

MAUDE BRITT BURIED WED. AT SHAMROCK

Mrs. Maude Britt, member of a prominent Wheeler County ranching family, died at the Shamrock General Hospital at 8:18 p. m. Monday after an illness of about four months.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the First Methodist Church in Shamrock.

Mrs. Britt was born, July 2, 1901, in Bronson, Kans. She came to Wheeler in August, 1908, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Holt, and attended both grade and high school in Wheeler.

She attended the old College of Industrial Arts at Denton, that later became Texas State College for Women. She taught school in Wheeler for two years before attending Oklahoma University at Norman, where she met and married Buck Britt in 1923.

The couple lived for a while in Crosbyton and Shamrock, then moved to the Britt Ranch headquarters near Wheeler, where they lived until 1943.

Then they moved to the Casa Monte Ranch near Clayton, N. M. where they have been living since.

In addition to her husband and parents, Mrs. Britt is survived by two sons, Max and Sam, who is a student at Colorado A & M College; three brothers, R. J. Holt of Wheeler, Clarence Holt of Borger, and Demaris Holt of Pampa; and one sister, Clarice Holt of Fort Worth.

Mrs. Britt, a life-long member of the Methodist Church, was active in church and civic affairs in both Wheeler and Shamrock.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Wayne Cook of Quanah, former Methodist pastor at Wheeler, who was assisted by the Rev. S. M. Dunnam, pastor of the Shamrock church, and the Rev. E. C. Derr, pastor of the Shamrock Baptist Church.

Burial was in the Shamrock Cemetery under the direction of the Clay Funeral Home of Shamrock.

Explosion Sends Oderant Barrel 600 Feet In Air

Smell that odor which was floating around town today (Thursday)?

H. M. Wiley of the Wheeler Gas Company calls in to report that just because you smell the odor peculiar to a gas leak is no sign you really have one, today, that is.

A drum of the oderant which the gas company puts into their lines so people can detect gas leaks blew up about 12:00 noon today sending the barrel about 600 feet in the air and leaving the contents of same along with the bottom of the barrel setting in their gauge house just south of the gas company office and warehouse.

Mr. Wiley reports that the barrel landed on top of the Max Wiley apartment knocking a hole in the roof, bouncing into the air and landing hard enough to knock a second hole in the roof. The Max Wileys were not at home at the time of the explosion.

Mr. Wiley states that the cause of the explosion was simply that the pressure became too high in the barrel and probably the barrel was a little weak.

A lucky feature of the explosion was that the compressor engine which was near the drum of oderant had become overheated and had died some time before the explosion or it would have probably caught fire.

What Do You Know About Tuberculosis

Do you know that tuberculosis is preventable? Curable? Not inherited?

Tuberculosis is contracted from another active case. It is a "catching disease". It is caused by a germ which usually attacks the lungs, but may attack other parts of the body, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Tuberculosis is spread from an infected person to others in several ways, some of which are: through nose and throat discharges by coughing and spitting; through using dishes, linens and other articles soiled by any infected person. Tuberculosis infection usually is the result of continued close contact with an active case; therefore, it is a "family disease".

How do we know who has tuberculosis? Early TB is without symptoms. It is no respecter of persons. It occurs in all walks of life and at any age, but is least likely to be present in serious form between the ages of 4 and 14 years.

If coughing and loss of weight are present, the disease is well advanced, and a person has lost his best chance for complete recovery.

How can we protect our families? Go to your physician for an examination, including a chest x-ray. When the mobile x-ray unit comes to your town, have a free chest x-ray. X-ray surveys have been conducted in 132 counties and 18 institutions during the past year and over 514,400 persons have been x-rayed. Protect your home from tuberculosis.

Editorial

DON'T LET DEATH TAKE YOUR HOLIDAY!

The wreath is a traditional symbol of Christmas. In windows and on front doors of homes all over America, the bright red and green of holy will signify the joyous festivities of the holiday season.

For Christmastime should be a time of happiness. Every family looks forward to the joy and celebration that the holiday period should bring. But every year thousands of families in our country see Christmas joy turned into suffering and tragedy because of needless and preventable accidents.

The National Safety Council points out that hundreds of persons are killed and thousands more injured by accidents during the Christmas-New Year's holiday season—the year's peak accident period. The No. 1 killer is traffic, and its death toll on Christmas Day is two or three times the annual daily average.

To keep death from taking your holi-

day—or the holiday of your loved ones—is a simple thing. It costs nothing, takes no time and requires only a little effort. It only means being aware of the extra holiday hazards and of the extra caution, common sense and courtesy needed to overcome them.

Refuse to drink if you are driving. Wait for the light to change. Yield the right-of-way. Discard a string of Christmas tree lights with worn insulation. Throw away gift wrappings as soon as presents are opened.

These are little things—but they pay off big in holiday happiness. These little extras go a long way toward keeping the lights on in your home and the red and green holly wreath on your door.

They will preserve for you and your loved ones the joy and delight that is America at Christmas.

SEX CRIME CURBS

Another series of sex crimes, involving small children has aroused a healthy public reaction that something should be done to prevent these heinous attacks and murders. Unfortunately, these waves of mass sentiment die down with the passage of time.

Action, however, is predicted in New York and California by reason of the rising incidence of sex offenses of an extreme nature. Democrats and Republicans in New York have urged proper action at the next session of the legislature. In Los Angeles, where nine brutal sex killings of small girls have occurred in the last 25 years and 25 cases of sex molestation of small children were reported in the week after the recent murder of 6-year-old Linda Glucoft, the most concerted approach to the problem is being taken.

Handling of sex perverts as criminals has proved inadequate in California with respect to so-called minor cases which often lead to the heinous crimes. Misdemeanor and police court prosecutions there have failed to prevent graver offenses, and it has been difficult to obtain convictions on the felony of child molesting.

Juvenile officials and educators in California in the light of this experience and in the interest of prevention have pointed to a course for handling sex deviates in their incipient stages. The cases would be defined legally as mental illness and so handled by the law. Child molesters and other abnormal types would be placed in a special hospital for them under an indeterminate sentence. Release would not be allowed until cure, based on expert opinion, was certain. Even in presumed cures, offenders would continue to have supervision by being paroled to local boards of physicians, psychiatrists and laymen.—From Fort Worth Star-Telegram

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

1. Is goat milk ever evaporated or dried? Yes. The processes for evaporating or drying goat's milk are essentially the same as for cow's milk. Goat's milk has been successfully evaporated and canned for a number of years. Dried goat's milk has been on the market even longer. The chief reason these enterprises have not expanded more is the limited amount of goat's milk available.

2. How important is vitamin A in the calf feeding ration? The New Hampshire Experimental Station found that calves consumed more feed but that gains were reduced by 50% when the supply of vitamin A was low, while utilization of protein decreased by about 25%. Vitamin A deficiency decreases the efficiency of digestion, reduces the rate of absorption of nutrients, and results in less energy produced from feeds used.

3. What can be done to prevent anemia in pigs? Anemia is caused by a deficiency of iron and copper in the mother's milk, and no brood sow ration has succeeded in correcting this deficiency. The following plan has worked very well at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company. A solution containing copper, iron, and dextrine is made up with water. This solution is painted once a day on the sows' udders so that while nursing, pigs consume a sufficient amount of iron and copper to prevent the development of anemia. The mixture is prepared in the following percentages:

Ferrous Sulphate (Copper-ground)	27%
Copper Sulphate, ground	3%
Dextrine	70%

These percentages are by weight, and one pound of the mixture dissolved in a pint of water is sufficient for one litter up to weaning.

Holiday Time For Pie

Serving pie for dessert is one of America's favorite habits—so much so that we say "As typically American as apple pie." Pies are especially traditional for holidays—Cherry Pie for Washington's Birthday and Pumpkin Pie for Thanksgiving.

Of course we must always have a Mince Pie for Christmas. The one pictured here—Mince-Cream Pie—is a new version of mince, with a layer of packaged vanilla pudding added to the top. There are other pies that carry around the name—scheme of a special holiday, like the Christmas Delight Pies described below. Here the cherries are molded in red cherry-flavored gelatin, then a layer of lime-flavored gelatin is added, for a bright and colorful Christmas dessert.

Bring on the pies—their holiday time!

Mince-Cream Pie
 1 recipe prepared vanilla pudding
 1 tub non-fat milk
 Three-fourths cup mince-meat
 1 baked 8-inch pie shell

Prepare pudding as directed on package. Cool slightly (about five minutes), stirring occasionally. Add milk and mix well. Spread mince-meat in bottom of pie shell. Cover with pudding. Chill.

Christmas Delight Pies
 1 No. 2 can red cherry pie cherries
 1 cup cherry juice and water
 1 package cherry-flavored gelatin
 1 cup hot water
 2 baked 8-inch pie shells
 1 package lime-flavored gelatin
 2 cups hot water
 2 cups cream, whipped and sweetened
 1 cup shredded coconut

Drain cherries well; reserve juice. Add enough water to juice to make 1 cup. Dissolve cherry gelatin in 1 cup hot water. Add cherry juice and water. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in cherries. Place 1/2 cup gelatin mixture in each pie shell. Chill until firm.
 Dissolve lime gelatin in 2 cups hot water. Chill until slightly thickened. Spread a thin layer of whipped cream over firm gelatin layers. Cover with slightly thickened lime gelatin. Chill until firm. Top two with remaining whipped cream and sprinkle with coconut.

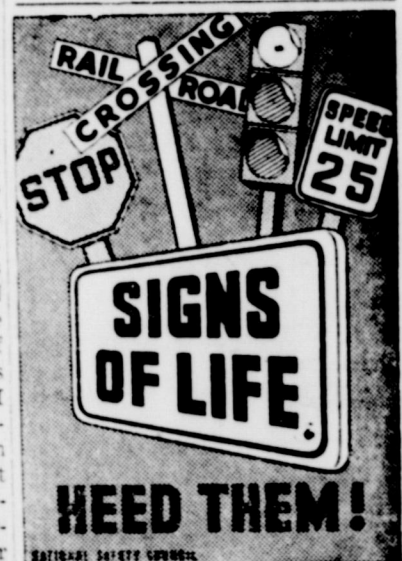

"You doctors are sure making progress," I says, "but tell me, are any of the patients fussy about whose bone they're getting?"

"No sir!" replies Doc. "No more than they worry about whose blood they get. No one yet asked for a bone from a man who went to the same school or church he did."

From where I sit, it would be a better world if we were half as willing to accept other people's ideas and tastes, as we seem to be willing to accept their bone and blood. There'll always be differences. Some like buttermilk, others would rather have a sparkling glass of temperate beer. But underneath we're pretty much the same—deserving each other's respect and tolerance!
