Editorial

PEACE FOR GERMANY

The Big Four Council of Foreign Min-

isters, convening in Paris Monday, will have at stake far more than a peace settlement for Germany. The future of Europe, if not of the entire world, is involved in the ability or inability of the four former war allies—the United States, Britain, Russia and France—to arrive at some sort of accord.

British Foreign Secretary Bevin appropriately has declared that complete agreement at the Paris conclave might lead to 200 years of peace. Failure to reach any understanding over Germany, in the opinion of European statesmen, would heighten the danger of ultimate conflict between Russia and the West.

The last previous session of the Big Four ministers, the fifth meeting since the end of the war, terminated in futility on December 15, 1948, after conferences which began in London on November 25, 1947. The ostensible cause was failure of Russia's reparations demands on Germany, but the basic conflict was the fundamental disparity between the aims of communism and the principals of democracy. The same obstacle may make futile the negotiations at Paris, yet the effort is being made.

Western delegates to the conference are said to foster tacitly no hopes for a general settlement of the German problem. No major concessions are anticipated from either side. Yet appreciable gains would be made by a complete solution of the Berlin problem, increased economic co-operation between Western and Eastern Germany and a temporary truce in the cold war in Europe.

Hopes may be engendered by the expectations of Gen Lucius D. Clay, former U. S. military governor in Western Germany, and other Western authorities that Russia conceivably may startle the world by offering to accept unconditionally the Western plans for a German settlement. That implausible development would be welcomed by the peoples of the entire world, if not some of its leaders. If the days of miracles should not be past, relief from the uncertainties, fears and stress of a "cold war" would be an incalculable blessing to mankind.

Open Toilets Cause Hookworm Disease

Hookworm disease is found frequently in those communities where sanitary toilet facilities are inadequate, and where infected human excreta is permitted to contaminate the soil. Persons who come in contact with that soil, either by going barefooted or by handling the dirt, contract hookworm disease when the hookworm from such soil bore through their skin and make their way to the human intestine.

"The main characteristic of hookworm disease," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, "are listlessness and apparent laziness, and many a child and adult has been called lazy, when in reality he was suffering from hookworm disease. Sometimes there is abdominal pain, nausea, and diarrhea, but this is unusual."

Inability to perform efficient work, and general weakness of the patient make this disease not only a public health but an economic problem, and it can be eliminated only by carefully following two steps: first, providing sani-

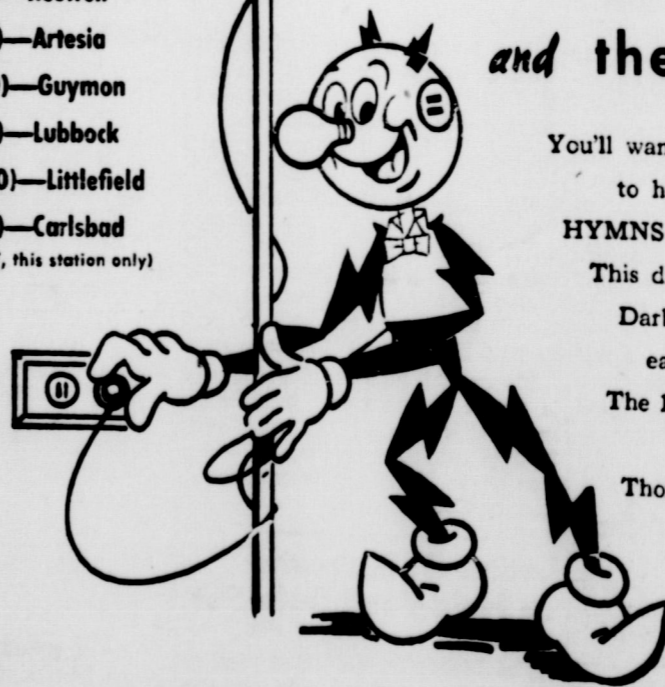

closing days of the legislature." The "scramble" has died down now but here is what happened. Representative Hanna of Dallas, opponent of the Gilmer Aiken plan, disclosed G-A supporters were attempting to arrange for submission of another bill to take the kinks out of G-A bill 115.

So far no one knows for sure just what those kinks were. But it is believed one kink concerned the mechanics of the election of the 21-man school board.

Hanna found out G-A bill 115, passed May 4, had never reached the governor for his signature to

make it law. It then turned out the attorney general had been approached to draw up a corrective bill to make G-A 115 more effective. The lid blew off then. What will this do to the plan? What's wrong? What is going on? Who did it? HUH? Isn't G-A 115 effective as it now stands? These questions were tossed around by many people.

The bill itself is as knotty a piece of legislation as has been drawn up since the Constitution and everyone was excited. Just when things were going good one of the sponsors of the G-A program jumped in and threw cold water on the corrective bill idea. "Much ado about nothing," commented Senator Otis Lock of Lufkin, an ardent, influential, supporter of the program. The way things stand now the three bills will become law.

Something new has been added in our voting system. A secret ballot bill has been passed by both houses and the governor undoubtedly will sign it. Heretofore it has been no particular trick for the average election official in the rural counties to trace the voting

record of every citizen. The new measure requires that the voter leave a number in a sealed box at the polling place; the number will be on the ballot and will be detached from the ballot by the voter as he votes. The stub will have the name on it. Later, if need be in case of an election contest the box can be opened, but only on court order.

Women service on juries will be decided by the voters this year. The amendment has been passed by both houses and will be submitted along with an amendment calling for annual sessions of the legislature.

Governor Jester has indicated he will call a special session if the legislature doesn't pass a big appropriation to take care of such state wards as the insane.

The house killed a move to bring a horse racing bill on the floor, 69-32.

Still to be decided though is how much money the state is actually going to spend.

Lieutenant Governor Allan Shivers has come in for criticism because he left the Senate in the middle of pressing legislative business and went off to Washington to work on the tidelands issue.

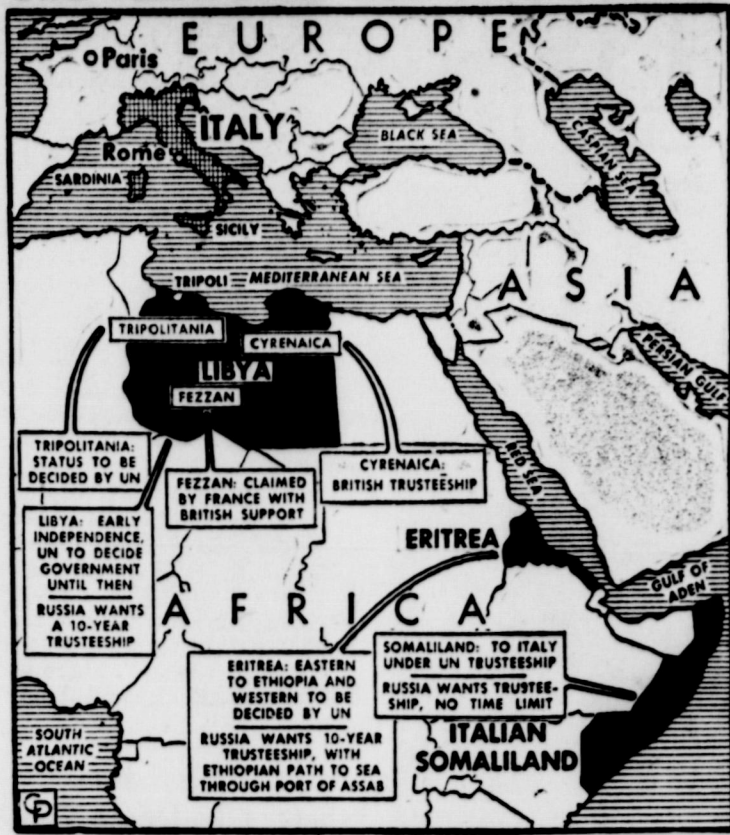
The House of Representatives has acted on most of the big money bills and sent them to the Senate but the Senate would take no action on any of them without its leader, Mr. Shivers.

The work-reluctant Senate, without its leader, met Tuesday (May 17) for one hour and quit until Wednesday. The Lieutenant Governor was due back Monday (May 23).

As usual the amount of work to be done in these last days is tremendous. Both houses will be desperately trying to finish up this work. With its back to the wall the legislature will pour on the steam and pass bills right and left until adjournment. The governor may call them back in special session or the voters may decide to have them meet every year.

Such voter action would cut down on the amount of work to be done every two years—the interval the legislature meets now—and give members more time for deliberation.

Hens Happier When Houses Are Sanitary

The five "S's" of poultry laying house sanitation introduce the new poultry circular recently released by extension poultry husbandmen of Texas A. and M. College. Cleaning and disinfecting the poultry house and equipment makes for healthier disease-free birds. And it's one of the first important steps in getting maximum egg production. The five "S's" of laying house sanitation are scrape, sweep, scald, scrub and spray, says the extension poultry specialists.

The new circular, officially known as C-260, Keep Hens Happy, also has information on disease and parasite control including coccidiosis, fowl pox vaccination, and the reduction of internal parasites by frequently moving the range shelters to clean areas.

Two other points brought out in the new circular are the separation of old hens from the younger pullets and the space needed per bird in the henhouse. Older birds are sometimes disease carriers of roup and range paralysis, and for this reason the old hens should be kept apart from the young pullets.

Each hen needs three to four feet of floor space, eight to ten inches of roosting space, three to four inches of feeder space and one nest or every five hens. And keep them supplied with plenty of clean water and feed, the specialists say.

Texas poultrymen who are interested in this circular may find one available at the county agent's office. Just ask for C-260, Keep Hens Happy.

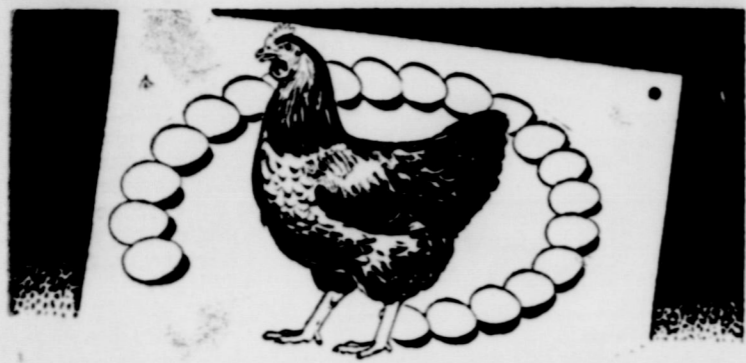
Bunting and street and window decorations will be on sale by the Dumas Business and Professional Women's club, with proceeds to be used to buy equipment for the Dumas city park.

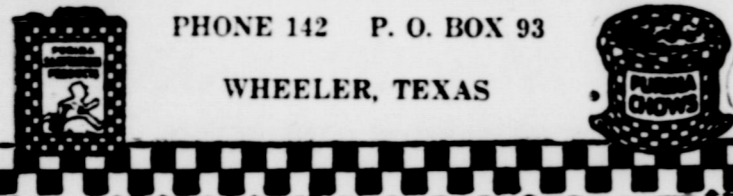

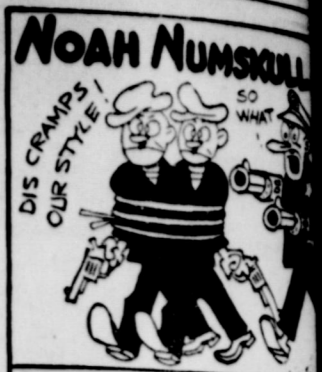

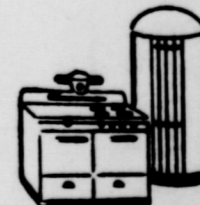

KITCHEN MEMO
BY JEAN CLARKE

There's something extra special about strawberry pie that puts a gleam in a man's eye. Strawberry Chiffon Pie mixture is cooked on the top burner, then turned into a pastry shell. Soften 1 envelope unflavored gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water in saucepan. Blend together 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tsp. flour, 1/2 tsp. salt. Add to softened gelatin. Mix thoroughly. Place over medium flame stirring constantly until gelatin is dissolved and mixture is thickened, then remove from flame. Add 1 cup crushed strawberries, 2 tbsps. lemon juice. Chill until mixture is slightly thicker than consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Fold into 1 cup whipped cream or 1/2 cup icy cold whipped evaporated milk. Turn into 8-inch baked pastry shell and chill until firm. Garnish with additional whipped cream and whole strawberries.

If you like to scent your linens or underwear, put sachet powder in cheesecloth bag and toss in with the drying laundry in your automatic gas dryer. The tumbling action helps the aroma to penetrate evenly through the clothes.

At least 15 gals. of hot water of 140°-160° (F) are needed to wash and rinse 8 to 9 lbs. of soiled cottons. Using less than this won't get clothes clean. An adequate supply of hot water will always be available where there is a quick recovery automatic gas water heater in the house because the supply more than keeps up with the demand.

To freshen dried lemons, cover with cold water and allow to stand for several hours.

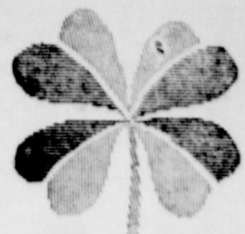

(Continued from Page 1) inquiries usually range all the way from "Where can I get a thorough examination so I can know whether I have cancer?" and up to the more intimate problems of "How can I get treatment for which I cannot afford to pay?" or "I can no longer take care of my mother without help. Where can I find a nurse, a housekeeper, someone to sit with her while I go marketing?"

"The most important consideration in establishing an information center is the need for medical supervision and assistance," Mrs. Perkins said. "Our county units are encouraged to work closely with the county medical society in all of their endeavors. It is not sufficient for the local medical society to approve the project. They must appoint a small committee to participate in and supervise its activities."

Part-time cancer information centers as described by Mrs. Perkins might, perhaps, be the corner of a public library or a table in the lobby of the county courthouse—some spot where volunteer workers can set up a temporary information desk for the distribution of literature on cancer and to answer questions on this vital health program.

"The information center program of the Texas Division is aimed directly at lowering the Texas cancer mortality rate," she said. "Last year nearly 7000 Texans

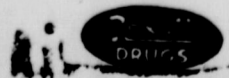

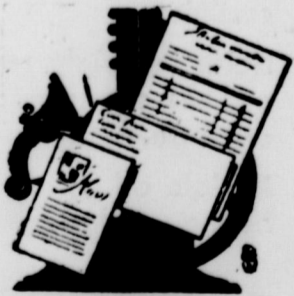
