Editorial

TOWARD UNIFIED WESTERN BLOC

Two proposals are now made which will together constitute a milestone in the drift of the United Nations toward either

final success or complete disintegration. Location of the milestone on one or the other of these two roads will be determined by success or failure of the two present proposals.

These proposals are (1) to form an alliance between the United States and Canada for military aid to the 5-power Western European Union, and (2) to call a Western European parliament for the purpose of strengthening that area through political, economic and military solidarity. The two proposals are complementary. One can not succeed without the other.

These two proposals constitute the most important move yet made to by-pass the U. N. At the same time they constitute the most important move yet made to circumvent the disastrous effects of Russia's use of the veto which is destroying the U. N. If the leaders of the Western Powers go ahead with these two projects, they have definitely set out on the longer of two possible roads to the objective of world organization. They have adopted the strategy of co-operating against the Soviet sphere for lack of a means of cooperating with it.

It is the wise course because it is the only course. While it has been the subject of speculation for some time, it was undoubtedly precipitated in the news dispatches Sunday by announcement that Russia will not lift the Berlin blockade even in return for commitments which are little more than a face-saver for the Western Powers in the present crisis. They have been traveling the road of appeasement—call it what you please. It is about as successful as the same course against Hitler proved to be. A strong confederacy must be set up within the U. N. to meet the strategy of the strong confederacy that has already been set up by Russia and its satellites.—From Dallas News

WAR? NOT NOW SAYS ROYALL

Kenneth C. Royall, Secretary of the Army, advances the opinion that war is not likely in the near future in the absence of some "accidental or unintentional occurrence."

Mr. Royall makes it plain, however, that the question of war or peace is not in the hands of the American people "but in the hands of a few despotic and powerful men." Apparently, he includes in this group the representatives of several nations.

Mr. Royall calls attention to the successes scored by the Communists in Europe by fraud and by pressure tactics and suggests that Moscow has been "emboldened" by these successes. Consequently, he says, the Communists have attempted to apply the same tactics to United States and other nations.

Cranberry Twist Coffee Cake



Twists of sweet yeast dough bridge the cranberry filling of this coffee cake. Extra plamour is added by the drizzle of confectioners sugar icing.

Cranberry twist coffee cake is one of those appealing hot breads which are almost too attractive to eat. But just break away one of the lattice-like sections and taste the wonderful combination of tart cranberries and sweet yeast dough.

In spite of its intricate appearance, the coffee cake is easy to make and can be duplicated as often as the family demands. Even the end of the cranberry season need not put this recipe out of circulation, for canned whole cranberry sauce may be used as filling.

In food value, coffee cake is always in season. In its yeast dough base is enriched flour, a basic food which provides B-vitamins, iron, protein and food energy. Flour is so versatile and economical that it should be used generously.

Serve cranberry twist coffee cake as breakfast bread, mid-afternoon treat or supper dessert. It shapes up into some of the best eating you've had.

CRANBERRY TWIST COFFEE CAKE

- 2 packages yeast, compressed or dry granular
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3 cups sifted enriched flour (about)
- Cranberry Filling

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add shortening, sugar, and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add two cups flour, beating well. Add softened yeast and beaten eggs. Mix well. Add remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled in bulk (about two hours). When dough is rising, make filling. When dough is light, punch down. Divide into two equal portions. Cover and let rest 10 minutes. Roll each portion into a rectangular sheet about 10 inches long and 15 inches wide. Cover half the sheet of dough with Cranberry Filling. Cut the other half of the sheet of dough into even number of strips three-fourths inch wide, cutting to the edge of the filling. Twist two adjoining strips together, and lay twist over filling. Fasten ends of twisted strips by tucking them under the edge of coffee cake. Place on greased baking sheet and let rise until doubled in bulk (about one hour). Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Makes two coffee cakes.

CRANBERRY FILLING

- 2 cups cranberries
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- Cook cranberries in water until the skins burst. Mix sugar and cornstarch. Add to cranberries and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add orange rind. Mix thoroughly. Cool before using.

Pork Gems with Creamed Peas

Broadcast: October 30, 1948

1 lb. ground, lean pork	1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup Per Milk	2 medium unpared, red apples
1/2 cup rolled oats	2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon sage (can omit)	3 tablespoons shortening
1 1/2 teaspoons salt	

Turn on oven; set at slow (325° F.). Grease 8 three-inch muffin or custard cups. Mix together pork, milk, oats, sage, salt and pepper. Pack into greased cups. Bake 45 minutes, or until brown. Remove cores from apples; cut each apple into 4 slices. Dip both sides of apple rings in sugar. Cook until brown in hot shortening. Remove meat from cups and top with the apples. Fill centers of apple rings with cooked raisins or tart jelly. Serve with creamed peas. Makes 4 servings.
