purchase agreements—but the purchase agreement must be signed by the producer not later than December 31, 1948.

The producer can request delivery instructions from the County Agricultural Conservation Committee or surrender his receipt for warehouse-stored grain within a 30-day period after the maturity date on loans for the kind of grain to be delivered.

The maturity dates on the grain loans are: April 30, 1949.

A producer may sign a purchase agreement without taking out a loan.

A producer may take a loan on part of his grain and also sign a purchase agreement on part of it. If a producer executes a purchase agreement and later takes out a loan no refund of the services fee will be made. It will be necessary for the producer to pay the service fee on the loan the same as if no purchase agreement had been executed. Similarly both

All County Men To Register At Local P. O. 70 Register In 3 Days

Registration for America's peacetime draft got under way Monday morning at the local post office with 25 men in the 25-year-old age group registering the first day. Forty-five men in the 23 and 24-year-old age classification registered Tuesday and Wednesday to bring the total for the three days up to 75.

Cliff R. Weatherly, local member of the draft board stated this week that the only registering place in the county would be at the Wheeler post office and all three employees of the post office, Chester Lewis, postmaster, Virgil Jamison and Lester Robertson, clerks, have been named official registrars.

The initial registration period will continue through September 18 according to plans set forth by the Selective Service Board.

LOAN PROGRAM EXPLAINED BY ACA SECRETARY

Commodity Credit Corporation has set a floor price under the grain sorghum crop in Wheeler County of \$2.27 per hundred. This is done by means of both the Loan Program and the Purchase Agreement Program. However, there is a serious shortage of storage space for the 1948 crop since there is an expected increase of one billion bushels of grain over last year's crop and the available storage is full of wheat. This means that producers are going to have to provide their own storage or sell crops at harvest at a low price.

Through the years farmers have been developing ways of increasing production of their land by use of legume crops, fertilizer, hybrid seed, better cultivation, and other similar practices; but they haven't stopped to think about the seriousness of storage facilities, and it's direct connection to the job of keeping prices at a substantial level. Every farm needs some type of storage—in this part of the country the essential type is grainaries. You can't expect a producer to make money if he does raise a good crop and then sell it at a price below what it actually cost him to produce it.

Before your grain is harvested why not look into the possibilities of providing your farm with adequate storage facilities. The requirements for a C.C.C. specified bin are: (1) Hold the grain without loss of quantity; (2) Protect grain against weather conditions which may cause deterioration of quality; (3) Afford reasonable protection against thieves, rodents, birds, poultry, and insects; (4) Permit effective fumigation for the destruction of insects; (5) Provide reasonable safety from fire and wind; (6) Require forcible breaking in order to be entered after sealing.

The above named requirements must be met in the granary to obtain a loan.

After the grain is in storage the producer must then apply for a loan at his local ACA office. The grain must have been stored at least 30 days when the inspector shall measure, sample the grain and seal the bin. The sample is then sent to a recognized warehouse by the ACA where it will be graded. If the grades show that the grain meets or passes CCC specifications then the loan will be made and the producer will pay \$3.00 or 2c per cwt., whichever is greater, to the ACA as a service fee. Grain must be obtained before December 31, 1948. The

Anglin Is Winner Stevenson Carries County 854 To 666

Lloyd Anglin was re-elected county commissioner of precinct 1 by a 22-vote margin over Frank Lee, in the only contested local race in last Saturday's run-off primary.

Anglin polled 361 votes to Lee's 339. By boxes the vote was: Mobeetie, Lee 263, Anglin 50; Wheeler, Anglin 259, Lee 51; Briscoe, Anglin 52, Lee 25.

The precinct 1 commissioner's race brought an even 700 voters to the polls in the three boxes. This was only 60 votes less than the number cast in the July primary when Anglin nosed out Lee by 1 vote in a field of four candidates. The July vote was: Anglin 241, Lee 240, W. L. Erwin 188 and Alfred M. Hill 91.

But while balloting was heavy in the Mobeetie, Wheeler and Briscoe boxes, it was light in all other 15 county voting places. A total of 1,520 votes were cast in the Senate race Saturday compared to 2,110 in July.

COKE R. STEVENSON

Coke Stevenson, ex-governor who never suffered political defeat in 28 years of public office-holding, won the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senate Saturday in the closest race in Texas' long history. Stevenson had a lead of approximately 300 votes over Congressman Lyndon Johnson when the unofficial county of the Texas Election Bureau was completed Wednesday. The 60-year-old ex-governor carried 12 of Wheeler county's 18 voting boxes to pile up a lead of 188 over Congressman Johnson who had the editorial support of Wheeler county newspapers.

LLOYD ANGLIN

Lloyd Anglin of Wheeler was winner over Frank Lee of Mobeetie in the precinct 1, county commissioner race, Saturday by the narrow margin of 22 votes. Lee received a majority of 213 in the Mobeetie box and Anglin carried the Wheeler box by 208 votes; Briscoe deciding the outcome by casting 52 for Anglin and 25 for Lee. This will be Anglin's third term.

School surveys everywhere in Texas and the United States reveal that from eighty percent to ninety-nine plus percent of the school children are affected to more or less degree with dental disease. This high incidence then unquestionably gives dental health an important place in the field of general health.

Editorial

EXCEEDING INCOMES

The prime difficulty in gaining an accurate picture of economic conditions in disordered postwar years is due appreciably to warped, magnified appraisals of limited aspects of the complete situation.

Government controls were held forth by their sponsors as a "cure-all," while the opposition concentrated on the panacea of production as the only remedy, and later shifted to the other side of the problem by stating that excess money supply was the primary cause of our troubles. The element of partial truth gave weight to all these contentions.

More recently economic analysts have been viewing with alarm the fact that 28 percent of American families are living beyond their incomes and savings have declined appreciably. Inflation principally and post-war self-indulgence as a reaction to wartime denial have aggravated the normal American penchant for extravagance and for "keeping up with the Joneses."

These cases of living beyond income have their own cures. When savings and credit are exhausted, such families are forced to live within their incomes if they have not been able to increase them to meet demands. Hardship in varying degrees results, but it is partially offset by the gain in experience, in enforced self-discipline and denial. This normal operation of cause and effect is cushioned only when government subsidies are provided the improvident. These gifts, too, prevent people from gaining a sound perspective of economic conditions—many diagnoses and remedies for which create a veritable mental Tower of Babel for the American people.

THE BOMB NOT ENOUGH

The atomic bomb, by itself, is not a complete weapon, declares Lieut.-Gen. Leslie R. Groves, who headed the project that developed the bomb.

The General warns the people of the United States that it is not sufficient for us to pin our hopes on a single weapon or a single arm—such as the atomic bomb or air power by itself. He maintains that this country must protect itself by a properly balanced military establishment, including air, ground and sea forces.

The General is telling the people of the United States that the day of push-button warfare has not arrived. The statement cannot be repeated too often because of the danger that the people of this country may become convinced that a future war may be won by bombs or by scientific devices and that there is no necessity for the individuals composing our population to put themselves to any inconvenience in connection with national defense.

People vs. Polio

Under good and under poor sanitary conditions. Ninety-five per cent of those attacked are children. That is what arouses our sympathy and our pity. ALL OF US WANT TO HELP.

This dreaded disease has sifted hard and for this reason the writer has compiled the following information with the one thought in mind—not that of causing undue anxiety or worry or any hysteria among the citizens of this community, but to enlighten the people of a few known points on polio and stressing the vital importance that we

work individually and collectively, taking all precautions possible to keep our community clean and take all measures known, to inhibit the spread of the disease.

The questions and answers set forth in the following article are set forth for YOUR attention and with the hope in mind that YOU will do your utmost to cooperate in the health program here in Wheeler County to fight polio. The importance cannot be emphasized too greatly.

So far this year, almost 1,000 Texans have suffered the ravages of the dreaded crippler of children—polio. While it has not yet assumed the epidemic stage, the current outbreak in Texas is certainly extensive enough to warrant close examination of the factors in its control.

Q What is the health department doing to curb the present high incidence rate of this disease?
A Polio is a disease the germ of which thrives in filth. The virus of polio has been found in the nasal and respiratory passages and in the intestinal tract of human beings. It has been isolated from the body secretions and excretions. It is therefore apparent any control measures adopted should include attempts to prevent the spread of virus from these sources.

Eliminate Filth

The secret of eliminating polio can be told in two simple words—ELIMINATE FILTH. It could be wiped out by the simple expedient of being clean, individually and collectively. The health department's part in collective cleanliness is—conducting fly, mosquito and rodent elimination programs, inspecting domestic water supplies, supervising swimming pool, inspecting garbage disposal system, staging clean-up campaigns and the city-wide spraying with DDT.

Q What is known of the manner in which polio is spread?

A In all the outbreaks investigated, it is the general impression that there have usually been two and sometimes three possible transmitting agents involved—the house fly, the mosquito and the rat. It can be said without qualification that the fly can transmit polio. This has been proved repeatedly in experimental work, both in laboratories and in the field. Evidence shows that flies are vectors but does not show how important they are by comparison to other modes of transmission.

Q How do flies and other vectors of the disease come in contact with the virus?

A It has been found that polio virus has appeared in the stools of polio patients. It has been found in the sewage of Chicago during an epidemic and a percentage of the flies caught in the toilet rooms of polio patients were found to be carrying the virus. Fly specks from a fly which had been in contact with the intestinal discharges of a polio patient, caused paralysis in a monkey when the animal was inoculated. And if that isn't conclusive evidence that human excreta provides an excellent medium for the polio virus here is a fact that should clinch it.

Investigation of the disease shows that the polio virus was found in the nose and throat discharges four days after cases were dismissed, but in the bowel discharges, the virus was found 120 days after dismissal from the hospital. We are all familiar with the way flies are attracted to sewage and uncovered waste deposits. From this filth, they may enter the house and contaminate food and eating utensils. There is evidence that this may be a way in which the disease is spread. As for rats as an agent, the virus has been found in rat droppings.

When people are unaware that food has been contaminated in this manner, they may eat food that makes them liable to infection. As far as mosquitoes are concerned, we know that they are the vector of a disease called Equine Encephalitis, which symptoms are very similar to polio, in fact so similar that it is difficult to tell the difference except by an autopsy. Mosquitoes have been incriminated by some authorities.

Spread of Polio

Q Is there anything to the claim that polio can be spread from one person to another?

A Polio is an infectious disease because there is very definitely something to personal contact with a polio patient, being the way in which the virus is spread. There is good evidence of direct and indirect contact being the responsible factors. Droplet infection—that is, the drops of saliva released to the air by coughing, sneezing, or heavy breathing—may well be one of the means by which a person gets infected. Perhaps there are many abortive cases to one case developing paralysis. Very few people ever go to bed with these abortive cases. They feel peaked, have a stiff neck and a headache, and they may think it is only a touch of the flu or a summer cold. In reality it may be one of these abortive cases of polio.

Q Are these people actually carriers of the disease?

A That is one of the real tragedies of polio. Experts estimate that during any epidemic or widespread

outbreak, there will be from 100 to 500 "light" cases to every case developing paralysis. These so-called "light" cases are so many walking carriers of the disease. They use public toilets, eat in public restaurants, mingle with the crowds, all totally ignorant of the fact that they may be instrumental in passing the horrible affliction of polio on to others.

Q Can polio be prevented?

A As stated before the control of polio is both an individual and a community responsibility. It is virtually impossible for the state and local health departments and local police officials to carry the load themselves. The following are a few of the steps the community as a whole can take in preventing polio. There should be a thorough checking of out-door toilets, garbage pickup and disposal and spraying. All sewer connections should be properly made. Garbage should be buried and covered immediately or incinerated. City-wide spraying, treating garbage cans, dairies, slaughter houses, and food warehouses should be accomplished.

Q What is the individual's responsibilities in such a campaign to fight polio?

A As far as the homeowner is concerned he should be scrupulous in maintaining sanitary conditions on his premises. All the doors and windows of his house should be screened, and those screens should be sprayed thoroughly with a 5 per cent solution of light oil-base DDT. All of the out-buildings, such as garages, wash houses, and the like should be sprayed. The spray will not hurt shrubbery, but if animals or pets are to be sprayed, a 5 per cent water soluble solution should be used. Service stations and restaurants should be kept spotlessly clean, and the operators should keep in mind that heat and chlorine are the only practicable two agents capable of killing the polio virus.

Q What basic sanitation is recommended for the control of other filth-borne diseases?

A We all know that good health is a condition of environment, and the most effective means of insuring a high standard of public health is education in basic sanitation. As a matter of fact, 20 per cent of all disease can be traced directly to poor habits of personal hygiene. The health department makes the following recommendations with respect to basic sanitation. These

things should be practiced as a matter of personal pride, not to mention their worth as health insurance.

They are: First—take steps to see that human waste is properly disposed of. Second—protect all milk, water and other food supplies against contamination. Third—eliminate the breeding places of flies, mosquitoes, cockroaches, and all other loathsome insects. Fourth—inaugurate rodent control measures. Make sure that rats and mice do not have free run of your household and ground. Fifth—insure the proper sanitation of your home by encouraging each member of the family to practice these simple rules of basic sanitation.

The doctors, the health officers of your community and YOU are all playing on the same team and the more interest we show and the closer cooperation, the more assured we will be of winning the game against polio.

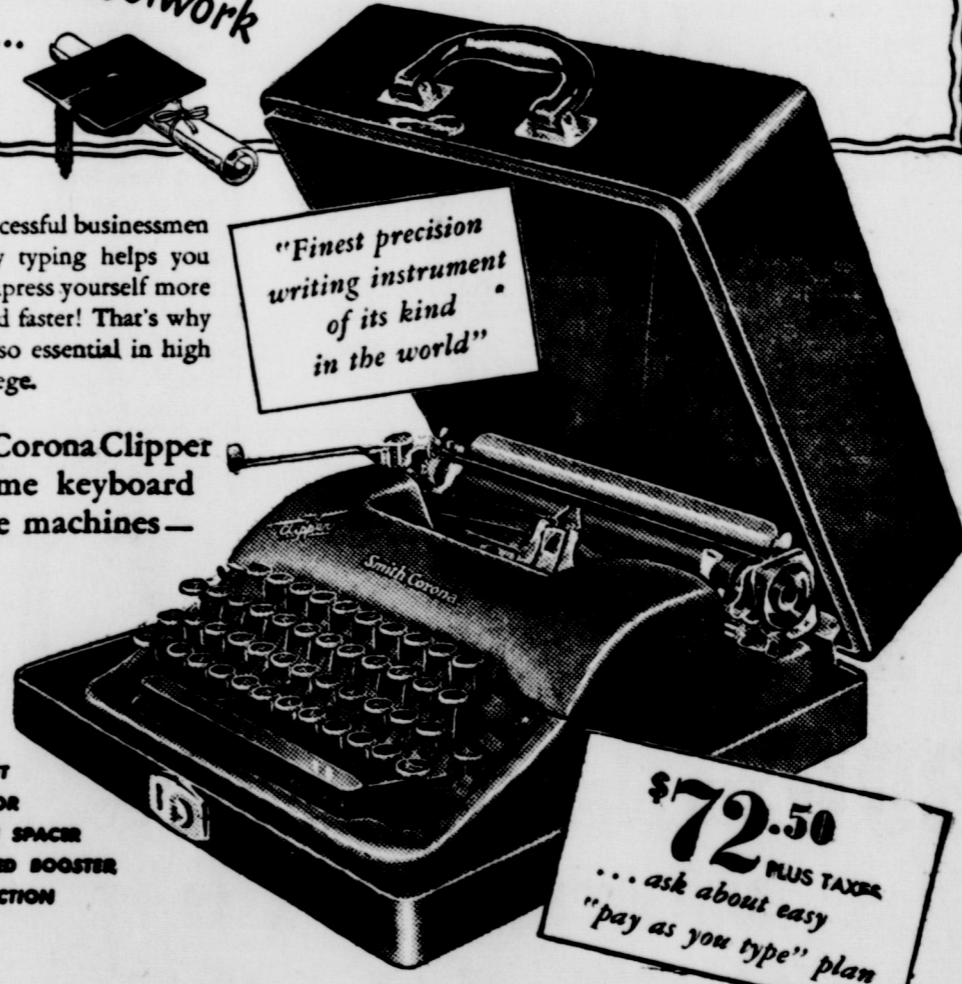

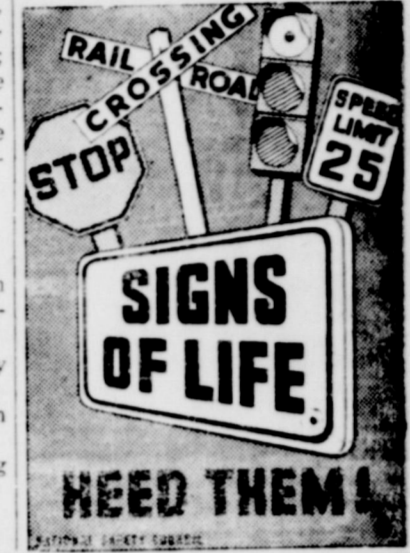

1/2 cup liquid oil, peas, or water
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1/2 cup fine corn flake crumbs
1/4 cup hot shortening
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup liquid oil, peas, or water
2 cups drained peas, cooked or canned

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Cut steak into pieces for serving. Sprinkle mixture of 1 1/2 teasp. salt and few grains pepper on both sides of meat. NEWS IN WORLD OF RELIGION

By W. W. REID

New York City presents the greatest missionary challenge of any city or territory in America or the World," in the opinion of Dr. Mark A. Dawber, executive secretary of the Home Missions Council of North America. Dr. Dawber says that surveys show that of the 7,908,000 people in New York City, at least 3,500,000 — a population equal to that of the city of Chicago — are without active membership in any Protestant or Catholic church or Jewish congregation. "New York City is now approaching the point in its history where secularism is destined to become the majority faith," he says.

Protestantism, Catholicism, and Judaism are all "minority groups in New York City," Dr. Dawber asserts.

The post-war mayor of the port city of Nagasaki — the city upon which the second atomic bomb fell in Japan — is an active Christian and a member of the Methodist Church there. Mayor Matsumoto was educated at Kentucky Wesleyan College, Winchester, Ky., and later

Staffs at both cities have declined from upwards of 750 to skeleton forces, matching the dwindling of available surplus property in the areas. Cut-off date for applications has been set by the regional office as August 23. A small arms firing range located at Fort Bliss near El Paso is also being offered. Included are 1984 acres and one building. Priorities on this disposal will expire August 24.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Veterans planning to get under the wire in buying surplus property before end of the War Assets Administration priority system August 31 will benefit from attending new sales planned for August. Latest Texas sale announced by the regional office will involve eight lots of materials at two San Antonio locations. Items offered will include flying glasses, infra red lamps, and some very used office equipment, an air compressor, magnaflex machine and photograph equipment. Inspection may be made at Kelly Field and Fort Sam Houston Thursday, August 26. The sale by bidding will be held at WAA warehouse, 610 S. Flores St., San Antonio, on August 27.

Surplus housing is again available to Texans at both sealed bid and on the spot War Assets sales of camp buildings. Biggest offering will be approximately 2,000 structures to be marketed at the Camp Shelby, Mississippi, location August 24, 25, and 26. It will be an auction-type, cash and carry procedure. Another non-priority offering includes a dental clinic, barracks, mess halls, administration and other structures making up a total of 19 at Amarillo and Childers Air Fields. Bids are on special forms which may be secured from the Grand Prairie office of real property disposal. Deadline for this sale will be September 3.

World War II veterans are again reminded of their opportunity to purchase 17 government vehicles by submitting written bids at the WAA office August 29. Several of the machines are at the Temple VA hospital with others near Dallas, Midland, El Paso and McGregor. Bids must be accompanied by a 25 per cent deposit. The awards will be made at the Customer Service Center of the Grand Prairie office beginning at 10 a.m. August 29.

An unexpected withdrawal of about \$900,000 worth of surplus hand tools at Camp Bowie, Brownwood, brought about cancellation of a War Assets sale there planned for August 20. The tools were claimed by Army Ordnance for national defense needs. Meanwhile, sufficient utility facilities for a Texas town were going on sale at this camp. The utilities include water, telephone gas and electrical systems. The period for priorities will expire August 27, following which remaining materials will be offered on a non priority basis.

The War Assets Administration's southwest region will undergo another contraction August 31. One result will be the closing of WAA offices at both San Antonio and

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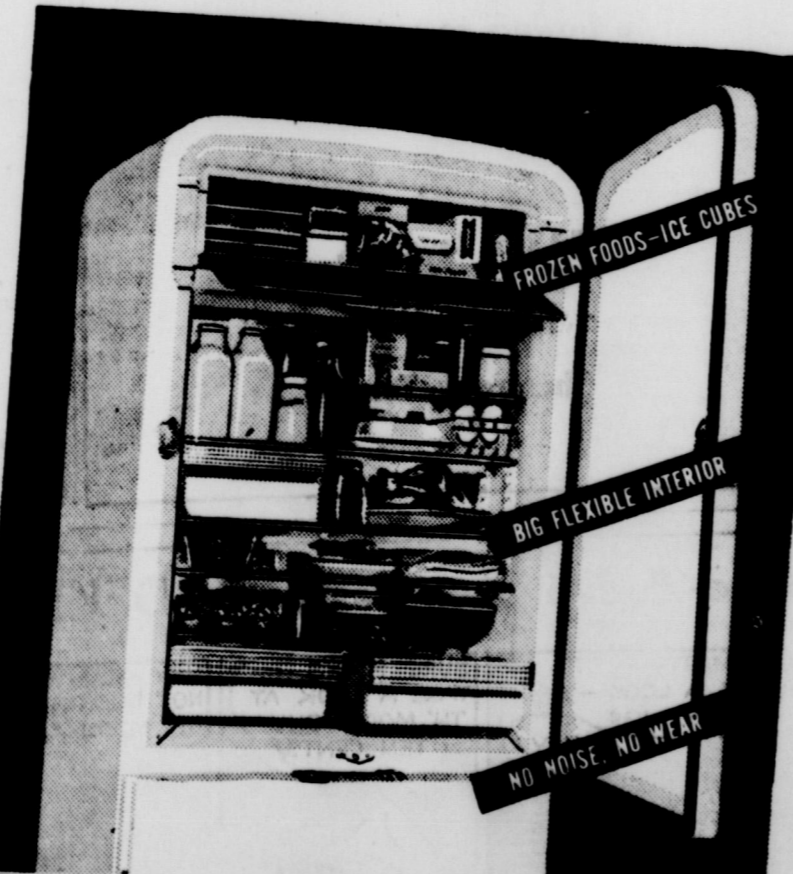

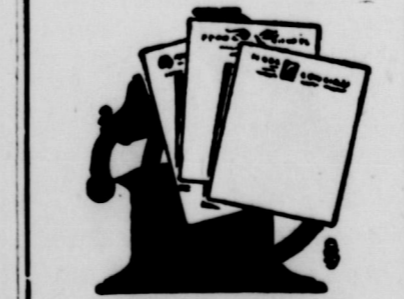

Veterans' News

Veterans Administration advised veterans to give their National Service Life Insurance policies periodic "three-way checks" to make certain that their NSLI programs are consistent with their plans, obligations and incomes.

The "three-way check" should cover (1) beneficiaries, both principal and contingent; (2) manner in which proceeds are to be paid to beneficiaries; and (3) amount and type of NSLI in force.

Changes in family status or family income often require a veteran to change the method of NSLI settlement. He may elect to have his NSLI proceeds paid to his beneficiary in a lump sum or in equal monthly installments ranging from 36 to lifetime income.

60 Texans Have Died Result Appendicitis In First Five Months

Sixty Texans died as the result of appendicitis during the first five months of 1948, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

Appendicitis killed 60,000 people in the United States and Canada last year, Dr. Cox said. He warned that young adults are especially susceptible to attacks, and that appendicitis is a leading cause of death among children and adolescents.

"Operative techniques have been improved to the extent that an unruptured appendix can be removed with great safety," Dr. Cox said.

He said it was imperative that the patient lie quiet until the doctor comes as moving about disturbs the inflamed parts. He strongly urged against taking laxatives in cases of suspected appendicitis.
