**WOMEN AND CHILDREN FIRST**

Time was when the phrase "women and children first" sounded the spirit of chivalry. But in today's America the same phrase ironically designates the group which bears the rudest brunt of the tax on toilet preparations.

Consider the one-sided budget strain in a typical family of moderate means. The mother keeps her children looking healthy and clean with the aid of simple baby oils and talcum powder—on which she pays 20%

"luxury" tax. She keeps her own appearance by using shampoo, hand cream and face powder—all of them subject to the same 20% excise tax. Her husband, on the other hand, uses dentrifices, shaving cream, razor blades and hair tonic to look well-groomed. But he pays not a single tax for any of them.

The fact is that the excise tax on toilet preparations originally was regarded as a wartime luxury levy. As such, while hostilities continued, women consumers made no complaints about it. But, in January of 1947, after the President proclaimed the end of hostilities, Congress reenacted the levy and it was then that American women started to register their justified resentment. They were as happy as anyone to see millions of men being mustered out of the armed services. But they still wanted to know why their budgets were kept on a wartime basis.

Since reenactment of the tax, there have been no less than 11 bills calling for its repeal. There is also in the Congressional file a 747-page report reviewing these bills and recommending that at least one of them be passed. To date, there has been no action on any of them. And women continue to ask why the legislators consider it a luxury to be well-groomed.

The idea of classifying essential toilet preparations as luxuries just doesn't make sense. Even during hostilities, the War Production Board listed cosmetics among "toilet necessities" and allocated critical materials for their manufacture. And the OPA placed cosmetics in the category of "cost-of-living necessities."

Personnel officials can give you very definite answers to the question of whether ordinary cosmetics are essential in the life of women. They'll cite the situation of two girls with parallel ability and experience seeking the same position. They'll ask you to suppose that one girl looks pallid and uncurled while her competitor, thanks to the intelligent use of wave lotions, lipstick and face powder, makes a much better appearance. Invariably, the second girl is the one who will get the job. It is unfortunate that, in some cases, the other girl will miss getting it only because she can't afford that 20% tax on the little things that make the big difference.

The bills asking repeal on these taxes will be reviewed by Congress sometime this spring. Any action taken on them can be influenced importantly by letters which budget-weary women write to their Congressmen. And the husbands, who ultimately foot the family bills anyway, will do well to join their voices to the protest.

Isn't it about time, in this post-war, twentieth century America, that well-groomed ladies and unchafed babies ceased to be considered marks of the "luxury class" only?

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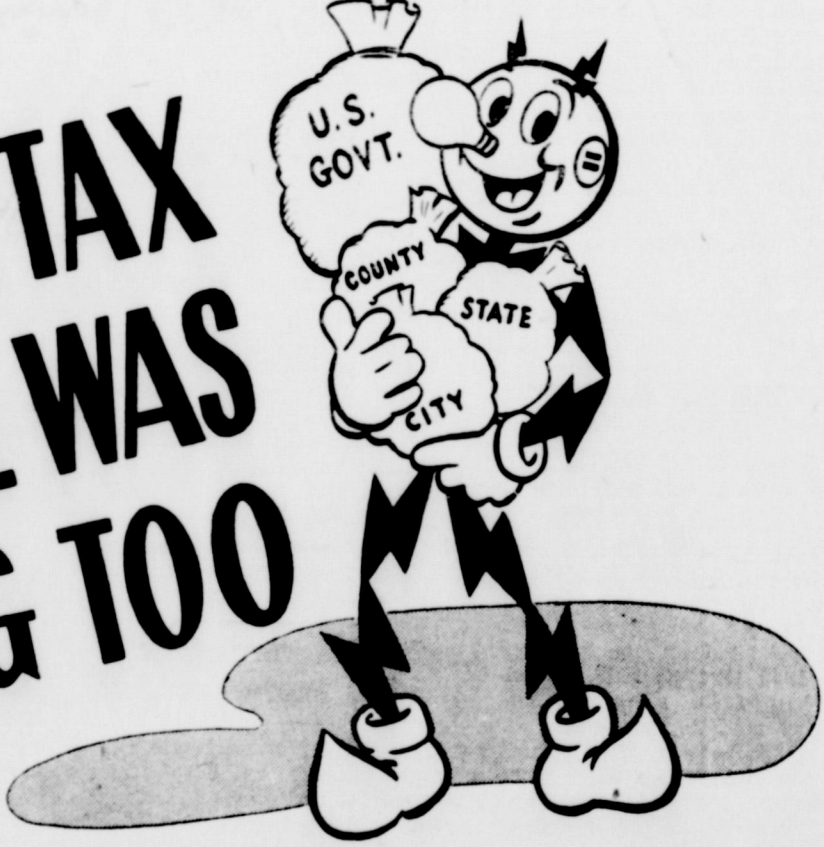

### NEW FARMHOUSE PLANS DESIGNED

Thirteen up-to-date farmhouse plans, every one designed to give farm families comfortable and efficient surroundings, are pictured and described in a new U. S. Department of Agriculture bulletin, "Farmhouse Plans for the Northeastern States". W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer-buildings of Texas A. and M. College, says that county home demonstration agents now have the bulletin in their offices.

These 13 houses are adapted to most Texas conditions. Since a farmhouse is a combined home and work center, the designers have seen to it that each house has outstanding features that farm families want and need. Included are: rooms planned for family work and living; space for eating in the kitchen; a place near the back door for the men to wash up and hang work clothes; indoor traffic routes that do not cross busy work areas; adequate storage space for food and fuel; and ample closet space.

Every house adds Allen is designed for running water and each plan provides for at least one bathroom.

These plans are the product of the Regional Plan Services. This is a cooperative arrangement between the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the states in a

region. They work together in developing plans for farm buildings that are suitable for the region. The 13 farmhouse plans for the northeast were developed by three agencies in the Department—the Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils and Agricultural Engineering—the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics—and the Extension Service—and twelve Northeastern States cooperating.

Copies of the bulletin, "Farmhouse Plans for the Northeastern States", may be purchased for fifteen cents per copy, from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D. C. The order should be accompanied by coin or money order (no stamps), says Allen.

### CHECK HOUSE BEFORE DOING REMODELING

Before you get too deep into plans for remodeling an old house make sure first that the house was well built and is still sound, says Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension specialist in home management of Texas A. and M. College.

Do some checking before you decide to remodel, advises Mrs. Claytor. Examine the house from foundation to roof and estimate the needed repairs and their cost. Check the location from the standpoint of good drainage, protection from cold winds which make a house hard to heat, protection from flooding during heavy rains, good sewage disposal and convenience to the highway. Don't forget the water supply. Water should be plentiful and tested for safety.

If the house and its site pass inspection, and remodeling seems a wise investment, USDA housing specialists say it's wise to give as much thought to remodeling plans as you would to planning for a new house, Mrs. Claytor points out.

She suggests that careful attention be given to the following points: Plan for enough rooms to take care of your family's needs. Well located doors and windows will help solve the lighting and ventilation problems in the house and don't forget a closet near the back door for the men's work clothes.

Are house entrances convenient to the drive? Are all rooms easily reached from the back door? Are work and living areas free from traffic? Do bedrooms and bath open from a hall and are the halls wide enough to allow for moving furniture?

Kitchen and work areas should be arranged to save labor and unnecessary steps. Allow working space for more than one person. Plan plenty of storage space for supplies and equipment where they are used and a place for the men to wash other than the kitchen sink.

The dining room should be convenient to the kitchen serving area. Be sure there is seating space for everyone regularly served and for company. Provide storage space for dishes, silver and linen.

The living room should be large

and comfortable. In it should be equipment and storage for reading, writing, farm business, sewing, games, hobbies and entertainment.

The sleeping space should be sufficient to allow for separate rooms for parents, boys and girls—not more than two persons per room. Is there space for overnight guests or provisions for the aged and ill? Plan plenty of storage space for clothing and bedding.

Is the water supply plentiful and safe? Plan an adequate sewage disposal system. Is there hot and cold running water in the kitchen, bathroom and laundry? Have you planned for enough well-located lighting fixtures, switches and wall plugs?

From the plans you have made, do you think the house will appear pleasing both inside and out? Does it have good proportions and simple lines?

Now that plans are made, will the cost of remodeling be less than for a new building?

If you can answer "yes" to most of these questions, says Mrs. Claytor, your planning is good. If you "yes" only a few, try to improve your plans before strating the remodeling job, she concludes.

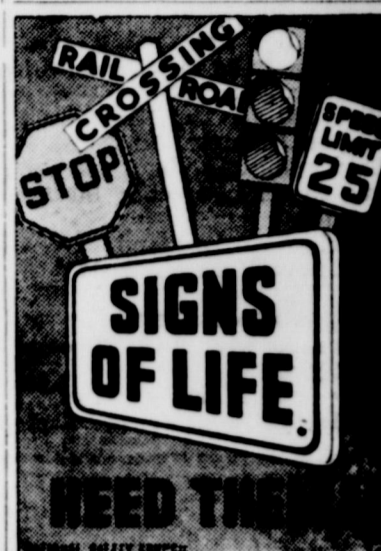

NEW YORK, March 13 — The General Electric Company today announced price reductions in many of its major lines of home appliances.

The price changes, effective immediately, will cover several refrigerator models, home freezers and electric ranges.

The company said the new prices will represent savings to the consumer on these items of up to \$20 per model.

General Electric President Charles E. Wilson said that at the same time new models of several major consumer products would be introduced at prices "substantially below" those of the models they replace.

Included in the new items, Wilson said, would be a table model television set priced at \$239, as compared to \$325 for the lowest price formerly set for a similar receiver.

Referring to GE's effort "to reduce prices on its consumer products wherever possible," Wilson said similar reductions were being made in store coolers, water coolers, commercial refrigeration and in construction materials such as wire and wire devices.

**Radio-Telephone Comes to The Farm**



SEDALIA, MO. — Progressive farm equipment dealers have seized on the new radio-telephone service to speed up farm service calls and solve an old problem: how to keep contact between the service truck and the dealership sometimes many miles apart. Emergency calls for repair work on farm implements sometimes come at critical times during harvesting or planting season, when every lost day costs money. Service was slowed by sparse communications in the rural areas, so that service trucks burned up valuable time retracing steps. Some farm equipment dealers have installed radio-telephones in their service trucks. Now the home office can put the service truck on an emergency job almost immediately and maintain constant communication with the operator in the field. Above, Scudder Hull of the Engle Tractor and Implement Company here, puts in a call from a customer farm to his office, using the radio-telephone in the service truck.

**Measles, Chickenpox Widespread This Year**

Measles and chickenpox have been widespread throughout the state during the past few weeks, and in the week ending March 5th measles reached a total number of cases, 3909, that was the second highest in history. Chickenpox was almost twice the seven year median, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has stated that there is an unusual number of adults suffering from this so called "childhood" disease.

"Both these diseases are extremely contagious", Dr. Cox said, "and the strictest isolation and sanitation precautions are necessary to halt their spread. Dishes, toys, towels, or anything that has been around the patient can carry the germs to other members of the household, and all such articles should be thoroughly disinfected before being handled by others susceptible to these diseases."

The State Health Officer recommended that a physician be called immediately when a child shows any beginning symptoms of chickenpox or measles, and that his ad-

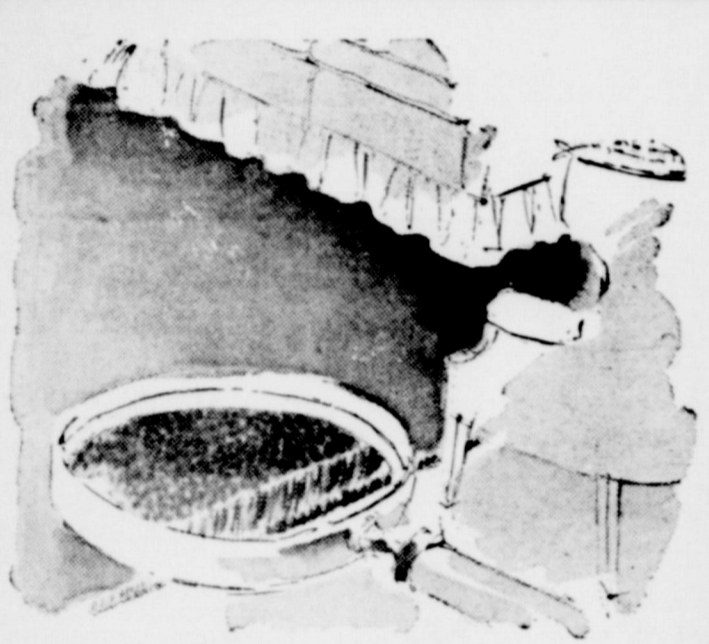
vice be followed implicitly until complete recovery. Dangerous complications often accompany or follow measles, and a child may have his entire future health endangered unless he receives competent care during his illness.

"It is not advisable to treat these childhood diseases too lightly", Dr. Cox said. "They are sometimes responsible for nothing more

than a few days discomfort. We cannot count on the child to receive a competent doctor's vision and attention."

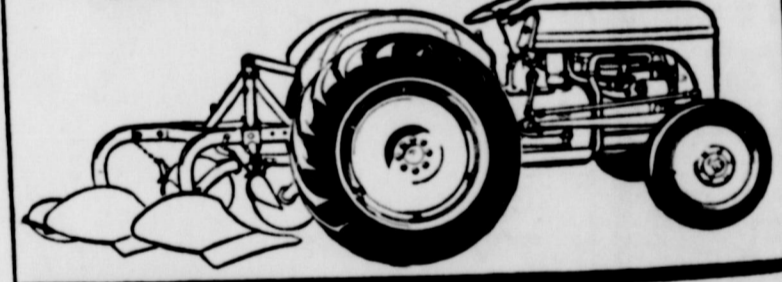

**Recipes Using Delicious Yams**

**By ALICE DENHOFF**

**FROM** the heart of the deep South, Louisiana to be exact, come golden yam sweet potatoes, golden indeed, since they offer a good conservation food, are delicious and filled with healthful elements, as well as being plentiful. Now just how much more could one demand of any food item? And not content with all these excellent attributes, yam sweet potatoes are versatile as well, doubling not only as a vegetable, but as a good ingredient in side-dishes, baked dishes and desserts.

**Perk up** baked luncheon meat with baked golden "yams", and serve a casserole of sweet potatoes layered with orange sections to furnish excitement in an otherwise plain meal.

**Quick-Prepared Dish**

**Tutti-Fruitti Mashed Yams** are star material, as you'll discover when you prepare 'em, and quickly prepared, too. Mix 2 1/2 c. yam sweet potatoes (1 1/2 lbs., 4 to 5 potatoes), 2 tbs. table fat, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 c. crushed canned pineapple, 2 tbs. sugar, 1/4 c. milk, 1/4 c. raisins and 1/2 c. chopped nuts. Turn into 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake in moderate oven (375 F.) for 20 min. Will yield 6 servings.

**For another** elegant eating idea peel 5 cooked yam sweet potatoes (1 1/2 lbs.); cut in half lengthwise. Arrange in shallow baking dish. Combine 2 tbs. grated orange rind, 1/4 c. orange juice, 1/4 c. sugar and 1/4 tsp. salt; bring to a boil. Pour over potatoes and bake at 375 F. for 30 min., basting after the first 15 min. Remove from oven, spread with 1/2 c. whole cranberry sauce (about 1/2 of 14-oz. jar) and bake 15 min. longer. Yield: 6 servings.

**Yam Custard**

**For a** nourishing one-egg yam custard mix 1 1/2 c. mashed yam sweet potatoes, 1/2 firmly packed c. brown sugar, 1/4 c. sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. molasses, 1/4 tsp. flour, 1 1/2 tsp. each cinnamon and ginger and 1/4 tsp. cloves. Blend in one slightly-beaten egg, 1/4 c. undiluted evaporated milk and 1/2 c. milk. Turn into 6 custard cups. Place in pan of hot water and bake at 350 F. for an hour or until tip of a pointed knife inserted in the center comes out clean.

**For an** easily fixed dish, boil medium yam sweet potatoes until almost tender, then peel. Put in skillet with bacon fat or meat drippings, and cook until brown on all sides. Serve with Vienna sausage.

**To give** a meal a lift boil yam sweet potatoes until tender; peel and cut in halves, lengthwise. Brush with butter, sprinkle lightly with 2 tbs. sugar mixed with 1/2 tsp. cinnamon and 1/4 tsp. nutmeg. Place under broiler, heat until sugar is bubbly.

**For something** different to serve with lamb make plump little yam croquettes from mashed potatoes. Make 'em about 2 inches in diameter, and one inch thick, then make a depression in the center with the thumb. Brown in fat; fill depression with spoonful of mint jelly.

**FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING**

**Q. What can be done to prevent sons from mashing their pigs?**  
**A. All farrowing houses of every type should have a guard rail around the sides and back of the individual pen used by each sow and her litter. This rail should be 8 to 10 inches from the floor and 8 to 10 inches from the wall. Guard rails are of great value in keeping sows from rolling on their pigs.**

**Q. How much space is needed in the brooder house for baby chicks?**  
**A. The Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm recommends not more than two chicks per square foot during the first six weeks. Pullets in confinement up to 20 weeks should have two to three square feet per bird and those on range need about 1 1/2 square feet of house space per bird. Three to 3 1/2 square feet is recommended per hen. Crowding retards growth and causes uneven development.**

**Q. How much fresh water does a dairy cow need?**  
**A. A cow should drink a minimum of about five gallons of water for each gallon of milk she produces, although many cows will drink more. Even when dry, dairy cows need a regular supply of clean, fresh water.**

**KR Bluestem Is Being Tried In Falls County**

One Falls county farmer planted an acre of KR bluestem a year ago.

Otto Pursche of Otto, Texas, planted the original acre last April, reports County Agent W. I. Ross. Pursche harvested a crop of

43 percent purity and 69 percent germination.

At a pasture meeting in the county agent's office in December, Pursche told the other stockmen of Falls county his story of KR bluestem. They became interested and each one—a demonstrator in the county—received two pounds of seed to plant this year. Each

**Windbreak Protects Flowers and Shrubs Around The Home**

A windbreak to protect the flowers and shrubs about the homesteads is needed in every county in the state.

That's the advice from Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. and M. College, who explains that the destructive mechanical action of the wind often mars the beauty of shrubs by spoiling their shapes and destroying the blooms.

Besides this, tender plants are hindered in growth or may be killed by the wind. Unless there's a natural windbreak to protect the farm homestead, planting one is the logical first step in landscaping a home, says Miss Hatfield. It will pay special dividends by breaking the force of the wind and modifying the temperature.

There is a combination of trees and shrubs that are well adapted for use in windbreaks, says Miss Hatfield. Among those which have been successfully planted for this purpose are desert willow, tamarix or salt cedars, native pine, western willow pine, red cedar and Arizona cypress. The landscape gardening specialist points out that the plants native to the locality are good ones to use for windbreaks.

In areas free of root rot, the Chinese elm is a strong favorite because of its rapid growth. All plantings should include several varieties of trees, because it's not a good idea to depend on just one variety.

Where root rot is found black walnut, cedar elm, red cedar and Chinese pistacia are often grown for windbreaks because of their resistance to this disease, says Miss Hatfield.

home demonstration clubs and similar organizations have cast their votes for the most desirable features in cooking utensils—and they voted for just about the same characteristics each year.

Other desirable features include a flat bottom, straight sides, rounded edges, bottom without grooves, material that retains heat and heats evenly, heavy weight, good balance to prevent tipping, lips on each side for pouring, and durability.

"Homemakers would like to see removable handles that won't turn in the hand," Mrs. Claytor said, "and some sort of provision made for hanging the pan by the handle."

And, too, they'd like to have fitting covers and heat resistant knobs on the lids.

The voters included housewives, groups and repeaters, according to Dr. Enid Safer, household management specialist of the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, and member of the sponsoring AHEA committee.

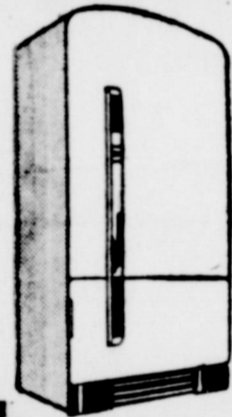

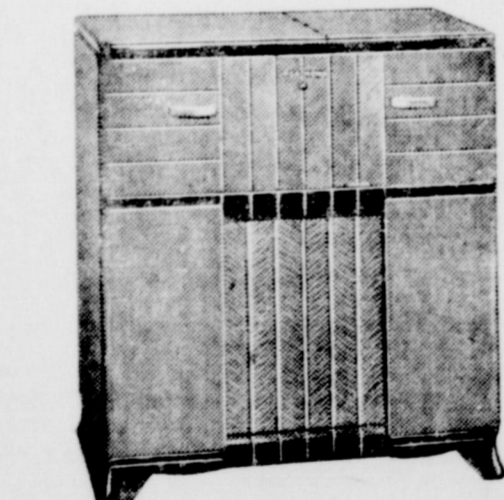
