Editorial

WHERE THE BLAME LIES

Hints in Washington are that some high government officials may be put on the congressional griddle in an effort to saddle them with the blame for conditions which have produced our initial military reverses in Korea. As in most instances where things go wrong in government, the inclination seems to be to find a scapegoat. But if Congress

really is sincere in fixing the blame for our lack of full preparedness to meet a crisis, it has only to hold a mirror up to itself.

As early as May 1947 an eminent citizens' commission appointed by the President presented a plan for a comprehensive defense program for the United States, including a carefully safeguarded system of universal military training. The report of the commission pointed, with what now seems like an uncanny sense of prophecy, to the dangers lying in the expansionist ambitions of Russia. It urged universal military training as a means of insuring that American youth, in the event of any further armed conflict, would not be sent into battle without the training essential to success and to their chances of survival. Yet, as Mr. Daniel A. Poling, distinguished churchman and a member of the advisory commission, reminds, we are now making the same mistake that was made in two world wars.

Dr. Poling also places the blame where it belongs. As he reminds, the President repeatedly urged that the report be adopted, all responsible heads of the armed services endorsed it, and public opinion polls showed that the American people overwhelmingly supported the idea. Yet little or nothing was done in Congress to put it into effect.

The estimated cost of such a program was \$1,750,000,000 a year, which might have made it less costly in terms of money—and certainly less costly in terms of lives—than the program in which we are now embarking. For not only would it have made the United States better prepared, it might have been the means of causing would-be aggressors to shrink from the risks involved.

Hoarding of sugar since the outbreak of the Korean war has brought to public notice the enormous reserves of food in storage in this country. Sugar alone is so abundant that Cuba alone has been unable to find a market for its one-million ton surplus.

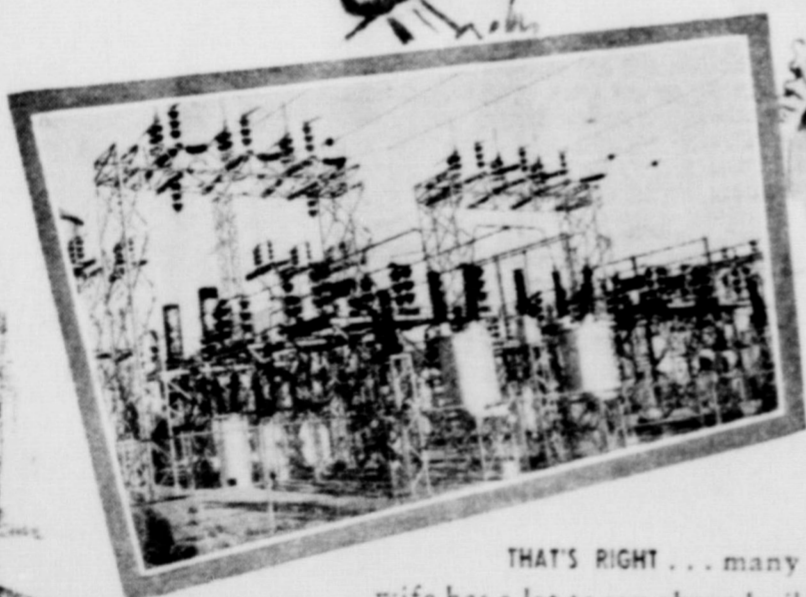
A million tons is two billion pounds; or 200 million 10-pound sacks of sugar. The run on sugar stocks obviously is a windfall only for the sugar industry, and raises a question that the real shortage will be lack of space for storage in hoarders' homes. The huge sugar surplus exists before the world's biggest crop in history is marketed. Gossip as to a sugar shortage again has been at a variance with the facts.

UNITED GAS TO EXTEND LINE

United Gas Pipe Line Company has filed an application with the Federal Power Commission Monday proposing the construction of 1,130 miles of natural gas pipe lines in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. Cost of the proposed pipe lines and other facilities was estimated to be in excess of \$111,000,000. The project will receive its supplies of gas from substantial reserves in a number of fields along the Texas and Louisiana Gulf Coasts. Construction of these facilities will provide an initial increase in the capacity of United's pipe line system of approximately 805 million cubic feet daily. These enlarged facilities would serve the triple purpose, according to the application to the increasing flexibility of the United Gas system, provide with new and substantial natural reserves of natural gas, obtaining a more balanced distribution of reserves now in cities and towns in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, southern Oklahoma and northwestern Florida. The proposed lines would constitute a major addition to the existing United Gas system, increasing the delivery capacity of the system to meet the increasing demands of present customers as well as to serve new customers in the area, according to the application. Deliveries would be made to cities, towns and plants along the lines, as well as to Texas Eastern Transmission Corporation and other companies. Newspaper Advertising

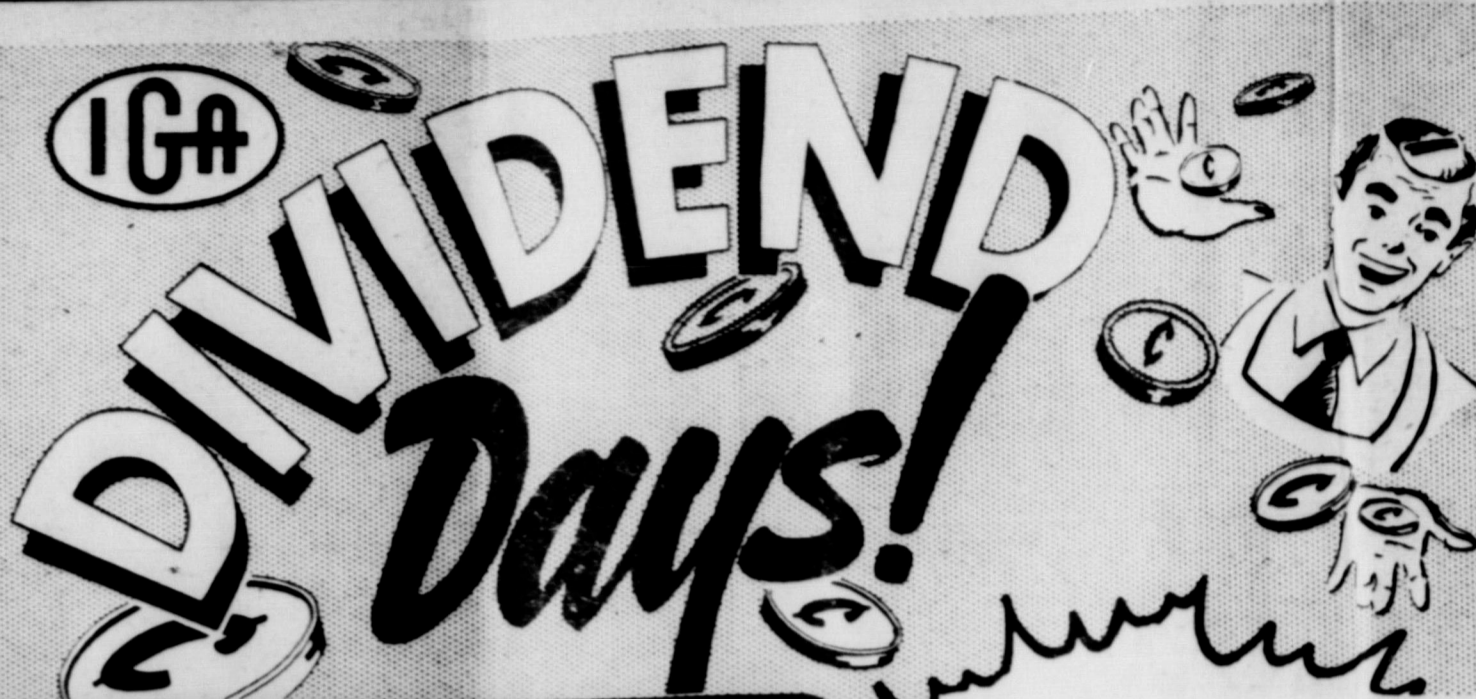

Dr. Cox Says Children Do Not Have Natural Resistance To Impetigo

When a state health authority says there is no such thing as a natural resistance to impetigo, parents of small children know exactly what he means. Those parents know, perhaps from bitter experience, that the same individual can suffer repeated attacks from what State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox calls an "offensive, annoying skin infection."

Although children are unusually susceptible, impetigo can be found in any age group, Dr. Cox said. It is most prevalent during the summer months, but has been known to occur at any month.

Impetigo, according to Dr. Cox's explanation, is a purulent skin infection. It isn't too serious, except in new born babies. An invasion of a hospital nursery ward calls for extreme attention to keep uninfected babies from getting it, for it spreads like fire in dry grass.

Impetigo is caused by a pus-forming bacteria called staphylococcus—the same sort of germ found in boils and sores where pus is present. Usually it forms an unsightly crust over wide areas of the body. The pus underneath the crust is highly infectious if allowed to get on any other skin surface.

The infection is easily transmitted when a non-infected person uses the towel of someone infected, since the towel moisture per-

mits the germ to survive. Children living in most hygienic homes frequently get impetigo, although it is perhaps more common among children living in homes where personal sanitation is considered too important.

Dr. Cox says soldiers are often infected, because they have small chance for keeping consistently clean. It may involve a whole arm, or a side of the face and neck.

The only way to minimize the ill effects of impetigo is to keep the infection localized, that is, keeping it from spreading. This can be done only by preventing the pus or serum from exuding into "clean" skin surfaces.

The family physician is the infected child's best friend. He'll advise the mother how best to combat the ailment, and how to keep it from spreading to other members of the family.

Fruit Icebox Dessert
Broadcast: August 5, 1950

1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup cold Pet Milk
4 teaspoon granulated sugar
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup canned crushed pineapple, well drained

GENERAL FARM CONDITIONS

The general crop conditions in Wheeler County is wet and weedy. The many rains have caused retarded growth in the crops found on sandy, worn out land that make up a sizeable portion of this county. The cotton growers are praying for sunshine and hot weather that is so vital to the growth of cotton. It looks as though there will be a bumper feed crop made this year if the weeds and grass can be controlled. The larger number of acres planted, plus more fertilizer and the good seasoning that we have all points to one of

Don't become exhausted through work or hard play. Don't stay in cold water too long or sit around in wet clothes. Avoid becoming chilled. Always wash hands before eating.

the largest crops of feed produced in Wheeler County's history. For the ranchmen and stockmen, the outlook is good as there is an abundance of green grass now and it should continue to get better for a while, but the ranchmen is having his troubles too; the screw-worms are very bad. One fellow said that a cow could just have a blood-shot eye from a social hang-over and she would get screw-worms. Be sure to make it a point to see your cattle as often as possible because of screw-worms can sure do the damage in just a short period.

GRADING MARKET HOGS

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has set up a new system for grading slaughter hogs. It is based on the old system of choice, good, medium, and common fat barrows and gilts. The change being made in the grade of choice. Choice now consist of three sub-grades of choice 1, 2, and 3. This change was brought about mainly through demand of the housewife who wanted a trimmer piece of meat with less fat, especially the loin and side.

Slaughter barrows and gilts are classified primarily on the degree of finish; this is where choice 1, 2, and 3 comes in.

Choice 1 are those hogs that are lacking a high degree of finish. Before this change they are called "warmed over" or hogs that were lacking finish.

Choice 2 is the middle of the road hogs that shows a high degree of finish. This was formerly the standard of perfection in marketing hogs.

Choice 3 are hogs that have been over finished but still are top in quality and conformation.

SHALLOW SOIL

Many people in the Shamrock vicinity have had trouble with their trees, shrubs, and flowers turning yellow and dying after 2 or 3 growing seasons. This is probably due to the limited amount of top-soil in this area: Unfortunately there is a layer of gyp or lime only a few feet below the ground level, and in some spots it is no more than a few inches to the lime formation. When plant roots reach this lime formation, they must either change growth direction to obtain needed nutrients or they will turn yellow

and die. Barnyard manure is the best solution to this problem as it will furnish the nutrients as well as organic matter that the soil needs. Commercial fertilizers will counteract lime in the top soil but will be of little benefit on the gyp layer underneath.

Tobe Fry, who lives northeast of Wheeler, dug holes around his elm trees and applied organic fertilizer in these holes. This restored the growth and color to his trees.

JOHNSON GRASS AND BERMUDA KILLERS

Two new chemicals are out for eradicating Johnson grass and Bermuda: These are ammate and Trichloroacetic acid (T. C. A.) T. C. A. and ammate are soil sterilizers, but do not have the long lasting affect as did the salts or previous chemicals used for killing these field pest. The rate of mixing and application are 3-lbs. T. C. A. per gallon of water and 1/2-lb. per 100 sq. feet mixed in the form of a spray. This T. C. A. can be obtained from any of the chemical companies now and can probably be found locally in the near future.

Equipment in the sewing room should include a sewing machine, work table, full view mirror, ironing board, sleeve board and iron. Small items should include shears, scissors, measuring tape, pins, thread, pin cushion, and needles to take care of the different sewing jobs.

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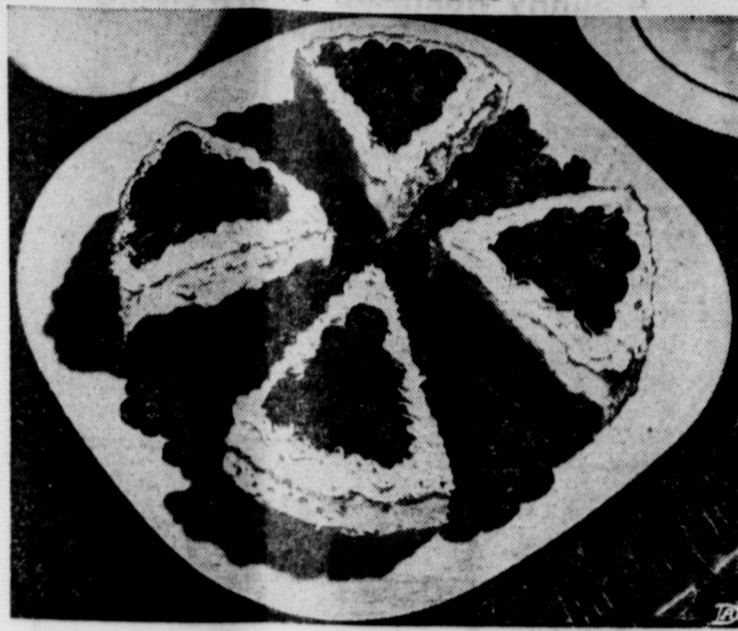

Party Shortcake



Truly a party pie is this sweet biscuit shortcake cut into wedges, then heaped high with raspberries and glorified with whipped cream cheese piping.

RASPBERRY SHORTCAKE

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 6 tablespoons shortening
- 1/2 to 1 cup milk
- Sweetened raspberries
- Whipped cream

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk to make a thick batter, stirring only until flour is well moistened. Spread in ungreased 9-inch layer cake pan. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Cut in pie-shaped wedges. Heap with sweetened raspberries. Garnish with whipped cream. Makes 1 9-inch shortcake.

HOME KITCHEN SCENE OF MANY ACCIDENTS

More farm accidents occur in the home than in any other single place on the farm and about the most dangerous room in the house is the kitchen. There are many reasons why accidents happen in the kitchen, says Mrs. Bernice Claylor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. & M. College, but few outrank carelessness and household disorder.
 Poor connections on the gas stove; overheating or using kerosene in coal or wood ranges; gas escaping when a boiling pot has extinguished a flame; pots and pans containing hot food or water upset by children, using worn-out equipment, especially electrical appliances, matches not placed out of the children's reach and accidents that often happen to the homemaker while frying foods in deep fat—these are common causes of kitchen accidents.

Mrs. Claylor says that a well kept kitchen, one that is provided with plenty of cabinet and storage space, is most likely to be a safe room. However, carelessness can nullify the features of even the best planned and constructed kitchen. One gas explosion or a fire caused from hot grease removes the kitchen and often times the housewife from further safety troubles.
 The stairs and steps both inside and outside the home seem to have been made especially for creating accidents by falling since so many

home accidents happen there. It is dangerous under any circumstances to walk on stairs with both arms loaded and it is doubly so when the stairs or steps are cluttered. Stairway treads should all be the same width and risers the same height, says Mrs. Claylor, and the treads should not be polished.

The stairway is no place to store the broom, mop nor the children's toys. Scatter rugs should never be placed at the bottom nor the top landings of the stairway. Loose or frayed runners are extremely dangerous. Cellar steps are usually poorly lighted and also catch more of the items that are just temporarily set there until they can be moved into the cellar. These are the items that cause many of the serious home accidents. They are not moved until someone gets hurt.
 Protection from fire hazards, orderliness, timely repairing, using tools and equipment as they were intended to be used, disposing of worn out appliances and the use of common sense will greatly reduce the number of home accidents, says Mrs. Claylor.

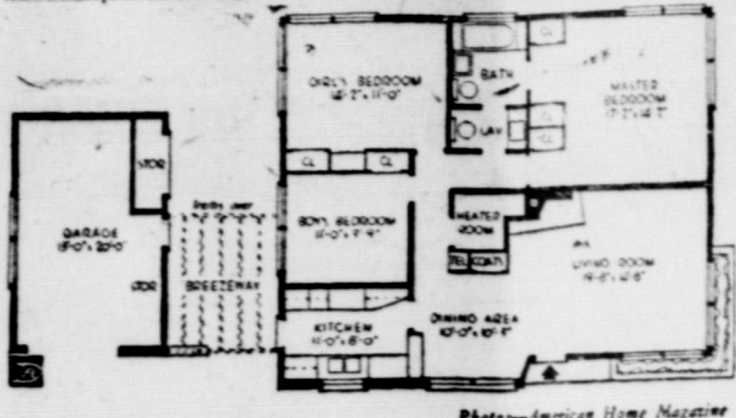

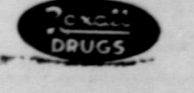

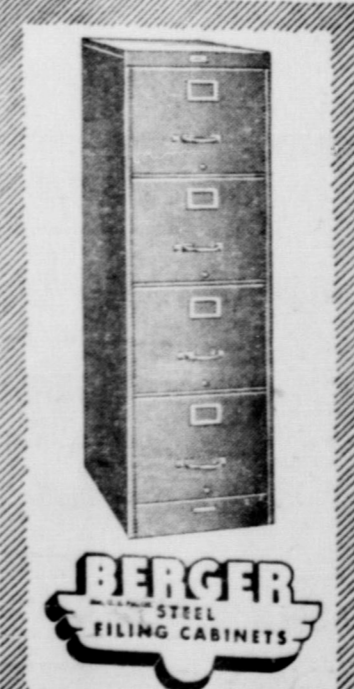
