**Editorial**

**WHOSE FREEDOM IS IT?**

Arguments are flying thick and fast  
against high support prices for farm  
products. Most of these arguments state that  
farmers will face the possibility of losing  
their freedom if they submit to these supports.  
The folks who think we should have  
either low or no price supports also wave

the danger flag and ask if farmers are willing  
to submit to Government Controls on  
acres in order to obtain high price supports.  
Now, when we say that these folks  
ask if farmers are willing to submit to acreage  
controls, what we mean is that they  
make these statements in speeches they make  
and the articles they write. We don't mean  
that they ever go out into the country and  
actually ask any farmer what they think  
about it. It might be a pretty good idea if  
they did ask a few farmers. We believe that  
they would get some different answers than  
when they answer the questions themselves.

There is a lot of talking about loss of  
political and economic freedom if farmers  
accept high price supports. We might ask if  
the farmers you know lost any of his freedom  
the past few years when price supports  
were in effect, when price supports assured  
enough production so that prices of food remained  
reasonable. It used to take 30 hours  
of work each week for a factory worker to  
earn enough for food to feed his family—in  
1914. Today, 12 hours of work each week  
will buy the family food for a week. Does  
that sound like farmers are getting too much  
for what they produced? Doesn't that show  
that price supports have kept food prices  
down, at a time other prices and wages increased?  
In fact, wages went up about 500  
percent when cost of food rose only 150 percent.

What freedom would any farmer lose if  
he accepted high price supports? Maybe the  
folks who talk against high support prices  
are worried about the fact that farmers may  
be told to reduce the acreage of some crops.  
We wonder if farmers are too much worried  
about this possible reduction. We wonder if  
the experts know that a farmer would rather  
plant 90 acres of wheat, and be guaranteed  
\$2 a bushel, than he would 120 acres and  
have no guaranty of what he would get for  
his crop when he hauled it to the elevator.

Yes, the farmers who worry about  
farmers losing their freedom should get out  
and talk to some of them. Then they might  
realize that most folks are more concerned  
about prices than they are afraid of losing  
liberties. It rather minds us of the story of  
the fellow who doesn't believe in conservation.  
However, he was a strong believer in  
grass-hopper control. His land kept eroding,  
and he continued to fight grass-hoppers.  
The day he killed the last hopper the last  
inch of his topsoil washed away. Looking at  
his lost farm, he exclaimed, "Well, thank  
goodness, I at least got rid of the hoppers."

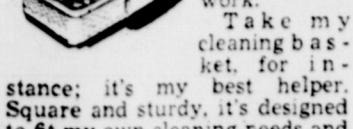
We are just wondering if a fellow who

predicament. As he saw his farm mortgage  
foreclosed, his bank account gone, and his  
family in need, he might say, "Well, thank

**Home Sweet Home**

Jim always says that spring  
cleaning is a generous coating of  
elbow grease. A sympathetic  
husband's not the worse kind; so  
I never confess that spring  
cleaning's not the cyclone he  
thinks it is.

irk out of work.



Take my cleaning basket, for instance; it's my best helper. Square and sturdy, it's designed to fit my own cleaning needs and to whittle down household mileage. Now I don't have to trudge back downstairs for that bottle of polish or dust cloth I forgot. Everything I need is where I want it when I want it.

The kit is fitted with a compartment for dusting rags, another (an empty glass coffee jar) for oily polishing rags. All in their place are bottles of wax, ammonia, lemon oil, touchup polishes (for scratches), dry cleaner, and bleach (for those stubborn bathtub stains).

In it also are metal polish, window cleaner, scouring powder, a bottle of glue (handy for quick repairs), and a box of tacks and nails.

You can choose your tools to fit your jobs; mine include several types of brushes, a window squeegee, a whisk broom, hammer, screwdriver, and an all-in-one duster.

I not only use this duster for furniture but find it a must for keeping my Venetian blinds fresh and new.

Blinds really don't need special care if treated like furniture.

Here are a few rules I've discovered regarding Venetian blind care. Dust them regularly with your duster—away from the tapes. In the city, wipe them down once a month with plain soap 'n water or a weak ammonia solution. Never allow dust or soot to accumulate on the slats.

Remember always to wipe the blinds dry when exposed to rain or snow. Don't ever dunk them in the bathtub—you'll shrink and fade the tapes. You wouldn't bathe your furniture and if you keep in mind that Venetian blinds should be treated like furniture they'll lead a long trouble-free life.

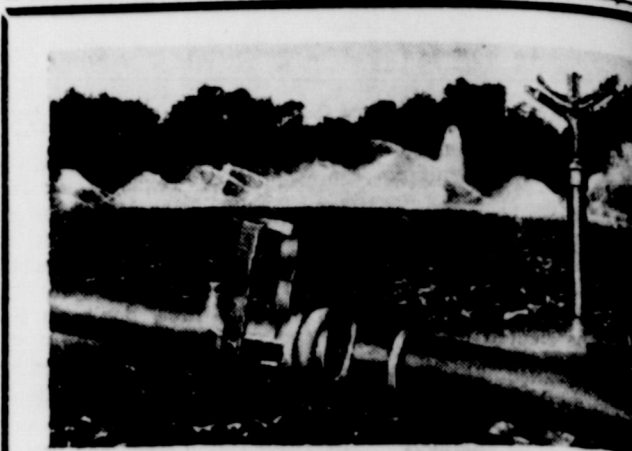

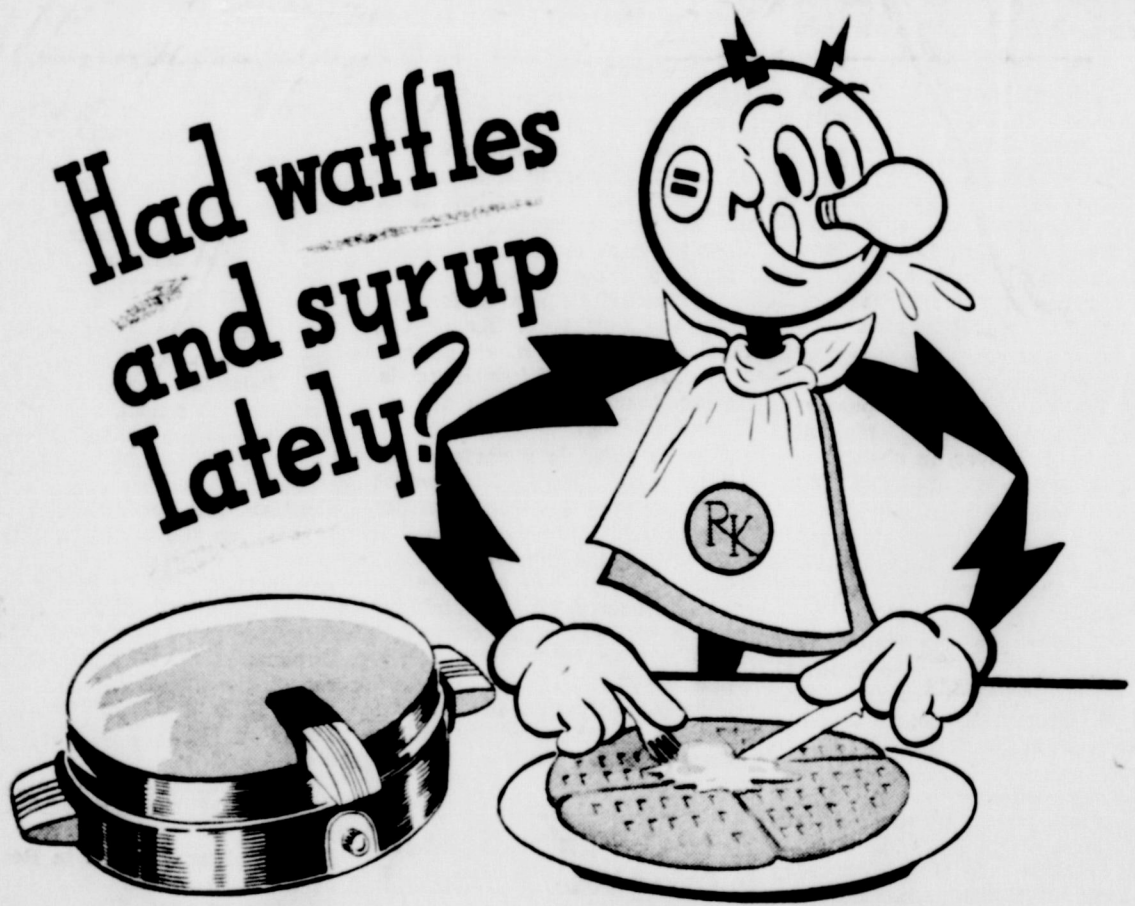

**KITCHEN MEMO**

Many a good homemaker hesitates to cook fish. Yet it can be cooked so many different ways and is a welcome change for a main course. *Fish Casserole* uses either fresh or frozen fillets. Wash 2 lbs. fillets. Wipe with cloth. Break into large chunks and place in greased casserole. Cover with 1 pt. sour cream, 1/4 lb. grated cheddar cheese, 1 small minced onion, 1/2 cup white wine (or 1/4 cup lemon juice), 1 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper. Bake in moderate gas oven (375°F.) for about 30 mins. Serve on hot noodles—2 cups noodles boiled in salted water for about 8 mins. Serves 4.

the leaves. Burn them into a leaf compost. By burning you lose the value of the leaves and kill off the already growing plants. Refuse besides leaves in a compost too, says Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardener, Texas A. and M. College. constantly making soil. Dead wood, old leaves, plant materials make releases mineral plant in the soil. When re-

leased, this matter can be used by plants and tree roots. A simple enclosure of scrap lumber, brick or stone should be provided to hold the compost together. In sections of the state where high winds are a daily thing, a compost pit is preferable—almost a necessity, says Miss Hatfield. If a pit is available, spread a thin layer of soil over its contents, after adding the leaves or grass clippings. In the dry part of the year when there isn't much rainfall, it's a good idea to wet the entire pit once or twice a month to insure a well-rotted compost.

If a well-balanced plant mixture is desired, add a 100 pounds of 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer to a wagon load of compost mixture. Sprinkle the fertilizer over the pit before covering it with a layer of soil. The fertilizer speeds up

the leaf rotting process.

In acid soil areas, such as the eastern part of the state, add 100 pounds of lime as well as the fertilizer to the pit contents. Compost of this type is especially good for soils which tend to pack, or become hard and crusty during dry periods, Miss Hatfield adds.

It usually takes about three months for leaves, weeds and small limbs to rot. Use a half pound to a pound per foot of row space for flowers, vegetables or shrubs. Mix the compost thoroughly into the soil before seeding.

If you're figuring on using the compost material for pot plants, use a mixture of one-half compost and one-half good loam soil or sand.

Save the leaves for compost material, urges Miss Hatfield. It's one of Nature's best fertilizers.

### HOME FREEZER SAVES MONEY

Is a home freezer on your list of home equipment to be bought during 1949?

If so, size is one of the important items to consider in order to get the best returns for the money invested, according to specialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says that an average of five or six cubic feet for each person in the family is a rough guide as to the correct size.

"However, the right size depends a great deal on the way the freezer will be used," she points out. "A city or suburban family may need only one to two cubic feet per person, since they usually store only commercially frozen food and ice cream. A family, on the other hand, freezes much of its yearly supply of home-produced food and may need as much as 10 to 12 cubic feet per person." A cubic foot holds about 30 to 35 pounds of food.

It is better to overestimate on size, the specialist suggest, than to underestimate, for after a home freezer has been in use, families often find more uses for the unit

than they might have planned at first. Larger units cost less per cubic foot than the smaller sizes.  
"Electric consumption by a home freezer varies with its size, use and location in the house," the specialist conclude. A 10-cubic foot freezer, under average conditions, uses about 90 kilowatt hours a month. This figure, multiplied by the electric rate, will give you a rough idea of the monthly cost."

Plan the order of cleaning routine so that it fits in with the daily schedule, continues Miss Darden. Sort out the jobs which must be done once a week once a month or less often so that several do not come on the same day.

The easiest way is the best way to do the job. Make as few motions as possible while housecleaning. Use both hands, and avoid those extra rubs and pats that take the extra time and energy. At the same time, route your work to save steps.

And another thing to remember is to do the job in as comfortable a position as possible while working. Sit whenever you can and rest between jobs. Short rest pauses or changing jobs once in a while will help reduce fatigue.

Don't forget breakfast and lunch. Eat heartily, and wear easy action clothes, shoes and hose which are comfortable and well fitting, says Miss Darden.

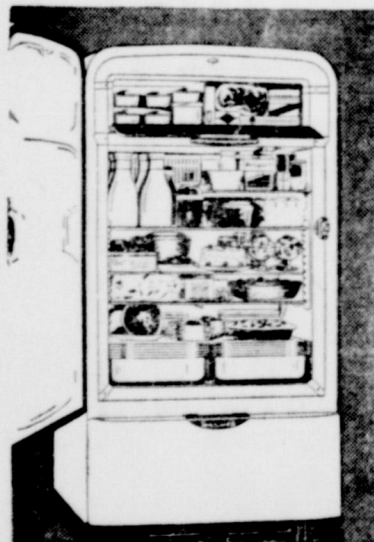

## METHODS OF SAFE STORAGE BEING STUDIED

A series of experiments are underway to develop methods of safe storage of sorghum grain on the farm, according to Director R. D. Lewis of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

These experiments are centered at the Beville sub-station. Cooperating with the Texas Station are the U. S. Production and Marketing Administration and the Corn Products Refining Company.

Sorghum grain is considered a highly perishable crop by Gulf Coast farmers because of its high moisture content. The crop is harvested during June and July and must be sold immediately since there are no facilities for on-the-farm storage.

If practical methods of safe on-the-farm storage can be developed through this study, the farmer will be able to market his sorghum grain in a more orderly manner, Lewis said. He will be better able to take advantage of fluctuations in market prices.

Sorghum grain production has had a tremendous expansion in the Gulf Coast area in the past few years. High temperatures and humidity, and severe insect damage make the safe storage of sorghum grain in that section very hazardous, Lewis said.

Seventeen storage bins will be used at Beville for these tests. Seven are made of steel, four of wood, three of temporary construction and four are underground pits. Each bin will hold from 1,000 to 2,200 bushels of grain.

Lewis estimates that approximately one million pounds of the 1949 grain crop will be used to fill the 17 bins. The grain is being furnished by the Corn Products Refining Company.

Some of the bins will be painted aluminum and some painted white to determine the effect of the color of the bin walls on the temperature of the stored grain. Thermocouples will be installed in each bin and an accurate check will be made on the grain temperatures during storage.

Moisture determinations and germination checks will be made at frequent intervals during the storage period, Lewis said.

Chemicals will be used to determine their effectiveness in preventing heating and deterioration of high-moisture grain during storage.

A part of the program will also be on control measures against insects, Lewis said.

Agricultural engineers heading these experiments are M. G. Dav- enport of the Beville station and J. W. Sorenson, Jr., and H. P. Smith of College Station. Jack Bradshaw is representing the PMA.

Lewis believes findings of this study will encourage the feeding of more livestock on South Texas farms.

**Cherry Dumplings**  
 1 1/2 cups canned, pitted cherries\* 1 cup prepared biscuit mix  
 1/2 cup sugar 7 tablespoons Pet Milk  
 3/4 cup water 3 1/2 tablespoons water

Turn on oven; set at hot (425° F.). Grease well four 3-inch muffin cups or individual baking dishes. Drain cherries well, saving juice. Mix cherries with sugar; divide among greased cups. Let stand. Put biscuit mix into bowl. Stir in mixture of milk and water with fork. Beat 30 seconds. Drop batter on top of cherries, dividing equally. Bake 20 minutes, or until brown. Turn out at once. Serve warm with sauce made by stirring 1 cup cherry juice into mixture of 1/4 cup sugar and 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch and boiling until clear. Makes 4 servings.

### What It Takes To Make A Button Hole Strong

What makes a buttonhole strong? That's what many home seamstresses as well as clothing manufacturers want to know. Buttonholes, especially on work-clothes, must take lots of stress and strain.

Nena Roberson, assistant extension clothing specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says that laboratory studies show that several things decide how long a buttonhole will last. The number of stitches per inch, the type of thread, the kind and quality of fabric and the kind of stitch used all affect the length of life of the buttonhole.

Purl buttonholes, made with a machine like that used in commercial clothing manufacture, and whip buttonholes, made with a home-type sewing machine, were compared. One of the first things the tests showed was that the number of stitches per inch is important in making buttonholes that resist friction, says Miss Roberson.

Increasing the number of stitches per inch—up to a certain point—made the buttonholes last longer. For instance, whip buttonholes lasted considerably longer when the stitch number was raised from 17 to 37 per inch. But when stitch-

es were added, the buttonholes lasted only slightly longer, and in some cases, not so long.

Another item of great importance shown in these tests was that buttonholes made with unmerceroized thread lasted quite a bit longer than those made with merceroized thread, says Miss Roberson.

That wasn't all. Women want to know more than that about buttonholes. So other tests were made. The kind of fabric and the kind of stitch used for buttonholes also made a big difference in the life of a buttonhole. In fabrics, you might think the high quality ones would wear better. Such was not the case. Medium quality percale held buttonholes longer than either high or low quality percale, Miss Roberson says.

The so-called purl stitch was easier on buttonholes than was the whip stitch.

That's how buttonholes wear.

### Strawberry Parfait Cake



It looks like a shortcake—it's really a cake, with a strawberry meringue for the filling and topping, and a final garnish of bright berries.

Strawberry parfait cake is a variation on the shortcake theme, and an elegant springtime dessert. Instead of biscuit or scone base, there's a fluffy cake, and strawberries are folded into a frothy meringue for a topping that is beautifully pink and luscious tasting.

The parfait "frosting" makes the most of strawberry flavor, so that a little more than a cup of berries will make a strawberry cake serving eight to ten people generously. No need to hunt for a four-leaf clover to expect good luck with this cake. Follow accurately this basic, tested recipe for a two-egg cake, using best ingredients, correct utensils, and temperature given. Bake the cake in two greased eight-inch layer pans, dividing batter evenly between the pans. For layer cakes, it is often well worth the time to cut a sheet of plain paper to fit the bottom of pans so that the cake will come out perfectly.

This cake requires only standard ingredients almost always on hand. Use enriched flour to make it for family service because of its extra B-vitamins and iron. The cake is one you'll want to serve throughout the year, with a variety of fillings and toppings.

#### STRAWBERRY PARFAIT CAKE

##### Batter

2 cups sifted enriched flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup milk, mixing well. Add remaining one-third flour mixture, mixing until light and creamy. Pour batter into two lined eight-inch cake pans. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 25 to 30 minutes. Makes two eight-inch layers.

##### Strawberry Parfait Topping

2 egg whites  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup strawberries  
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar  
1/2 cup sugar  
Mash strawberries, or put them through a coarse sieve. Beat egg whites until frothy. Add salt and cream of tartar. Beat until stiff. Add sugar and strawberries gradually. Continue beating until meringue holds its shape when beater is drawn through it. Pile between layers and on top of cake, leaving sides bare. Garnish top with whole berries.

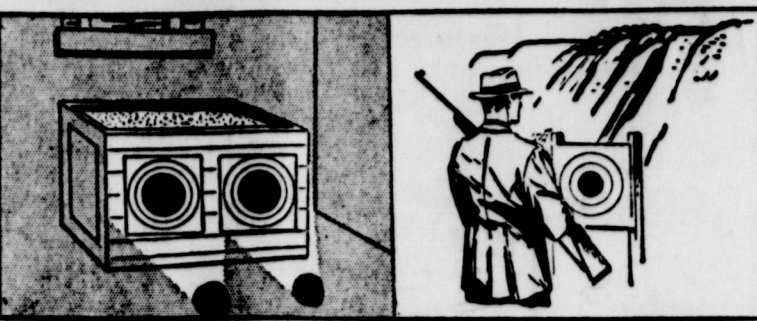

## HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE

By ARTHUR E. COOK  
 National and Olympic Rifle Champion

### Where To Shoot



Choosing a safe place to shoot is most important. A safe shooter is a skillful shooter—he knows where every bullet is going and he has a backstop behind his target to stop the bullet. This applies both to hunting and target shooting. And no matter what kind of shooting you intend to do, get your practice on the target range. It is the only good way to learn the basics. For beginners I recommend firing at 50 feet, the standard indoor distance. Later you can increase to 50 and 100 yards, the standard outdoor distance. The illustration at left above shows a safe bullet stop for a 50-foot range in your basement or shed. Fill a large packing box or crib with sand and place it in front of a solid brick or masonry wall. Board-up all windows with steel or one-inch hardwood. Reinforce the front of the box and arrange lights as shown. Sand about eighteen inches from front to back will stop .22 caliber bullets, but remember to repack it regularly. Outdoors select a steep hill or bank which is free from rocks and hang your target in front of it. Build a simple frame to hold your target; don't tack it to a tree or the bullets will ricochet dangerously. Best of all join or form a rifle club in your community or school and build a real range. You will quickly become safe and skillful. (This instruction based on the booklet, "HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE," published by The National Rifle Association, Washington, D. C.) Never point your gun muzzle at anything you do not intend to shoot!

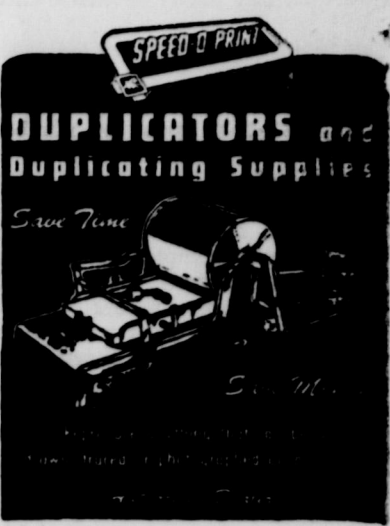

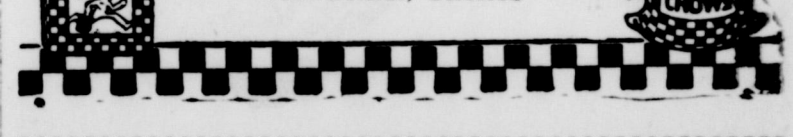

### Give Your Employer Social Security Number

"Be sure the boss gets that social security number down, and that he gets it down correctly," is the suggestion to all workers by John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration. The best way to make sure that the record is correct is to see that you have your official social security card with you when you apply for a job, and when you report for work the first day.

The Social Security Administration must rely upon the number in keeping a record of your individual account because there are literally thousands of identical names. The only way your employer can make complete reports to the Government (Employers will make their next report during April, which will cover wages paid during January, February and March), and thus make sure that your account is properly kept, is to have the information as to your name and number. If you fail to do your part by taking your card with you, you may lose part or all of the benefits that are rightfully yours; worse, you may be depriving your family of the insurance protection that the social security program provides.
